Route 8 North, right on Route 20 to the Old Riverton Inn.

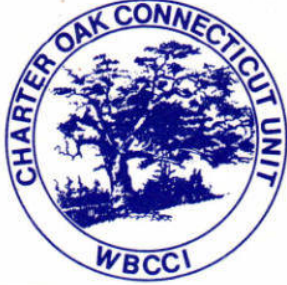

## THE LEPRECHAUN CARAVAN R-60 TO NOTRE DAME

Plans are progressing for the Leprechaun Caravan, R-60 to the 27th WBCCI International Rally at Notre Dame University, South Bend, Indiana. The caravan will assemble at Merle and Mildred Wynn's #5989 farm at Sheffield, Massachusetts on Saturday and Sunday, June 16 and 17th. The caravan organization meeting will be scheduled for around midday Sunday, the first required caravan meeting.

Monday the caravan will move to Harvard, New York, a distance of 145 miles. Tuesday the route will continue through Corning, New York with time available to visit the Corning Glass Works Museum and Outlet Store. The tour will continue south and west to the Antler Inn on the outskirts of Gaines, Pennsylvania, a distance of 175 miles. Parking will be on a lawn type field in back of the Inn. This will be a two night stop so we can visit the Canyon Country of Pennsylvania. The Antler Inn has an interesting looking menu and is open for lunch and dinner.

Thursday the caravan will move it's greatest distance, 215 miles. It will pass Kinzua Dam on the Allegheny River, through Warren, Pennsylvania, where the New Process, Outlet Store is located, down the Allegheny River to I-80 and west into eastern Ohio. Parking at the other stops have not been confirmed at this time.

International Rally Fees must be prepaid at WBCCI Headquarters, before May 1st to park with the caravan at the rally. Use the coupon in the Blue Beret and indicate you will arrive with the "Leprechaun Caravan R-60". To sign up for the caravan a \$25 Kitty Deposit payable to: WBCCI CARAVAN R-60, must be sent to Paul L. Worthley, P.O. Box 247, Strong, ME 04983.

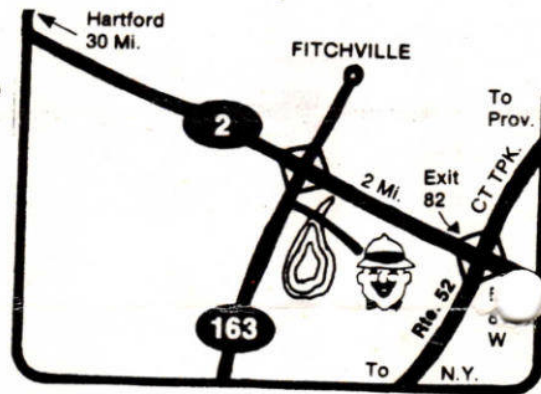

We have enjoyed the following desert recipes at recent COCU pot-lucks:

Bobbie Brissette's Black Forest Trifle

Heat 4 cups milk and 3 sqs. unsweetened chocolate till just bubbles form around edge of pan. Combine 1/3 cup cornstarch, 1/2 cup sugar, 1/4 tsp. salt and 1/2 cup milk.. Stir into hot milk bringing to a boil, boil one minute stirring constantly. Remove from heat, add 2 tsps. vanilla. Crush vanilla cookies to make 2 cups. Reserve some for top edge. Save out 1/2 cup cherry juice filling from one can of cherry pie filling, for center of top also. Layer pudding, crumbs, cherry filling - on top place 1/2 cup filling in center and crumbs around edge. Chill 5-7 hrs. This delicious dish serves 8 generously.

