





This Mid-winter Board Meeting was unique in another way. The Seminar commenced on Tuesday and was scheduled for two days, but finished early afternoon the first day. This allowed two and one-half days of free time. In addition, Friday P.M. became free time inasmuch as the Board meeting adjourned just prior to noon. WOW!!! No debates, no controversy, only accomplishment. Some of the newly adopted issues are as follows:

- All National, Special Event, Region and State Rallies may invite Non-Member owners of RV's manufactured by Airstream, Inc. This most definitely could be a great recruitment tool.
- A Unit may host a rally or caravan or combination thereof with a RV Club not chartered by WBCCI, and may have two "Buddy Rallies" to which each member may invite not more than one non-member RV family.
- 3. In future the present category UNIT MEMBER and/ or UNIT MEMBER ONLY will be classified as AFFILIATE MEMBER. This will give two classes of membership - a.) An International dues paying member - Regular Member; b) a member paying International and Unit dues to another unit but paying unit dues only to another unit.
- 4. To be eligible to serve as an elected officer of an Intra-Club, a Unit, a Region or International, a person must be a Regular Member of the International Club. This eliminates and excludes an Affiliate Member or a Member at Large from holding an office.

- 5. Bylaws were changed to add a new dues structure: Members may pay International dues for multiply years, such payment to be non-refundable. 2 years X Current International Dues minus \$10.00; 3 years X Current International Dues minus \$15.00; 4 years X Current International Dues minus \$20.00.
- 6. Members of an Overseas Caravan may with International Executive Committee approval travel in other than a RV manufactured by Airstream when participating in a National Caravan. They will have the same rights and privileges as a WBCCI member upon payment of the required Caravan fee.

Dave Walker, Constitution and By-law Chairman, together with his committee, did a super job in presenting to the Board, via chosen advocates, many changes to clarify and correct many articles in the Policies and Procedures. Some of the items are as follows:

A. Authorized Flags and Pennants and how they are to be flown at various events.

Emphasis was placed on the fact that many were flying locale or custom flags that have not received prior approval. All Region Officers were asked to relay information to the units: a.) the procedure for approval and b.) encourage having a Unit Flag.

B. Clarification of the use of the Emblem and Insignia of the International Club. Use of these items is restricted and cannot be used without prior approval of the IBT.

- C. Clarification of assignment of Caravan numbers and approval of caravans which is the responsibility of the Standing Committee Chairman. There is no insurance coverage for Caravans into Mexico, therefore there can be no authorization for such Caravans.
- D. All Intra-Clubs serving a useful purpose and as authorized by the IBT must restrict membership to members in good standing in the International Club. All such Intra-Clubs shall prepare a Constitution and Bylaws and any amendments thereto and forward four (4) copies of same to International Headquarters for review by the C & B Standing Committee. The guidelines for the C & B are the same as for units, as is the requirement for notification of the Club's elected or appointed officers to be provided to Headquarters no later than November 15th of each year.

Likewise must all flags, decals, patches, pennants and plaques be approved by the IBT.

There were a few motions that were merely housekeeping issues, therefore have not been described in detail.

Larry Huttle was present at the official Board Meeting. He advised that the new media being planned for future, as well as articles such as those which have appeared in the Wall Street Journal in November or December, will without any doubt, do its part to enhance our way of life

He gave a brief synopsis of the future plans of Airstream and advised of the 50 trailer limited edition planned for each year. This year's edition is a Norman Rockwell theme and we were given the opportunity to see the trailer as it was on its way to Texas. Each year a new theme will be depicted.

He advised that the 5th Wheels were in production and being well received. (We had one on site at the Rally and the owners were pleased with the unit) Airstream is also coming out with a light weight towable by auto, airstream geared to the younger generation. I believe it was this one that he stated could accommodate six people. In response to the request of our members, steps are being taken to have dealers available at the International. Details must be worked out but Larry did not feel it to be an unsurmountable issue.

Flag Protocal

by Dick Bartram, 2nd VP Region 1

All of us love the look of flags on display at rallies on our trailers and motorhomes. While comprehensive rules exist in the Blue Book on pages 54, 54.1, and 54.3, and there is a detailed set of diagrams in appendix #12, not everyone has a copy of the Blue Book. Therefore, it is appropriate to publish the basic rules for proper flag display.

- Do not fly flags at night unless a light shines on them.
 - National flags should not fly in bad weather.
- Do not fly your country's flag in another country unless you fly that country's flag
- Assuming you have 3 flags, the following flag protocol will be correct in the USA and Canada. The display as viewed from the fromt of your RV:

LEFT: US flag; Provincial flag (in Canada only).

CENTER; Canadian flag; state or current WBCCI office flag (not in Canada).

RIGHT: State flag (not in Canada); current WBCCI office flag; Provincial flag (in Canada only).

- When flying flags from more than one country all flags must be the same height from the ground. If you are flying just the U.S. Flag as a country flag and your flag poles are not of equal length, the center one must be higher and fly the U.S. Flag. (This is not authorized in Canada and no other country's flag can be flown in this manner).
- Other variations exist for International and Region officers. If you have any questions about how you should fly your flags, ask your unit President or any Region officer.



The following text represents the proposed changes to the Constitution and the Bylaws for the Charter Oak Connecticut Unit of WBCCI. We will vote on the proposed changes during a meeting at the "Safety Rally." For original wording of both the Constitution and Bylaws, please refer to the copy found in the 1997 Charter Oak Connecticut Unit Directory, pages 17-25.

