Fryeburg

There and back again

Traveling back from the Airstream International this past year from Fryeburg, Maine, was, at least for me, a most satisfying road trip. The trip to the International was certainly incredible! We caravanned out from Minnesota, with excitement mounting at every stop. The termination of every day is a happy respite from a day driving. After all, we were on a time schedule, with scheduled stops every 250 miles, more or less. And, of course, the International itself was an amazing event. A bit hot for that part of the country, but we had a wonderful time...if I had a nickel for every time a local in Fryeburg declared that "it's never this hot in Maine," I could probably start a commercial enterprise of one kind or another. However, it was the travel back to Minnesota that made it all worthwhile.

Those who know me well also know that I spent a good amount of time living in the Northeast, which I consider the most beautiful part of our Nation. The Northeast? Really? Well, it's all subjective. That opinion belongs to me. Some will agree, some will hold their nose to my proclamation. I'll throw out a few words in simple explanation. The Rocky Mountains are huge and majestic, with towering peaks reaching well above the tree line, made famous through the lens of none other than Ansel Adams; the most famous of which is the face of Half Dome, in Yosemite Valley, California. The entire Rocky Mountain Range, from north to south, captures a beauty that can only be appreciated in person.





Or perhaps the desert in our American Southwest! Such beauty; especially during the Spring flower bloom. When Carry and I made our six-month western trip during the 2015 to '16 winter months, we witnessed an "explosion" of hummingbirds that I never understood existed in the desert. I didn't know! Another example of "you just gotta see it to believe it." And the Spring wildflowers! Gorgeous beyond belief. Or the huge saguaro cactus! How special are those living specimens?

Or how about tropical Florida! Steamy and hot in the summer, and very livable during the winter. The running joke is that if there's anyplace on the planet that has more mosquitoes than Minnesota, it certainly must be Florida. It's a fun place to stay in the winter, but rather crowded. When Carry and I were full time in our Airstream for 6 plus years,



we spent 3 winters in Florida. Probably the most memorable side trip we made was to Key West; the southern most point of the entire United States, with so much to see and do. From there we go to St. Augustine, the oldest city in the entire United States. My favorite lasting experience from the oldest city being the pirate museum. And we can't forget the pounding waves of the Atlantic Ocean. The Gulf side is nice, but the Atlantic has some sort of unique, special quality that only a huge ocean could possibly possess. Of course, let us not forget Walt Disney and Mickey Mouse! Pictured on the right is none other than something called the "Airstream Ranch," which used to be located on Interstate 5 just outside of Tampa. Unfortunately, it's no longer there. The

city demanded that it be removed for further development. I was there! And you really had to want to get there to witness the spectacle. We had to walk through some serious mud from a side road to reach this monument. One theory says it was an alien landing site. Not me. There are some strange people in Florida.



So, why should the Northeast be my favorite location within our beautiful, diverse Nation? Part of my belief is very personal, and where I certainly have no problem sharing those personal beliefs, I can't ramble on too long, so let's get to



the heart of the affair. I would use this analogy; if the Northeast were a '50s pinup girl, it would be Betty Page. The Rocky Mountains command a certain majesty, but rather dull and plain to the naked eye. By contrast, most of the summits of the Northeast are below the tree line, which means they stay green during the summer, and a beautiful mixture of golds and reds during autumn. Rolling hills and small towns dot the landscape, where tradition and old town squares remind us of a time long gone. And the reason for this is twofold. The rolling landscape is steep and doesn't allow for massive re-development of old buildings. And there is a certain Yankee sensibility that says that things are "fine, just the way they are." Anyone who has spent anytime up in the Northeast knows exactly what I'm talking about.

But there's another, far more important reason for my love of this region. The history and the founding of our Nation. If you want to know where the roots of our Nation are found, go to Boston, and span out from there. On our way home from last year's Rally in Fryeburg, we took our time, with no particular schedule, and stopped wherever we pleased and spent valuable time. One such place was the old Air Force Base in Plattsburgh, New York, on the shores of Lake Champlain. I spent 3 years of my life on that base before I was sent overseas. The buildings all go back to the 19th Century and are on the National Historic register. They were once Officers Barracks, but have been turned into fancy townhomes, and one even a brewery. And the brewery is a Harvest Host. Seriously, check it out. It's great! Good food, and beer. Who can resist. And I spent a very special time walking the old cemetery. These are people lost during war, dating as far back as the War of 1812, and the famous Battle of Plattsburgh, on Lake Champlain. I walked this cemetery with careful contemplation, just like I use to, fifty years ago as a very young man. But I found something that I can't believe I missed so many years ago. An unknown soldier from the Revolutionary War.