Audrey Clark's Chocolate Mousse

3 bars German sweet chocolate  
18-20 lady fingers  
3 tbsp. water  
4 tbsp confectioners sugar  
6 egg yolks and 6 egg whites  
1 1/2 tsp vanilla  
1/2 cup heavy cream

Use 9 x 5 x 3 bread size pan.  
Melt chocolate over boiling water or in microwave. Remove from heat, stir in sugar, egg yolk, and vanilla. Beat until smooth. Beat egg whites stiff but not dry and fold into chocolate mixture. Put in layers starting with ladyfingers at

bottom and sides of pan. End with chocolate mixture. Whip cream and spread over top. Best if frozen first, and then taken out and served very cold.

PROPOSED CHANGES TO CONSTITUTION

Charlie Eglise and Jim Hegeman have been working on the Constitution and By-Laws Committee in order to propose changes to our Unit's Constitution and By-Laws. The proposed changes to the Constitution are shown below with the changes shown in italics. We will discuss and vote upon these changes at our October meeting. Once changes are accepted by the Unit, they must be approved by International before becoming effective.

The By-Laws have been revised and approved by the Executive Board at its August meeting. You can receive a copy of this revision along with a copy of the revised Constitution once International approves the constitutional changes.

Article III, Section 2.

...All applicants will be notified of the location of the Unit meeting and *should* be present at said meeting for acceptance into the Unit. *In the event that an applicant cannot be present at said meeting, the Unit President, First or Second Vice President or any past president may meet with the applicant, and, if appropriate, may recommend the applicant to the Executive Board for acceptance into the Unit.*

Article III, Section 5.

Dues received from a new member after October 1 shall entitle such new member to full membership privileges for the remainder of the calendar year *as well as for the coming year.*

Article IV, Section 2.

The officers shall be elected at the annual business meeting and shall assume office *at the time that they are duly installed and shall hold office until the next installation. The President, 1st Vice President and 2nd Vice President cannot succeed themselves in the same office. All other officers can succeed themselves.*

Article IV, Section 3.

The Directors shall be elected at the annual business meeting, each for a term of two years *commencing at installation* but arranged so that only one-half such Directors' terms expire in any one year. No Director shall serve more than one two-year term.

Article IV, Section 4.

In the event of the death, advancement or resignation of the President or a Vice President in *their* ability to fulfill *their* duties of office...

Article VI, Section 2.

...*If the rally or meeting is of less than two days duration...*

Article VIII, Section 3.

All amendments to this Constitution shall become effective upon adoption *unless otherwise stated.*

If you own a qualified diesel car, van or truck from model years 1979 through 1985 on Jan. 1, you'll be able to claim a one-time income tax credit on your 1984 return. For future purchases, through model year 1988, you claim the credit in the year you buy the vehicle. You'll get:

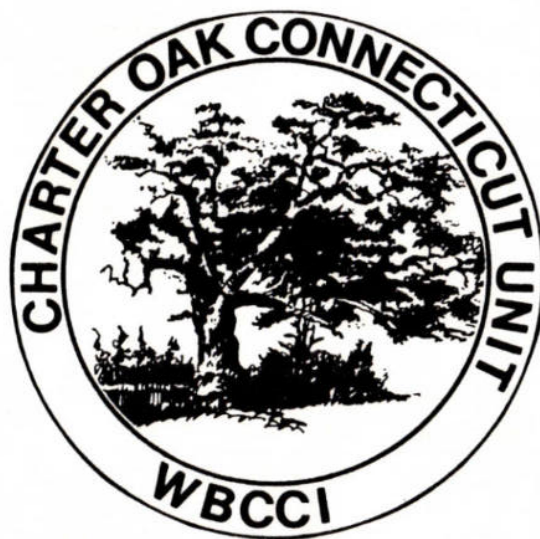

### Diesels gear up for a one-time tax credit

Owners of late-model diesel-powered passenger cars, light vans and trucks will be eligible for a tax credit next year. It's all because of a 6 cent per gallon increase in diesel fuel prices at the pump. The increase, part of the recently enacted bundle of tax law changes, was primarily meant to tax commercial truckers. Hence, the one-time credit (depending on age) of between \$17 and \$198 per vehicle weighing 10,000 lbs. or less. People who own such vehicles on Jan. 1, 1985, can claim the credit on their 1984 tax return. Attach a Form 4136. Also eligible for the one-time maximum credit of \$102 for diesel cars and \$198 for light vans or trucks: vehicles from model years 1985 through 1988.