Constitution

Article IV

Officers and Their Election

- Section 1: The Officers of the Unit shall consist of a President, a First Vice President, a Second Vice President, a Corresponding Secretary, a Recording Secretary, a Treasurer and Directors (four). The Executive Board shall consist of all of the Unit Officers plus the Immediate Past President of the Unit.
- Section 2: The Officers shall be elected at the annual business meeting and shall be installed and shall assume office at that time. An officer shall serve in office for a term of one year or until a successor is elected but in no case shall an officer, except the Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary or Treasurer, be eligible to serve more than two consecutive terms in the same office, provided said officers are duly nominated and elected for each term of office.
- Section 3: An officer who advances to an office pursuant to the provisions of Sec. 5 of this ARTICLE shall not be deemed to have served a full term in such office unless said service is for a period of greater than one-half (1/2) the term of such office.
- Section 4: The Director shall be elected at the annual business meeting, each for a term of two years commencing at the annual meeting, but arranged so that only one-half such Directors' terms expire in any one year. No Director shall serve more than one two-year term consecutively.
- Section 5: In the event of the death or resignation of the President or the death, advancement or resignation of a Vice President, or an officer's inability to fulfill the duties of office, the next ranking Vice President (in the order first, second) shall advance thereto. All other vacancies on the Executive Board, except that of the Immediate Past President, shall be filled by a majority vote of the Executive Board.

Article VI

Business Meetings

Section 6: A mail ballot may be used to obtain the vote of the members of the Unit on a proposal when such is deemed desirable or necessary. When a mail ballot is used to obtain the vote of the member of the Unit on a proposal, no other method of voting on such a proposal shall be utilized.

Bylaws

Article II

Committees

Section 1: Standing Committees shall be:

- A. Budget
- B. Caravan
- C. Constitution and Bylaws
- D. Ethics and Grievances
- E. Family/Youth
- F. Historical
- G. Hospitality
- H. Legislative
- I. Membership
- J. Publicity
- K. Public Relations

The President shall appoint and be an ex-officio member of all committees except the Nominating Committee.

Section 2: All Standing Committees shall consist of a Chairperson and as many members as deemed necessary by the President. Chairpersons of Standing Committees shall report at each meeting of the Executive Board.

Standing Committees General Duties

- Budget In cooperation with the incoming and outgoing Treasurer of the Unit, prepare for the Executive Board a budget projecting the unit's income and expenditures for the calendar (or fiscal) year next ensuing.
- Caravan To plan, organize, and obtain leaders for unit caravans that are
 operated or conducted for the Unit within the scope of the WBCCI Caravan
 Handbook. To develop an aggressive Unit Caravan program and to coordinate
 unit caravan matters with appropriate Region and International Caravan
 Committee personnel.
- Constitution and Bylaws To conduct a continuing review and study of the
 Unit and the International Constitution and Bylaws and to make recommendations for any amendments or additions deemed desirable and in the best
 interest of the Club.
- Ethics and Grievance To investigate and assess all grievances or complaints made by members and others and to make recommendations thereon to the Unit Executive Board.
- Family/Youth Plan programs to encourage participation of family/youth at unit functions and to be the liaison person between the Unit and International Family/Youth Standing Committee.
- Historical To record events including written and pictorial material associated with unit activities and to maintain a historical record of such.
- Hospitality To receive and make welcome guests and new members at club functions. Recommend ways to meet and greet all club members and guests at rallies and/or seasonal functions.
- Legislative To study, advise and recommend legislation in the interest of the Club and its members; to recommend opposition to all legislation which is discriminatory and injurious to the interest of the Club and its members.

There was so much charm — the wonderful ancient buildings. I especially liked the bakeries, Ted managed to have wine with lunch and dinner — even if only with cheese and bread.


When in Rome we tried to do as the Italians do, which included translating the four French words we knew into Italian.

Florence, too, is abundant with priceless works of art. We assume that caring for all the wonderful buildings and their contents keep the country too busy and too broke to clean the streets.


All during our three weeks away, Ted wished he could have stowed the Airstream aboard Air France. We never would have survived. Driving, riding and walking gives new meaning to fear.







Airstreamers take to the highway

It's rally season for an American classic gaining new chic

Good luck trying to reach an avid Airstreamer between now and July Fourth.

If they're not already in Huntsville, Ala., they're on the road there for the good times and camaraderie of the 40th international rally of Airstream club members.

"It's just like your own family," says Bernie Carriker, the Charlotte-area chapter's president. "For several days, all you do is hug people. I'm not kidding. I'll hug the men, and my husband will hug the women."

These days, the sleek, silver trailers are as hot as a Carolinas summer.

Hollywood stars are getting them customized with tile floors, pine walls and other features, and keeping them as hideaways on back lots and on location.

Lifestyle maven Martha Stewart took one for a spring antique buying trip to Maine. One co-stars in the TV show "Promised Land" about a down-and-out Carolinas factory worker who finds faith and hits the road to help strangers.

Neiman Marcus put a 1968 model — turned by decorators into a four-room lakeside retreat with antique rugs and a cloud-painted ceiling — in its catalog last Christmas. Price tag: \$195,000.

And the trendy, modern art set is calling them an icon of American industrial design.

Airstreamers, themselves, don't know about all that.

So far, more than 100,000 have been built — and more than 60,000 are on the road.

Airstream sold 480 new trailers from August 1995 to July 1996. There's also an active market for used ones. Owners with home computers can cruise the Internet to trade fix-it tips.

Airstreams have long been coveted by retirees, who want a top-of-the-line RV and who can afford to spend up to \$60,000 and long stretches on the road.

Carriker and husband John Jr., 71, a retired Charlotte fire captain, bought their first Airstream in 1999 and are now on their seventh, a 30-footer that sleeps four. "It's the Cadiliac of trailers, who says. "Everybody wants the

While the trailers themselves have come a long way since RV pioneer Byam, his name and outlook on life live on through the international caravan club.
Begun in 1955, the club now includes 10,600 families who pay \$45 a year to join, plus local dues that range from \$5 to \$25 annually.



Caravan members have been arriving for weeks, making sure everything is just right for this year's event, titled "Mansions to Moonflights."

And, once again, club members are impressed with their Huntsville welcome.