Who was this person? Obviously, we don't know. But we could write stories and allow our imagination to run wild. Was he killed in the area? Very likely, would be my guess. Where was his home? No one knows. My guess, if we knew who he was, he probably would have been sent home for burial. He was probably a poor farmer, as were most soldiers who fought in the war. But possibly also a laborer of one kind or another. And very likely rather young, most being about 20 years of age. It's very unlikely that he was an officer, because most officers of the day were mostly educated and wealthier, and less likely to be an unknown. As far as I know, there were no major land battles near Plattsburgh during the Revolution, with most action taking place on Lake Champlain against opposing Navies. But, there could have been a small skirmish along the shores of the big lake. Many such small battles never made our history books. Lake Champlain was used to move troops and supplies up and down the lake from Montreal. Is it possible that a small boat of British Regulars came ashore in the area and were opposed by Plattsburgh locals? We will never know. Our unknown will remain forever lost to history. May he rest in Peace!

Maple Syrup

Terry and I processed Maple Syrup this spring. Here is our story.

Terry and I live on over 11 acres north of Princeton. Terry has wanted to process Maple Syrup for years, so this was our first offering. Our neighbor did as well, so we went in on it together.

We started tapping in late March and ran the taps for about 10 days. It started out slow, but once it started flowing it came abundantly.







The snow was very deep, so it made getting the syrup out of the woods very difficult. ATV's and other equipment just got stuck, so we had to pull a sled. Those are two-gallon buckets that are full. Eight x two = 16 gallons. 16 gallons x 7 lbs. per gallons = 112 lbs through heavy snow got tiring. We had to do this at the peak once a day. It takes about 40 gallons to get one gallon of syrup. The syrup comes out as crystal clear water, and it has a light sweetness to it.

From there it went into a machine we built that removes 50% of the water. It is called a reverse osmosis machine (to the right) this is a big-time saver as it takes hours and hours to boil off the water...and then it comes inside where it takes more time to boil it down.





The top pan on the stove (to the left) is a warmer pan, once we get the water boiling, we want to keep it there and the way we do this is keep four gallons simmering above the main eight gallon pan and allow it to trickle in real slow.

In the end we harvested over 160 gallons of syrup and ended up with about three gallons of syrup. The syrup is very creamy and of course is wonderful.







+Bird Friend By Shelli Stanger Nelson BRN 4062

Have you ever thought you could talk to the animals like Dr. Doolittle? Well, you can. And I have. Science now provides evidence of just such communication. Curious? Read on. If not, stop here!

We've made ourselves a lonely place. At once quiet and chaotic, overstimulated and yet often completely desolate. We fill our thoughts, homes, even the space around us and thus, our nervous systems with noise. Noise that ends up stifling real sounds. Sounds that produce not only peaceful feelings but honest to goodness healing. Where might we find these sounds? Hint: not from the TV or even through our listening devices. Swallow up the sounds of birds (and all of nature) for a true mood lift.

Listening became more important after losing my physical eyesight when I was 23 years of age secondary to diabetes. Never missing a teaching moment, I'll take this opportunity to educate sighted people about "other senses". First, stop questioning people who are blind about "other senses increasing"! We've been asked this same question about, oh, 50,000 times before. And secondly, no, other senses do not become more acute. They become more evident. Rather than seeing what's going on in the street outside my window as I write this I'm listening to the sounds. The sounds are easier for me to focus on because my attention isn't overtaken by what I'm seeing. Sure, because my vision isn't taking my concentration I can hear more details in sounds. But sighted people can also hear these same nuances just by closing their eyes. Or even merely deciding on purpose to target the sound rather than the vision. By doing this anyone will detect subtleties through their hearing.

Listening to birdsong involves much more than casually noticing it in the background. If we sit with the intention to understand it's musical language, in all of it's variations, we cause neurological changes in our brains. Changes that enhance memory, concentration and focus. In fact, studies show that people with brain injury or other degenerative brain processes see improved cognition when exposed to a steady dose of birdsong. Remarkable, right? This free therapy is accessible to anyone who decides to give it a whirl. Depression and symptoms of isolation and loneliness can lessen when we turn off the noise and let in the melodic sounds of birds.

