• Financial Literacy and Sustainability -- For further information, refer to the April 2024 Blue Beret Blog.


We were lucky at the Mid-Winter IBT as Suzanne and I left Jackson Center approximately 1.5 hrs. before an EF 2 Tornado hit Logan County. For reference, an EF 2 Tornado has winds ranging between113-157 mph. Logan County received some serious damage to the area.

In March, I sent out a News Flash about the June election. Below is a map of the members in North America. As you can see, there is a very high density of members in Region 2. As I pointed out in the News Flash, only 311 people out of 965 from Region 2 voted in the last election. Region 2 has 13 clubs so that means on average 24 members from each club voted. Jackson Center will have a Campfire meeting where the topic for the vote will be centerstage as well as sending out multiple emails on the topic. To make sure people without email access are notified, I will be contacting the local Club Presidents, and a snail mail notification will be sent to members without an email address. Jackson Center will send out a paper ballot if one is requested.

We have been working hard with 3rd party vendors to get benefits for our ACI members. I have attached a document listing these benefits along with links to their websites.

We are pleased to announce that our 2024 Eastern Ontario Shakedown will take place from Thursday May 9 through Monday May 13, 2024, at the Richmond Fair Ground. This is the weekend before the Victoria Day long weekend and the Spring Rally in Blyth.

As usual we will have our Thursday trip to The Glen Restaurant at 5:00 p.m. for early arrivals, Friday snack at 7:00 p.m.; Pot-Luck meal on Saturday at 5:00 p.m., and a Sunday breakfast, cooked and served by the hosts and volunteers at 8:30. Get Your Flamingo On at the Flamingo Fling Spring Rally in Blyth, ON

It's getting closer! Your host team is looking forward to seeing you at the "Flamingo Fling" in Blyth. Here's your chance to wear those flamingo-logoed items hidden away in your closets and drawers! And of course, bring any other "flamingo bling" you want to show off!

We have the Blyth Campground for a total of 5 nights starting Thursday, May 16. Nightly camping fees are \$50.85. When you register at <u>https://airstreamclub.org/2024-spring-rally</u>, indicate what nights you plan to stay and the camping fee will be calculated automatically for you. Campsites will have electrical (at least 15 amps) and water hook-ups. Showers and toilets are located close to where we'll be camping and there's a dump station on site.



While we have the campground reserved from Thursday to Tuesday, the actual rally starts on Friday and ends on Monday. To be fair to everyone, the camping fee will be kept separate from the rally fee. The rally fee will cover the costs of:

- Breakfast on Saturday, Sunday and Monday of fruit and juices, cereals, and assorted baked goods and spreads, as well as the all-essential coffee and tea
- Refreshments Friday, Saturday and Sunday evening
- Common costs such as table coverings, dish detergent, printing and other miscellaneous items
- Saturday evening's entertainment. We've hired a DJ so bring your dancing shoes!

Saturday night's dinner is being catered by Pineridge BBQ out of Hensall. That cost is separate and you can select it as an option on the registration form. On Saturday afternoon prior to dinner, we plan to have "Hassle Tassel" – that's like a happy hour where you'll be invited to a small group "mix and mingle" hosted by one of our members at their camp site. You'll bring your chair, a snack to share and your beverage of choice. Keep your fingers crossed that Ma Nature cooperates!

For Sunday dinner, we'll have a pot luck dinner. Then, afterwards, we'll play some games and award prizes! (Spoiler alert – the prizes are really cute!)

Airstream misadventure #17

Spring of 2018, our second season of Airstream travel. We'd just collected our rig from winter storage at Can-Am. On the way back home, we did an overnight at Green Acre Park in Waterloo. We parked, hooked up and looked forward to our first night's camping of the season. I was outside and Karen called through window "There's a burbling sound coming from the bathroom sink!" I went inside and sure enough, there was not only a burbling sound, but water quickly filling, and ultimately overflowing the sink! My first instinct was to shut everything off. I ran outside, turned off the water, and checked that sewer valves were closed.

