It has come to my attention that some Units are having joint rallies. I want to encourage this type of activity because there is synergism when a rally event gets to a certain size. Cost factors are distributed over a larger number, allowing for additional activities, friendships from different Units are developed and the volunteer workload is spread over more people. One example is the Rally that the New York Finger Lakes Airstream unit had in August of 2023. They partnered with the Ontario unit. That rally had over 60 trailers. The rally had a rig from as far away as Texas. The 3 NYS units are partnering for a rally in 2024. As you can see, these rallies are not limited to their local units.

Your Region 2 officers have not been 'asleep at the switch'. Plans for the Region 2 Rally are taking shape. So, save the DATE May 2 to May 5, 2024. The location is the Centre County Grange Encampment & Fair. The status is that we are finalizing the contract. What I can tell you at this point is the following:

- Location: 169 Homan Lane, Centre Hall PA 16828
- Sites will have 30AMP hookups and water (dump station is available).
 - Note Grange Park has HIGH water pressure. Please bring water pressure reducers to avoid water hookup issues!
- We will have access to a building with tables and chairs.
- We are looking at Catering services and Entertainment options for the Rally.
- Pricing/Registration information to follow in the next President newsletters and will be posted on the WBCCI website along with the Grange Encampment & Fair Guidelines.

We will be using JotForm and PayPal for registration and payment.

On the JotForm for the rally there will be an area to volunteer, identify if you have any food limitations/requests, and other inputs for the rally.

We plan to have online registration open for the rally by Jan 1st of 2024.

For the Spring Rally in Blyth

Your Host Team for the Spring Rally in Blyth is hard at it – planning a long weekend that's bound to be too short! The Blyth Campground is ideal for our needs. In fact, it was a popular spring shakedown location for several years as well as the site for the 2013 Spring Rally.

The gathering space in the Community Centre is spacious and extremely well-equipped for groups like ours. It's on the second floor. If you have "rusty knees" or "squeaky hips", have no fear - there is elevator access!

The grounds are enormous and relatively level. There is an abundance of electrical and water hook-ups. Nobody goes without and you'll have at least a 15-amp service. Showers and toilets are located close to where we'll be camping and there's a dump station on site.

We don't have the camping costs yet as the fee schedule will change at the end of the year, but we expect the nightly fee will be in the neighbourhood of \$40. While we have the campground reserved from Thursday to Tuesday, the actual rally starts on Friday and ends on Monday. To be fair to everyone, the camping fees will be kept separate from the rally fee.

We're still in the early days of planning, but our program is starting to gel. We'll have more to say about that, along with points of interest in the area, in the February issue of The Trillium.

Tech Bites

How to Add More Torque to Your Sewer Cap - John R.

Like for tow vehicles, torque can be a useful force, especially when trying to get off those stubborn sewer caps to allow you to dump your holding tanks. This simple modification will put a torque amplifier on the end of your sewer cap and make it much easier to get the cap on and off. This boost in torque can be accomplished for less than \$15 of supplies and some basic skills.

What you will need:

- One 6 inch nylon boat / dock cleat. (This can be purchased at Canadian Tire.)
- Two 1.5 inch 10-24 stainless-steel bolts with a trumpet head to sit recessed in the cleat
- Two stainless-steel washers
- Two stainless-steel nuts
- Masking tape and a marker
- Drill with a 3/16-inch bit
- Screwdriver and plyers

Remove the sewer cap from the trailer and put a piece of masking tape across the cap marking the center line.

Place the nylon cleat on the cap and mark the spots where to drill the two holes. Drill the holes using a 3/16-inch drill bit and remove the masking tape. Assemble the nylon cleat to the cap using the stainless-steel bolts, washers, and nuts.

Reinstall the cap back on the trailer and just feel the extra torque helping you put that cap back on!











How to Remove EternaBond Tape - Don M.

[Editor's note: <u>EternaBond tape</u> is commonly used to repair roof leaks]

Needed:

- Heat Gun
- Plastic putty knife or scraper
- Acrysol adhesive remover
- Clean dry rags
- Soap and water

Instructions:

- 1. Apply heat to warm tape
- 2. Start peeling at a 45 degree angle to minimize tearing
- 3. Continue heating if you encounter resistance, be patient
- 4. Use plastic scraper for stubborn areas to gently lift the edge of the tape
- 5. Clean residue with Acrysol or rubbing alcohol using a rag
- 6. Wash the surface with soap and water, then dry
- 7. Inspect the surface
- 8. Apply new sealant (if necessary)



Our First Airstream Caravan - Made in USA 2023 John R.



Karen and I have been RVing for the last 19 years and the last three camping seasons we spent in an Airstream, so we are no strangers to RV travel. This year we took a 20-week cross Canada and US tour to the western part of the continent.

The last 5 weeks of our adventure was with a group of 43 Airstreamers on the Made in the USA Caravan, lead by Bill & Beth R. from Pompano Beach Florida, with Dale and Kathy S. as co-leaders. The tour took us through the states of Ohio, Michigan, Indiana, Illinois, and Wisconsin.

As the title of the caravan suggests, we visited factories to see how products are made in the USA, and museums which were about the history of products made in USA. We visited 14 factories and 8 museums, toured Notre Dame University, and had two river cruises.

It was natural to start out this caravan in Ohio and with a factory tour of the Mother Ship in Jackson Center. Then we were off to Michigan for a tour of the Ford F150 assembly plant and Ford Museum, along with a Greenfield Village tour.

Our next stops were in Indiana where we visited the Auburn and Duesenberg Automobile Museum, a chocolate factory with lots of samples, the Oliver House which was the home of Joseph D. Oliver who made his fortune manufacturing horse drawn plows and later moved into building tractors in the 1800's, the former Studebaker mansion which is now a restaurant, the THOR factory where they make class C motorhomes, and the Kokomo Iridescent Glass factory where art glass for stained glass windows is made.



We toured the Subaru production and assembly plant, the Caterpillar engine plant, Fair Oaks Farms where they milk 10,000 cows three times a day, and a shrimp farm housed in a barn!

In Illinois we toured the Caterpillar visitor center and John Deere visitor center, had a lunch time river boat cruise on the Mississippi, visited a railway museum, and enjoyed an architectural cruise of the Chicago riverfront.

Our last stops were in Wisconsin where we toured the Kohler toilet factory where they still make cast iron bathtubs as well as porcelain toilet fixtures, the Harley Davidson Museum, and several breweries in Milwaukee. During some free time in Milwaukee, I visited the National Bobblehead Hall of Fame; with thousands of bobbleheads, including sports figures as well as fictional and nonfictional characters, it was well worth five bucks to spend a few hours wandering around.

Overall, our impressions of our first caravan are extremely positive. We met 41 genuinely nice people who we hope to see again some time in the future. As Karen says it was a treat on the last 5 weeks of our 20-week tour to have things planned out for us rather than us having to make all the decisions with the fear we may have missed something important to see. Would we do another caravan ... well we have booked for the Polar Bears and Northern Lights Caravan for next September/October and are looking into 2025 to see where we would like to caravan next.
