After a full helping of the Big Easy and all she had to offer, we headed back to I-10 and the drive to River Delta Marina and Campground (near Creola AL) owned and operated by Mobile County, Alabama. It is convenient to I-65 which starts nearby. In fact, we can now say that we have traveled the entire length of I-65. This was another (***) camping experience and the best value of the trip! For \$20/

night, you get a pullthrough gravel site with full hookups in a big grassy space bordered by cypress

trees, ponds (with alligators in them), and a huge river delta. There is a long nature walk on an elevated wooden walkway that allows you to observe the lush growth and wildlife that thrives here. You have a full shop full of fishing supplies from worms to bobbers and with a temporary permit you can catch bass and redfish from the extensive docks. This waterway leads down to Mobile Bay which has its own attractions, but it was very comfortable here. The manager at the campground is Shad, a former college basket-

ball player and coach who received a Purdue tee shirt from us. He will happily share hoops stories of his own. This was our second cash-only place, and they require a \$40 cash deposit. However, Shad is ready with your \$40 refund the next morning, so it is not a problem. We highly recommend this spot!

As we headed north the next day, we aimed for Montgomery, AL and a KOA (***) for another one-night stay. This KOA was under new management and getting

a lot of attention from the new owner. It might be worthy of another birdy in the future. Martins Fami-

ly Restaurant, in operation since 1935, was the spot for a homestyle meal of ribs, speckled butter beans, green beans, fried okra, mashed potatoes, cole slaw and a big basket of hot cornbread muffins. Although the chocolate pie was tempting, we opted instead for our first experience with rolled ice cream. This involves a highly chilled steel plate onto which a puddle of sweetened heavy cream is poured. Various items (cookies, syrups) can be chopped (Left: Winston and Clementine, Campground Reviewers)

and mashed into the cream which freezes in seconds and is continuously scraped before being flattened and rolled along the edge of a putty knife into a frozen cylinder. It was good, but doesn't compare to the Original Frozen Custard in Lafayette, IN.

With that hearty food to fuel us, we set off the next morning for Huntsville, AL and our campsite at the U.S. Space and Rocket Center Camp at





One Tranquility Drive. It was a bargain at \$30/night with full hookups, paved platforms, and a very pretty wooded campground... very easy to reserve online too. This was another (***) location, perfectly located within the big park where kids attend Space Camp. We could watch them setting off model rockets from the camp test facility and the drone facility was a short walk away, as was the Museum Complex. Our two days here were full of plenty of attractions at the Museum, plus loads of options within the very lovely city of Huntsville. No surprise to learn that this is the top relocation destination in the USA for scientists and engineers associat-

ed with the Aerospace industry. The Redstone Arsenal is in Huntsville, along with a major NASA research complex. We highly recommend the campground and the town. Plan for not less than 2 days, although 3 might be better.







April 14th found us spending the night at the KOA right off I-65 in Bowling Green, KY (**). We arrived during a thunderstorm, and it rained all night. This limited the opportunity to walk around but it was a very nice layout and easy to find.

The next night we crossed the Ohio River and stayed at Charlestown State Park in Indiana (***). The park was packed with campers, all enjoying a very warm evening. Two major loops with full hookups were still closed, so we adjusted to an electric-only campsite and got into line for the dump station the next morning. How spoiled we had become on this trip! We guessed that it was still early in the season and labor might still be in short supply until high schools and colleges finished their spring semesters. There was no evidence of

any rangers or patrols in the campground, but other patrons were well behaved. Charlestown would be worth a return visit.

We headed home on Sunday, April 16th, stopping in Carmel to see the grandchildren, let them jump around and hide inside the Airstream, and then drive the last leg of our 2,027-mile trip. After unhooking and unloading, Pete looked over at me and lovingly asked "Well, where do we go for our next trip?"

Recipe Round Up ~ One Pot Pesto Pasta with Bacon AUTHOR: FRESH OFF THE GRID

PREP TIME: 5 MIN COOK TIME: 20 MIN TOTAL TIME: 25 MIN SERVINGS: 2

This Pasta is a saucy one pot meal that features pesto, zucchini, cherry tomatoes, and parmesan cheese with pasta and bacon.

INGREDIENTS

- 2 slices bacon
- 2 zucchinis sliced
- Handful of cherry tomatoes
- 2 cups pasta
- ¼ cup pesto
- ❖ ¼ cup parmesan
- 2 tablespoons pine nuts
- Salt + pepper



INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Cook the bacon in a skillet over medium heat until crispy, remove, chop, and set aside.
- 2. Add zucchini, cherry tomatoes, and a pinch of salt to skillet and sauté until zucchini is tender and beginning to brown in spots, 5-7 mins. Remove vegetables to a plate or bowl and set aside.
- 3. Add pasta, 3 cups water, and ½ tsp salt to skillet. Boil, stirring frequently until pasta is tender and most of water has been absorbed about 10 mins (but check package directions). You can add more water if needed or drain at end if there is excess. Remove from heat.
- 4. Toss pasta with pesto, then toss in vegetables, parmesan cheese, chopped bacon, and pine nuts. Season to taste with salt & pepper.


