ABOUT BRN'S

From Eric McHenry on social media: Clarification on BRN display (effective May 11th at the IBT meeting). I loved the process the IBT took - polling their members, then a significant amount of time in discussion amongst themselves. Ultimately the vote for the following language was adopted almost unanimously (14 Yes, 2 No, 3 non-voting).

The consensus was that a) BRNs were great and a neat part of our history/present, b) we encourage them to be displayed, c) the IBT also understands (and values) the preference of some members to be able to choose when/where to display.

16.6.10 Airstream Numbers

A. The display of the Big Red Number (BRN) is encouraged for participation in Club activities to assist with the identification, location, logistics, parking, communications, and some safety considerations. When the BRN is required for participation, the activity organizer shall inform the participants in advance and at registration. All methods for displaying BRNs, when required, should be visible and clear to read as described on the "All About BRNs" Club webpage.

The traditional method of display is provided below:

- 1. The Club Decal is affixed to the recreational vehicle centered above the front and rear windows or cluster lights, if so equipped, though lower or not centered placement is acceptable if Airstream badging, antennas, cameras, etc. do not permit application in the preferred location.
- 2. The vinyl BRNs should be centered, front and rear, below the decal.
- 3. The use of 6" high numbers is desired unless space does not permit, in which case Headquarters will provide numbers of a size that may be used.
- 4. Membership Stars, one for each 5 years of membership, are ideally to be placed half on either side of the Club Decal, if space permits. In the case of an odd number of stars the extra star should be to the left of the Club Decal. If space does not permit, the Stars can be placed above or below the Club

Featured Caravan

CRUIZIN' ALONG THE OPEN ROAD...OR THE NATCHEZ TRACE, IN THIS CASE

With a phone call from a fellow club member as motivation, I logged onto the club website and registered for the **inaugural** *Cruzin' the Natchez Trace* caravan. Then I looked up the caravan to see what I had committed to, as travelling with my Airstream friends was enough to get me to sign up, but I was curious as to what they'd gotten me into. Seventeen days to drive 444 miles? With 5 stops? Geez, this was going to be a slow one...

Which is just how the Natchez Trace should be appreciated. Slowly and leisurely. No commercial traffic. 50 mph speed limit, which is rigorously patrolled and enforced by the National Park Service Police. Ample options to pull off the route and park for picnics, waterfall hikes, historical sites, ancient burial mounds, small towns full of character and history ... SOOO MUCH TO SEE!



We travelled the Trace from south to north, same as the Kaintuck would have done in the early 1800's – it's much easier to walk back home after floating your flatboats of goods for sale in the big cities of Natchez or New Orleans than fight the downstream currents. Starting in Natchez, we got an overview during lunch in an antebellum mansion (complete with tour). The next day was a tour of the Longwood House, an octagonal home never completed after the death of the original designer and the Civil War interrupting construction. That did not deter his wife from raising her children in the semi-finished basement level, and two more generations of the family living there, as well! When donated to the Natchez Garden Society, the donor stipulated the house was to remain in the same state of semi-completion as it had been lived in for all those years ... to preserve it for all it was as it was.

Then our first day driving up the Trace. The Driver's Guide stated "96 miles – approximately 5 hours" ... what?!?! This is when we learned that staggering our departures would allow everyone parking at the various stops along the route ... most lots were large enough for 3-5 rigs, but not all 22 at once. The route is clearly marked with "site ahead 1mile" signs, then larger signs at the sites. The Emerald Mound is the 2nd largest burial mound in Mississippi, built by the Natchez starting in approximately 1350, and in use until the early 1800's. One basket at a time. On foot. To honor their culture, people, and history. It's overwhelming.

Second stop: Vicksburg, MS. Here we had a walking tour of the historic parts of downtown by a descendant of Jefferson Davis, president of the Confederate States of America, and a bus tour of the Battlefield, and the Cairo gunboat remains at the Visitor Center. A sobering history, balanced by the tangible remnants of the siege such as dented front gates and patched ceilings and floors due to



Our next day of driving was the longest, at 216 miles ... but also included a stop for lunch in French Camp, an historic town that is the present-day site of an academy for underprivileged kids, where they live and learn life skills in the pottery shop, bakery, store, farmlands, and other businesses. The Trace also provided more opportunities for waterfalls, historic stands (what the travelers called inns), and the Mississippi Craft Center.

