#### **Maintenance Minute**

We just returned from our Spring trip. This year we journeyed to Big Bend. It was fantastic. However, on the way home our TPMS (tire monitor) picked up a slow leak. As I mentioned last month, the TPMS is a life saver. Sure enough we had a screw in the tread and got it changed before it ruined the tire or the rig. So another data point for using a TPMS on your Airstream.

For those of you that have a Dometic thermostat (10 or 12 button), I want to point out a little tip.



At times, the circuits may get hung up and you will not be able to switch modes or anything else on your panel. When this happens it may be necessary to reset your thermostat. Now I have to admit I got a little frustrated with the directions on a reset. My manual said to turn the thermostat to the "OFF" position. I took this to mean the mode "OFF" position (more on this in a minute). After this, you are to press and hold the "Mode" and "Zone" buttons simultaneously and then

release. An "INT" message will appear on the display. At that point the thermostat will reset to the original parameters and function properly.

I could not get this to work. However, when the directions say "OFF" position, they are not referring to the "Mode". It really means the power button needs to be turned off. Then press the two buttons and it will reset.

We had one other problem on our trip that I want to point out. We got the dreaded "E0" error on our refrigerator. This error means the display panel is not communicating with the lower circuit board on the outside of the unit (for you Airstreams, newer you have compressor style, not an ammonia circulation system unit so this does not apply to you.) So I checked all the fuses, they looked good. I also unplugged the unit to see if it would reset. No luck. I also went through the reset and check protocol. No luck. Of course at this point we were in day 3 of a 10-day trip and I was a bit, let's say... unhappy. So I did the only thing I knew how to do without replacing the circuit board (which I did not have handy). I started unplugging all the connectors to the circuit board and spraying them down with contact cleaner and reattaching. I am not sure if it was



prayer or contact cleaner, but the "EO" error disappeared and the unit started functioning and worked great for the remainder of the trip. So two things to remember. One, always carry contact cleaner in your tool kit. Two, find a cheap electric multi-tester and keep it in your rig tool kit so you can check conductivity through your fuses. It may save you some headaches. Those are two easy fixes for the "EO" error.

#### **Trip Diary**

We just returned from the Big Bend area in Southwest Texas. This was a four-park trip for us.

It started with 9 hours to Davis Mountain State Park with a stop in Balmorhea to see the State Park there (and the huge spring-fed swimming pool). We hit some cold weather on day two (21 degrees), but it warmed up quickly to perfect weather. Davis Mountain SP is a nice park right next to the National Historic Site of Ft. Davis. The McDonald Observatory is also just down the road. We highly recommend the "Star Party" for an evening of astronomy and telescopes. The night sky in that part of Texas is phenomenal. It is also hard to believe those mountains are in Texas.

Next it was onto Big Bend Ranch State Park about 100 miles south. We stayed at the Maverick Ranch RV resort in Lajitas. It is only primitive camping in the State Park and the sites can be a little challenging to get to. However, we are going to give it a try next time. Maverick Ranch is a great location and offers full hook-ups, Wi-Fi that works, a pool, and laundry facilities. There is a general store next door and the Golf Resort is across the street. Great place to stay if



going into the State Park as the entrance is just a mile up the road.

As for the Park, the Closed Canyon is an amazing 2-mile hike. It has some rock crawling, but it is beautiful.



We then moved 17 miles up the road to Terlingua/Study Boote and the Paisano Campground which offers great access to the Big Bend National Park. Big Bend NP has to be on everyone's travel bucket list. The Chisos Mountains, located entirely inside the huge park, are a wonder.



The hiking is amazing in Big Bend NP. On our last day we hiked the Santa Elena

Canyon Trail and the 1,500 foot walls of the canyon are spectacular.



We had perfect weather with lows in the 40's and highs in the 70's with the exception of one hot day in the upper 80's. Timing was good on the crowd front as we never felt like there was a mass of people anywhere. That will not be the case in a few weeks when the Spring Breakers make it to the Parks.

There are some truly beautiful hikes in Big Bend. We highly recommend both the State and National Parks and we found the company of several fellow Airstreamers along the way. If you want more information about our trip we would be glad to give you some tips at the rally (or anywhere for that matter).

Texas is blessed to have such great State and National Parks right here in our back yard.
