PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Know before you go

Pre-trip checklists and routines to prepare before heading out to camp take many forms. A very important and often overlooked item to review before leaving is the destination (and any stops along the way) RV park or campground policies.

As a club, broadly as the Airstream Club International and specifically the Oregon Airstream Club, the focus is on the **fun, social aspects of camping together**, and there are published rules of the road (<u>https://airstreamclub.org/rules-road</u>) to guide the journey.

Before registering for rallies or making reservations, be sure to read the policies posted on a campground or RV park website. What's expected can vary regarding

vehicles allowed, use of tents/pop ups, visitors, pets, and use of facilities. Understand what's expected in advance to avoid surprises and uncomfortable situations at the campsite.

Here are three examples of how varied campsite policies can be from place to place.

Oregon State Parks (https://stateparks.oregon.gov/index.cfm?do=visit.faq)

You'll want to check to see if there are specific rules for each state park, as there are a few exceptions.

- How many people are allowed in a campsite? Maximum of 8 people.
- Where can I ride an Electric Assisted Bicycle (E-Bike)? A person may operate an E-Bike on roads and trails eight feet (8') or wider unless otherwise posted.
- **Does my pet need to be on a leash?** Your pet needs to be physically restrained, meaning you must be holding them, holding onto their collar, or have them on a leash no longer than six feet. Exceptions: your pet is in a designated off-leash area; inside your vehicle, tent, or pet-friendly yurt or cabin.
- Are pets allowed inside park buildings? Unless otherwise specified, no with the exception of service animals.

Silver Cove (https://silvercovervresort.com/policies/)

• Site cleanliness: Your site must always be kept clean and neat. Only appropriate outdoor RV furniture is allowed. Outside animal feeders of any type including your own pets are prohibited due to the wild



animal pests in the area. No trailer, boat or dirt bike storage are allowed on the sites. Extra refrigerators, freezers, coolers, boxes, clothes lines, garbage cans or other debris are not allowed to be stored outside.

- Visitors: Your visitors are always welcome; they must register with the main office. Visitors are expected to read and adhere to all RV park policies. All your visitors must leave the campground by 10 p.m. Park occupants are responsible for the rule violations of family members and/or visitors.
- **Pets:** Pets are welcome! You may walk your pet throughout the park and in designated pet areas. Animal waste must be picked up immediately. Pets must always be on a leash no longer than 6 feet. Pets may not be left unattended at any time, left alone in the RV, fenced, penned, chained or tethered on park property. Pet pens, cages, runs and kennels are not permitted. Pets are not allowed in any park facility, special exceptions for service dogs with appropriate paperwork are permitted. Aggressive or Barking dogs may lead to an eviction. No more than two (2) pets allowed per site unless approved by management.
- Sewer hook-ups: You must have a sewer line track underneath for proper flow, no leaks and cap is securely fitted.

Sea and Sand (https://seaandsandrvpark.com/rates/)

- **Campfires:** Are now only allowed in the forest sites only. However, you can still have a fire on the beach. We do allow propane fireplaces.
- Tents of any kind are not allowed
- **Maximum 2 vehicles per site:** one RV and one vehicle. Rates include (2) occupants per RV site. Each additional person is \$2.00 per day. Max 6 per RV site. All Visitors must check in at the office. Visitors staying over 1 hr. shall each pay a Visitor Fee of \$2.00 per day. No more than 6 people in each site.
- **Pets are required to always be on a leash.** Please pick up after pets and do not leave them unattended in your RV or vehicle. No more than 3 pets per vehicle. ABSOLUTELY NO PITBULLS, ROTTWIELERS OR MIXES OF THOSE BREEDS ARE ALLOWED.

We always want to leave places visited better than they were found and that goes beyond personal campsites. Leaving a good impression is especially important for group camping, so the Oregon Airstream Club is welcomed back year after year.

TIPS, TRICKS, INTERVIEWS, RECIPES, AND MORE USEFUL TRAVEL APPS

We here at the newsletter thought it might be a good idea to share some info about apps that can help you with trips and travel. Some we have used personally and some have been suggested by others. Remember that all states have DOT sites that are updated regularly with road conditions. These sites list things like road closures due to inclement weather, fires and construction. It's always good to check those before you go and as you travel.

We also want folks to know about Harvest Hosts and Boondockers Welcome, which you can join for a fee. Worth noting that the fees don't increase as long as you're a member. Both occasionally run specials for new members as well and may offer specials for referrals. Both services can be a great way to fill in empty days on your itinerary or serve as bridges between reservations elsewhere.

Harvest Hosts is a network of places that offer campers free camping at spots like wineries and farms. Usually there's a maximum of a 1-2 night stay with no hookups on land that these businesses are not using near or at their locations. Since the stay is free, it's understood that campers should purchase something from the host, such as a tour, wine tasting, or something from the gift shop. This means that it's often a good deal for the host and the camper. Pre-planning is best for these, and there are reviews of the different hosts. Boondockers Welcome is a directory of people who offer their land or driveway for people to boondock. Unlike Harvest Host, which is made up of businesses, Boondockers Welcome is largely private residences and the like.

