
President's Message: Summer 2023 & ROCK SPRINGS INTERNATIONAL

WACO, TX JUMPOFF

2023 has sped by and half the year is already here and gone! As we prepared for our journey to Rock Springs, WY, I don't think we have ever had so much "stuff" packed into our truck and trailer. We expected to need plenty of summer clothes but also some warmer shirts and pants we would need in the mountains. We



started out on June 9th from Kingwood and drove to Deer Crossing RV park in Waco, TX where we met 100 degree Texas heat, Jim and Lisa Feine, Susan, John Sheridan (along with Clarabelle) and Clark Gardner & Debbie Pfunder. Rick and Tracy Elkins, (with Finn &



Gracie) arrived the next day as did Ken and Lia Laney (with pups Go-Go, Dandee and a honkin' big Harley motorcycle in the back of his truck!) Over the next couple of days we toured Magnolia Market & Silos, Baylor University (Susan's Alma Mater), the Dr. Pepper Museum, and the Waco Mammoth National Monument, the Waco Suspension Bridge built in 1870. We were signed up to do a Brazos River Cruise but a sudden bad weather





tables and chairs in a shady spot where we gathered for Happy Hour and Susan Sheridan's scrumptious chicken casserole dish served from the tailgate of my truck! After eating, Maria served everyone a strawberry cupcake to celebrate my birthday! We survived the heat and then hurriedly put everything up as dark clouds started gathering and a wind kicked up. Before the night was over, we had a little rain and hail in true Texas fashion.

QUANAH, TX

After a huge breakfast prepared by Tracy Elkins and served in front of their trailer on the 12th of June, we left Waco in two groups for a 285-mile drive to Quanah, TX (actually the township of Goodlett, TX) where we spent one night at the Ole Towne Cotton Gin RV right on Hwy 287. This is a quaint site where we enjoyed a bring-yourown-dish dinner inside the cavernous building that houses the original cotton gin

dating from the turn of the 20th century.

Before heading to Amarillo the next day, Jim and Lisa Feine accompanied us to the 1884 old Train Depot near downtown Quanah. The depot has been turned into a fabulous museum filled with a variety memorabilia from the time of the town's namesake, Quanah Parker. The Comanches captured Cynthia Ann Parker in 1836 when she was 8 years old. Cynthia later became the wife of Chief Nocona and was the mother of Quanah Parker. If you have time to visit the museum on your way to Amarillo, don't pass it up!



AMARILLO, TX

Amarillo was a short 150-mile drive from Quanah where we were all checked into Big Texan RV Ranch for a three-night stay. This park is located on Hwy 287 and easily accommodated our group with full hook up was in walking distance of the Big Texan Steak Ranch Restaurant. I don't think any of our group tried the 72 ounce steak but we all had plenty of food to eat!

There are some really great things to see in Amarillo such as the Sizemore RV Museum and a section of Route 66 Hwy near downtown. Best of all however, is the 28-mile drive south to Palo Duro Canyon State Park. It is like a miniature Grand Canyon with beautiful canyon and rock formations of the Caprock Escarpment. It has been inhabited by humans for the last 10 to 15,000 years.



As you approach the canyon that land is completely flat until suddenly, the ground opens and sinks 800 feet deep with beautiful canyon walls of red earth and rock. There is a park building constructed by the CCC workers containing a gift



shop, panoramic views of the canyon from large glass windows, historical artifacts, videos of Indians hunting buffalo from horse back with bow and arrows filmed in the 1920's demonstrating how they thrived in the winters and blazing summers in the canyons.

On the night of June 14th our group returned to the Canyon for the TEXAS
Outdoor Musical in the

Pioneer Amphitheater where we enjoyed a BBQ dinner and then watched a troupe of singers, dancers, and musicians put on their 57th summer season musical! The performance was truly entertaining as well as visually impressive with live horses, great sets, and lighting that showcased the canyon walls behind the stage. We highly recommend this event for anyone traveling near Amarillo in the summer.



The next afternoon, we gathered in some shade at our Big Texan campsite and used our trucks as windbreaks from the gusting breeze for Happy Hour and then were treated by Lia Laney's vegetable and beef dish served over rice. The Gardner's brought salad and Susan Sheridan made wonderful pork dumplings.

