

The site of the 1980 Region I Rally will be Camperama Campground in Townsend, Vermont Aug. 28 - Sept 1. In southern Vermont, Townsend is a quaint New England town with much activity centered about the green. The Townsend Furniture Factory and Store outlet is just outside the camp entrance.

A place children should see, parents must visit, and grandparents can not resist is the world renound factory and store for Mary Meyer Stuffed Toys about a mile west of town. About \(\frac{1}{4} \) mile up the road is Vermont's longest covered bridge (Scott Brodge). This is just below the Army Corps of Engineers Dam and Recreational Lake. Bring your old tube and float back to camp - 3/4 mile of fun!

The story of a narrow guage railroad which bisects Camperama is "must" reading in "36 Niles of Trouble" by Victor Morse, the Stephen Greene Press, Brattleboro, Vt.

Those who wish to explore other West River Valley towns may continue up Rt 30 beyond the Recreational Lake to Stratton Mtn. Ski area or to Weston where the Weston Country Store, Weston Eowl Mill (wooden bowls) and the Weston Playhouse are located.

About 3 miles south on Rt 30 is Newfane, the "Shire" town of Windham County (Bring your camera). On the green will be the annual auction.







Dick Porter has copies of the revised By-Laws and everyone will receive a copy, either at the next few rallies or in the mail.





groups of owners far removed from the center of their present unit, wanting some activity in their area. The Board decided that State Units could recognize chapters within their borders, but such chapters would be required to pay a minimal amount of dues to the state treasury.

By 1963, the club had grown to such numbers that the Board decided the country needed to be divided into regions with regional officers to assist the hard-pressed national officers. In South Miami Heights at the January Airstream Rally of 1964, seven regions were created and officers appointed. At the same time the club became an international organization as we now had two Canadian units, and chapters became units in their own right.

In 1967 it was decided that the increased growth of the club warranted the addition of more regions with a corresponding increase in regional officers to assist the various units within their areas. At this time twelve regions were established. While the original regions had carried geographic names, it was now decided that the units would be numbered 1 through 12.

At the midwinter rally in Florida in 1959, the usual election of officers was held. However, the Board decided that now that the International Rally was to become an annual event, the next election would be held in July, at the rally, and that succeeding officers would serve from July 5th of each year.

Since 1958, and the first International Rally at Bull Shoals, many things have taken place at these rallies that have sparked continuous enjoyment for thousands of WBCCI members. It is not surprising that Caravanners journey to the location of the International Rally site each year in the hopes of seeing friends and renewing acquaintances that have now become almost ritualistic.

If each of the Past International Presidents could write a paragraph on their experiences as President, we are sure there would be a best seller in the making. Herewith is a chronological list of the first twenty-five Presidents of W.B.C.C.I.Inc.:

SUGGESTIONS FOR RALLIES & MEETINGS

From the BLUE BOOK

- Advance Notice: When preparing flyers, include information regarding rally fees, dates, parking, deposits, activities, potluck dinners, etc.
- Rally Expenses: All rallies should be self-supporting each person paying his share of the expenses. When visitors pay the same as members they feel free to take part. This also prevents criticism over treasury funds being used for activities in which all members do not participate.
- Suggestions for Making a Successful "First Impression(at a WBCC1 Rally:
 - a. Have a greeting committee to meet arrivals with a "Hi! Glad you're here!". Some may be new owners and new to our program. Make them feel at home. Give each person a name tag; give each trailer a program, or if you do not have a program, tell them to check the bulletin board for the schedule of activities.
 - b. Have hospitality trailer so that on arrival the greeters can say, "The coffee is on--get set up and then come over to trailer #____."
 - c. The San Diego Unit initiated a friendship book to be given to each person collecting autographs. Everyone attending the rally is asked to write his name, address and trailer number. Each name is numbered and awards are given to those that get the most names.
 - d. It is fun to take a snapshot of each family and paste it in the Unit history book. These books are of interest to everyone and should be on display at all Unit rallies.

- Have a Unit guest book and ask everyone to sign at each rally.
- f. It is fun to have a "gate" prize. One thought, number the programs and lucky number gets the prize, use some kind of gag.
- g. It is always good to have something planned for the children. Makes a more enjoyable rally for everyone.
- 4. Rally Parking: Rally committeemen and officers are parked together in the center of the ring, as these are the people who are responsible for the success of the rally. Also, it is a great convenience to the members to know where to locate officers and committeemen.

This method of parking has become known as the "Brass Circle" and is a very controversial subject. Some feel it is a matter of favoritism, but this is not true. Those in the center circle are the hardest workers at the rally and put in the longest hours. Visiting officers are usually parked in the center also. This is a courtesy as well as placing them in a position where they can observe and offer helpful suggestions.

5. Meetings: Wally patterned "Meeting Time" after the old town hall meetings. Meetings may be strictly social or a combined social and business meeting, but it gives everyone an opportunity to get together. Meetings provide a time to get acquainted, to exchange ideas, to discuss objectives and accomplishments. It is a time to take part and a time to recognize individual contributions. The sidewalk cafe meeting is always fun. Members bring their refreshments and sit around and talk about what has been done or seen, trips made, etc. This usually takes place about 4:30 in the afternoon.

If a business meeting or a combined business and socia meeting is planned, notice should be posted. Everyone will make an extra effort to get back from sight-seeing or shopping.

- Bulletin Board: Place a blackboard in a central location (the hospitality trailer is often used) as a center of activities, for announcments, program news, and if you have a printed program, post one on the board. Keep everyone informed about what is going on.
- Church Services: Church services at the rally site are a very important part of the rally program. Even a very simple service brings a deep meaning of fellowship. If a minister is attending the rally, there is no problem. If not, a local minister may be invited to speak, or a member may read a short sermon. It is a courtesy to members to post notices of local church services on the bulletin board.
- Head Table: Arranging the head table and the seating of guests, depends upon the size of the table and the number to be seated. If possible, your own officers and their spouses should be seated at the head table. If there is not room for the spouses, they should be placed as near the head table as possible and introduced as important guests. Your president should sit in the center position. Visiting VIPs and International officers would normally be seated at the head table. A special table for officers, past and present, may be arranged. If you have inadvertently overlooked someone who might reasonably expect to sit at the head table, ask him to stand and be acknowledged. This helps to overcome what could be an embarrassing situation.
