In the 1920s, Wally Byam began building travel trailers for his own use. In 1931 he started selling trailers and the Airstream company was formed.

Fast forward to 1951 when he conceived the idea to lead a group of travel trailer friends on a trip to Central America. He later led several caravans to Mexico and Canada. Many caravanners were repeat participants and soon wanted to form a club. Wally eventually gave in and the Wally Byam Caravan Club, International (WBCCI) was founded in August 1955. The Idaho Airstream Club formed in 1961.

We are a 501(c)(7) club, organized for pleasure, recreation, and other nonprofitable purposes. Our main purpose is to camp, explore and have fun, but we do hold at least one business meeting each year to meet requirements to keep our nonprofit, federal income tax status. Our meetings are usually short, but keep us on track. This year we have 2 meetings: one in April; the other will be in August.

## An Unforgettable Day in the World of the Great Wapiti

We were so excited to have had an entire heard of elk advance toward us from across the river and were anxious to see how our pictures of the event had turned out! I had taken about a thousand photos. So, we left Yellowstone Park and headed back to our Airstream so I could load them on my laptop.

To my disappointment, I had selected the wrong auto-focus mode. However, when you take hundreds of pictures, you are bound to have some good ones, and I had a few.

After some research and making proper adjustments to the camera settings, and practicing on the rehab grizzlies, we headed back into the park. By this time, we didn't have a lot of daylight left. Kelly, my wife was driving so I could watch for




wildlife; the pursuit of wapiti (the Indian name for elk) has been a passion of mine since I was 13 years old, and I was in my element! We were just heading into a burn area when I spotted something out of place – about eight inches of elk rack reflecting sunlight in what was otherwise burned-out black branches, some 100 yards up the mountain. Traffic buzzed by, completely oblivious to what was just above them on the mountain side. We were going about 30 miles an hour and the next turnout was a few hundred yards down the road. I asked my wife to pull over there, but not abruptly, as I didn't want to create a traffic jam. Factoring in the human element is necessity if you want to see and photograph wildlife, especially in Yellowstone!

Once my camera was ready to go, I nonchalantly got out of the truck and started walking along the river towards where I had seen the elk. And to keep from drawing attention, I hid my camera, a 70-200 mm f/2.8 lens with a 1.4X multiplier. I made my way to where on-coming traffic couldn't see me; behind the only tree I could find between the river and the road. I crouched down so my

eyes were at the same height as the road to further hide myself from those passing by on their way out of the park.

Quickly the magic began to happen - here came another entire heard of elk! This time, they were coming down off the mountain headed to the river for a cool evening drink.





And just like that, without planning, I found myself once again right in their path and in their way! I had no idea I was where they would want to cross the road to get to the river!