"When we understand the meanings of a sound made by a bird, nerves in two different brains touch and signal to one another. The link between nerve cells is made from vibrating air, a connection as real and strong as the chemical links between nerves of a single brain in a single species. Birdsong then, is a sonic neurotransmitter that leaps between species."(1) What results is a new language forged by the listening of the human and the speaking of the bird. This inter-species communication can be restorative as well as informative.

Once we have conditioned the self to recognize this communication, we can respond to the invitation from the birds around our homes. They are inviting us to pause, to feel the greater world by listening, not by touching. They are inviting us to recognize the joy of life through their singing. They are inviting us to notice something larger and more constant than what lies in the limits of human desires or human troubles. After disasters, birds always sing, reminding us that hope endures.

If we wish to, we can interpret the bird's song and all of its idiosyncrasies. When we become attuned to the messages of birds, we then can step deeper into connection with all species and living things: the moaning of the bark of a tree, the fifty-plus different calls of a crow, the singing of the flowers (I've listened to a video in which a group of flowers literally emits the sound of music), the whistling of dew and the music of falling snow. A leaf tells a story far beyond that which our eyes can see. The story is told through communication that takes place through hearing but also through the heart and soul. We won't easily hear this story with our eyes fixed on the obvious but instead, by plunging into the abundance found only through concentrated focus. Eyes closed we are encouraged, or rather forced, to utilize senses beyond the restriction that eclipses our truly significant ways we hear. We must, however, buy into the idea that listening with focus is beneficial. That sitting in the quiet, with Facebook closed and the time-waster device set aside is entertaining, fulfilling, worthwhile and even healing.

I'm reminded here of a poem I once heard the great poet, David White, perform. Sadly, White never gave the author but said the poem is part of Native American legend. "` "No two trees are the same to raven; no two branches the same to wren. If what a tree or branch does is lost on you, then, you are surely lost. Stand still, listen, listen. ..."

I had not come upon the aforementioned science when I forged a relationship with a male cardinal through communication based on listening. I know! Right?

It was an astounding and humbling experience for me to literally communicate with this beautiful creature. He was the one who began the relationship. He clearly sang in a different melody whenever he saw me. This caught my attention and I simply put effort into connecting with him. It quickly became obvious to me that he was being intentional about what he was doing with his voice. He waited for me patiently before I fully grasped what was happening in my little suburban home nestled in the deep woods. I still see him now, perched on the handrail of our deck, looking directly into our home just four feet from him, his head turning side -to-side like birds do. And letting out the most curious sounds that to this day I've not heard replicated.

The relationship worked like this most of the time: I might be in the kitchen and he'd land on our deck rail outside our sun porch. I'd come to the sun room and he'd get excited, chirping the way he did only for me. I intentionally expanded my heart energy toward him. He'd respond to this with more enthusiastic singing, again, in a way particular only in my presence.

I decided on purpose, in other words, set my intention, to try to communicate with him. Of course, I had no idea how to talk to a bird. I was, however, astute enough to know that I shouldn't try mimicking another cardinal. It came to me that he was purposely attempting to communicate with me in particular. He called me out from the house. Or he'd find me elsewhere on our property and change his melody. I gave thought to what sort of things I could communicate. Rather than pretending I could whistle as well as a bird, never mind having any notion whatsoever what my human whistle meant to the bird, I worked on simple messages such as communicating my delight in him. Or telegraphing single emotions such as love, happiness and sadness.

Bird Friend, the only name I ever had for him, responded to my signals by singing, tweeting out single chirps or more sophisticated combinations of melodies. I learned to pay attention to how he was singing and the amount of zeal he put into his communications. After this, I began to become curious if I could convey my desires to him. I wondered if I could actually create a give-and-take relationship. So, I began signaling him to do different things. I asked him to, for example, fly to a specific tree branch. Or to come closer to me or to move from railing to railing on the deck. Imagine my astonishment when, sensationally, he managed to follow my requests with mind-blowing accuracy nearly 90% of the time.

I seldom used verbal words with him. Most of my connection was made through pure intention; me making a conscious decision about what I wanted to say and being focused and clear. I learned to understand him as well. I could tell when he was lonesome, particularly happy or being playful. Sometimes when I was outside he'd sneak up on me by swooping down from his silent perch in the trees, flying unusually close to me, landing nearby and singing in a way I came to know as his laugh.