"The city asked us what they could do to bring the caravan back (after the 1988 visit)," Hew-er, a Detroit native, said. "We told them we didn't have electric hook-ups for everyone the first year, but they made sure we did this year. They had the utilities guys out here and everyone made sure this thing would work."

The city charged the group \$156,000 to cover services, said Judy Ryals, executive director of the Convention and Visitors Bureau. The services include utili-ties, cable television, shuttle bus transportation from John Hunt Park - the old airport - to the Von Braun Center, renting the convention center, complimentary parking at the center and clean-up work.

Ryals said the bureau sought bids on many of those services to get a good idea how much the camping group should pay.

"When they were here in 1988 we came out \$3,000 under budget, and we feel confident that will happen again this year," Ryals said. "We are experiencing some additional costs that were unexpected due to the rain in providing some services at the park with the damp ground, but I still don't think that's going to make us go over budget."

City crews have laid almost four miles of water and sewer lines at the park, she said.

Hewer estimates about 700 more Airstream travel trailers and motor homes will arrive in the next two days to add to the 900 or so already here.

"When they come in, they will just stream in here," said Lucile Hewer, Norm's wife. "You won't believe it."

Caravan members have set up shop in the Von Braun Center, where a week's worth of activities has been planned, including unit meetings, board meetings, health clinics and a teen queen pageant Wednesday night.

The caravan began in 1958 in Bull Shoals, Ark., with some 300 campers. Since then the caravan has grown to almost 10,000 units, including a medical center and a section of antique Airstreams still used to crisscross the country. Not all the units will attend, Hewer said. The largest rally to date was the 1976 Louisville, Ky., rally with 4,493 campers.

The 1,600 or so campers expected here are close to the average, though Hewer said the numbers are declining "because most of our people are old."

The average age of rally members is 70, with most being retired. However, Ray Brunk, a re-tired Indianapolis police officer and WBCCI public relations officer, said you don't have to be a certain age or be retired to be a part of WBCCI. If you have an Airstream and pay your \$45-a-year dues, you can join.

"The media writes about us old folks all the time, but we have young people, too," Brunk said.

The WBCCI teen program gives children and teens traveling with their grandparents or parents lots to do at the rallies. This week teens will go to Point Mallard water park and tour the U.S. Space & Rocket Center.

Hewer said the teens also try to do good deeds at the places they visit. This year, they are collecting pennies to assist a Huntsville girl who needs a liver transplant. The WBCCI is also collecting money for the Downtown Rescue Mission and making hats for the homeless for the winter.

Roy Clark just making great music

Roy Clark's resume is breathtaking. He's been named Entertainer of the Year by both the Country Music Association and the Academy of Country Music, who gave it to him twice.

■ The Wally Byam Caravan Club is one way retired business people keep rolling along. Page B6.

His multi-instrumental prowess has earned him countless "best-of" prizes from awards shows, magazines and fans, and his singing with the "Hee Haw Gospel Quartet" helped produce seven straight "Gospel Group of the Year" awards from 1981-87.

In 1976, Clark became one of the few Western artists to be allowed to tour Communistgoverned Russia. He was named the first national ambassador for UNICEF in 1989.

But Clark, who performed at the Von Braun Center Arena Sunday night for the Wally Byam Caravan Club International's annual rally, said his biggest thrill was probably winning the Pioneer Award from the Academy of Country Music this year.

Only six individuals have earned the prestigious award, including Gene Autry, Roy Rogers, Roger Miller and Minnie Pearl.

"I went to the awards show to be a presenter, but then they

surprised me," said Clark, 64.

Clark, who is as famous for his comedy work in the longrunning country skit show "Hee Haw" as he is for his music, attributes most of his accomplishments to merely surviving the "here today, gone tomorrow" world of show business.

"Longevity," he said when asked about his career. "I found out a long time ago that the bigger a star was, the nicer he was. That's the key to staying in this business, being nice to people. When you hear about some-

one being a 'flash-in-the-pan,' you can sometimes read between the lines."

Speaking of longevity, Clark said there's not much of it to be found in today's country music

scene.

"Everything now is marketing," he said. "They get a nice,
young person, dress them the
same way, make them wear the
same cowboy hat, put them in
the studio, and spend thousands
of dollars to find a record that
will sell.

"Then they try to market it to the structure, radio, promoters, anyone that can give the kid some visibility. If it doesn't catch on with the people, they get rid of them and say 'next'."

Clark said artistry is a lost commodity in Nashville today. "The singers all sound alike, and the songs are all the same tempo. And they talk such high volumes in sales."

Ronnie Dunn of the popular country duo Brooks and Dunn once told Clark that Arista Records would have dropped them if their recent album "Borderline" hadn't shipped a million copies.

copies.
"That's the first-day sales,"
Clark said. "I couldn't believe it.
Here's a group that's sold 10 million records, and Ronnie was
worried about being out of
work."

Clark, equally proficient on guitar, banjo, fiddle and mandolin, is pleased to see that a few country artists can still circumvent the Music Row machinery, such as Alison Krauss, who records for the tiny Rounder Records label in Massachusetts.

"She just came up on talent, and I was glad to see it," Clark said. "But most don't do it like her. I tell young people in the business 'Enjoy it now, this moment is yours. But don't go thinking you're the hottest thing in town, because it'll end before you know it.'"

Ending is something Clark's career has yet to do. From his early days in a band that opened for Hank Williams, to his current projects that include albums of gospel material and big-band classics, he's never come close to the soup line.

"I watched Hank play four times a day for two weeks," he said of those early gigs with Williams, when bands would play several short sets in a single day. "I was totally mesmerized by him. He had an aura that was hard to explain. All he did was stand there and sing. But he believed in what he was singing about. I never forgot that."

Clark was also influenced by

Bing Crosby. "He was always in total control," Clark remembered. "Movies, TV or singing, he was always laid-back. He always said the right things at the right time. He was the complete showman."

