
John, and dog, Willy.

We backpacked in our 20's, car camped in our 30's, and bought a 28' Nomad travel trailer with bunks right after 9/11 so we could get away to National Parks, State Parks, and National Forests. When the kids were young, we would camp in the mountains (Shenandoah NP) one weekend and the next weekend at the beach (DE and Outer Banks, NC) during the summer. We would camp at Hershey Park (PA) and Busch Gardens (Williamsburg, VA) theme parks annually, and toured/camped the Smoky Mountains, the Adirondack Mountains, Yellowstone and Grand Teton National Parks. Then, they became teens and camping was in the past.

Dave had always wanted an Airstream. The country closed down for Covid-19 and the trips that Catherine had planned to break from caregiving did not happen. We needed to get away. Thus, we began our search for a travel trailer that would accommodate John's lack of mobility. The Airstream has a lower profile and is closer to the ground, so it is easier for John to get into and out of the trailer. The Airstream has been perfect for our disabled son, and he has progressed to being able to walk with assistance down the aisle.

Our maiden voyage with our Airstream was to Cape Henlopen State Park in April 2021. Followed by our trip to Shenandoah National Park and Great Smoky Mountain National Park via the Blueridge Parkway in May, 2021. Trip to Acadia NP in July 2021 and a trip to North and South Dakota and Wyoming. May 2022, we traveled to

Arizona camping at Mather campground in the Grand Canyon National Park and near Winslow Arizona for the Petrified Forest National Park. We also saw Zion, Mesa Verde, and Great Sand Dunes National Parks, and stayed at a number of state park campgrounds during our Spring 2022 trip. Vermont in July of 2022 and then Frisco NC at the Hatteras National Seashore, Elkmont Campground in Great Smoky Mountain National Park, Mammoth Cave campground, and camped in a state park near New River Gorge National Park. We enjoy seeing National Parks and believe that driving is the best way to see America.

We haven't attended any rallies yet but would like to learn more about such trips.

On our maiden voyage, we met a fellow Airstreamer who introduced us to this club. On our trips, we have camped beside other Airstreams (by chance) and we always learn something new. On the road, Airstreamers blink their lights to recognize the Airstream. Just owning an Airstream seems like you belong to a club.

Airstream Travel Planning

We have been RVing for about 15 months and have developed an approach to travel planning we thought was worth sharing. We are sharing it with you not because we found the best approach; far from it! We hope to get your feedback to improve our current way of doing business.

We approach travel planning from three levels. At the highest level we look out about a year and see what time windows are available to travel and the general destinations we'd like to see. We're somewhat hemmed in by medical


appointments and family events (can't miss the nephew's college graduation!), so certain blocks of time lend themselves to travel, with smaller windows of course meaning shorter trips. We don't push to see iconic destinations in a short time; we give each destination the time it deserves. We also try to incorporate some must-attend events (like Paul's



college reunion) into our larger travel plans. Our high-level plans for 2023 include Florida in March and Alaska in the summer and fall. 2024 plans include Florida mid-Jan to mid-March and eastern Canada in the summer and fall. We will fit in shorter trips as our other commitments permit.

Once we nail down time frames and general destinations, the second level of planning is more detailed where we figure our general route of travel, specific sights to see, and specific places to stay. We aren't full-time RVers so every trip

starts and ends from our home in Lewes, Delaware. We live about a three-hour drive from the grandkids in northern Virginia, so seeing them is the first and last stop of every trip. Many of the places we plan to visit are the homes of family and friends. We'll **moochdock** or camp near them and stay for a night or two. We have cousins and friends we haven't seen in ages and so far, everyone has been happy to get together. As a retired military family, we have friends across the country, and we try to maintain those friendships with stops at/near their homes.



Route planning also means incorporating big sites (Niagara Falls) and smaller sites (Frank Lloyd Wright's Fallingwater). We are torn between taking interstates (high speeds and more miles covered in each day) versus US routes and state routes (many small towns across America are hidden gems with great locallyowned restaurants and stores). At this level of planning, we use RV Trip Wizard.

There's a learning curve to using Trip Wizard. It first seemed a little awkward but like any other software, every time you use it planning becomes a little easier.

This article is not a plug for RV Trip Wizard. I happened upon it and just started using it. Search for "best RV trip planner" to find articles comparing the most popular planning apps to see which one is right for you. RV Trip Wizard doesn't cover every possible camping location, so we supplement it with other sites we keep open while planning:

- Campendium (https://www.campendium.com) We have come across sites in Campendium that weren't in Trip Wizard
- Campspot (https://www.campspot.com) The greatest value of Campspot is that the app searches all campgrounds near your destination for availability rather than you manually searching local campgrounds one by one to find available sites (although we aren't sure what campgrounds Campspot doesn't cover).
- AllStays (https://www.allstays.com): Huge database of camping sites with sites like some public lands, some military, and casinos that Trip Wizard sometimes doesn't have.
- HarvestHosts (https://membership.harvesthosts.com) This site includes both Harvest Hosts locations and Boondockers Welcome locations. The website has an incredible galaxy of places to stay; farms, wineries, golf courses, churches, museums, and more that open their parking lots to a few campers, typically for one night. You will boondock at these free sites, and most are well worth it. Some ask you to eat or buy their wares, but hey, you have to eat dinner somewhere.
- RV Dump Stations (https://www.rvdumps.com). Valuable when in between boondocking sites and you need to dump your tanks.
- US Military Campgrounds and RV Parks (https://www.militarycampgrounds.us). A helpful site for current and retired military members who can access RV parks on military bases.
- Recreation.gov (https://www.recreation.gov). Over 4000 sites controlled by these federal agencies:
 Bureau of Land Management, Bureau of Reclamation, Bureau of Engraving and Printing, Federal Highway
 Administration, National Archives & Records Administration, National Oceanic & Atmospheric
 Administration, National Park Service, Presidio Trust, Smithsonian Institution, Tennessee Valley Authority,
 Fish and Wildlife Service, US Army Corps of Engineers, and US Forest Service.
- Airstream-only parks (http://www.viewrvs.com/airstream-parks.php). The 13 AS-only parks across the US are listed here.

