Captain Mike was drooling over this state-of-the-art leveling/ stabilizing system.



66th International Rally Report

The 66th International Rally was held in Rock Springs, WY this year. The Piedmont Airstream Club was represented by the Caps, Lovetts, and Ratis. We parked together, and that was a good thing because we may not have been able to find each other amongst the almost 1200 Airstreams at the rally. It was quite the sight!



While parking we discovered a Killdeer nest with 4 eggs and a very protective mother. To accommodate another Airstream, the nest was moved about 60 yards away from its original location! Fearing the mother would never find the nest that far away, the Ratis went and collected the nest and eggs and created a

location that was close to the original nest site and their campsite. By the end of the arrival day we saw that the mother Killdeer had found her eggs and was once again warming them up. For the remainder of the rally the Ratis and the Caps were treated to chirps and protective displays whenever they were working on their Airstreams, but it was well worth it.



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Steve Lovett was the designated flag bearer at the Opening Ceremony, with the five of us making sure our voices were heard for the Piedmont Unit.

The Lovetts were a staple of the International Rally holding three sought after and well attended

presentations that attendees said had encouraged them to try

more recipes. Several attendees from the Lovetts' demonstrations at the Maine International Rally also attended these classes, and some of them had even bought equipment and applied the lessons from the previous International Rally. The cornbread, prepared in the camp Dutch oven, was co-ordinated with the InstaPot bean presentation, and together they produced a tasty treat for everyone who attended the two.



The Lovetts were co-leaders of the most recent Taste of Blue Ridge caravan and were presenting information about the caravan in the main hall. They got a lot of interest and will have no problems filling the caravan for next year, with the possibility of a waiting list.

The Caps, Lovetts, and Ratis will be continuing their journey together towards Alaska, but not beyond! More about that adventure as it unfolds.

Planning a Mini-Caravan to Alaska

In early February, Pete and Bonnie Cap got the idea of going to Alaska when their friend shared his story of going North. They didn't want to go alone so they floated the idea to fellow Airstreamers before the Region Three Rally "Silver on the Sand - Take Two 2023" in Myrtle Beach. A few interested parties responded, but the timing didn't work out until Leslie and Steve Lovett heard about the trip and immediately said yes. At the Region Three Rally, Pete approached Delia and Rob Rati about the trip, and while they were interested they also needed to work out the logistics of how they would be able to work on the trip. A few days later the Ratis committed and the mini-caravan was born.

Putting together the itinerary was our first major challenge. It was one thing to commit to the idea of a trip, but yet another to actually make that idea a reality. The first planning meeting was in person at Pete and Bonnie's daughter's house, (a central location) and lasted well into the evening. We each brought several planning instruments to the session which included a couple copies of The Milestone, the 2018 Alaska Caravan itinerary, and several Planning phone apps. After about 6 or more hours of planning and several pizzas later, we had planned enough stops to get us just into the state of Alaska. We hadn't figured out what we wanted to do in Alaska nor how to get back home. However it was a perfect beginning.

With the help of RVLife and several Zoom call sessions, we finally worked out all the stops in Alaska and the route back home. We split up the duties for reserving campsites, with some people making reservations while others in the group continued planning the next stop. Some sites we were able to book all of us in one reservation, while at other ones we had to make reservations independently. We had yet a third group looking at activities in the areas we were camping to help decide how many nights we wanted to stay at a particular location. It took a lot of work and coordination from everyone involved, but the advantage was that we were able to create a completely custom trip tailored to our interests and limitations.

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Speaking of limitations, the Ratis need to work from their RV so we had to ensure that the distance traveled each day was something they could do after work. They got Starlink so they could work during the trip because there are large portions of Canada with no cell service! Starlink would be everyone's internet connection when we traveled into those parts of Canada, and maybe even Alaska, where we would have no internet access. Starlink introduced another set of limitations, because in order for it to work we needed sites that had a clear view of the sky. As everyone knows, many RV parks have sites in amongst the trees and those would make Starlink useless. We used Google Maps satellite view to look at sites in each RV park to get an idea whether any sites would work. When we made reservations we also told the RV parks that we needed sites with a clear view of the sky, and they were all as accommodating as they could be.

So, with the journey planned and some common activities booked at various locations, we all set out for Wyoming independently. We rendezvoused at a campsite near International the night before, and then caravanned into the International Rally together to enjoy the events and then start our amazing mini-caravan.