RATON, NM / MONUMENT, CO

On June 16th, we drove to Raton, NM and spent one night in town at the KOA before driving through Raton Pass the next morning on our way to Monument, CO where we spent three nights at the Colorado Heights Camping Resort. This gave us a chance to visit the Air Force Academy in nearby Colorado Springs. What an impressive Academy, Book & Gift Store, and retired aircraft displays on part of the 18,500 acres of the campus!

The next day, we travelled to Manitou Springs, and met up with Vernon and Jo Goodwin for the 9 mile Cog Train 9 miles up to Pike's Peak. The ride up is picturesque with



2000 year old Bristlecone pines,

Ponderosa pines, and clear mountain streams. On reaching the 14,000-foot top, we were greeted by very thin air, a blanket of snow, and a restaurant where we had donuts and snacks. We were warned by the conductors that we only have 45 minutes before we have to be back on the cog train or the doors will lock and we would be left. We set our watches and got back with 5 minutes to spare. Unfortunately, several failed to get back and were left to get down later the best

way they could. After the ride down, we toured Manitou Springs and had a nice lunch with Jim and Lisa Feine.




On June 20, we departed the campground for the drive to our last stop before Rock Springs. We drove the 280 miles to Rawlins, WY at the Red Desert Rose Campground Park for one night. We now joined by Jerry and Carol Goodwin, Vernon and Jo Goodwin, and Gary and Pam Alley. To celebrate, we found a great restaurant in Rawlins called Michael's Big City Steakhouse! The owner provided us with our own room that accommodated our group. We had a great meal and plan to return there if we are in Rawlins again (which the Feine's did after International!)





It was only 150 miles from Rawlins to Rock Springs. Rick & Laurie Vice arrived with us and we were all parked in our sites by 1:00 pm. The Sweetwater Events Center is a nice facility that has over 1200 full hook up sites and almost 100,000 feet of covered pavilion space.

The attendance was over 1200 trailers! (See aerial photos below) Our GHAC members were grouped together in corrals that had full hookups and a great view of White Mountains directly to our west. There was plenty of parking available as well. The weather was cool in the mornings and evenings but did



get a little warm during the daytime. The wind was ever-present with occasional sudden gusts that taught us not to leave our awnings open when we were elsewhere.


We discovered some interesting things to do such as drive the 19-mile Wild Horse Scenic Loop. We drove it and saw



several groups of beautiful wild horses. We visited the nearby Bureau of Land Management (BLM) horse corral where wild horses are brought regularly to control the population from over-grazing the open land. They are for sale if anyone is interested in bringing one home for \$185.00. Burros are also available! We took a day trip up to South Pass City, WY which is a ghost town now but was the site of a goldrush in 1869 that saw the town grow to 3,000 people. Many of the buildings are restored and available for touring and managed by the Sta te of Wyoming. Nearby you can

still see the wheel paths of the Oregon and California wagon trails where settlers were traveling West for their fortunes.

Several of our members drove to Flaming Gorge just to the south of Rock Springs; we opted for a tour bus to take us there. This gorge is quite majestic with mountain views of the Green River that runs through it.



There were some great restaurants in Rock Springs such as Eve's at the White Mountains

Golf Course, Lew's in town, and Old Chicago Pizza provided us with great pizza for the whole GHAC group when we had dinner under the newly built Spicer Pavilion that came with a large propane fireplace that was needed due to the cool weather that evening.

The Airstream dealers from Salt Lake City, UT and Etna, WY shared time to show off new Airstreams in one of the large tents. Several sales and trades took place and ice cream was served for a few dollars. The usual Swap Meet was held and lots of new and used items were

bought and sold. Vernon Goodwin sold several of his Hitch Handles. If you don't have one of these, you need to contact him for one. He is currently in Alaska where he and Jo caravanned from Rock Springs. They are staying out of the triple-digit heat we are experiencing in the South.

Other GHAC attendees went their separate ways after International and visited Mount Rushmore, Crazy Horse, the Badlands, Yellowstone, Sturgis, Devils Tower, the Grand Tetons, and Jackson Hole.

We stayed an extra 6 day s in Rock Springs with the Feine's, the Alley's, and Sheridan's before heading to Craters of the Moon in Arco, Idaho, Salt Lake City, and Moab, UT to the Canyonlands and Arches National parks. We concluded by staying with friends in Pagosa Springs, CO, Santa Fe, NM, Abilene, Fort Worth and back to Houston. All our group got home safely! Gary and Pam Alley got to see a lot of Salt Lake City waiting on an axel from Dexter after several miscues on delivery, but they are back in Kingwood!
