Mike writes a daily blog answering questions of issues on RV electricity and gives answers to electricity questions. This past weekend during our rally a member backed into a site which only had a 50 amp plug. Their rig rig used a 30 amp line for power. They were fortunate to have a dogbone.




Mike writes on his blog that as long as the campground pedals are wired properly any 30 to 50 amp or 50 to 30 amp dogbone adapter should be safe from catching fire. Mike also writes that there are a few adapters that may not totally be compliant in all states but believes are safe if use properly. Mike also recommends two types of adapters that he feels comfortable with and recommends. (Camco and Southwire brands.) Mike also writes that because nearly every adapter failure he has seen are from those super inexpensive puck adapters that were not likely assembled correctly to begin with.

The court is 1/4 the size of a tennis court. In Boerne, we play on 8 courts, every day except Sunday, from 7:30AM until about 11:30 AM. It is called Open Play and anyone can join in. Going to new places, and we always meet new people where ever we are camping. Some have Airstreams, and some are just curious about Airstreams.


Do you work and or have hobbies?

It has been nearly two months since I gave you a taste of what Barbara and I were up to on our around-the-world adventure. Since that report, we have visited New Zealand (7 ports), Australia (6 ports), Indonesia (3 ports), Malaysia, Brunei, Taiwan, The Philippines, Japan (7 ports), S. Korea, and China (2 ports). Days at sea are also as action-packed or as leisurely as you desire.

Just to give you an idea of the offerings, beginning shortly after breakfast you can participate in putting (putt-putt) competition (a little tougher when the ship is rolling), needlepoint (mostly chatting as I gather), Bridge lessons (beginners thru advanced).

There are "enrichment lectures" on everything from history to geography, to "The Sex Life of Sponges", art lessons of all types, Mah Jongg, table tennis tournaments, and organized singing. (Our "Sing Out Loud" group put on a successful concert just before we arrived in Auckland). There is also bingo, shuffleboard, and competitive trivia in several venues. (This was literally a small cross-section of activities.). Wine, gin, whiskey, liquor (and other types of libations) tasting are common. Entertainers from magicians to comedians to singers to string quartets, etc., etc. are scheduled throughout the cruise.



At most ports of call, we arrive early in the morning. Barbara and I booked more than 50 shore excursions through Oceania long before the cruise began. Many people also book independent commercial tours. And, of course, there's always the option of just getting off the ship and exploring on your own. (We've done all of those).

If you're on your own, just make sure you have a ride back to the ship.
Barbara and I literally had to hitchhike back after our cab driver failed to pick us up from the Auckland Aquarium as promised. All turned out well, however, as every "Kiwi" (New Zealander) we encountered was wonderful.

We are happy campers (or cruisers, as it were).

The diversity of experiences beyond my own wildest imagination has made our ATW cruise the trip of a lifetime. Where can one get up-close and personal with "salties", giant five meter long salt water crocodiles, as we did in the Adelaide River near Darwin, Australia, then make it back to the ship in time to enjoy "High Tea" while being serenaded by a lovely string quartet? Then, there was trek through the jungle on Komodo Island, Indonesia in search of one of their fearsome giant dragons in the morning then come back and relax in the afternoon.

We do not know what is completely in store for us for the remaining 100 days of our cruise, but Barbara are eagerly looking forward to the adventure.