Back inside. The flooding had stopped and we desperately tried to contain the water before it escaped under the cabinetry. After the panic, I paused to figure out where the water came from. A) Both tanks were empty as we'd just taken the rig out of storage. B) There's no connection from the water hookup to the black tank (right?). So what the heck? I decided to try an experiment and asked Karen to watch the sink while I turned the water back on. After one twist of the faucet she screamed "Turn if off! Turn it off!" Another spill to mop up.

Well, I was flummoxed. It was a few minutes before Can-Am closed for the day so I quickly gave them a call. The tech I talked to was likewise flummoxed. He said "Let me go talk to Andy." I waited. A few minutes later he came back and said "Apparently, the bathroom sink in some models is plumbed into the black tank rather than the grey tank. Is it possible that you connected the water hose to the black tank flush inlet rather than the city water inlet?" Sure enough, the hose was connected to the flush inlet right above the warning sign that says not to do that. Feeling like a complete idiot, I thanked the technician profusely and sheepishly moved the hose to its proper place.

We were quite fortunate that the black tank was clean and dry after winterization. Had the tank been less than clean the consequences would have been ... unfortunate.

Lesson learned.

My Tank Overfloweth

Well, spring is here, and you have successfully un-winterized your Airstream, or so you thought, until you connected to city water and notice after several minutes that the freshwater tank is overflowing.

The question here is how is this happening? "This never happened before" is your first thought and how is the city water connection connected to the freshwater tank? To fill the freshwater tank, you need to unlock the little door and put water in the freshwater fill port, but you are connected to the city water connection.

To get water to a tap inside your Airstream you can either use the city water connection or the on-board water pump which takes water from the freshwater tank, so there is a connection between the city water connection and the on-board pump. The connection is at or near the discharge line of the on-board water pump and water is prevented from backflowing into the freshwater tank from the city connection by a non-return valve or check valve that is located inside the on-board water pump. After storage, the internal check valve can get stuck in the open position allowing water from the city water connection to flow backwards through the pump and into the freshwater tank filling it up and then coming out the overflow of the freshwater tank. I had this exact problem after de-winterizing the Airstream last year and the pump was only two years old. I was able to fix the problem by doing the following procedure which does not take very long and will verify if the check valve is stuck or broken.

- 1. Turn off the city water supply.
- 2. Turn on the water pump, make sure there is water in the freshwater tank.
- 3. Run a faucet for 10 to 15 seconds.
- 4. Turn off the water pump.
- 5. Turn on the city water supply.
- 6. Run a faucet for 10 to 15 seconds.
- 7. Repeat steps 1 to 6 at least 3 more times.

If the problem was a stuck check valve this should, as it did in my case, fix the problem. If not, it indicates a broken check valve. Not all is lost, and you may not need to buy a replacement pump. If the water pump is operating okay, then you have several options.

1. If you are on the road, you can just fill up the freshwater tank and use the on-board pump for your water needs. Then fix the problem at a more convenient time.

2. You could install a check valve in the line of the onboard water pump. Camco has a check valve that fits right on to the water pump (direction of flow marked on valve) This check valve will connect to the suction line and costs around \$20: Camco part # 23303 RV ½" backflow preventer. An alternative to this would be a Sharkbite part # 2008-0000LFA ½" check valve for about \$40 which can be connected to either the suction or discharge line but requires cutting of the Pex line. Again, direction of flow is marked on the check valve. Amazon carries these as well as your local RV dealer.


3. If you know the make and model of your water pump there are rebuild kits available from Amazon or your local RV dealer for between \$30 and \$50.





4. If the pump is not functioning properly then you will have to replace the pump which will cost between \$120 and \$150.

In my kit of spare parts for the RV I carry an inline check value in case I have to make a repair while on the road. Now you know why the freshwater tank overflows when connected to city water and what to do. Enjoy the journey!
