Greetings to all. As I sit here waiting another day for summer, I'm thinking about what I have to do, or should do to be ready for the camping season. Fortunately, the trailer has been in warm storage for the winter which has allowed me to work on it. We've replaced the A/C



with one that hopefully will be much quieter than the one we had which sounded like we were at the back end of departing jet. We have a bit different type of interior lighting which should make our environment feel a bit less cave like, cozy is one thing but... There is the continuing process of cleaning up the exterior; stripping the sun baked clear coat and then using an acid wash to make the surface appearance consistent — hopefully. The regular maintenance left on the list is to repack the wheel bearings. I do that by hand as I don't care for the easy-lube for a number of reasons. That strategy allows for inspection of the brake shoes, drums, and the activation magnets for wear and proper function. Not good to suddenly realize you have no brakes.





Good Reads for the Airstream

Book Review By Mary Jorgensen. (BRN 6104)

A book that I have read recently and that I liked is "Demon Copperhead" by Barbara Kingsolver. If you have read any of her books, you know she is a writer of fiction, nonfiction, short stories, and poetry, and for this book she won a Pulitzer prize in 2023.



It is a story about a boy growing up in Appalachia. He is probably not unique in his story, but is unique in his looks. He has dark skin, red hair and sea blue eyes and is referred to as mulungen - a derogatory term.

His father is dead and he is living with his drug-addicted mother. Nearby neighbors are around to help him out in various situations, especially when his mother is in rehab from overdoses. His mother remarries a controlling man who does not like Demon and tries to control everyone. His mother commits suicide due to a drug overdose - probably related to the conflict between Demon and her husband. Her husband does not like or want Demon and so he is thrown into the foster system. After two really bad placements, he runs away to his grandmother - his father's mother - a woman he had never met. She has compassion for him but will not keep him permanently because she only deals with girls. But she finds him a better foster placement with the local high school football coach with whom she had a close relationship - he had married one of her girls. The coach is living as a widower with a daughter about Demon's age. This stage in Demon's life is pretty good. Enough to eat, good clothes and a chance to play football - at which he is pretty good. However Demon's luck changes when he has a severe injury to a knee during a game. He refuses surgical help, thinking that time and Oxy will get him through this.

Of course it does not and leaves him drug dependent. His drug addiction causes friction with people and he leaves to move in with a girlfriend who is also drug-addicted. They learn the drug system, and keep getting more dependent. His girlfriend dies of a drug overdose and Demon finds himself at rockbottom. He knows he needs help and he finally turns to a nurse he knows who gets him into rehab in another state. He gets clean eventually, but the story doesn't end here. He goes back to his hometown to help celebrate the coach's retirement and it is here that many questions are answered about things that have happened to Demon. I am not going to spoil this for anyone wanting to read the book by telling the ending, but I really enjoyed this book, as I have enjoyed reading other books by Barbara Kingsolver. She writes with detail and grit that is sometimes uncomfortable to read, but always interesting. I have given a quick overview of this story - there are too many things to list them all in a report like this.

There is one spoiler alert: if you have read David Copperfield, this book will feel familiar!



A Healthy Airstreamer is a Happy Airstreamer

Hey Airstreamers! Time to get ready for another fun filled season of adventures and comradery. Traveling by plane or in your tow vehicle often involves sitting for long periods of time. This can increase your risk of problems such as swelling, discomfort, and even deep vein thrombosis (DVT) in your legs and ankles.



Normally, the veins and arteries in your legs efficiently circulate blood back from your limbs back to your heart to be reoxygenated. In your legs, this process is supported by your calf muscles, especially as you walk and move. However, sitting or standing for long periods of time can make it especially hard for your legs to return the blood to your heart. This can lead to swelling, discomfort, and leg fatigue.

According to the CDC, anyone traveling for more than four hours is at risk for blood clots.

Studies show increased risk if you are:

Over 40

Overweight or obese

Pregnant or recently pregnant

Taking hormone replacement therapy

Diagnosed with vein disease or have a family history of blood clots

Sound like any of you?

Luckily, there are a number of ways you can reduce your risks and travel safely. If possible, take a break every hour to stand, stretch, or walk when traveling for more than four hours at a time. Drink plenty of water to stay hydrated, and avoid alcohol or sleeping pills. If you can't walk around, try small calf exercises such as raising your heels while keeping your toes on the floor.

