Welcome to Quincy, California, nestled against the western slope of the Sierra Nevada Mountain range. The Plumas County seat is tucked at the edge of the lush American Valley at 3,432 feet elevation. It is known for its rolling green ranch lands buttressed by towering peaks, beautifully preserved historic buildings and a vibrant downtown area. The town has a relaxed vibe with an outdoorsy community that knows how to enjoy life. There's something for everyone in Quintessential Quincy, from dining, shopping, art galleries and museums in the charming downtown, to scenic drives along the Feather River Canyon on Hwy 70. And only 17 miles Southwest, is Bucks Lake, which offers year-round recreation opportunities for outdoor enthusiasts hiking, biking, fishing, kayaking and picnic1

Wednesday we'll kick things off with happy hour @ 5:00 PM, followed by Neapolitan Style pizza from the family owned Leon & Roy's Pizzeria, with salad and dessert provided by the club. There will also be raffle prizes throughout the weekend!



Thursday, will feature two complimentary tours of Sierra Pacific Industries Lumber Mill. There is a max capacity of 30 quests

per time slot (9AM and 11AM), so sign ups will be first come first served. Come and learn about this company that owns and manages more than 2.4 million acres of timberland in California, Oregon and Washington and is one of the largest U.S. lumber manufacturers. The company also millwork, windows produces renewable energy. The rest of the day is free to enjoy the great outdoors and numerous dining opportunities around town, but come back and join us for happy hour @ 5PM and campground s'mores later in the evening.



Friday will be another day to explore the area on your own. Hike and have a picnic, or take a scenic drive or bike ride. The Brewing Lair, in nearby Blairsden offers 15 scenic acres of forested land, and a Food Truck from noon to 7:30 p.m. You can also bring your own picnic and enjoy the fresh mountain air while sipping on craft beers. Dogs on leash are welcome! Join us back at camp for happy hour at 5 p.m. Dinner on your own.



Saturday is another day to explore including Lake Almanor or Bucks Lake; fish the scenic Feather River or explore the Plumas County Museum in town. Enjoy the downtown area or take a drive


out to Bucks Lake and enjoy lunch at The Lakeshore Resort or Bucks Lake Lodge. The Farewell dinner begins with happy hour at 5 p.m. where we will continue giving out raffle prizes! The Back Door Catering Company will be cooking up a feast of Citrus Chicken, Gluten Free Wild Rice, Roasted Vegetables, Salad and fresh local bread. There will also be a Loaded Mediterranean Falafel Bowl available to our vegan travelers.



Hiking opportunities abound in the "Lost Sierra." Check out www.Alltrails.com for their top ten list, or for 2 shorter scenic adventures (although 45 minutes from the RV Park to the trailheads) are Bear Lakes Loop Trail, which passes by four lakes in about 4 miles, or Frazier Falls Trail which offers a relatively easy hike (1.2 miles round trip) to a beautiful 176 foot waterfall. On both of these trails, you will cruise through forests of pines covered in lush green moss and see beautiful wildflowers that pop with color. Also, if you're looking for a leisurely nature walk close to Quincy try the Feather River Land Trust Leonhardt Trail, which takes you into the wide-open spaces of American Valley or walk along the river at Gansnor Park. Both include interpretive signage.

Rally Registration is Only Through the Online Jotform

Registration for this rally opens at 9 a.m. on April 1, 2024. At that time, access the Jotform registration page via the Club's webpage https://airstreamclub.org/norcal-quincy-2024-rally Or click on the Jotform link:

https://form.jotform.com/240728185757164

Space is limited. Attendees are chosen on a first-come, first serve basis based on the time the completed Jotform is sent to the registrar. After completing and sending the Jotform, wait for an email *from the registrar* confirming that you are registered for the rally, and the amount you owe. At that point, you may either pay for the rally via Zelle to the NorCal Airstream Club (initiate through Zelle App or bank app if your bank participates) or send a check for the full amount directly to the registrar. If you pay by check, make your checks payable to "WBCCI/NorCal" and mail directly to Lori Bibby, 3029 Black Hawk Lane, Lincoln, CA 95648. If you want to pay via Zelle but do not know how or if your bank participates, check out: https://www.zellepay.com/.

If you do not hear back from the registrar on the day you register, contact her within 48 hours at: NorCalregistrar3854@gmail.com. If you are placed on the wait-list, do not pay until you hear from the registrar that you are confirmed for the rally. She will let you know your status.

Refund Policy: Cancellations and/or changes to registration must be received no later than Wednesday of the week prior to the rally, in other words, a week before the start of the rally. Refunds will be available depending on funds recovered in all categories. Parking fees are refunded according to RV park cancellation policy. Meals, tours, rally fees, etc., are refunded if money has not been spent by the hosts.

Please contact the Rally Registrar if you have ANY changes to your registration or wish to register after the deadline. Best to email at: NorCalregistrar3854@gmail.com She will contact you as soon as she can. Under no circumstances are members to contact the RV Park with changes or cancellations.

Note: Your registration is incomplete and not fully confirmed until we receive BOTH your registration and payment. Typically, Zelle payments will confirm your registration quicker than sending in a check. Do not wait until the last minute to pay or you may not have a site regardless of when you initially apply. If using Zelle, make sure to add your name, rally location, and how you accessed Zelle in the "memo" or "message" area before sending payment.

Finally, if you are ill or not feeling well, please stay home and get better. Thank you for your courtesy in this regard.

