



## **Used Airstreams** increase in value

Veteran Airstream owners agree.

Phyllis Mangold, 62, and her husband Les, 65, of Laguna Hills, Calif., have owned four Airstream trailers in 19 years. They vow that once an Airstream owner, always one - not only because they can travel with well-appointed versions of a small home, but because there's a profit in it. "Each trailer we've owned, we traded or sold for more than we paid for it," she says.

"People want an Airstream because it's the Cadillac of the industry," says Steve Krivian, Airstream director of marketing services. "The people who buy are more experienced RVers in their 50s and 60s and are more affluent."

Depending on features ranging from curbside patio awnings to cedar-lined closets, Airstream trailers today can cost from \$25,000 to \$46,000 and range from 25 feet to 34 feet long. Specialty trailers can cost more than \$110,000. The company's Airstream motor homes (self-contained) cost from \$80,000 to \$100,000 and range from 29 feet to 34.5 feet long.

The company has made only about 100,000 trailers and motor homes in 50 years. One reason: Each one is custom-made, and no two are alike, Airstream President Gerard Letourneau says.

"If you're going to pay \$42,000 for a trailer, you want your choice of fabrics, wood and options," he says. Customers order units to their own specifications from about 110 USA dealers.

This year, the company deviated from its traditional silver-sided trailers and introduced the Argosy, a less-expensive model with a beige baked-enamel surface. It will compete in the \$20,000to-\$24,000 RV market. Within a year, the company also plans to introduce an Argosy motor home, which will sell for about half the price of an Airstream motor home, he says.

"We compete for the top 2% of the RV market," Letourneau says. "In 1984, there were about 400,000 RVs sold in this country. That's only 8,000 we would have a chance to get. Airstream is at the very top of the price pyramid; Argosy is in the next lower

The travel-trailer market has gone through tumultuous times. In 1972, 583,000 RVs were sold in the USA. The market dropped to 296,000 in 1974, climbed to 541,000 in 1976 and then slumped to 181,000 by 1980, the Recreation Vehicle Industry Association said. Reasons range from fluctuating interest rates to rising gasoline

Airstream was reflective of these changes. The company started by Byam was sold to Beatrice Food in November 1968 (Byam died in 1962). It was bought in August 1980 by Thor Industries Inc., an RV maker. Airstream's sales had dropped from \$80 million in 1977 to \$22 million by 1980, Letourneau says.

Letourneau, who had a reputation of restoring ailing companies, was hired to head Airstream in 1979. At that time, it had nine manufacturing, service and research and development plants in

Ohio and California, employing 1,400.

"I laid off 1,100 people and brought everybody to Jackson Center and started all over," Letourneau remembers. "I didn't make many friends, but when it was all over, there were at least 300 people who had jobs. Now we're back up to 400 people and sales are projected this year for \$50 million.

He says the company's after-tax profit margin varies from 4% to 6% each month. In its heyday, the company was producing 2,100 vehicles a year. This year, Letourneau says the company will make 1,000 trailers, 200 motor homes and 500 Argosy trailers.

Most employees live in this small, rural community in western Ohio. If they buy an Airstream, they get a 10% discount from the dealer's cost, and they can use a demonstration trailer free for vacations. The company also lends a unit to the town's schools and to the town's only police officer for his vacation.

Airstreams are known for rallies that attract thousands to one

spot in the world every year.

David Reed, executive secretary of Wally Byam Caravan Club International in Jackson Center, says the club holds 1,500 events a year across the USA, Canada and Mexico for its 45,000 members. It is the largest RV club exclusively for owners of one type of vehicle, he boasts.

Each July 4, which is Byam's birthday too, about 4,000 trailers converge on a campsite somewhere in the USA. This year, Boise, Idaho, can expect to see a sea of shining mercury, he says.

Clay Garrison and his wife Esther, both 70, of Dayton, Ohio, have been club members for 29 years. Garrison says he likes the club for its social benefits. "We can go clean across the U.S. and know somebody about everywhere.

Although Airstream has built a business on travel, the company is expanding its specialty vehicle fleet to meet changing market needs. The company built Astrovans in 1983 for NASA's space shuttle program, to ferry astronauts to and from the shuttle sites. Airstreams also are used by police, as emergency communications centers, and as funeral coaches.

