


MARCH 1979

Of course the gasoline situation was a big topic of discussion during the evening, so perhaps the closest that many of us will come to Alaska is seeing it through another's eyes. However, I for one am going to think POSITIVE and hope that we will all he able to enjoy our far-away travels in the future.

Our president, Bud Weston, has been receiving much literature about the forthcoming 22nd International Rally at Las Cruces, New Mexico, from June 27-July 4. A Regional Caravan to be headed by Paul L. Worthley will be organized at Great Barrington, Mass., and will start for Las Cruces on June 11. "It will pass through Binghamton and Corning, NY, down the Allegheny River in Pennsylvania, across Southeastern Ohio, Kentucky, Missouri, Oklahoma and the Texas Panhandle arriving at Las Cruces on June 25. Club members along the route will rendezvous with the carayan as it passes their area. The carayan will travel 150-175 miles per day with two possible layovers enroute. A mini caravan of Region I snow birds from Florida will join the caravan at Bardstown. The caravan will be limited to 30 trailers. Kitty fee deposit \$25. The caravan will be known as the LAS CRUCES TRAIL CARAVAN R-19. It is recommended that those planning to go on the caravan reserve a space by registering before it is announced in the Blue Beret (March?). To register for the caravan, your rally fee (\$25) must be paid in advance. On the rally coupon, in the blank space for caravan name, write in: LAS CRUCES TRAIL CARAVAN R-19, make advance rally fee payment to: Paul L. Worthley, P.O. Box 247, Strong, Maine 04983. Also enclose a caravan kitty fee deposit of \$25 made payable to LAS CRUCES TRAIL CARAVAN R-19. Advance rally fee payments will continue to be processed through the caravan leader until the coupon is published in the Blue Beret."

If you have never attended an international Rally, it is an experience to be long remembered and one which every Airstreamer should share. There is an opportunity to do many fun things as well as learning informative, helpful tips on trailering. In addition to the many meetings, there will be competitions covering many areas. Whether or not you wish to participate or be a spectator in the events is up to you. However, enthusiasm is contagious; and I'm sure that all who attend the rally will find the theme of "FIESTA FUN" will be brought to life. If you wish to enter any of the competitions listed below, please drop me a line and I'll see that you get further guides pertaining to entry information:

Fourth of July Parade - Entries judged on conception and execution of theme

Driving Contest - Limited to one entry per unit, to be judged on ability to back into a parking site through a prescribed course

Skits - Limited to 15 minutes which includes skit, setting up and removal of scenery--directed to theme of Rally.




We are always sorry to have our members leave us because we feel Airstreaming is such a wonderful way of life, but we wish good fortune to all in future endeavors.