I know this sounds almost impossible, bordering on the ridiculous but our relationship was very mutual. My husband, Brent, observed the interaction between Bird Friend and me on many occasions. Our affair was singular between us and I relished the periods of shared connection. Our communications dwindled during the deep winter and to my absolute utter astonishment, I heard him call me to the deck in late February or early March following that first winter. If only birds had a longer life. After two summers and another autumn, I never heard him again. I was hopeful that third summer that he'd land on the deck railing and call me from the kitchen. It never happened.

While you're traveling, or at your home base, how about you give this a try? My best advice is to approach your bird with calm assurance. Avoid being "pushy" or willful. Likewise, avoid pulling on the bird or other creature. I learned that my energy was the pivotal component to the success of our friendship and communication. A great first start is to simply open your heart and appreciate these glorious creatures surviving here from the dinosaur age to fill the trees and our hearts with their healing songs.

Newsletter Editor Ramblings

Last November, I talked about how the cork floor in our trailer got damaged by a water leak and that we found and fixed the leak and pulled up the damaged floor. And that the cork floor was no longer manufactured, so we thought we'd solve the problem by installing all new cork floor in our family room and use the family room floor to patch the trailer floor. Sounded really good in theory, right? Well, I'm happy to report that we patched the floor in our trailer, but learned a couple of things in the process.

First thing we learned is that we bought the cork floor for the family room about a year after we installed the floor in our trailer. Same manufacture and model, so shouldn't be a fitting problem, right? Well, the family room floor tiles are about $1/32^{nd}$ of an inch narrower than the original trailer floor tiles. Doesn't sound like much, but once we got $\frac{3}{4}$ of the way across the trailer with the patching, the seams no longer lined up with the old floor tiles. So, we have a slight gap (1/8" wide) between two tiles about a foot long. Fortunately, it's mostly under the dinette table, so not overly noticeable. I have a plan to fill it after our next couple of trips. We decided to wait to see if traveling would shake things around a bit and maybe close the gap for us. Probably wishful thinking.

Second thing we learned is that the family room floor was exposed to sunlight a lot more than the trailer floor. So, many of the patch tiles are much lighter than the old tiles. Picture below shows the difference.



Kay read online that you can stain cork flooring, so she tried on some scrap pieces. The cork flooring does <u>not</u> accept stain hardly at all. Most of the floor is covered with furniture and a big area rug, so again, it's not overly noticeable. Kay says we are not going to try and sand and stain the floor. We'll just spill coffee and let the floor get darkened that way. On a very positive note, everything is all back together and we attended the Spring Rally with an intact trailer. And we're ready for our travels this summer!

On to a different topic. While in Alaska last year, we had the three rear red marker lights stop working. Well, one stopped working completely, and the other two were only half working. These are LED marker lights we installed 14 years ago while rebuilding her. Since we were never driving at night, we decided to wait until we got home to replace them. I replaced them a few weeks ago, and when I tested them, I discovered that the two rear red side markers were also bad. This is like where one thing leads to another. So, I ordered two more red marker lights (LED again) and installed them last week. Then I noticed that the old yellow marker lights were significantly dimmer than the new red marker lights. So, while I was at it, I ordered all new yellow marker lights and replaced them yesterday and today.

Hopefully you can see the difference between the two. The pics lose some of the contrast because in person, the difference is more pronounced.

Installing them was pretty straight forward. Pop the outer cover off and remove two screws, and then pop the old light off the trailer.

The old marker lights are wired in with two wires. One for power and a white neutral or return (sometimes called the ground wire). I used a green colored power wire for all of the running lights on the trailer.





The new lights only have one black wire for power. The return/ground is via the metal ring in the light over the right-hand screw hole. The screw that attaches the light to the skin of the trailer provides the return/ground. However, I don't trust that completely, especially since I seal the screw hole with caulk to prevent a water leak around the screw.

So, I made a pigtail to provide a better return/ground connection.





Here's a new marker light connected to the existing wiring.

Here's the new marker light wired in and screwed back down. The lug on the pigtail I made and connected to the white wire in the previous picture is attached to the light with the right-hand screw, ensuring a good return/ground connection.



Overkill? Maybe. But I tend to overengineer things sometimes. Just ask Kay. 😊

(Kay here: it's very true! You definitely don't want to take apart something Chris has put together....)

On to a third topic. It is with some sadness that I made the decision to stop being the Newsletter Editor for the Silver Times. I announced at the Spring Rally that this edition is the last edition that I will be editor.