The lessons learned from those influences helped Clark make the difficult leap from music to television. His first major success was a recurring role as Cousin Roy Halsey on "The Beverly Hillbillies."

"I got my first on-screen kiss from Elly May," he said of the character played by Donna Douglas. "That wasn't too shabby."

He attributes his later screen success to his time on the "Beverly Hillbillies" set. "They did the show for so long, they were like a family," Clark recalled. "They were really good to me, and that helped me get some more confidence."

In the summer of 1969, "Hee Haw" premiered. Clark, of course, had no idea the ensemble show would stay on the air for 25 years. He said the producers almost worked him to death in the early days.

Clark remained a featured player in long-running bits such as "The Barber Shop" with Archie Campbell and "Pickin' and Grinnin'" with Buck Owens, Clark always did the "grinnin'."
"Furnholy wanted to do 'Hee

"Everybody wanted to do 'Hee Haw'," Clark said. "We had Sammy Davis Jr., Ethel Merman and Vic Damone begging to be in the cornfield."

In 1979, Clark played a benefit concert in Fayetteville, Tenn., to help raise money for an athletic field house at Lincoln County High School.

"A friend of mine, Lou King, was working at the Amana refrigerator plant there," Clark said. "He said the athletes were having to change into their uniforms in their cars before a game. He asked for my help."

Clark said he had no idea the town would name the field house in his honor. "I was really surprised they did that," he said.

cept for the ones the "mudders" cut in the green fields by persistently driving cars or trucks right up to their trailer doors instead of parking in the lot, says Jack.

He and fellow Tampa Bay Unit member Paul are cooking onions and peppers outside while Paul's wife, Berniece, fixes burger toppings in the Hallstedts' trailer. Paul and Berniece are new Airstreamers, only three in club years, but they're already well into the thick of things.

Tonight's dinner is chairman Paul's thank-you to his committee of special messengers — the volunteer liaisons or "gofors" who run messages between the numerous over-organized committees in the International Caravan. The Caravan's agenda for this year's annual week-long rally reads like course options for a small college. Topics range from navigation, computers and radios to wood carving, microwave cooking and flower arranging.

Tonight, a few days before the busy rally officially begins, they're relaxing, sauteeing, grilling onion burgers. None of the three are bothered by my questions. They see TV news crews, documentary filmmakers, book writers and photographers everywhere they congregate. Cults, especially a free-ranging silver highway gang like this, draw attention. They're used to it.

In fact, they say I should buy an Airstream trailer sometime and join the caravan. "Ever been inside one?" asks Berniece. "Wanna take a look around?"

Love to.

No need to duck, there's plenty of space even for the 6-foot-plus crowd. The living room — pull-out sofa, cell phone, radio, recliner, rocker — is spotless. No shoes on the white living room carpet, but you can wear them in the kitchen. It has hardwood floors that match the dining table.

I should live so good.

The double bed and mounted wall TV set make for a comfortable, if cramped, bedroom. There's a bathroom, a hallway, a shower, a microwave, a refrigerator and more. They've got solar panels for electricity and fantastic fans that shut off in rain.

The Great Outdoors it's not. But they never said that's what they signed on for.

"My husband said I could only have one," says Berniece, "so get it the way you want."

So she got the largest available Airstream. The trailers cost tens of thousands of dollars. The Hallstedts had to save for years. But they knew this was what they wanted.

"With a trailer that size, someone asked 'How many does it sleep?' " says Berniece.

"Two. Only two," she pounds out the answer, holding up two fingers and laughing.

In Huntsville's expansive city of some 1,600 Airstream trailers, the Hallstedts have found an intimacy that is supported, not hindered, by the abundance of nearby friends.

In fact, it's the eve of their 30th wedding anniversary — and they haven't told a soul. Tonight's feast is for friends. Tomorrow is just for them. Out here, they make their own rules.

"This is how we live, like a bunch of gypsies," says Paul matter-of-factly. He wanders over to a shaded cooler to check on the watermelon and beer. The cooler, a 3-foot Keystone brand barrel for tonight's party, was donated by a nearby Chevron station about an hour ago. You learn things — and how to get things — on the road.

"We kind of bum around and see what we can pick up," he says.

That's not to say any of the Airstreamers are bums. They just don't have enough space in their packed-up and hauled-away lives for 3-foot tall coolers. As is, they keep all of Paul's fishing equipment and most other non-essentials in the back of their Dodge Ram. Airstreamers refer to their requisite trucks as "closets."

"It's a good life and it's something to do," pipes up Jack, who picked up his first Airstream in 1964. "If people didn't have their Airstreamers, they'd be sitting on their front porches."

Like all long-time members, Jack likes to chat. But there's more than friendly banter to being an Airstreamer. There's also a restless wanderlust.

Paul and Berniece maintain a small house in Holiday, Fla. But, like most Airstreamers, they only occupy it for the winter months.

Last year they put 23,000 miles on the trailer. The year before it was 25,000 miles. They meet lots of great friends like Jack and his wife, Edith. They pursue their hobbies and see the world. They live a lot.

"You see all these people," says Jack. "They can't all be crazy." "But it helps," admits Paul.

Paul worked as a railway engineer for 30 years. Berniece taught first grade in a Michigan classroom for 31. They, like all Airstreamers, have friends who don't travel, who don't understand.


"They all think we're strange," says Jack, smiling.

"They just sit at home and see what they want to see on TV," says Berniece.

"You know what they say?" asks Paul. "They say, 'Do it. We wish we could."

"They say, 'We're going to work one more year,' " says Paul. "Then one more year, then another."






For any who may not be going to the Region I Rally, follow the map for Peters Pond Park.

Ragin' Recipes . . .

