These salsas are an ideal accompaniment for grilled shrimp, chicken, turkey or simply served with tortilla chips!

Chunky Watermelon Salsa

- ♠ 1 lime
- 2 cups 1/2" pieces seeded watermelon
- 1 cup 1/2" pieces seeded peeled cucumber
- \$\square\$ 1/4 cup thinly sliced green onions
- 2 TB minced fresh cilantro
- § 2 tsp minced seeded jalapeño pepper

Using a small sharp knife, cut peel and white pith from lime. Cut lime into 1/4" pieces. Place in med bowl. Add all remaining ingredients to same bowl. Season with salt and pepper. Toss to blend. Cover and refrigerate at least 30 min. (Can be prepared 2 hours ahead.)

The Natchez Trace and Outer Space: Part I

A Travel Diary by Member Candice Kissinger

As soon as we finished winterizing the trailer last Fall, we began to think about where we might travel in 2023. We wanted to revisit the National World War II Museum in New Orleans, an organization we had supported as donors since its inception. After a decade, it was time to return and view the new exhibits. We read about the inaugural 'Cruisin' The Natchez Trace' caravan in Blue Beret magazine and thought it might be possible to combine these destinations. The WBAC organizers advised that the Caravan was sold out for 2023 and filling up fast for 2024. I did some research and contacted NatchezTraceTravel.com (P.O. Box 155, White House, TN 37188), gaining an excellent collection of materials to plan my own trip. Using my usual tools (RVTripWizard, tips from Airstream Addicts/Facebook, etc.), I was able to make campground reservations along what ended up being a 2,027 mile route from West Lafayette, IN to Louisville, KY, Nashville, TN, the entire length of the Natchez Trace (Nashville, TN to Natchez, MS), New Orleans, and a return through Alabama (Mobile, Montgomery) so we could visit the U.S. Space and Rocket Center in Huntsville, AL.

Last year, I used a KOA campground for the first time. I had always avoided them, thinking that staying there violated some unwritten code of Airstream ethics. However, when I needed a couple of overnight stops in 2022, I found KOA to be clean, consistent, reliable (full hookups with everything functional), easy to book and a very handy way to get a refill for a propane tank. Usually, I was able to get a pull-through site...much appreciated after a long day of driving. They were also secure and more appealing than a noisy night spent in the parking lot of Walmart or Cracker Barrel. As I describe the trip, you will notice one-night KOA stops before and after the Natchez Trace.

We departed West Lafayette on March 29th, 2023 with our still winterized trailer in tow. We would get it flushed, sanitized and ready at our first stop: a KOA south of Louisville (**). Along the way, we passed Seymour, IN and called up some John Mellencamp music to honor their favorite son. The early spring weather was cool but pleasant. After de-winterizing, everything worked...a great start to the trip!



The next day we headed towards Nashville with Johnny Cash setting the musical mood. Just before crossing the KY-TN border, we passed the construction site for a mega-factory in Kentucky being built to manufacture batteries for Ford electric vehicles. The weather was considerably warmer as we pulled into our site at the KOA (***) close to the Grand Old Opry. After a quick setup, we enjoyed a family-style Southern meal at Paula Deen's restaurant nearby to satisfy cravings for fried chicken, collard greens, sweet potatoes and big fluffy biscuits with butter. With the unknown territory of the Trace ahead, our meal plans were to be self-sustaining and we picked up additional groceries

sufficient for several days.

Getting out of Nashville and finding the starting point for the Trace was a bit tricky but Exit 192 on I-40 had a sign pointing out the Natchez Trace Parkway (NTP), which leads to McCrory Lane, terminating at State Rd 100, a quick right turn and another big sign. We entered a road presenting lots of twists, turns, and hills ahead.

Candice and Pete Kissinaer have been Airstreamina since the purchase of their 2019 International Serenity 23FB. They tow BRN 3227 (The Parrot Palace) with a 2019 GMC Sierra Denali and are supervised by their winged overlords: Winston and Clementine (a pair of Indian Ringneck parrots who rule the back seat and make witty comments about the traffic, weather and driving skills of their hapless minions). A birdy rating system is used in this essay to indicate *inferior* (∗*) *to superior* (* * * *) camping experiences encountered on this trip.

