A Message from the Vice-President

Chris and I have just returned from our longest adventure yet. A sojourn that took us to St. Augustine, the Keys, and Miami - a little more than 1800 miles!

We enjoyed the historic sites in St. Augustine including the National Shrine of Our Lady of La Leche. On this site, on September 8, 1565, General Pedro Menendez de Aviles came from Spain to secure the land for his country and establish a mission to convert native Americans to Christianity. The first Mass was celebrated that same day. This has become a pilgrimage site for many Christians and we highly recommend a visit. We also visited Villa Zorayda, the winter home of Franklin W. Smith, built in 1883. The Moorish Revival style home was inspired by Alhambra Palace in Granada Spain. The interesting thing about this structure is its construction. Smith utilized a mixture of Portland cement and crushed coquina shells. The first concrete structure in Florida and the






first of its kind. The building was

resistant to fire, moisture, and insect damage. Smith went on to construct his Casa Monica Hotel of the same material. The construction caught the eye of Henry Flagler, who used the method to build four more buildings during the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries. The most magnificent of these is the Ponce de Leon Hotel (now Flagler College). We took the history tour here. It's the only way to see the largest extant collection of Tiffany stained glass in America. The dining room is surrounded by windows and the roof allows for a line of windows down the center of the room. They were

spectacular! And I must say that they have the most elegant dining room of any college I am aware of.

Heading further south we established our home base at Fiesta Key RV Resort in Long Key. It's about midway down the Keys so was an easy drive north or south to see sites. We spent a day in Key West and enjoyed tours of Ernest Hemingway's home and Truman's Little White House. At Hemingway's home, the cats are the stars and they know it! These polydactyl (six-toed) cats - about 60 of them - live their best life at this museum house. Some of the cats are descended from a cat Hemingway was given by a ship's captain whose



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name was Snow White. As Snow White started having kittens, Hemingway named them after famous people, and the museum does so today as well. Truman's Little White House began as naval officer's housing constructed in 1890. Eventually, the house was abandoned by the Navy. Truman found out about it early in his presidency when it was suggested to him that he use the home as a place of respite so he decided to give it a try. He enjoyed it so much that he ended up spending 175 days of his presidency there from 1946 -1952. Several presidents have used the home including Taft, Eisenhower, Kennedy, Carter, and Clinton.



We ended our trip with a visit to the Everglades National Park. I must admit that I was naive about this natural wonder. I did not realize that the Everglades is not a swamp. It is a very slow moving river. They tried to drain it beginning in the 1920s by building canals. This idea was very costly and was a constant battle with Mother Nature. After decades and billions of dollars, President Nixon finally killed the project in 1969. The damage done by this is being repaired and we saw evidence of the work. I hope that this landscape will come back to its full glory in the decades to come. We enjoyed the beauty of the Everglades on an airboat ride. Our guide gave us plenty of history and allowed us to enjoy just being in the natural environment. Skimming across a Sawgrass river is pretty fabulous!

Our last exciting stop was our first visit to a Buc-ee's! Pretty fun experience. I enjoyed capturing the reflection of the store on Luna's side.

It's got to go!!!

Back when I was researching purchasing our Airstream, I consulted a neighbor. I only saw him in person one time, but we communicated by phone, text and email a lot. He belonged to another church in town, not that that's relevant. It did give him some validity by membership. He didn't belong to ACI, but never trash talked about it.

I would find an Airstream for sale and run it by him. He was very good at giving a synopsis of the pros and cons of the model. He also helped keep me from going down a pretty crafty scam artist's path.