BREAD PUDDING

1 (1 pound) loaf French bread

2 cups half-and-half

2 cups milk

3 eggs, lightly beaten

2 cups sugar

1/2 cup chopped pecans (optional)

1/2 cup raisins

1/4 cup shredded coconut (optional)

1 tbsp. plus 1 tsp. vanilla extract

1/2 tsp. orange extract

1-1/2 tsp. ground cinnamon

2 tbsp. butter or margarine, melted

1/2 cup shredded coconut (optional)

1/2 cup chopped pecans (optional)

Whiskey Sauce - see separate recipe

Break bread into small pieces and place in a shallow bowl. Add half-andhalf and milk; let stand 10 minutes. Crush mixture with hands until blended. Add eggs and next 7 ingredients, stirring well.

Pour melted butter into a 13x9x2 inch baking dish; tilt dish to coat evenly. Spoon pudding mixture into dish. Bake at 325° for 40 to 45 minutes or until pudding is very firm. Remove from oven. Let cool. Optional - combine 1/2 cup shredded coconut and 1/2 cup chopped pecans; stir well.

To serve, cut pudding into squares. Place each square into an oven proof dish. Place dishes on baking sheet. Pour Whiskey Sauce evenly over squares and sprinkle evenly with coconut mixture. Broil 6 inches from heat until sauce is bubbly and coconut is lightly browned. Serves 15

BREAD PUDDING WHISKEY SAUCE

1 cup butter

2 cups sifted powdered sugar

3 Tblsp. bourbon

2 eggs, beaten

Place butter in top of double boiler; bring water to a boil. Reduce heat to low; cook until butter melts. Add sugar and bourbon, stirring until sugar dissolves.

Gradually stir about 1/4 of hot mixture into beaten eggs; add to remaining hot mixture in pan, stirring constantly, 5 minutes or until mixture thickens. Makes 2 cups

SAUSAGE & CHICKEN JAMBALAYA

3 tbsp. vegetable oil

4 chicken breast halves

1 lb. Andouille or smoked sausage, thinly sliced & quartered

1 cup diced onion

1 cup diced green pepper

1 cup diced sweet red pepper

1 cup sliced green onions or scallions

3/4 cup diced celery

4 large cloves garlic, crushed

2 10-1/2 oz. cans chicken broth

1 28 oz. can crushed tomatoes

1/2 tsp. salt

1/2 tsp. ground red pepper

1-3/4 cups long-grain rice, uncooked

Heat oil in Dutch oven over medium heat. Add chicken, meat side down: cover and cook 15 minutes. Turn chicken, add smoked sausage; cover and cook 15 minutes. Remove chicken and sausage and discard the drippings. Cut chicken into small pieces. Add onion, green and sweet red pepper, green onions or scallions, celery, and garlic to Dutch oven; sauté until crisp-tender. Stir in chicken broth, crushed tomatoes, salt, ground red pepper, and rice. Bring to a boil. Add chicken and sausage. Cover, reduce heat, and simmer 20 minutes. Stir before serving. Serves 8 (easily)



JIM'S FAMOUS CHICKEN GUMBO

1/2 cup vegetable oil

1 4 to 4-1/2 pound chicken, cup up

1/2 cup all-purpose flour

3/4 pound cherize (smoked sausage), cut

into 1/2" slices

1/4 pound boiled ham, diced

1 large onion, chopped

green bell pepper, chopped

3 ribs celery, chopped

6 or 7 scallions, sliced

3 cloves garlic, minced

2/3 cup chopped fresh parsley

2 tsp. dried thyme

2 bay leaves

1-1/2 to 2 quarts water

Salt & black pepper, to taste

1-1/2 tsp. hot sauce

2 to 2-1/2 Tblsp. gumbo filé powder or

10 oz. package frozen okra pieces

Rice, cooked

Heat oil in a heavy 5 quart pot or Dutch oven and brown chicken on all sides over medium heat. Remove chicken and set aside. Blend flour into remaining oil and cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until roux is chocolate colored (about 20 minutes), adding more oil if mixture is dry. Stir in sausage slices, diced ham, onion, green pepper, and celery. Sauté, 10 minutes, stirring frequently. Add browned chicken, scallions, garlic, parsley, thyme, bay leaves and water, stirring to mix with roux. Add salt and black pepper and simmer, partly covered, 1 hour, or until chicken is tender. Remove chicken, trim off skin and bones, and return chicken

in large pieces to the soup. If using okra, stir in. Bring soup to a simmer. If using gumbo filé powder, stir in five minutes before serving. Remove and discard bay leaves. Serve gumbo over rice. Serves 4-5 (easily)

Do You Have a Gas Leak

Do you have a gas smell around your trailer? Can't find where it's coming from? Don't use soap bubbles! Your COCU has just the thing for you. The President of the Unit has in her care an Electronic Gas Leak Detector, or "beeper," that is really easy to operate. It may be borrowed by any of our members to use and return.

It is battery powered and to operate you first remove the plastic cap from the tip of the probe. To turn on the "beeper," pull the large knob up, turn the sensitivity control (the small white knob), fully clockwise, and allow one to two minutes for the beep repetition to slow down to an even beat of one or two per second. Then slowly turn the sensitivity up (turn the small white know counterclockwise) until the beat of the beep picks up slightly.

Now you are ready. Using the probe search near the area of a suspected leak. Gas at the tip of the probe causes an increase in the beep rate. The faster the beeping, the closer the probe tip is to the leak. You will find this instrument very sensitive, keep the probe tip clean and dry and do not damage the wire mesh at the tip. Good luck! If you find you need help, ask the Prez.


Jim Edmondson led us in prayer — all mourned the tragic death of Princess Di.


This rally was an example of what Airstreaming is all about, the willingness of so many people to come together bringing their talents and hard work for the enjoyment of all.