Latourneau says he will continue to push for innovative products to compete in the travel-trailer market. He laments that sales of used Airstreams number three to every one new Airstream sold. But although Airstreams are built to last at least 15 years, he won't consider cutting quality, even to compete.

'We wouldn't build one that doesn't last," he says. "That's not

## Airstream affectionately called 'Tinkertoy'

Airstreams have a reputation as the Rolls-Royces of trailers. But their owners have a more af-fectionate name for them.

'We call them Tinkertoys,

said Neil Steketee, "We're always tinkering with it."
Steketee and his wife, Ruby, brought their 31-foot Airstream from their hometown of Holland, Mich., to Boise for the 29th annual Wally Byam Caravan Club Inter-national Rally — named for the founder of the Airstream line of

trailers.
The Steketees are sold on the Airstream brand because the trailer's sleek, aerodynamic design makes it easier to tow. "You have a low center of gravity, so the block of the branch of the it's safer and less likely to turn over," Steketee said.

over, Steketee said.

Elizabeth and Paul Rife, of Dade City, Fla., Airstream owners for 18 years, said the trailer preserves its value well over time. In fact, Rife said, older Airstreams can be sold for as much as or more than their original pur-

chase price.

Three models of the trailer are available, ranging in price from \$25,000 to \$49,000.

The Sovereign, the least expensive Airstream model, sells for \$27,000. It is available in 25-, 27-, 29- and 31-foot models, and with eight floor plans.

Pate Rawak, Chalfont, Pa., a regional manager for Airstream, said the silver trailers are known for their large amount of storage space. "We are a truly round trailer," Rawak said. "We make the most of our space." Items can be stored under beds

and couches as well as in the cedar closets — standard on all models — that line the walls.

One of the most popular models is the Excella (\$38,000) because it offers standard features that are



optional on the Sovereign, Rawak

It is available in 32-foot and 34foot lengths and six floor plans. The Excella features a fixed din-ing table, filtered water system, air conditioning, and a microwave oven. The refrigerator runs on gas, electricity or a 12-volt bat-tery.

For those who want all the comforts of home plus prestige, The Limited (\$49,000) is built with better interior materials and all the features of the Excella, Rawak said. The Limited is available in 32-foot and 34-foot lengths and six floor plans.

Standard features on the Excella and The Limited include a lighting package that illuminates the hitching system, a deluxe sys-tem monitoring panel with hold-ing-tank and water-tank indica-tors, a Sony sound system and digital clock, and a keyed security dead-bolt lock with doorbell and grab handle

Among the standard features on The Limited are a hidden safe for added security and a sensor to indicate when air pressure in the tires is getting low.



## 'Cadillac' of travel trailer turns 50

JACKSON CENTER, Ohio

— It's a golden anniversary
for the silver bullet.

Fifty years ago — in 1936 — Wally Byam, a frustrated California advertising executive with an insatiable wanderlust, built a silver travel trailer. It was one of the first trailers to make comfort a top consideration. For example, it was shaped like a bullet, for smoother road travel.

Called the Airstream because Byam thought it looked like a stream of air, it was made of riveted aluminum on a tubular steel frame and sold for \$1,200 (no small potatoes

in the Depression era). In honor of the anniversary, the Henry Ford Museum in Dearborn, Mich., has requested that one of those original models join its loaner exhibition on transportation and cultural history.

"It's a pioneer of an efficient, practical house trailer," says Don Adams, museum spokesman. "It has a value beyond just any trailer."

## Airstream aims for upper crust of travelers

JACKSON CENTER — There is a lesson here in north central Ohio about how to take a cult image and turn it into a 55-year-old, multimillion dollar corporation.

The image is of sleek aluminum "silver bullet" travel trailers gliding along the nation's highways, as much mobile homes as recreational vehicles to their owners.

The lesson is from Airstream Inc. President Gerard N. Letourneau who, since 1980, has been teacher and guardian of the company's image as the Cadillac of the industry.

