On The Road Again to Capture the Newest National Parks

The problem about announcing to the world that you have done every national park is that it sets you up for a neverending journey.

Our original article, which first appeared in the Urban Update in 2019 and reprinted in October, was after we completed the 60 national parks. We had saved the remote, not easily accessible Alaskan parks as the pinnacle of our quest, all done! Well, not quite.

The good news/bad news for we 'collectors' is that Congress keeps adding more. The good news is that there are now 425 entities that are part of the National Park system. Of these, 362 are national rivers, memorials, monuments, historic battlefields, reserves, preserves, seashores, or lakeshores. The national park designation is the highest honor in the system and brings much needed funds to preserve and protect these gems.

The bad news is that we "mature collectors" had to drive the 2,500+ miles to claim the newest national park in West Virginia. Ah, but bucket lists are a wonderful way to keep us motivated.

It took a few more years but we are current again. Covid delayed our travels some. Added in 2019 was national park #61 – Indiana Dunes. Ironically, and true of all the added parks is that we were right there back in our boating days. We came off an extensive exploration of gorgeous Lake Michigan on Wandering Star, our trawler, back in 2000 and moored near this beautiful National Lakeshore. But we did not go into the park or visitor center. Close does not count.

We have a few Indiana natives in our club that were familiar with this beautiful area. Don Kuhns worked there in the late 60's and has great stories. Ask him about Mohammed Ali. Jim Cahill lived nearby, and I can imagine him playing in a band on their shores. Linda Rendleman also hails from Indiana. We were encouraged to go back. So, off we went in 2021 to see what it was all about.

Lake Michigan is our favorite Great Lake. It is massive, has interesting ports along its shore and at the south end it runs along the northwestern border of Indiana. This is where Indiana Dunes State and National Park are located. You can see Chicago in the distance. The dunes dominate the landscape, some are white and high, others covered with dune grass, some pine forested. The wildlife is abundant with over 350 bird species in the park making it one of the top five national parks for birding.

A developer bought lakefront property and moved Art Deco/futuristic homes featured at the Chicago 1933 World's Fair to the Indiana shore. He hoped to create an upmarket lakeside resort to attract wealthy Chicagoans. 'Beverly Shores' failed. The houses have been restored by private investors, and while they are only open to visitors once a year, you can walk the streets and enjoy the exterior and grounds anytime.

Also added in 2019 was national park #62 – White Sands National Park. In 1933, President Herbert Hoover designated it a National Monument. The white sands are Gypsum – the largest gypsum dune field in the world. We had never stopped but had driven by it several times as it is near I-10 and I-25 and the town of Alamogordo, New Mexico. It is also known as the White Sands Missile Base which has a rich history of its own.

Our visit was mid-winter 2021 and the snow on the ground mixed with the white-white gypsum sand. The dunes are high, not dissimilar to the dunes we found at other sandy national parks such as Great Sand Dunes NP in Colorado; Kobuk Valley NP Alaska; the Indiana Dunes NP; and our nearby Death Valley NP, all have cool areas of sand dunes. At White Sands they encourage you to hike the trails and climb up the dunes with a sled or disc and ride down. It's a blast. A 16-mile drive through the park gives you a good overview. You can stop anywhere and play along the way.

The newest national park, New River Gorge National Park in West Virginia was the last jewel in our crown on this go-around. It had been designated as a national river in 1978. It's beautiful and worthy of a long visit to take advantage of the many recreational activities. Our near-miss story for this park was in 2016. We'd driven across the country to attend our first ever Airstream International Rally in Lewisburg, West Virginia. It was exciting for us Airstream newbies, not only the cool events going on at the rally, but the fact that the area was experiencing the epic flood of 2016. We were prevented from sightseeing in the area, and one place that we'd wanted to see was then known as New River Gorge National River.

It is not a new river, in fact it is the oldest river on the North American continent, estimated to be the second oldest river on earth, between 10-360 million years old. Known for decades to West Virginians for its stunning natural beauty and recreational opportunities, including river rafting, fishing, hunting, hiking, and camping. We stay inside National Parks when it's practical and available, but often find that state parks which abut the national parks are more RV accessible. So, we stayed at Little Beaver State Park, which is just a few miles from one of the visitor centers. The park does not offer a simple circle drive, but rather four entrances with four visitor centers that each highlight different points of interest in that section of the park.

Do not miss Canyon Rim Visitors Center for spectacular views of the Gorge and Bridge. Boardwalks and trails make it easy to explore along with its particularly good visitor's center. Grandview is in the south near our campsite and has magnificent views. Thurmond Depot Visitor Center highlights the more recent history of the railroad, coal mining and life in the Appalachian Mountains.

So, when you are out and about in this beautiful country, be sure to stop at some of the smaller, lesser known places. There is something of interest in ALL of them and who knows, someday they may grow up to be a true NATIONAL PARK!
