Anna Brandon's POST-WYOMING CODDIWOMPLING

For the last three years David and I have followed up the WBCCI Annual Rally with adventures of our own, always more fun with friends. This year, about twelve of us journeyed up to Fishing Bridge Campground in Yellowstone National Park from Rock Springs. After 30 minutes of fooling around with our electrical cables and breakers like dancing monkeys, we all finally realized that the power was out over the entire campground. Not the best way to start your visit to Yellowstone! The intermittent power outages were just a nuisance while we took beautiful hikes, marveled at the geysers and fumaroles, and gasped at the stunning views.

David and I left Yellowstone on our own to head up to Glacier National Park, staying on the west side in the St. Mary's West Glacier KOA park. This was the most expensive park we have

stayed in since we bought Drag-N-Fly the First back in 2019, but we had a beautiful campsite just outside the west entrance to the Going to the Sun Road, and smack dab between the Many Glacier and Two Medicine Valley entrances. We were able to get an entrance ticket into Two Medicine but not Many Glacier or Highway to the Sun. No problem! We entered Many Glacier right at 3 and had plenty of time to explore before dark. For the Going to the Sun Road, we booked one of the Red Bus tours, giving us entrance to the scenic road anytime that day. The Red Bus tour is worth the money. They have reserved spaces at each stop so can drop you at each point and you don't have to worry about parking. All this nature can be overstimulating though, so we took one day and went

into Browning, Montana to the North American Indian Days celebration. From the morning parade to the afternoon rodeo we were mesmerized with the Native American culture and, in particular, Indian Relay races. Four color-coded teams composed of three young Native American men and three horses take their places in front of the stands. The designated rider of each team jumps on bareback, triestosubduetheready-to-run

stallion, then takes off around the racetrack. While slightly slowing down as they come back around, each rider jumps off and onto another prancing horse for the second round of the racetrack, then repeats the feat for a third and final run. Talk about exciting!

We left Montana and headed up to Alberta, Canada where we met Mark and Michelle Wright (Affiliate NTxAC Members) to spend a few days touring Banff, Lake Louise, and Moraine Lake. Our first day was rainy, so we used it driving up the Icefields Parkway (between Banff and Jasper). The website for the parkway proclaims, "Prepare to be Amazed," and we were. We stopped at the Columbia Icefield and sprung for the Ice Explorer tour that takes you out on the icefield then, afterward, to the Glacier

Sky Walk (a glass-floored observation platform 900 feet over the Sunwapta Valley). It was hard to look down but, when you did, it was "awe-full." The next day we toured both Lake Louise and Moraine Lake—so breathtaking that the pictures look like they are taken in a studio! While we were up there, we heard from Tom Jensen and Allana Patterson, who were staying in Banff. We all met for dinner in Banff one night at a brewery/distillery and caught up on all our adventures before we all scattered again.

The four of us left reluctantly and headed over to Calgary, Alberta for the "The Greatest Outdoor Show on Earth," the Calgary Stampede. In your imagination, take the Texas State Fair and multiply it by 10 and you'll have an idea of the Stampede. The afternoon rodeo features cowboys and cowgirls from all over Canada and the US making roping and wrestling bulls look like a piece of cake. The evening show brings on the famous Chuck Wagon races, bareback First Nation relay races (just as fun as the Indian Relay races we watched in Montana), a light show, a musical, and fireworks all rolled up into one three-hour experience. We adventurously tried some of the Stampede food, but none of us was up to the catsup or mustard ice cream.

The time had come for us to head south but we took our time about it, knowing what temperatures we would face back home. We stopped in Cranbrook, British Columbia, for our for our last two nights in Canada. This KOA sits out of town next to the St. Eugene Resort, home to a golf course, casino, three restaurants, a pool, and a spa. Unfortunately, they are still suffering from COVID-related business challenges, so not much was open. Sometimes, though, the best entertainment is free, and this took the form of an ongoing forest fire just on the other side of the valley we were in. By the next morning, there was just a little puff of smoke going and we turned our sights south again.