"At one period of time, Airstream got very complacent, very smug," said Letourneau, 50, whose office could easily fit into one of Airstream's trailers. "Even though they had the quality image, I believe they lost the idea of what quality was all about. The credibility of Airstream is back."

Airstream, once owned by Beatrice, is now part of Thor Industries, which had \$98 million in RV sales last year. Letrouneau estimates Airstream contributed about half of that.

Unavailability of gasoline in the 1970s, not high gas prices, devastated Airstream, Letourneau said. He laid off 1,100 of 1,500 workers and closed nine facilities, leaving only the Jackson Center plant where workers average 20 years of seniority.

Now, the company is growing again with an eye on lower-priced RV markets, although the business of making travel trailers with hardwood interiors, cedar closets and built-in microwaves keeps "plugging along at about 100 units a month."

That includes production of the year-old Argosy line, aimed at a slightly less-affluent market. There also are a few motor homes produced each month.

That compares with industry giant Fleetwood, which produced 20,000 trailer units in an industry that had total production of about 385,000 units last year.

What Airstream doesn't have in volume, it makes up with price. Owning a share of the image costs an average \$100,000 for a motor home; the industry average is \$63,100. A travel trailer starts around \$25,000 and ranges to about \$42,000, about three times the industry average.

"Very few (competitors) shoot at that segment of the market," said Tom Corson, chairman of Coachman Industries in Elkhart, Ind.

It helps if you have a captive market, and Airstream spends a lot of time and money developing that. It's called Wally Byam Caravan Club Inter-

It's called Wally Byam Caravan Club International, named after the company's founder who realized many people who bought RVs didn't know what to do with them.

A typical Airstream buyer is more than 50 years old, has owned at least one other RV, probably bought the first Airstream used and usually pays cash, he said.

An owner also can spend the equivalent cost of a new unit refitting a trailer after a decade.

"There's some who come in and have had it for a long time, and we think they're ready for a new one. But they like the one they have and just want to change out the interior," said Lois Metz, who has been figuring out customers' bills at Wally Byam Store and service center since 1968.

It's not hard to drop \$2,500 on just changing a twin bed to a double, she said, because everything has to be hand-fitted.

And for the owner who doesn't have everything, the store can easily provide everything from \$19 mud flaps to \$162 hickory writing tables. Those parts and service provide much of Airstream's sales volume, Letourneau said.

"We all moan and groan about them, but I think they all like them," said Onnie Pelto of Warren, who was having his trailer serviced.

He and his wife, Eleanor, said they bought a used Airstream about 10 years ago. They are members of the caravan club and travel to Florida for about three months every year. "It's better than just sitting at home," Mrs.

The current frenzy in lower-priced markets should rise to include Airstream in three or four years, and continued success with the Argosy line could mean as much as a 15 percent employment increase, Letourneau said.

But the action now is in RVs priced under \$15,000, and he's thinking of expanding Airstream's line to include the "stick and staple" models.

"They've got to be very careful. They'll be competing with more competitors and I don't know if they know how to do that as well," said Barry Vogel, an analyst with the Moore and Schley investment firm.

Letourneau knows the danger of tarnishing the solid-gold image, but handled carefully perhaps even with a separate manufacturing plant — he thinks it can be transferred to a full line of RVs.






#### NOTES

## 3,500 Trailers Gather For Airstream Reunion

BOISE, Idaho — For days, the silver-bullet trailers from all over the continent have been coming into southwestern Idaho in waves, forming a shining, 200-acre sea of aluminum shimmering under the hot desert sun.

The 3,500 trailers will stay through today, the nation's birthday and that of their late founder Wally Byam, who invented the Airstream a

half century ago.

The rally began in 1958 when Byam decided to invite club members to join him for a birthday celebration on Lake Bull Shoals, Ark. About 600 members of the club, formed in 1955, dotted the lakeshore with 300 trailers.

"We said we'd never get this many else."

people together again," recalled Clay Garrison, a retired Ohio farmer

He and his wife, Esther, the rally historian, are among just eight people who have attended every rally since and are among the few remaining members who knew Byam personally.

Frank Sargent is a 77-year-old Fort Meyers, Fla., businessman who invented the Thetford toilet, the commode that comes in Airstreams and most other recreational vehicles. He also knew Byam.