Cape Cod Caper







Recipes

APPLE CURRY CHICKEN

1 tsp. curry powder
1 large green apple, chopped
1 large onion, chopped
2 cups apple juice
1 Tbsp. lemon juice
1/4 pound mushrooms, sliced
1 tsp. chicken bouillon
3 to 3 1/2 pounds chicken thighs, skinned
1 Tbsp. flour
2 Tbsp. green onions, sliced
1 cup plain nonfat yogurt
Green onion for garnish

In a 6 quart pan, over medium heat, stir curry powder until slightly darkened (about 4 minutes). Add apple, onion, 1 1/2 cups of apple juice, lemon juice, mushrooms and bouillon. Bring to a boil. Add chicken, cover and simmer until meat is no longer pink at the bone, about 30 minutes. With a slotted spoon, transfer chicken to a platter and keep warm. Blend remaining juice and flour. Add to pan and cook over high heat, stirring often, until reduced to 3 cups. Remove from heat, blend in yogurt, and pour over chicken. Garnish with green onion. Yield: 5 servings

SUMMER SQUASH CASSEROLE

1 lb. yellow squash
1/2 cup chopped onion
1/4 cup red pepper or tomato for color
1/4 cup chopped green pepper
2 egg whites
2 tablespoons low or non fat mayonnaise
2 teaspoons paprika
1 teaspoon lemon pepper seasoning
without salt
vegetable cooking spray
4 tablespoons cracker crumbs
1/4 cup shredded low fat cheddar cheese
1/4 cup shredded part-skim mozzarella
cheese

Cook cut up squash in boiling water to cover or steam until tender. Drain. Combine onion, red pepper, green pepper, egg whites, mayonnaise, and spices in bowl, stirring well. Gently stir in squash. Spoon 1/2 of squash mixture into a 2 quart casserole dish coated with cooking spray. Sprinkle with mozzarella cheese. Layer second half of squash mixture and sprinkle with low fat cheddar cheese, then sprinkle with cracker crumbs. Bake at 325 F for 30 minutes. Serve warm.

The Taylors' Tale

Many, many years ago, in the Onondaga Valley of New York State, the trails of Chan and Jackie crossed at a busy little boarding house on the campus of Syracuse University. Chan, from Wyomissing, PA, was a recent Cornell graduate, just beginning his career in gas utility, while Jackie, from Buffalo, NY, was continuing her graduate studies in personnel administration. She had interrupted her studies that year to become Secretary to the Chancellor of Syracuse. By 1964, all the young Taylors had flown from the nest to various New England universities and for them the circle starts all over again.

Early retirement inspired trips abroad, but once we were exposed to the Wally Byam way of life in 1977, it was "see America first"! Wen we weren't traveling, we volunteered at Hartford Hospital for 12 years.



- Rally Parking Park rally hosts together. These are the people
 who are responsible for the success of the rally. Be sure everyone
 knows where to locate officers and hosts.
- 6. Meetings Wally patterned "Meeting Time" after the old town hall meetings. Meetings may be strictly social or a combined social and business meeting. Meetings give everyone an opportunity to get together. Meetings provide a time to get acquainted, to exchange ideas, to discuss objectives and accomplishments. This is a time to take part and a time to recognize individual contributions. The sidewalk cafe meeting is always fun. Members bring their refreshments and sit around and talk about what has been done or seen, trips made, etc. This usually takes place about 4:30 in the afternoon.

If a business meeting or a combined business meeting and social meeting is planned, notice should be posted. Everyone will make an extra effort to get back from sight-seeing or shopping.

- Bulletin Board Place a bulletin board in a central location (the hospitality RV is often used) as a center of activities for announcements and program news. If you have a printed program, post one on the board. Keep everyone informed about what is going on.
- Church Services Post notices of local church services on the bulletin board.
- 9. Head Table Arranging the head table and the seating of guests depends upon the size of the table and the number to be seated. If possible, your own officers and their spouses should be seated at the head table. If there isn't room for the spouses, they should be placed as near the head table as possible. The President should sit in the center position. Visiting VIPs and International officers would normally be seated at the head table. A special table for officers, past and present, may be arranged. If you have overlooked someone who might reasonably expect to sit at the head table, ask them to stand and be acknowledged. This helps to overcome what could be an embarrassing situation.

Guidelines for Rallies & Meetings

- Chatter Article Appoint someone in advance to write a news article for the Chatter describing the event and ask them to submit the article to the Chatter editor within a few days after the event. This is the responsibility of the host. Failure to do so will result in a delay in publishing our newsletter.
- Advance Notice When preparing flyers, include information regarding rally fees, dates, parking, deposits, activities, potluck dinners, etc. Submit a flyer (sign-up sheet) to the Chatter editor in advance of your event.
- Rally Expenses All rallies should be self-supporting, each
 person paying his share of the expenses. When visitors pay the
 same as members, they feel free to take part. This also prevents
 criticism over treasury funds being used for activities in which all
 members do not participate.
- Suggestions for Making a Successful "First Impression" at a WBCCI Rally
 - a. Have a Greeting Committee to meet arrivals with a . . . "Hi! Glad you're here!" Some may be new owners and new to our program. Make them feel at home. Give each person a name tag, give each RV a program, or if you do not have programs, tell them to check the bulletin board for the schedule of activities.
 - b. Have a hospitality center so that on arrival the greeters can say ... "the coffee is on ... get set up and then come over _____." Have a bulletin board at the hospitality center. Post announcements and program, and perhaps a sign ... "Welcome to the Charter Oak Connecticut Unit, WBCCI."
 - c. Take a snapshot of each family and paste it in the Unit history book. These books are of interest to everyone and should be on display at all Unit rallies.
 - d. Have a Unit guest book and ask everyone to sign it at each rally.
 - e. Award a "gate" prize. One thought . . . number the programs and lucky number gets the prize . . . use some kind of gag.
 - Plan something for the children. It will make a more enjoyable rally for everyone.

- (c) To conduct ourselves so as to inspire others also engaged in recreational vehicle travel to a full appreciation of the intent and meaning of this code.
- (d) To maintain our camps and parking areas in a proper manner and to leave them in a neat and clean condition.

