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President's Message

Our Colorado Airstream Club was well represented, with more than 120 members taking part in the Airstream Club International Rally. We were in good company. Nearly 12 hundred Airstreams from all over the U.S., Canada, and Mexico were drawn to the sprawling Sweetwater County Events Complex in Rock Springs, Wyoming, for a full week of learning, sharing, camaraderie, food, fun, and entertainment.



CAC Past President Rob Hughey had organized an informal caravan so that many of us could arrive at the same time and get parked as a group. We met Thursday night, June 22, at the KOA in Rawlins. Rob had been talking with the parking committee volunteers and led us out early Friday morning to ensure we could park together. I was assigned "caboose" to ensure everyone was together for the last hundred miles to the Sweetwater Events Complex. But then a funny thing happened. When a group of rigs from Texas began to pass through our group, four of us separated from the "front of our CAC wagon train." After a brief stop to regroup, we rolled into Rock Springs about ten minutes behind

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the front, so you would think we would be parked last. But when we were "staged" in two lines by the parking crew, those who arrived later were parked first. So, we were pretty much unhooked when the first rigs in our little caravan were backing into their spots. As Rob Hughey began to back into the spot next to mine, I couldn't resist. "Hey Rob," I said, "if you were having trouble keeping up, you should have just given us a call. We would have been happy to slow down."



This was the 66th International Rally for the Airstream Club. Rally sessions covered topics ranging from 'How to Change a Tire' to "Getting the Right Insurance Coverage for your Airstream." With multiple concurrent sessions daily, we could choose from presentations, including club history, travel tips, high-tech hacks, cooking techniques, maintenance shortcuts, Airstream upgrades, what to expect from caravans and rallies, and more.

I was honored to carry our CAC flag during the opening ceremonies and proud to see our flag flying on Rob and Shari Davis' vintage rig for the big Vintage Parade. Many of our Colorado Airstream Club members were actively involved as presenters, entertainers, organizers, and volunteers, helping to make the 2023 Rally one to remember for all the right reasons. CAC Trustee Jim Stahl shared lessons learned in upgrading his Interstate to lithium-solar power. Jim Cooper shared his fly-fishing expertise, Trustee Mike Zimmerman led sessions on trailer backing and tire changing, and Carolyn Beardshear led a discussion on travel and camping apps that can help Airstreamers find fun camping experiences and save money. And, of course, we were all proud to be there as CAC member Marsha Howe was sworn in to serve on the International Club Executive Board.

Nightly entertainment options included the Airstreamers Band and Chorus concert in a downtown Rock Springs park, an 80's dance party at the VAC (Vintage Airstream Club) tent, jam sessions, storytelling, happy hours, and the big closing night live entertainment bash. Downtown Rock Springs businesses gave us discounts, and everybody at the Rally seemed to have a story about finding the best Mexican restaurant in town.

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There were too many highlights to recall in this newsletter, but one of my favorites came when Mary responded to a social media post. The Gauthiers, Airstreamers from Oregon, posted that they were at the Rally with their 9-week-old baby, Miss Lena. They thought she was likely the youngest Airstreamer at the Rally and were hoping to get a picture of her with one of the oldest Airstreamers in attendance, and they were looking for suggestions. Mary replied that CAC members CJ and Miriam Hahn were parked with our group, and the resulting pictures with baby Lena (9 weeks old) in the arms of Miriam Hahn (now 92) are precious memories for us.

We left Rock Springs looking forward to next year in Sedalia, MO. Many thanks are due to International President Eric McHenry, the ACI officers and HQ staff, the Sweetwater County Events Staff, and the many hard-working ACI volunteers who made the 66th International - a rally to remember. Wally and Helen would have been proud!

Carry Your E-Bikes With Confidence

Ever wonder if there are other options for carrying e-bikes? Well, I have, and the limited options from Airstream have always intrigued me. Airstream says, "Never put a hitch on the rear of your trailer."

Well, I am here to tell you about an option that has worked for us for years. Many of you know the name Luke Bernander—a fixture at the maintenance rally for years and king of fixing large and small Airstreams. Luke devised a way to put a 2" hitch on the rear of our 28ft Airstream International and supports for tie-downs.



Luke has done this to several trailers, and I don't know anyone with negative results. I was then able to use our ATOC bike carrier. ATOC makes this bike carrier, and we use it to carry our tandem and two single e-bikes (Trek) to Arizona each year. Total weight is a little bit over 100 lbs. Luke also sold us a device to help keep the bike rack from bouncing up and down so much.

I don't think Airstream's rack mounted on the rear of trailers gives enough flexibility to owners to choose an e-bike that fits their needs. One shouldn't have to choose an e-bike based on the ability to carry it. Instead, select an e-bike for your physical needs.

The options listed above are costly but give owners more options. Some current bike racks warn of carrying too much weight, and some warn of stress fractures caused by too much weight. We always carry our e-bikes without the batteries on them. Batteries can weigh anywhere from 4 to 5 lbs or more.

We have been transporting our bikes to Mesa, Arizona, for quite a few years with little problems. If you don't carry a tandem, ATOC bike racks can be configured to carry three bikes or just two. The rack also lowers to near the ground, so no lifting of the bikes is required. However, you must remove the bike's front wheel for it to be mounted on the bike rack. But the bike rack also has the option to carry the front wheels on it. Check it out if you're interested <u>ATOC.com</u>, and of course, Luke would always be interested in helping you.





Humphreys Keynote Address" Airstream HQ Returning to Normal in the Aftermath of COVID

Airstream VP Justin Humphreys' keynote address at the International Rally provided a detailed update from Airstream HQ. Justin reported that much of the "craziness" brought on by the pandemic was now in the rearview mirror. Dealer inventories, supply chain problems, and even factory workforce issues brought on by the pandemic are becoming more normalized.

Humphreys told rally attendees that Airstream had successfully avoided the need for massive workforce layoffs that many RV manufacturers were experiencing now that the demand bubble created by COVID was deflating. But he said demand for new Airstreams remains strong, and hiring and retaining highly skilled workers is still a big challenge throughout the RV industry.

Humphreys reminded attendees that RV manufacturing requires skills ranging from metal fabrication to plumbing, flooring, cabinet makers, engineers, designers, electricians, and mechanics. Those are all areas where good employers are challenged to find good workers. But, he told rallygoers that the massive new Airstream manufacturing plant in Jackson Center, coupled with recent structure changes within the company, is paying off with more standardization of rigs resulting in greater manufacturing efficiency and improved quality control.

Humphreys talked about new Airstream initiatives aiming to improve quality and reliability from suppliers and subcontractors. He noted that after-sales problems with a single appliance or electronics component can have a ripple effect, resulting in problems for the plant, dealers, and customers.

Humphreys also enthusiastically talked about ongoing Airstream initiatives to strengthen dealers by developing more exclusive locations. He noted the new Airstream exclusive stores in Utah and Wyoming participating in the rally, the new Airstream exclusive dealership in Chandler, Arizona, and soon-to-open new stores in Pennsylvania and Colorado, expected to open this fall. He said establishing a new top-rated dedicated supplier program would help reduce waiting time for parts from vendors and suppliers. That will reduce the time our rigs spend waiting for dealer service and repairs.