One of the simplest and easiest ways to reduce your risk of blood clots when traveling is by using compression garments. Compression socks are a safe, effective way to reduce your risk of developing these conditions. Compression socks work by gently compressing your legs to promote blood flow back from your legs up to your heart.

A Good News TPMS Story

If you're still wondering if you really need a Tire Pressure Monitoring System on your Airstream...the answer is unequivocally "Yes." Full stop. No hesitation.

We'll keep this saga short and just tell you that one of our Nev-R-Lube bearings disintegrated in the middle of nowhere on our return trip from Key West (these are the same bearings you have in your wheel hubs if you're hauling a modern-ish twin axle Airstream). The tire monitor worked as intended, alerting us of the 165 degree temperature on the left rear wheel while the other three were at 74 degrees.

As we said, this is a good news story. The temperature rise happened quickly, and very fortunately coincided with a fuel stop. The Coach Net folks dispatched a mobile mechanic, and FOUR DAYS later we were underway.

In the process, we learned a few things, such as:

- Nobody stocks Dexter Nev-R-Lube hubs. Seriously, nobody.
- Overnight freight is expensive. The hub and bearing assembly more so.
- Lifetime bearings have a finite lifespan. About nine years in one case.
- Our upgraded battery and solar system kept the lights running and the phones charged.
- Without the TPMS alerts, this would have been a very different story.

Ending up in a ditch along Lake Okeechobee was the likely alternate scenario. Instead, we spent four nights over a weekend in a shaded shopping center parking lot waiting for parts. The wheel didn't fall off, the dump valves weren't wrecked, and our Airstream wasn't damaged. We read a couple of books. Fixed a plumbing issue. Did laundry.

Consider this our unqualified endorsement for tire monitoring.

All of this applies even more so if you have a single axle Bambi. We've been there too, but that's another story.....

DIY: Replace Your Factory Skylights

The skylights that come in modern Airstreams have an outer dome and a flat inside part. The outside dome is pretty flexible that is susceptible to damage by hail. If yours are showing their age, there is a better solution.

In 2009 an Airstream owner, Kevin Li approached the owner of Maxim Skylights,
David Thornton about making replacements for his trailer. At the time Maxim
produced hurricane proof skylights for commercial buildings but accepted the challenge. In May of
2022 Maxim was sold to Birdview Skylights but continues to offer skylights for Airstreams under the
Maxim name.

Our 2019 Globetrotter's two skylights were still functional but I chose to replace them before they became a problem. The Maxim skylights are composed of three layers of 1/8" polycarbonate.

Maxim offers two sizes that fit Airstreams produced from the 1990's to present:

Square: 22.75" X 22.75" Rectangular: 17.75" X 26.25"



They have a form on their website with color and finish options. I chose light gray outer dome, clear and clear on the other two. For the finishes, I chose anodized clear for the metal frame.



NOTE: This combination usually ships in 10 days. Mine arrived in less than that. Cost of the square is \$364, rectangular is \$299, shipping included. I recommend calling Maxim once you have your choices and place the order over the phone. It's a small company so you'll talk to a knowledgable person.

The process of removing the old skylights was very straightforward. Here's a list of the tools I found worked the best:



Stiff metal putty scraper, rubber mallet, carpet knife. plastic scraper, caulk gun, Phillips screw driver, OSI Quad Max sealant. Solvents: Mineral Spirits, Lacquer Thinner, Xylol. Optional: Rubber wheel to remove adhesive

First, remove the shade and interior plastic trim.

Next, grab a step ladder and using the carpet knife, slide it between the aluminum frame and the skylight to loosen the tape adhesive. Run it around several times until there's little resistance.

Next, take the stiff metal putty knife and insert it on an angle between the frame and the skylight. Using the rubber mallet, tap to drive the blade on an angle to further loosen the adhesive bond all the way around the frame. Push up on the skylight occasionally to see if the seal is broken.

Once the seal is broken, you can push the old skylight up and off the frame.



With the old skylight removed, you'll need to prepare the aluminum curb for the Maxim skylight. I used the carpet knife again to remove as much of the old adhesive as possible.





I did try using a rubber wheel available from Amazon with mixed results. It couldn't get the stubborn last layer off. This is where the solvents come in.