Just like Texas, Montana takes about two days to get from one end to the other. We had one night on the edge of Flathead Lake and the next just outside of Livingston, where, without thinking, I turned on my rice cooker while the AC was running

(we have one of the older No matter 30-AMP rigs). how many times we switched the breaker plugged and unplugged, we could not get the AC to come back on. *Drag*-*N*-*Fly* the Second is wired so that all plugs run either on solar or shore power, and this was our first long trip with her, so we were still unfamiliar with how she operates. Mark and David tore her apart looking for another fuse box. We were cool enough in Montana that not having the AC wouldn't be a problem. It never dawned on us that the whole trailer was running on solar until the fridge started beeping at 3 AM because we had no power. Now we've learned that our lithium battery and 600 watts of solar are good for a couple of pots of rice, a few cups of coffee, a couple hours of TV, and about 8 hours of the Max-Air fan. It sure felt lonesome to be alone again after such a fun week camping with friends, (Mark and Michelle were drawing out their return a little longer by skipping over to South Dakota) but we were eager to find out what was wrong with the AC before we got back to Texas. We pulled into our campground in Buffalo, WY (where Longmire was filmed) about 4, and, while setting up heard, "Yoo-hoo, what are you guys doing here?" We were parked right next to Kevin and Mary Short, neighbors of ours from the North Texas Airstream Community. It was

sure nice to have someone to visit with while we waited for the mechanic! He pulled up an hour later in a dilapidated pick-up with a sign on the side that read, "Yardwork, Carpentry, Plumbing, RV Repair, Marriages, and Pet-Sitting." I figured we must be in good hands if he could do all that. He scratched his head, called a friend over to look at it with him, and all of a sudden spotted a new breaker box in the back storage compartment of the rig that we didn't know anything about. Upon opening, there are two switches—one said "Main" and the other said "AC." Sure made him look like a hero! Now we know where to go when the AC blows the breaker again... After a quick night at a Harvest

Host close to the borders of Nebraska and Colorado, we landed at Spruce Lake RV Resort in Estes Park, CO for a few last

days of cool evenings. Trail Ridge Road in Rocky Mountain National Park is David's all-time favorite ride; the drive was uncrowded and beautiful. We had dinner at our favorite Estes Park restaurant, Bird & Jim, then turned our noses to Texas after six wonderful weeks of travel. We made it to Raton. NM that first day and intended to break up the trip back to Hillsboro with an overnight in Childress. We stepped out of the truck around noon for a pit stop and faced 106 degrees for the first time this year. A couple of miles down the road afterward, David turned to me and said as only he can, "Darlin', we are skipping Childress and heading home. No point in dragging this out any longer." And so we did. If all this sounds fun, you are cordially invited to head out with us anytime!

August-September 2023 : The ABCs of WBCCI

One creeping trend I've noticed over the last several years is organizations discarding their names in favor of acronyms. Of course, this is not an innovation; it's been going on for decades. Classic examples are IBM, GE, GM, and AT&T. But it seems to be accelerating. I can't remember the last time I ate at a Dairy Queen, a Burger King, or a Kentucky Fried Chicken. They have changed all their branding to DQ, BK, and KFC. And that's not even accounting for newer businesses and stores that are less familiar to me. The same is true for our own Airstream club. This month, I'd like to demystify some of the abbreviations you might encounter.

Let's start with the main organization itself. Current usage favors **ACI**. This stands for **Airstream Club International**. Legally, however, this is just a *dba*, or *doing business as*, name. More formally, we are known as **WBCCI**, or the **Wally Byam Caravan Club International**. This is the name under which the club is registered as a 501(c)(7) organization—501(c) (7) being the section of IRS code dealing with social clubs. Another popular acronym is **WBAC**, the **Wally Byam Airstream Club**, also a *dba* name. I learned on the <u>airstreamclub.org</u> website that there are 6 more *dba* names. I couldn't find the others on the website, though, nor could I tell you what they are. **WBCCI**, **ACI**, and **WBAC** are all the same entity.

One more acronym I'd like to introduce is NTxAC, which stands for our club, the North Texas Airstream Club. Geographically, NTxAC is the Dallas-area chapter of ACI. This one can be a bit confusing as you might have also come across the acronym NTAC. NTAC (pronounced "EN-tack"), or the North Texas Airstream Community, is an Airstream-only member community located in Hillsboro. NTAC is its own 501(c)(7) social club; you must own an Airstream to become a member there; and you must maintain membership in ACI to live there. However, NTAC is not affiliated with ACI, and NTAC and NTAC are not the same thing. Several members of NTxAC, including me, live at NTAC. This was less confusing when local chapters of WBCCI were known as units instead of clubs. During this era, NTxAC was known as the North Texas Unit of WBCCI. But time marches on and new conventions take hold.
