

We Rally Together! 2023 International Rally Report

The 66th Airstream Club International Rally

June 24-30th 2023

Rock Springs, WY

This was one of the largest international rallies we've attended, with 1100+ trailers. Most sites had full hook-ups. The location was the Sweetwater event complex, which hosts horse racing, car racing and other large events. The parking was on gravel, and the sites were tight and close together. The multiple campground sections were far apart, and the pavilion area was a mile from our campground. There were shuttles, but we mostly took our bikes back and forth. This year had 700 first timers of the 1100, and many new folks were from California and the west coast.



The vendors and presentations were held under large white tents. The weather was mostly cool enough to not need air conditioning. The presentations were extensive, with every time slot having 6 or more options. There were the usual technical support topics, as well as topics on travel apps, national forests and grasslands, volunteering your way across the US, and cooking classes. The vendors were mostly tech and parts this year. There were no T-shirts or hats available. As one of our members said, there was no "fun stuff" to buy. T-shirts were available ahead of the rally on Lands End, but they were difficult to find on their website. I never did find them and heard the same from others. Lands End is a reputable company, but having shirts available at the rally to purchase is more convenient.

Justin Humphries, CEO and VP of Sales from Airstream gave his usual state of the RV industry talk. A few key highlights:

A WBCCI one year membership will be given to new purchasers of an Airstream RV. This cost will be covered by Airstream, not WBCCI.

There are several new Airstream exclusive dealerships. Of note is one coming to Detroit (no date given). Shorewood RV bought out Lazy Days in Minnesota and is building a 15,000 sq ft Airstream exclusive dealership north of Minneapolis.

He discussed pre and post Covid sales. Sales are down from Covid year levels (2020 – 2022), but still up from pre Covid years. Towable sales are down 23% for 2022 and 24% through April of 2023. B-Vans were up 15% in 2022 and down 12.5% through April of 2023.

We Rally Together! 2023 International Rally Report (Cont.)

If you didn't already know, our Region 7 was the only region to vote against the executive council amendment. It was a topic of much discussion amongst the attendees here from our region. Another topic of much concern was the purchase of land and a building by our International Club in Jackson Center. This is to be used for additional office space for a cost of \$595,000 at a 7% interest rate. Since the club ended last year in significant debt, the money to make such a large purchase is not available. We've heard that the purchase is a done deal, and the membership was not consulted. The purchase includes a bank building that needs renovation and some land that could eventually be used as a campground. The bank is leasing part of the building and has another year left on their lease. The club needs to cut costs and services to pay this mortgage loan. Ginger Slattery says that options being discussed as near certain are the elimination of the membership directory (would be digital only), and the Blue Beret moving to quarterly publication. Obviously more cuts will have to be made. If you are unhappy with this, Ginger asks that you write to the new council members and Lori Plummer. ASAP. Lori is the real estate manager for this purchase.

Wyoming is a beautiful state. We had a chance to explore the Flaming Gorge, which is a 90-mile-long canyon with steep red rock walls and the Green River flowing through. It is a haven for kayakers, boaters, and fishermen.

Another fun adventure was the Wild Horse loop drive. We saw wild horses, of course, and a couple of antelope on the road that were fighting (mostly playfully).

Rock Springs itself is a small town, but had a laundromat, a couple of nice Mexican restaurants and Sapporo, a Japanese Hibachi restaurant that was excellent.


We Rally Together! 2023 International Rally Report

Airstream Club 66th International Rally

I dare not speak for anyone else, so my report on the 2023 Rally is influenced by my personal bias. Having put out the disclaimer, what follows is my impressions of the 66th International Rally.

Let me start by saying this is the fifth International we have attended. It was certainly different from our traditional program, but still had a familiar feel and pace to many parts. The good included very nice weather except for one storm, that while strong, was not severe (always put your awning in when you



leave). The days were mostly in the seventies and low eighties, nights in the sixties with nice breezes. Very comfortable weather for the 1,190 plus Airstreams that were registered. It was the biggest attendance in years, and shows the continued growth of our club. The opening ceremonies followed much of the traditional script, but with a speedily paced recognition of the various Officers, Regions and Clubs. It was finished in less that two hours, and the crowd dispersed feeling pleased and wanted. It did feel strange to not go through the formality of voting for officers, but I think the new system will serve us well in the long run.

The daily programs varied across the interest spectrum of our members. If you didn't find anything that interested you, you either know everything (like me and the editor), or have no interest in anything. From quilts, to solar installation, to black and grey tank cleaning, it was there. The site of the Rally had full hook-ups, individual sites marked by wood fences, and easy access to and from the surrounding areas. You were able to rent your own golf cart for the duration, or you could just start walking and one of the volunteer shuttle drivers would offer you a ride. Those parked furthest away from the main venue were as much as three quarters of a mile away, so the carts were in regular use.