Stop #3 was Tupelo, birthplace of Elvis Presley. We also toured the Buffalo Zoo animal sanctuary. More light-hearted than Vicksburg and Shiloh (next stop). The campground was also a spectacular state park where we had 12 of the sites that lined a peninsula into a lake with a beautiful shoreline and fantastic scenery. Our second "caravan dinner" was at this park



– where our kitty fee covered the cost of a meal prepared by members of the group. On a personal adventure, after stopping at the hardware store where "Miss Gladys bought her son his first guitar," I had lunch with caravan mates at a restaurant that met their criteria: 1. must not be a national chain, 2. must contain someone's name (if they're willing to tell you who is responsible, it must be pretty good!), and there must be ample parking. Kermit's Outlaw Kitchen fit the bill. Have you ever had a hamburger made from barbequed brisket? There are no words. I suggest you go explore downtown and taste for yourself!

Another 100-mile day to Pickwick Landing State Park, which put is mid-way between Shiloh National Battlefield (which we were directed to self-tour using the National Park Service app with driving tour) and Corinth, TN. Corinth was pivotal in the

establishment of control of supplies in the Civil War, as it is a railroad town with crossed tracks, allowing goods to come in from multiple directions. Both the Union and the Confederacy wanted this seat of importance. Eventually it went to the Union. The town has done a great job of preserving the history and highlighting other important cultural and historic sites of importance.



Our last day on The Trace was only 180miles, with another town at the mid-point to stop for lunch and some shopping. There were many fantastic points of interest along the route this day, including a memorial to explorer Meriweather Lewis (of Lewis & Clark fame), where he died. The final part of the drive is post-Trace and along interstates through/around Nashville to the campground near The Grand Ole Opry. The contrast between Elvis' modest beginnings in Tupelo, and then a back-stage tour and explanation of the history of The Grand Ole Opry showed the breadth of musical culture and history in America, and this caravan provided a way to learn of both. Even if neither are your preferred musical genre, the cultural significance of one man and one industry were impressive, and fun to see. Our show was also fantastic, and fun to be a part of the longest running radio program still on the air weekly! Our last day was the tour of President Andrew Jackson's home and gardens, followed by a final dinner and slideshow of the journey. Again, a great balance between history, culture and fun.

There will be some revisions to the route and timing based on comments from the participants this year, but this was a fantastic caravan. Just under three weeks allows for people to fit it into schedules, and not to become too overwhelmed by too many tours, or too much time spent with the same people. Roy & Charlotte (with help from Johnny & Cissy Thibedeaux as co-leaders) put together a great adventure to highlight a little-known part of American history, layered with some sobering Civil War sights, light-hearted zoos and musical venues, through a part of the country strong in its own culture and personality.

MY ADVENTURE ON THE SWELL

At Christmas of 2019, my sister convinced us to join her and her husband on a tugboat through the inlet passages of Vancouver



Island. We agreed, because Tom loves boats, and planned the trip for May of 2020. Needless to say, COVID happened, and it has taken us 3 years



RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Chewy Caramel Pecan Diamonds

For dessert at the Boulders Rally, I served my pecan diamonds. Warning: It take a LOT of pecans. (I did not drizzle the caramel on the batch at the rally.) **Do not double recipe, make two separate batches if you want more.**

Ingredients:

- 1 1/4 cups all purpose flour
- 2/3 cup powder sugar
- 1/4 cup cornstarch
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1 cup (2 sticks) chilled un-salted butter (divide 3/4 cup for crust, 1/4 for topping)
- 1 1/2 cups packed light brown sugar
- 1/2 cup light karo syrup
- 4 cups coarsely chopped pecans
- 1/2 cup whipping cream
- 2 tsp vanilla extract
- 8 ounces of caramels
- 2 tsp milk

Directions:

Line a 13 X 9 baking pan with foil, leaving an overhang of at least 1" on all sides. Grease the foil with butter. Preheat oven to 350.

Crust: blend flour, powder sugar, cornstarch, and salt. Add the chilled butter (stick and a half) cut up in to chunks. Blend in food processor until mixture clumps together. Press dough evenly onto bottom of foil-lined pan. Bake the crust for about 20-25 minutes, until light golden. Remove from oven and cool. Turn oven down to 325.

While crust is baking, make the topping. Stir brown sugar, corn syrup, and half stick of butter in a heavy saucepan over medium high heat until sugar dissolves and mixture boils. Boil 1 minute. Add pecans and heavy cream. Boil mixture for about 3 minutes until thickened slightly. Stir in vanilla. Pour hot topping over warm crust.

Bake in the oven until the topping is darker and bubbles, about 20 minutes. Transfer pan to a cooling rack. Cool completely in the pan. The topping will harden.

Melt caramels in double boiler with milk. Drizzle over the top and cool. When completely cooled lift foil out of pan onto cutting board. Using a heavy sharp knife, cut crust with nut topping into diamonds. Can be made ahead and frozen. Should make about 30 1.5" pieces.

A lot of trouble, a lot of \$\$ for pecans, but worth it!