"He was a complex man, a man of extraordinary talent," Sargent said. "He could capture a group of people. But he still wore pants and put his socks on one at a time like anyone else."


And what a boost. The Airstreamers are expected to leave up to \$15 million behind while they tour our city and state. That's certainly a welcome infusion to our economy.

Although they said they don't like crowds, they

have been pleased with the rally. "It's so well-organized," Mrs. Carl said. "We find the people very friendly," Carl said.

The Carls, however, have one

complaint - the weather.

"It's a hot time in the old town," said Carl, noting that swimming at the Boise YMCA was a great way to beat the heat.

The Carls are two of approximately 1,000 attending a WBCCI rally for the first time, said Milan Wight, chairman of the "first-timers" orientation program, developed by the veteran rallygoers to help the rookies.

"It's really overwhelming for a new person to come to one of these things," Wight said.

Wight reviews everything from the evening entertainment programs to first aid to the water system during the orientation ses-

About 600 first-timers attended a 52-minute multimedia orientation program in the Boise State University Pavilion on Friday, and Wight expects another 600 to attend a repeat performance Monday.

However, not all first-time rally participants needed a big introduction to the annual event.

John Foulk of Cornelius, Ore. has heard about the international rallies for years from relatives.

His mother, father, brother, sister-in-law and an 83-year-old uncle finally got him and his wife Nellie to join them at a WBCCI

"It is super," Foulk said.

Mrs. Foulk, referring to the relatives who traveled from Arizona and Colorado to attend the rally in Boise, said, "We have our own international unit."

Although the Foulks said they knew a lot about the WBCCI before coming to the rally, Mrs. Foulk said they neglected to learn about the most important thing hooking into the water system.

Relatives helped them solve that problem in short order.

Sandra Herbstler of Tacoma, Wash., was another first-timer who needed no introduction to the world of an international rally.

Her father is a WBCCI regional vice president, and her 16-yeardaughter is a veteran of an international rally.

"It's quite something to see them all together," said Herbstler, who said she was comfortably settled into her parking spot at the airport.







#### Article IV

#### OFFICERS AND THEIR ELECTION

- Section 1. The Officers shall consist of a President, 1st Vice President, 2nd Vice President, Corresponding Secretary, Recording Secretary, and Treasurer. Officers shall be only Regular Members. The Executive Board shall consist of all the Unit Officers plus the Immediate Past President and 4 Directors.
- Section 2. The Officers shall be elected at the annual business meeting and shall be installed and shall assume office at that time and shall serve for a term of one year or until their successor is elected and qualifies. No officer shall succeed themself in any office, except the Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer if duly elected and installed. An officer who succeeds to an office pursuant to the provisions of Section 4 of this Article, shall not be deemed as succeeding themself, unless they shall have served in such office for a period greater than six (6) months.
- Section 3. The Directors shall be elected at the annual business meeting, each for a term of two years commencing at installation but arranged so that only one-half such Directors terms expire in any one year. No director shall serve more than one two-year term.
- Section 4. In the event of the death, advancement or resignation of the President or a Vice President, or in their ability to fulfill their duties of office, the next ranking Vice President (in the order First, Second) shall succeed thereto. All other vacancies on the Executive Board, except that of Immediate Past President, shall be filled by a majority vote of the Board.

#### Article V

#### EXECUTIVE BOARD

Section 1. The Executive Board shall be the administrative body of the Uni and shall define the policies of and have full administrative authority in all matters pertaining to the Unit, and shall exercise general control and supervision of all officers and committees.

Section 2. A que. om of the Executive Board shall consist of a majority of the members.