During the first days there was confusion over what was meant by "Finding a Campsite seminar is in building xyz". The staff quickly got improved maps and locator information out on "Grupio". In fact there were daily email updates sent to all attendees, and immediate updates on "Grupio". The "Grupio" app is easy to use and great for any size of an event and I would recommend adopting it for Wisc-UP club outings. At any time, I could pull up the program and get details of every class/info session/program during the Rally. I won't list them all, since you can't attend them now anyway. One of the great additions to this rally was the food truck area in the middle of the program buildings. It was nice to be able to get food and or beer and wine between sessions.

On the way to the Rally we spent a couple of nights in Laramie, where we stopped at a wonderful Cup Cake shop. The woman working behind the counter asked where we were headed, and when we said "Rock Springs", she looked shocked and said, "Why go there, it is the armpit of Wyoming". While I would not say it is the best place I have ever been, it seems she was a bit harsh. The old downtown had two Brew Pubs, a number of shops, and a sense of its history as a Railroad town and a coal mining area. The sprawl contained all the usual big boxes and a wonderful "Cowboy Crepes" restaurant (and it was great). The area is near the famous "Flaming Gorge", which we saw during a most of the day bus trip that was well worth it. It also has huge areas of BLM land with dispersed camping, wild horses, antelope, elk, mule deer and lots of littler critters. If you want, they have wild horses available for adoption.

If I was to rate the rally, I would give it high marks for organization and content. The site, while great in terms of hookups, was not particularly conducive to happy hours and the usual gatherings of our tribe, mostly because of individual lot size. As usual, we met tons of people we knew from before and made new friends.

If you get a chance, try to make your way to one of the next Internationals. The time changes for the next two should make them even more interesting.



Our Regional President addressed the gathering of people from the Region (7). It seems as if she is requesting that every member of the Region make an effort to contact the Board members to request that they continue to spend \$50,000.00 per year to provide every member with a printed copy of the directory.



A Tourist Trap but a good one is the obligatory photo at the Snow Stick. In my photo archives I must have 20 of these!






The Jampot is staffed with Monks who make great jams, jellies and baked goods. Me and the Monk helping me compared beard lengths!




Friday Morning we will tour the cheese museum and then on to a cheese dairy store. Might

Repairs, Restorations & Cool Airstream Things

Seat Cushion Foam Replacement

We saw a video by Keep Your Daydream on YouTube where they showed how to replace the seat cushion foam in their Airstream. The factory foam is on the soft side. We noticed this and decided to try the firmer foam they recommended.

First we measured the cushions length and width to calculate how much foam we'd need for our 2019 27' Globetrotter. In our case it was two 1/3 sheets (24" x 82") and one 1/2 sheet (36" x 82"). The foam is called Lux High Quality open cell from Foam Factory in Macomb, MI. We also ordered 17 feet of their 1" medium loft x 30" wide Polyester Fiberfill batting to go on top of the foam.

The process is pretty simple: Unzip the covers and remove the cushions. Ours were also wrapped with a thin plastic sheet which helps when slipping it back into the cover.

Lay the original cushion on top of the new foam and trace around the outside with a Sharpie marker. I used a large serrated bread

knife to cut on the line. We used 3M "77" spray adhesive to hold the batting to the top of the cushion. It helps to have

another set of hands to insert the foam back into the cushion cover. One tip we saw online is to turn the cover inside-out to start it over the foam.

We're very happy with the results - no more sinking down to the plywood under the cushions!

One tip: All the cushion's foam was 4" thick except for the two that are used for the pull-out lounge bed. Those are 5" thick to make up the difference in the slide. We chose not to replace the foam in those cushions and could have bought a little less foam.


THIS AND THAT

There has been a lot going on with the IBT. In May, at the Strategic Planning meeting at Jackson Center, there were some big proposals. One was to purchase an adjacent building and property that had recently come on the market. The current headquarters building is in dire need of several thousand dollars of repairs. The new facility is turn key ready with minimal renovations needed. This purchase was approved at a special meeting in June.

The second proposal concerns the Blue Beret and the printed membership directory. These will affect you, the members. It is a fact that printing costs have sky rocketed from \$12-\$14,000/year just a couple of years ago to \$25,000 now. Advertisers are also not wanting to invest in print media. They are moving their advertising dollars to the online markets. So, the proposal is to reduce printing the Blue Beret to 4 times a year and eliminate the printed membership directory. I have been advocating since May to prevent the elimination of the printed directory. #1 Not everyone is online yet. Some because they did not grow up with computers, some because they are in remote or rural areas that don't have service. There has been talk of members who request a printed directory would be charged \$15 + S&H! This would be for a much reduced directory that includes only names, BRNs and emails.