Article IX LIABILITY

Section 1: Neither the Unit nor its officers are responsible for the loss of or damage to properly or for injury to or death of a person on the premises of any club function. This freedom for responsibility for loss or damage to properly applies regardless of whether that properly has been received by any member or officer or left upon the premises.

Article X

AMENDMENTS

Section 1: These Bylaws may be amended at any business meeting of the Executive Board by two-thirds vote, provided the proposed amendment has been submitted to all members of the Executive Board in writing at least ten (10) days prior to such meeting.

Section 2: Such amendments shall become effective upon adoption.

Article XI

DISSOLUTION

Section 1: In the event of dissolution of this Unit, the members shall, through the President, assign all assets to the International Club in accordance with Section 501 (c) (7) of the Internal Revenue Code.

Article XII

MAIL VOTE

Section 1: On International issues, a ballot by mail can be conducted when deemed necessary by the Executive Board. When a vote is to be taken by mail, no other form of voting will be permitted.

These bylaws adopted and effective April 5, 1992 at East Hartford, Connecticut.

- (c) If by a majority vote the Executive Board finds justifiable cause for removal of said officer or director, they will present their findings to the unit membership for a vote of the membership.
- (d) A majority vote of the unit members present and voting at this meeting for removal of said officer or director, will remove said officer or director from office and they will be so notified by certified letter.
- (e) All voting in Section 8 (c) and 8 (d) will be by secret ballot.

Article VI

DELEGATES

Section 1: The Executive Board shall select one delegate and one alternate from among the officers and Regular and Associate members who will attend the annual Delegates meeting of the parent organization, the Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc. Any vacancy occurring following such selection shall be filled by appointment by the President. The delegate and alternate should be instructed respecting the wishes of the Unit on matters to come before the meeting. The President and Secretary shall certify to these selections.

Article VII

DUES

- Section 1: The annual dues of Regular, Associate, and Unit members shall be set by the Executive Board.
- Section 2: If a member fails to pay properly assessed International and Unit dues before November 15 of the year immediately preceding the year for which dues are payable, their names will not appear in the WBCCI Directory. If the dues are not paid and receipted by the Treasurer on or before December 31, membership will be terminated and stricken from the roll.

Article VIII

CODE OF ETHICS

Section 1: All members shall abide by the following Code of Ethics:

- (a) To be ever mindful of our responsibility to the Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc., and through conduct indicate to the public that membership therein is an assurance of courtesy on the road and elsewhere and of goodwill to all peoples and countries.
- (b) To say or print nothing which may reflect unfavorably on others and to dedicate ourselves to the work of cementing together the members of our units and the Club in bonds of friendship, good fellowship, and mutual understanding.

Constitution

Article I

NAME OF ORGANIZATION

Section 1: This organization is a chartered Unit of the Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc., and shall be know as the Charter Oak Connecticut Unit of the Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc.

Article II OBJECTIVES

Section 1: The objectives of this non-profit organization shall be to furnish encouragement and assistance in the development of the Unit and thus afford fraternization for Airstream trailer and motorhome owners; to encourage safe driving and assist in improving the general welfare of the recreational vehicle public through assistance and active participation of all its members in building a strong organization for the betterment of goodwill toward trailer and motorhome travel; to coordinate with and participate in the interests and activities of the International and the Region; to cooperate with other organizations and units within our sphere which are seeking to elevate the standards and ethics of the various groups; to disseminate information of an advisory and educa-tional nature which will be of value to its members and the public; to study, advise and recommend legislation which is in the interest of the trailering and motoring public and oppose all legislation which is discriminatory and injurious to the trailering and motoring public; and to encourage government and private agencies to provide more and better trailer and motorhome parks and facilities.

Article III

MEMBERSHIP QUALIFICATIONS

- Section 1: Membership in the International Club is a prerequisite for membership in the Charter Oak Connecticut Unit.
- Section 2: There are three classes of membership in this Unit: Regular Member, Unit Member, and Associate Member.
- Section 3: To become a Regular Member of the Unit the applicant must apply through and be sponsored by a Regular Member, Unit Member or Associate Member in good standing. The applicant is required to attend one meeting, or be visited by a member of the Membership Committee or by a member appointed by the President for that purpose.
- Section 4: Regular or Associate Members of another unit may become a Unit Member in this Unit by an application to the Membership Committee and upon acceptance shall possess all the rights and privileges of the Unit,

except the right to vote in the selection or election of Unit, Region, or International Officers or on any amendment to the International Constitution including the dissolution or merger of the Unit with any other Unit.

- Section 5: Regular members who become incapacitated may become Associate Members as provided in the Constitution of the International Club, Regular and Associate members of the Unit possess all the rights and privileges of the WBCCI, including full voting rights in all elections and on all questions.
- Section 6: Applicants for membership in this Unit must submit dues and join the International Club simultaneously or show evidence of membership in the International Club through another duly chartered unit.
- Section 7: Dues received from a new member shall entitle such new member to full membership privileges for the same period accorded by WBCCI.
- Section 8: Failure to pay either Unit or International dues will automatically terminate membership in the Unit.
- Section 9: In those cases of multiple ownership of an Airstream trailer or Airstream motorhome the rights and privileges of membership shall be deemed to include the spouses of such owners but collectively such multiple owners shall possess one vote only, except for such co-owners who each pay International and Unit dues to this Unit shall each have one vote.

Article IV

OFFICERS AND THEIR ELECTION

- Section 1: The Officers shall consist of a President, a 1st Vice President, a 2nd Vice President, a Corresponding Secretary, a Recording Secretary, and a Treasurer. Officers shall be only Regular or Associate Members. The Executive Board shall consist of all the Unit Officers plus the Immediate Past President and 4 Directors.
- Section 2: The Officers shall be elected at the annual business meeting and shall be installed and shall assume office at that time and shall serve for a term of one year or until their successor is elected and qualified. No officer shall succeed themself in any office, except the Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, and Treasurer if duly elected and installed. An officer who succeeds to an office pursuant to the provisions of Section 4 of this Article, shall not be deemed as succeeding themself, unless they shall have served in such office for a period greater than six (6) months.

