Recipe Round Up ~ Pineapple Chicken Kabobs

Prep Time: 10 mins
Cook Time: 10 mins
Servings: 4 Kabobs

Marinating Time: 1 HOUR
Total Time: 1 Hour ,20 mins
Author: Fresh off the Grid

With bright, tropical flavors, these Pineapple Chicken Kabobs are an easy, fuss-free camping meal perfect for summertime grilling!

INGREDIENTS FOR THE MARINADE:

- ½ cup olive oil
- ♦ ½ cup chopped cilantro
- ♦ 1 TB honey
- 2 tsp minced ginger or ginger paste
- ♦ 1 lime juiced
- ♦ 1 teaspoon salt

TO BUILD SKEWERS:

- ½ lb chicken boneless, skinless thighs work best, cut into 1-inch pieces
- 1 medium red onion sliced into 1-inch pieces
- Pineapple wedges cut into 1 inch cubes—fresh or canned

INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Combine ingredients for marinade in a large bowl or Ziplock bag.
- 2. Add chicken to marinade and stir to coat. Cover or seal the container, and let marinate for at least an hour, or up to 24 hours.
- 3. In the meantime, fire up your grill or get your campfire going.
- 4. Build kabobs by threading chicken and vegetables onto your skewers. Brush with a bit of oil.
- 5. Grill kabobs over medium-high to high heat, turning occasionally so they cook evenly until the chicken is cooked through about 10 mins total
- 6. Remove from grill and enjoy!

for sausage. No reason to suffer until the next day if you have a sudden urge for brats! We brought a cooler and ice packs and loaded up on Bratwurst, plus free bacon with a purchase of 10 packages. There were 64 different types of brats (and 12 varieties of bacon) on offer! We stuffed our Dometic freezer with brats and bacon and they remained frozen for the entire trip. Joy! The first package has already been cooked and devoured. The rest is unlikely to last through the summer.

We recommend a visit to the Hermann Museum, housed in the original Ger-

man School. It faithfully tells the story of the town's beginnings and has an extensive collection of materials donated by residents as well as a floor devoted to Missouri River barge and shipping history. If you enjoy seeing craftsmanship, there are dollhouses, toys, furniture, needlework, and musical instruments there that are lovely to behold. They have an oldworld clockwork that was custom manufactured and still functions beautifully on top of the building. We also visited 'Herman the German', a big bronze statue of Arminius, who led an alliance of Germanic tribes against 3 Roman legions in 9AD and defeated them soundly (no small feat!). Arminius...or Herman...has remained a national hero in Germany for two millennia (also, no small feat!). Hermann is a thriving community, with lots of attractions to entice visitors and big festivals in the spring and fall which draw crowds from across the Midwest. It has been visited twice by Lewis and Clark and has survived the anti-German backlash from two world wars thanks to the dedi-



cation and vision of the town's residents. We recommend a visit.





We always plan a loop on our trip, so we don't go back over the same roads and chose Cape Girardeau, MO as our next stop. This port along the Mississippi is the current home of Southeast

Missouri State University (SEMO) and the birthplace of the broadcaster Rush Limbaugh. Cape Girardeau is trying hard but has a way to go before achieving the charms of Hermann. Some parts were very nice and there is a lot of frontier and river history to be found there. However simple things, like a failure to update the town website, made it almost impossible to find the visitor's bureau. We persisted, asked questions, and finally located it and then took a driving tour to find



Limbaugh's birthplace and family home.



Another local highlight was the Red House, a recreation of the cabin occupied by a French-Canadian trader Louis Lorimier, who became administrator of the territory by appointment of Spain, before the Louisiana purchase. Lewis and Clark also stopped here on their way west and later helped Lorimier's sons gain admission to West Point military academy. There was a magnificent, fragrant, and massive Magnolia tree in full bloom near the Red House during our visit. We stayed at Cape Camping & RV Park, which was very convenient but priced 57% higher

(\$55/night) than Hermann in a far drabber setting.

On Tuesday morning, we crossed the bridge over the Mississippi to East Cape Girardeau, Illinois and then on to our last stop of the trip in Effingham, IL. We only spent a night in Effingham at Camp Lakewood Campground but this was a beautiful place, extremely well kept and located on the sizeable Lake Pauline, which looks like a reser-



voir created by the Army Corps of Engineers. We really didn't see the community but have bookmarked this as a place worth stopping in the future. Our main impression of Effingham is that they have a lot of fun with the name of their town. We saw multiple signs advertising the "Best Effing Sandwich Shop in Illinois" or the "Effing Greatest Place to Get New Tires", etc.

It seemed like a quick jaunt back home to West Lafayette the next day, with a picnic lunch along the way. The standard routine of unpacking the refrigerator, removing anything edible and stripping the bed and bathroom of washables was quickly accomplished upon our return. Parrots Winston and Clementine gave this trip a 4-feather rating (out of 5) and once again enjoyed the passing scenery as well as the quality of a juicy pomegranate purchased from Schnuck's market. We had brought along special tomato seedlings, from a Purdue Citizen Science program, that we didn't want to trust to the uncertainty of rainfall, and they thrived on the sunshine and heat throughout the trip.

The Traveling Tomatoes sounds like a good name for a rock and roll band...or an Airstream.

Congratulations to Forrest & Jeri-Ann Bone

On August 21, 2023, Forrest and wife Jeri Bone were inducted into the RV / Motorhome Hall of Fame in Elkhart, Indiana during the "Function at the Junction" weekend rally. The Bones are only the fourth couple to receive the honor in the 51 years since the Hall of Fame was created. (Wally Byam was inducted in 1972).





Their passion for vintage trailers began

when they picked up a 1964 Safari from Jeri's parents who had been very active with the WBCCI. This coincided with the formation of the Vintage Airstream Club. Highlights of their efforts include Forrest serving as President of the Vintage Airstream Club during 1998-1999 overseeing 1150 members (VAC currently has 589

members). He advanced the club with several of his goals which involved creating

standards for Concours d' Elegance, establishing the Community Service project at International, and originating rallies and caravans by geographic regions. The Bones then revived and trademarked Tin Can Tourists (TCT) which celebrates vintage trailers and RVs of all makes and models. While active with TCT, the couple organized rallies and events for the club over the course of 22 years, eventually turning it over to their son.

Over 50 Tin Can Tourist and Vintage Airstream trailers were in attendance for the celebration included a fantastic reception dinner and plague presentation to this amazing couple. Congratulations!