AIRSTREAM CLUB INTERNATIONAL COURTESY PARKING POWERED BY HARVEST HOSTS (COMING SOON)

When I was asked to write about my favorite travel app, the first thing that popped into my mind was Harvest Hosts! For those unfamiliar with Harvest Hosts, (HH) they operate a membership program with a network of more than 4,000 wineries, farms, museums, and other interesting and unique attractions that invite self-contained RVers to visit and stay overnight. While there is no charge for Harvest Host members to park



overnight, members are encouraged to support these (mostly) small businesses with a purchase or donation.



David and I have purchased rice from a HH rice farm, alpaca socks from an alpaca farm, wine from wineries, and had delicious breakfasts at golf course restaurants.

My second favorite program (not an app but on the ACI website) is ACI Courtesy Parking. We currently have approximately 800 ACI members across the US and Canada who offer free overnight parking on their property for other ACI members. It may be the most underutilized benefit we have as members. As your ACI board compared our Courtesy Parking program to that of Harvest Host, it became very apparent why! The Harvest Host app has an interactive map of locations, photos of the parking area, and a description of the site including if any hookups are available. The ACI Executive Council decided to see if we could bring those features to our current ACI website and we were

advised it was just too expensive. Instead, we approached HH with the concept of a private platform on their website for ACI members and Courtesy Parking hosts ONLY. As the saying goes, why reinvent the wheel? HH loved the idea of a partnership with ACI and work has now begun to build *Airstream Club International Courtesy Parking powered by Harvest Hosts* website as a free benefit to both ACI guests and ACI courtesy parking hosts!

This program has an **ETA of late summer 2024**, and watch for emails from Lori Plummer and our club headquarters team in Jackson Center over the next few months. In the meantime, if you have considered becoming a Courtesy Parking host, this would be a great time to sign up as information seminars will begin soon! Hosts will have **100% control** over accepting reservations from other ACI members and no information on location will be shared until the reservation is confirmed by the host. ACI does <u>not</u> sell our membership lists so both Host and Guest information will be uploaded to the website by our ACI headquarters team. Our current courtesy parking hosts report they love meeting other ACI members and the only disappointment is that they don't get enough requests to stay!

In addition to the no-charge to Airstream Club International Courtesy Parking powered by Harvest membership offered by Harvest Host, they will offer a 50% discount to **new** members who want to add the traditional membership with access to small businesses like wineries, farms, etc. even more options for finding campsites as we travel. (Pray that you never get an elf infestation in your trailer; they're nearly impossible to get rid of and



cause all sorts of mischief). We found that the 17.5" x 11.8" rack fits well over our sink (we turn it 90° from the stock photo above) and easily rolls up for storage. Well worth the \$8 or so (on <u>Amazon</u>). Now if only we could find a good way to hang the dish towel without it constantly getting caught in the cabinet door...

SEARED STEELHEAD / SALMON	MUSHROOM SPAGHETTI

 By Amy Dabbraccio Here is a recipe that I have made for rallies that everyone has loved. Funny thing is I told everyone it was salmon, but it wasn't until Pendleton that I learned that steelhead is not salmon. LOL. So, I make this recipe with steelhead, and it's fantastic. Ingredients 6 salmon filets – my pieces were about 6 ounces each 1 teaspoon canola oil 4 tablespoons Asian sweet chili sauce 4 tablespoons hoisin sauce 1 tablespoon brown sugar 2 tablespoons lite soy sauce Red and green chili peppers sliced thinly (if desired) Cilantro chopped (if desired) Directions Rub the salmon with the canola oil. Heat a grill pan or cast iron skillet on high heat and sear on each side for 3 minutes. In a small bowl, add the sweet chili sauce, hoisin sauce, rice wine vinegar, brown sugar, and soy sauce, and mix. Pour the sauce around the salmon and cook for 15 seconds, then spoon over the salmon and serve. Top with hot chili peppers and cilantro, if desired.	By Michelle Paris A quick, come together meal that you can easily change some ingredients or add others. Fantastic as a first night camping meal around a campfire with a nice glass of wine. 2 Servings PREP: 20 mins COOK: 30 mins Pasta, Vegetarian Ingredients 1/2 cup Onion, small diced Salt, to taste 2 cloves Garlic, minced Black pepper, to taste 1-2 Tbl Olive oil 2 tsp Vegetable base concentrate 8 oz Mushrooms, sliced 8 oz Spaghetti noodles, broken in half 2-4 Tbl Butter, divided 1 cup Cheese parmesan, grated Directions Sauté onions and garlic in olive oil 2-3 mins. Add half of the butter to melt. Add mushrooms and season with salt and pepper. Add more butter if needed while cooking. When mushrooms are cooked add the vegetable base and mix in. Add broken noodles to mushroom mix and cover with water. Bring to a boil/hard simmer and gently stir noodles so they don't stick. Add water in batches until it's absorbed and noodles are al dente. Mix in parmesan cheese and serve. Notes Variations: Steak, chicken or shrimp can be added. Chicken base/stock, beef base/stock can be used in place of vegetable base. Add in 2 Tbl Dijon mustard	
	and 1/2 cup sour cream, and it's like stroganoff, nice and creamy.