Airstream Courtesy Parking (https://airstreamclub.org/members/courtesy-parking-directory). AS Club members can avail themselves of free parking spaces offered by other club members. Hundreds of sites across the US and Canada.

We also keep a tab open with Google Maps. It's helpful to quickly see how far your campsite is from your friend's house or the tourist attraction you really want to see. We typically plan to travel 250-300 miles a day. Being retired we don't need to kill ourselves with long days in the seat.

This list of tabs seems like too much to keep track of at once, but we mainly rely on a few and refer to the others when needed. When deciding where to stay, we rely heavily on reviews by other RVers so we do our best to provide honest reviews of the sites we stayed at. Please do take a minute to offer your opinion on the sites where you have stayed.



Finally, at the third and most detailed level, we take a couple of minutes every day we're on the road to look over the next day's route and weather. Having a sense of the route lets us know where we can stop for breaks, get gas, and shop for food. The next day's mileage lets us know when we need to hit the road in the morning.

As for weather, we rely greatly on Dave Titley's RV Weather Site (https://rvweather.com). He does our community a great service with daily forecasts, severe weather warnings, longer range forecasts across the country, and weather safety tips. Sign up for his daily email!

OK, that's about it for planning. As I mentioned before, the purpose of this article is to throw some planning ideas out to the Airstream community to find out from you more seasoned travelers what tools you use and how you approach travel planning.

Airstream Rock Guard Strut Repair

A few years back, during a trip to California, I noticed that one of the acorn nuts that held the upper edge of the driver's side rock guard went missing. No issue, as I just picked up a few and replaced it within a few days. I didn't think much of it until five years later when I noticed cracks in the aluminum shell underneath that rock guard. A small leak inside the trailer was not far from the front gaucho. It made sense that the small leak might be coming from these cracks. (Figures 1 and 2)

A trip to Jackson Center was an option, but I decided to try to patch this myself. I read a few forum entries and watched several YouTube videos on Cleco Clamps. I already had some shaveable Olympic rivets, so it was just a matter of what sizes of Cleco Clamps I needed. I ordered a couple of sizes just to be prepared!

In the picture to the right, with the strut removed, you can see the cracks throughout this area. Only a large patch that covered all of this would help hold this spot together. (Figure 3)



A problem came into view immediately. The patch was flat, and where I needed to place it was curved. Somehow, I needed to give a gentle curve to the patch. And the answer to that was the English wheel that I had. (Figure 5)

I just happened to have some aluminum sheeting appropriate for this task, so I created a template and cut out a rough rendition. As an artistic touch, I decided to add some sun rays that would peek out from behind the rock guard. (Figure 4)

Getting the curve just right took a lot of back and forth. Then came the big step of the first drill hole. After drilling the holes, I set up the Cleco clamps several times. At the same time, I drilled holes for the rock guard strut. (Figure 6)

Once it all lined up with the Cleco clamps, I spread a generous amount of TremPro 645 evenly onto the backside of the patch. The Cleco clamps were reapplied lining everything up nicely. I took each clamp off one by one and replaced them with the Olympic rivets. (Figure 7)

I also had a rivet shaver, and soon the rivets were just like the originals on the trailer! Once it was all fastened and shaved (Figures 8 and 9), I applied Captain Tolley's Creeping Crack Cure around the edges. Captain Tolley has helped me with several small leaks over the years.

Overall, it was quite fun learning how to do this and implementing what I had learned. I have another small scratch on the side of my trailer, and I have toyed with covering that with another artistic endeavor!



I traveled April 2022 for 3 weeks with my splinter group of women Airstream owners appropriately called the "Solo Streaming Sisters." The month of April was dedicated to visiting the Gulf Shores region of Texas, Mississippi, Louisiana, Alabama and the Florida panhandle.

There were 5 rigs including myself. We took a leisurely drive across the coastal areas staying 3-4 nights in each of the following: Davis Bayou State Park (MS), Fort Pickens State Park (FL) and Big Lagoon State Park (FL). All were great choices. I would return to any of them. Gulf Shores State Park had the best cycling paths and allowed ebikes.



I had made arrangements to visit family outside Birmingham, so I departed from the group and headed back to Alabama. I would wholeheartedly recommend Oak Mountain State Park in Pelham, AL. This state park is almost 10,000 acres and has very generous campsites. The campground is located about 5 miles inside the park. Each loop has its own pavilion with free wifi at the pavilion.

There are 2 lakes with all water amenities for rent. It includes a sand beach for swimming, as well as a newly renovated wading pool. There is a professional golf course, horse stables with a small show arena and trail rides as an option. A new archery range, BMX and mountain biking trails as well as varied hiking trails are located throughout the park. I was absolutely amazed with all this park has to offer. You would never need to leave and be entertained with something different every day.