I found the stubborn adhesive remaining wouldn't budge without a strong solvent like Xylol. *Make sure to use protective gloves when using any solvent.* Apply it to a rag and rub it slowly over the adhesive. It will dissolve the adhesive enough that you can use the plastic scraper to get it off. It will ball up and eventually come off. Afterwards, I used some lacquer thinner on a rag to ensure the surface was perfectly clean.

TIP: With the curb surface prepared, slide the sunroof through the hole and set it on the curb (dry fit). Using a Sharpie marker, draw a line along the inside edge of the curb to mark the innermost edge. Remove the skylight and invert it on supports to keep it from rocking on the dome.

Cut a large tip on the OSI Max sealant tube, large enough for a 3/8" bead. NOTE: The large bead is to compensate for gaps between the skylight frame and the curb. Apply the sealant to the skylight frame opposite of the line drawn. Applying the sealant to the skylight frame eliminates the problem of disturbing the bead during installation.





Next, remove the protective film from the outer dome. Carefully slide the skylight through the opening and set it on the roof. Rearrange your hands to lift it onto the curb. You can pull down from the inside frame on the skylight to set the sealant. I secured the skylight with 1 1/4" #10 hex head stainless steel screws though the pre-drilled holes in the frame. Use mineral spirits to clean up the OSI Max sealant if necessary.





Reinstall the inside trim and shade then step back and enjoy your new skylights!

Don't Forget the First Aid Kit

A first-aid kit is an important item to have when you travel, whether it's across the state or to a National Rally. A first-aid kit should include items that you need for a minor medical issue. (No brain surgery or amputations.) There are many fine, already assembled first-aid kits on the market, check Amazon. The marketed kits are convenient and effective. However, if you are interested in customizing or creating (DIY) your own first-aid kit, here is a list of items to consider including.



First, get a small plastic box with a cover or a large zip-up bag and clearly label it. The, gather the items on your list, using travel or sample sizes when possible, to save space.

- -Antibacterial wipes: Wipes that kill germs can be helpful for cleaning tools and hands.
- -Hand Sanitizer: hand sanitizer should contain at least 60% alcohol.
- -Instant Cold Packs: these disposable packs turn cold quickly to relieve bumps, bruises and minor burns.
- -Pain reliever: Acetaminophen (Tylenol) or ibuprofen (Advil) is helpful . Include children's formula if you have children traveling with you.
- -Scissors: you might need a scissors to cut gauze, bandages or open packages.
- -Self-adhesive wraps: wrap up a sore knee, ankles or other injuries with self-adhesive wraps that don't require pins or tape.
- Thermometer: check for a fever with a thermometer and clean it with an antibacterial wipe when you are done. Most digital thermometers now have batteries.
- Antibiotic ointment: apply ointment before sticking on a bandage.
- -Band-Aids in various sizes
- -2-3 packages of sterile gauze squares and one roll of medical bandage tape

Don't Forget the First Aid Kit (Cont.)

- -Masks and non-latex gloves
- -Tweezers: they are essential for removing bee stingers, splinters and ticks.
- -Antihistamines: Loratadine or diphenhydramine (Benadryl) can be helpful for seasonal allergies.
- -First-Aid Card with basic instructions for first aid care

Final considerations for traveling with medications- If you travel with prescription opioids or medications with needles, leave the prescriptions in their original pharmacy issued packaging. This will be helpful in case your luggage or trailer is searched by authorities while you are traveling. Hey, it can happen!

If you need medication refills, get them before you hit the road. Pack enough of your prescriptions for your entire trip and some extras in case you are delayed coming home.

Keep your first-aid kit secured and out of reach of children.

As always, be safe and see you down the road!




Region 7 Treasurer Needed



Their names are Ashley and Scott and are an adorable young couple, which led me to a brainstorm that many of the workers at Airstream come from the surrounding areas affected by this tornado. Ashley and Scott lost almost everything they owned as did many others in these communities. It's already in the works that I would like our Airstream community to come together and have a special collection to aid our Airstream neighbors affected by this tragedy. When everything is in place, we'll send out an email with the details. Please be generous. Christine, Nancy and I all got to leave, the residents did not. Let's help them rebuild as they have all helped build our Airstreams....