#### Article VI

#### BUSINESS MEETINGS

- Section 1. The annual business meeting of the members of this organization shall be held during the month of November in each calendar year. Such a meeting shall be announced by written notice and delivered to the members not less than fifteen days prior to the meeting. The notice shall indicate the date, time, and location of the meeting. A quorum for conducting business at the annual meeting, or at any additional business meeting, shall not be less than ten (10) percent of members.
- Section 2. Additional business meetings of the members may be held at a suitable time and place during the second day of each rally of the members. If the rally or meeting is of less than two days duration, written totice to the members indicating the time, location and purpose of such meeting shall be delivered to the members not less than ten days prior to the meeting.
- Section 3. The Executive Board, by majority vote, may call additional business meetings of the members.
- Section 4. The President or any two members of the Board may call a business meeting of the Executive Board at any time deemed necessary.
- Section 5. All Regular, Associate and Unit Members listed as current members in the International and Charter Oak Unit directories shall be eligible to vote at all business meetings of this Unit except in the election of Unit Officers or Region Officers and in the voting on any mendment to the International Constitution, in which, only Regular Members may vote. Each membership, identified by the international membership number, shall be considered one vote.

#### Article I

#### ORDER OF BUSINESS

#### Article II

#### COMMITTEES

Section 1. Standing Committees shall comprise:

- Hospitality
- Legislative Membership
- Program
- Publicity

All Standing Committees shall consist of a chairperson and of as many members as deemed necessary by the President. Chairpersons of Standing Committees shall report to the Executive Board, at the call of the President.

- Section 7. The duties of the Directors shall be as prescribed in Jion 1, Article V, of the Constitution and to attend all meetings of the
  Unit and the Executive Board; to accept special assignments as
  directed by the President.
- Section 8. Any Unit officer or member of the Board of Directors who without justifiable cause is absent for two consecutive unit meetings or fails to attend a total of nine unit meetings during his term of office will be subject to removal from office.
  - (a) Any officer or member of the Board of Directors prior to being removed from office for violation of Section 8 or any other justifiable cause will be given a hearing by the Executive Board with a minimum of seven members present prior to any action being taken.
  - (b) The officer or director will be notified by certified letter of the charges, time and place of hearing at least 20 days prior to the hearing.
  - (c) If by a majority vote the Executive Board finds justifiable cause for removal of said officer or director, they will present their findings to the unit membership for a vote of the membership.
  - (d) A majority vote of the unit members present and voting at this meeting for removal of said officer or director, will remove said officer or director from office and they will be so notified by certified letter.
  - (e) All voting in Section 8(c) and 8(d) will be by secret ballot.

#### Article VI

#### DELEGATES

Section 1. The Executive Board shall select one delegate and one alternate from among the officers and members who will attend the annual Delegates meeting of the parent organization, the Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc. Any vacancy occurring following such selection shall be filled by appointment by the President. The delegate and alternate should be instructed respecting the wishes of the Unit on matters to come before the meeting. The President and Secretary shall certify to these selections.

#### Article VII

#### DUES

- Section 1. The annual dues of Regular, Associate and Unit members shall be set by the Executive Board.
- Section 2. A member who fails to pay properly assessed International and Unit dues before November 15 of the year immediately preceeding the year for which dues are payable, shall be delinquent and their names will not appear in the WBCCI Directory. If the dues are not paid and receipted by the Treasurer on or before December 31, membership will be terminated and stricken from the roll.

#### Article VIII

#### CODE OF ETHICS

Section 1. All members shall abide by the following Code of Ethics:

(a) To be ever mindful of our responsibility to the Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc., and through conduct indicate to the public that membership therein is an assurance of courtesy on the road and elsewhere and of good will to all peoples and countries.

- (b) To say or print nothing which may reflect un worably on others and to dedicate ourselves to the work of cementing together the members of our units and Club in bonds of friendship, good fellowship and mutual understanding.
- (c) To conduct ourselves so as to inspire others also engaged in recreational vehicle travel to a full appreciation of the intent and meaning of this code.
- (d) To maintain our camps and parking areas in a proper manner and to leave them in a neat and clean condition.

#### Article IX

#### LIABILITY

Section 1. Neither the Unit nor its officers are responsible for the loss of or damage to property or for injury to or death of a person on the premises of any club function. This freedom for responsibility for loss or damage to property applies regardless of whether that property has been received by any member or officer or left upon the premises.

#### Article I

#### **AMENDMENTS**

- Section 1. These By-Laws may be amended at any business meeting of the Executive Board by two-thirds vote, provided the proposed amendment has been submitted to all members of the Executive Board in writing at least ten (10) days prior to such meeting.
- Section 2. Such amendments shall become effective upon adoption.