Editor's Note: Winton & Clementine's original rating symbol was a parrot. Unfortunately due to my publishing challenges, it had to be revised to a much less exciting star.

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Nashville is actually the end of the Trace, from a historical perspective. Its original travelers were the Kentucky traders ("Kaintucks") who loaded flat boats on the Ohio River with goods to be sold in Natchez on the Mississippi River. They sold the boats too because those were the days before steam engines existed to return boats upstream. Using profits from the sale of the boat and merchandise, each merchant bought a horse and supplies and then followed the old Buffalo trail from

Natchez all the way home to Tennessee/Kentucky. The organizers of the WBAC caravan were traveling from Natchez to Nashville. We were doing it backwards. Today, the entire length of the 2-lane parkway is a single National Park, run by the U.S. Department of the Interior. It features mile markers that were referenced on the maps we obtained. There

are countless brown signs with white letters advising the distance to waterfalls, overlooks, rivers, picnic tables, prehistoric mounds, historic sites, and wild turkey crossings with lovely turnouts that make it easy to pull a tow vehicle and trailer off the road



for a quick look. Traffic is restricted to small vehicles, with campers and trailers allowed but no large commercial vehicles. Some of the old bridges that cross over the NTP are too low for a semi. I double-checked the height of our Airstream...no problem! The speed limit is restricted to 50 mph most of the way and it is enforced. After being encased in the rumble and flow of semis on I-65 for a couple of days, it was a pleasant downshift to be cruising along the serene and beautiful NTP, with dogwoods and redbuds in full flower.

Our first stop was near Hohenwald, TN, at the Fall Hollow Village Campground (*), right off the NTP on Columbia Parkway. This was frankly overpriced at \$55/night but the operator of the camp claimed it was an event weekend for something called 'Mule Days' and thus worthy of a higher rate. Since there was no evidence of any festival called 'Mule Day' in Hohenwald, I concluded that the owner was just amusing himself by making an 'ass' out of the tourists. As it turns out, the celebration was further away in Columbia TN, but we missed it. The camp itself was not more than a group of full-time trailers in various degrees of disrepair, with no amenities at all. I had just finished reading an article about severe weather precautions which recommended taking shelter in the restroom at a campground, since these were typically brick or block buildings with no windows. This place didn't even offer a bathroom. As it turned out, severe weather was headed our way with a wide front



that was already causing havoc further west. We had scheduled 2 nights in Fall Hollow so we could go back along the Trace and do some hiking to see a waterfall and visit the final resting place of Meriwether Lewis, the famous explorer who, with help from Sacagawea, found a way to Oregon (Lewis and Clark Expedition, commissioned by President Thomas Jefferson). On our second night, our phones lit up at midnight with warnings from the National Weather Center. This was a surprise be-

cause we hadn't detected any connectivity in that location beyond a very faint signal (barely one bar). Now we were getting a message which said "Severe Danger! Take cover immediately!!" When I looked outside, lights were going on in other trailers and in the one

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next to us, the door flew open and several people ran outside, jumped into a car and tore off into the night, wheels squealing like they were the Dukes of Hazzard. Knowing that we had nowhere to hide, all we could do was hope for the best. The Weather Service warnings continued and became even more urgent, leading me to expect that the next one would tell me to bend over and kiss my fanny goodbye. Within 30 minutes, the wind was howling, lightning was on a repeat loop and then we were being pummeled by what sounded like baseballs. I had visions of leftover meatloaf wrapped in aluminum foil, with Pete and I serving as the meatloaf and the Airstream becoming the foil. Fortunately, the storm ratcheted down to a steady rain and we were able to unwind enough to get some sleep. The next morning, after



inspecting the trailer and miraculously finding not a single dimple, we learned that we had been 3.5 minutes away from certain death. A tornado had indeed touched down three



miles from us. As we returned to the Trace, we soon encountered the devastation of huge trees plucked, roots and all, out of the ground and scattered through a crushed section of forest. A mature red oak has a mass as high as 6,000 pounds (same as our Airstream). There was no doubt that our trailer would have been in trouble if that twister had traveled 3 minutes longer in our direction. Two weeks prior to our trip, rural Mississippi had suffered from several tornadoes and as we continued along the NTP, we saw piles of wood and the remains of large trees that had fallen across the road. Given the size of the trees, it was impressive how fast and thoroughly the Park Service had cleared the roadway.
