# March Rally Recap: Trailer Village Grand Canyon

This month we took our longest trip yet for a rally all the way to the Grand Canyon National Park. The weather was an experience in itself. On our nine hour drive there, we encountered four seasons in one day with rain, hail, snow, a tornado, a rainbow and sun. Upon arrival the night before in Williams, AZ, at the Grand Canyon Railway RV Park, we were welcomed by a heavy but fluffy snowfall. Our Airstream, Queenie Wahine, was christened with her first snow and endowed with a reminder of the trip, hail dents! Heated hoses and furnaces saved the day as temperatures plummeted overnight.

The rally was held at the Trailer Village RV Park, which is the only full hookup camping spot within the National Park. Within walking distance to the South Rim, it features easy pull through sites, is serviced by the park shuttle and connected to the bike path. Our hosts, Sharon and Lowell Ticer & Tane and Linda Koblick, did a fabulous job of arranging happy hour, breakfast and a Saturday night dinner. 

## **Grand Canyon Rally (Continued)**

Here are a couple of historical interest sites at the Grand Canyon that our campers visited: Desert View Watchtower, Hermits Rest and Kolb Studio.




Desert View Watchtower, constructed in 1932, rises to 70 feet above the canyon rim and is located 23 miles (37 km) east of Grand Canyon Village. The round snake legend painting above was painted by Hopi artist Fred Kabotie.

Architect Mary Colter's design takes its influences from the architecture of the Ancestral Puebloan people of the Colorado Plateau. This particular tower was patterned after those found at Hovenweep and the Round Tower of Mesa Verde. As you get closer to the building you might see how well it blends into the environment. It is difficult to tell where the rock of the canyon walls end, and the tower begins. Mary Colter said, First and most important, was to design a building that would become part of its surroundings; one that would create no discordant note against the time eroded walls of this promontory."

The watchtower stands today, partly as a monument to Ms. Colter's careful attention to detail, her enchantment with the southwest, and her commitment to the cultural preservation. (Source: nps.gov)

## Grand Canyon Rally (Continued)



Hermits Rest nestled in the wall of the canyon. It sits at the end of the 7 mile Hermit Road. Mary Colter also built Hermits Rest in 1914 to look like an old miner's cabin, complete with a giant fireplace and front porch. Today Hermits Rest has a gift shop and small snack bar. Restrooms are available here. The Hermit Trail, winding steeply down into the canyon, begins about 0.5 miles, 0.8 km west of Hermits Rest.

Between March 1st and November 30, the Hermit Road free shuttles provide public transportation between the Village Route Transfer Station and Hermits Rest (7 miles/11 km), with stops at 9 canyon overlooks. Visitors with disabilities can request an access pass that allows you to drive your own vehicle on Hermit Road (there is a gate code needed to access the road). Another option is to bike.



Wise words inscribed on the Kolb Studio entrance. Kolb Studio proudly sits at the head of the Bright Angel Trial, just like it did in 1904.

This was the Victorian era home of the Kolb Brothers who created a lasting legacy of adventure, exploration, family love, and amazing Grand Canyon photography. Photographers Emery and Ellsworth Kolb helped turn the Grand Canyon into a national icon. They built Kolb Studio, one of the earliest tourist destinations on the South Rim. The brothers began to take photographs of the mule riders from a small toll shack on the Bright Angel Trail. The toll shack would later become today's five story home, theater and photo studio built right on the edge of the canyon! The studio was used to document the trips of visitors and create imagery of Grand Canyon for 75 years.


Costs before the discount are as follows:

# Museum of Western Film History in Lone Pine, CA

Founded in 2006 the museum, located in Lone Pine, California collects, preserves, and exhibits a broad and diverse collection of western film memorabilia associated with the American western film genre. The Museum inhabits a unique niche of western history and culture. Although there are many museums featuring documentation on films and historic screen figures, The Museum of Western Film History is the only museum devoted to chronicling western film history and its impact on American culture.

Hollywood first came on location in Lone Pine in 1920, using the unique scenery in more than 400 feature films. The Alabama Hills, the Sierra Nevada and the Owens Valley are still being used in movies and car commercials. Most recently, scenes for the Academy Award-winning "Gladiator", Disney's "Dinosaur", "G.I. Jane", "Maverick" and "The Shadow" were shot in the Alabama Hills. The natural scenery remains unspoiled and unchanged since that first film in 1920, a silent Western for Paramount called "The Round Up" with Fatty Arbuckle. And as you slowly drive the dirt roads of the Alabama Hills – roads made by movie companies years ago, you're driving where John Wayne rode in 12 movies. Hoot Gibson, Buck Jones and Ken Maynard, Gene Autry and Roy Rogers and Hopalong Cassidy and other made films here too.

But it wasn't just Gene Autry, Roy Rogers and Hopalong Cassidy who helped immortalize Lone Pine. Other familiar names worked here too: John Wayne, Clint Eastwood, Jack Palance, Cary Grant, Douglas Fairbanks Jr., Tyrone Power, Susan Hayward, Gregory Peck, Spencer Tracy, Ida Lupino, Alan Ladd, Tony Curtis, Jack Lemon and Natalie Wood, just to name a few.

If you are heading north up the 395 to Mammoth or Bridgeport, you might stop on the way to take a break and check it out. The self-driving tour around the Alabama Hills nearby is a lot of fun and a nice way to break up the long drive.

# Recipe: Black and Blueberry **Cornmeal Skillet Cake**

I recently bought a new gas Weber BBQ for camping trips and the Weber website has loads of recipes to try out with the new grill. They also have an app you can download and take the recipes with you on your next trip.

#### What you need

- 1 tablespoon plus ½ cup unsalted butter. softened
- 1½ cup all-purpose flour
- ½ cup medium-grind yellow cornmeal
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon kosher salt
- 1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1 cup sour cream
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract

- 1 teaspoon finely grated lemon zest, plus extra for garnish
- 1 cup (packed) light brown sugar
- 1 cup blackberries
- 2 large eggs
- 1 cup blackberries
- 34 cup plus 14 cup blueberries

#### What you do...

- 1. Prepare the grill for indirect cooking over medium heat (350°F).
- 2. Grease a 10 inch cast iron skillet with the tablespoon of butter.
- 3. Whisk the flour, cornmeal, baking powder, salt, and cinnamon in a medium bowl.
- 4. Lightly whisk the sour cream, vanilla, and lemon zest in a small bowl.
- 5. In the bowl of an electric mixer, cream the sugar and the ½ cup butter until light and fluffy, 3 to 4 minutes. Add the eggs, one at a time, mixing well after each addition. Add the flour mixture in thirds, alternating with the sour cream, and ending with the flour. Gently fold in the blackberries and the 34 cup blueberries.
- 6. Spread the batter in the prepared skillet. Top with the remaining ¼ cup blueberries, gently pressing the berries to partially submerge in the batter.
- 7. Grill over indirect medium heat, with the lid closed, until a toothpick inserted in center comes out clean, about 40 minutes, rotating the skillet once or twice to ensure even cooking. Transfer the skillet to a rack to cool.
- 8. Cut into wedges and serve garnished with lemon zest and a dollop of whipped cream, if desired.