SUGGESTIONS FOR RALLIES & MEETINGSFrom the BLUE BOOK

1. Advance Notice: When preparing flyers, include information regarding rally fees, dates, parking, deposits, activities, pot-luck dinners, etc.
2. Rally Expenses: All rallies should be self-supporting each person paying his share of the expenses. When visitors pay the same as members they feel free to take part. This also prevents criticism over treasury funds being used for activities in which all members do not participate.
3. Suggestions for Making a Successful "First Impression" at a WBCCI Rally:
  - a. Have a greeting committee to meet arrivals with a "Hi! Glad you are here!"  
Some may be new owners and new to our program. Make them feel at home.  
Give each person a name tag; give each trailer a program, or if you do not have a program, tell them to check the bulletin board for the schedule of activities.
  - b. Have a hospitality trailer so that on arrival the greeters can say, "The coffee is on--get set up and then come over to trailer#\_\_\_\_\_."
  - c. The San Diego Unit initiated a friendship book to be given to each person collecting autographs. Everyone attending the rally is asked to write his name, address and trailer number. Each name is numbered and awards are given to those that get the most names.

- d. It is fun to take a snapshot of each family and paste it in the Unit history book. These books are of interest to everyone and should be on display at all Unit rallies.
- e. Have a Unit guest book and ask everyone to sign it at each rally.
- f. It is fun to have a "gate" prize. One thought, number the programs and lucky number gets the prize, use some kind of gag.
- g. It is always good to have something planned for the children. Makes a more enjoyable rally for everyone.

4. Rally Parking: Rally committeemen and officers are parked together in the center of the ring, as these are the people who are responsible for the success of the rally. Also, it is a great convenience to the members to know where to locate officers and committeemen.

This method of parking has become known as the "Brass Circle" and is a very controversial subject. Some feel it is a matter of favoritism, but this is not true. Those in the center circle are the hardest workers at the rally and put in the longest hours. Visiting officers are usually parked in the center also. This is a courtesy as well as placing them in a position where they can observe and offer helpful suggestions.

5. Meetings: Wally patterned "Meeting Time" after the old town hall meetings. Meetings may be strictly social or a combined social and business meeting, but it gives everyone an opportunity to get together. Meetings provide a time to get acquainted, to exchange ideas, to discuss objectives and accomplishments. It is a time to take part

and a time to recognize individual contributions. The sidewalk cafe meeting is always fun. Members bring their refreshments and sit around and talk about what has been done or seen, trips made, etc. This usually takes place about 4:30 in the afternoon.

If a business meeting or a combined business and social meeting is planned, notice should be posted. Everyone will make an extra effort to get back from sight-seeing or shopping.

6. Bulletin Board: Place a blackboard in a central location (the hospitality trailer is often used) as a center of activities, for announcements, program news, and if you have a printed program, post one on the board. Keep everyone informed about what is going on.
7. Church Services: Church services at the rally site are a very important part of the rally program. Even a very simple service brings a deep meaning of fellowship. If a minister is attending the rally, there is no problem. If not, a local minister may be invited to speak, or a member read a short sermon. It is a courtesy to members to post notices of local church services on the bulletin board.
8. Head Table: Arranging the head table and the seating of guests, depends upon the size of the table and the number to be seated. If possible, your own officers and their spouses should be seated at the head table. If there is not room for the spouses, they should be placed as near the head table as possible and introduced as important guests. Your president should sit in the center position. Visiting VIPs and International officers would normally be seated at the head table. A special table for officers, past and present may be arranged. If you have inadvertently overlooked someone who might reasonably expect to

sit at the head table, ask him to stand and be acknowledged. This helps to overcome what could be an embarrassing situation.