Death Valley II - Steve's Story



A Flash Rally was held at the Furnace Creek Campground in Death Valley National Park February 7 through 11, 2024. It was organized by NorCal president, Carmen Ortiz. members registered for the rally as early as August 2024. Unfortunately, a major storm hit the area Sunday and Monday (Feb. 4-5, 2024) just before the rally began, creating road closures and flash floods and causing several members to cancel their trip and rally participation. However, five hearty parties persevered and the rally was held in spite of the inclement weather and uncertain travel conditions.

Two of the parties, Jim Geurin of the Sacramento Valley Airstream club, and the family of Ludmilla, Damien and Matteo, came in on Saturday, Feb. 3 ahead of the storm. The other three parties. Steve and Yoshiko Deiwert. Bob and Carole Echols and Cliff and Joanne Roblee. planned to arrive Wednesday, Feb 7, just after the storm. Their plan was to travel as far as they could and hold up somewhere for a night in the event a road closure was encountered. Since weather, travel and road conditions were uncertain we maintained a steady stream communication between the early arrivers and those of us coming in later.

Fortunately, the roads were all open to Furnace Creek campground, albeit there were several flooded and muddy areas we had to pass through. Our trailers and tow vehicles got quite dirty from the mud and dust. We arrived at the campground mid-afternoon, with Ludmilla welcoming us and inviting us to their site for a group happy hour later in the afternoon.

Next morning we checked at the visitor center to see which points of interest were accessible and which were not. All of the side road and canyon drives were



closed as were some of the hiking trails. But, there were many that were open and accessible areas including Badwater, Zabriski Point, Golden Canyon, Mosaic Canyon, Mesquite Sand Dunes, and other interesting locations. I think between all of us we visited all of the available locations and (all-in-all) had a very nice time during the rally. Some photos below illustrate some of the sites we saw. These photos were contributed by all rally participants.



We got together every afternoon for happy hour together and shared stories about our experiences of the day. One happy hour was held at Zabriski Point so that we could all observe the sunset there together. Unfortunately, the clouds didn't cooperate but we all enjoyed the nice setting there anyway. At night the stars were spectacular and





several of us took photos with our cell phone cameras.



All in all it was a good rally and we were all glad that we went and will have fond memories of our unique experiences getting there, sightseeing, and our camaraderie. Thank you, Carmen, for arranging this flash rally.

Death Valley III - Matteo's Story

We had planned to arrive in Furnace Creek on Sunday, February 4th, given work and school schedules; that allowed us to drive during the weekend while taking our time. Unfortunately, the winter storm made us rush a bit to make it before the announced flash flood on February 3rd. Although we could not get a campsite at Furnace Creek Campground that night, we spent one night in Texas Springs Campground, and it was lovely.

Did you know that Death Valley National Park is the driest, hottest, and lowest place in the United States? Let us tell you more about those facts. Driest place: Death Valley usually has an average of 2 inches of water every year. With Hurricane Hillary in August 2023, Death Valley had 2.2 inches of rain in four hours, which created a temporary lake in Badwater Basin.



Even though this might not be something that a visitor would hope to see, the lake is actually rarer than the salt flats. During the winter storm prior to the rally, Death Valley got another 1.5 inches of rain in four days. Over the last six months, Death Valley got a total of 4.9 inches of rain, which is more than double the annual average of 2.15 inches! We were lucky to be there while the lake had not yet evaporated, although it was a wet winter and the lake lasted longer than normal. Visitors even kayaked in the lake. According to the rangers, it will take a few months for the lake to evaporate. So much for being the driest place in the U.S.!

Death Valley is also the hottest place in North America. The highest temperature ever recorded in Death Valley is a mind-boggling 134 degrees Fahrenheit (or 56.7 degrees Celsius, for our scientists and fellow Europeans). On the contrary, during the days before the rally, the thermometer sign in front of the Furnace Creek Visitor Center read 51 degrees Fahrenheit on

Monday, February 5. Less than half of the 134 degrees measured in 1913! (Of course that was in the Summer.)

Good news, though: One of those descriptions for Death Valley is still true at any time. Badwater Basin is the lowest point in the entire North American continent, at 282 feet below sea level. When on the boardwalk, visitors facing the mountains opposite Badwater Basin can see a little white sign if they look up. This sign indicates sea level and gives a perspective of how far below sea level that section of the park is. Fun fact: Badwater Basin got its name when a cartographer was mapping out Death Valley and observed that his burros would not drink the water of the local spring. Because of this, he wrote "badwater" on his map, and the name stuck.



Luckily for us, the light showers were spotty and we were able to visit multiple areas of the National Park that were closed after the flash floods. We drove through the nine-mile-long Artist's Drive twice and we chose the right time because it closed soon after we visited the second time.



We even spotted a few Desert Gold wildflowers alongside the road.



A ranger indicated that the colors in the rocks come from volcanic deposits that have chlorite and many types of iron oxide, and tend to be more vibrant during and after rainy weather.

For our Star Wars fans, Episode IV: A New Hope was filmed in the area around Artist's Palette.

Despite its name, Death Valley has a large amount of life. Mesquite Sand Dunes, for example, has many traces of life



Some examples are snake tracks in the summer, kangaroo rat burrows under creosote bushes, and pinacate beetle tracks year-round. Pinacate beetles are easily scared and tend to burrow into the ground to escape from whatever is frightening them. They burrow so fast that they disappear from sight in as little as three seconds.

Death Valley is also known for its dark sky, which attracts visitors and is excellent for stargazing. In between windstorms, we were able to see many stars and constellations with our

little camera telescope.