Section 3: The 2nd Vice President shall attend all business meeting so the Unit and the Executive Board and shall assist the President and 1st Vice President and assume the duties of the President and 1st Vice President in their absence, and will perform the duties assigned by the Executive Board.

Section 4: The Corresponding Secretary shall issue notices of all meetings of the Unit and the Executive as prescribed in Article VI, Sections 1 and 2 and Article VIII, Section 2 of the Constitution. The Corresponding Secretary shall prepare an agenda of pending business for use by the presiding officer at each meeting and shall keep a register of all members of the Unit.

Section 5: The Recording Secretary shall record and preserve the minutes of all official meetings of the Unit and the Executive Board; copies of same shall be available to members of the Executive Board not more than infifteen (15) days following each meeting, upon request. The Recording Secretary shall record the attendance of the officers and directors at each meeting and shall advise the presiding officer if a quorum is present.

Section 6: The Treasurer shall maintain the financial records of the Unit and shall receive all moneys and promptly deposit them in the bank previously chosen by the Executive Board; shall notify members of expiration of dues and issue receipts for dues paid; shall submit a full written report of finances to the Executive Board at each meeting and before retirement shall have the books and accounts audited by a committee of not less than three members selected by the incoming President. All books, moneys, and property of the Unit held by the Treasurer shall be delivered promptly to the successor.

Section 7: The duties of the Directors shall be as prescribed in Section 1, Article V, of the Constitution and to attend all meetings of the Unit and the Executive Board; to accept special assignments as directed by the President.

Section 8: Any Unit officer or member of the Board of Directors who without justifiable cause is absent for two consecutive unit meetings or fails to attend a total of nine unit meetings during his term of office will be subject to removal from office.

- (a) Any officer or member of the Board of Directors prior to being removed from office for violation of Section 8 or any other justifiable cause will be given a hearing by the Executive Board with a minimum of seven members present prior to any action being taken.
- (b) The officer or director will be notified by certified letter of the charges, time, and place of hearing at least twenty (20) days prior to the hearing.

Article III

GUESTS

- Section 1: A guest (or guests) sponsored and invited by a member in good standing and sharing that member's facilities may attend activities of the Unit. Members sponsoring such a guest shall pay one extra rally fee exclusive of the parking fee.
- Section 2: The Unit, once each calendar year, may host an invitational rally with a recreational vehicle club not chartered by the Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc., and, it may conduct a "Buddy Rally" to which each unit member may invite not more than one nonmember recreational vehicle family.
- Section 3: Members in good standing of other units affiliated with WBCCI, may attend activities of the Unit provided that such members, and where required, shall have made prior reservation for each attendance.

Article IV

NOMINATING COMMITTEE

Section 1: The Executive Board shall, not less than 90 days prior to the Unit's annual business meeting, appoint a three member Nominating Committee who shall, after having obtained the prior consent of each proposed nominee, place in nomination one candidate for each office and director to be filled by election, and submit a written report to the Executive Board which shall include the names of all candidates considered, and the President shall distribute the report to the membership not less than fifteen (15) days prior to said business meeting. Additional candidates, who have previously consented, may be placed in nomination from the floor of that meeting. No seconds are required for any nomination.

Article V

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

- Section 1: The President shall preside at all meetings of the Unit and Executive board, enforce the Constitution and Bylaws, appoint all standing committees and have such powers and duties as normally pentain to the principal executive officer.
- Section 2: The 1st Vice President shall attend all business meetings of the Unit and the Executive Board and shall assist the President and assume the duties of the President, when absent.

- Section 3: The Directors shall be elected at the annual business meeting, each for a term of two years commencing at installation but arranged so that only one-half such directors' terms expire in any one year. No director shall serve more than one two-year term consecutively.
- Section 4: In the event of the death, advancement or resignation of the President or a Vice President, or in their ability to fulfill their duties of office, the next ranking Vice President (in the order First, Second) shall succeed thereto. All other vacancies on the Executive Board, except that of Immediate Past President, shall be filled by a majority vote of the Board.

Article V

EXECUTIVE BOARD

- Section 1: The Executive Board shall be the administrative body of the Unit and shall define the policies of and have full administrative authority in all matters pertaining to the Unit, and shall exercise general control and supervision of all officers and committees.
- Section 2: A quorum of the Executive Board shall consist of a majority of the members.

Article VI

BUSINESS MEETINGS

- Section 1: The annual business meeting of the members of this organization shall be held during the month of November in each calendar year. Such a meeting shall be announced by written notice and delivered to the members not less than fifteen (15) days prior to the meeting. The notice shall indicate the date, time, and location of the meeting. A quorum for conducting business at the annual meeting, or at any additional business meeting, shall not be less than ten (10) percent of members.
- Section 2: Additional business meetings of the members may be held at a suitable time and place during the second day of each rally of the members. If the rally or meeting is of less than two days duration, written notice to the members indicating the time, location, and purpose of such meeting shall be delivered to the members not less than ten (10) days prior to the meeting.
- Section 3: The Executive Board, by majority vote, may call additional business meetings of the members.
- Section 4: The President or any two members of the Board may call a business meeting of the Executive Board at any time deemed necessary.

Section 5: All Regular, Associate, and Unit Members voting at the annual or additional business meetings of this Unit, and each such membership, identified by the International Club Membership number, shall be considered one vote, except for co-owners who each pay International and Unit Dues to this Unit as provided for in Article III, Section 9.

Article VII

BYLAWS

Section 1: Bylaws not inconsistent with this Constitution, and with the Constitution, Bylaws and Policy of the Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc., embodying additional provisions for the government of the Unit may be adopted by the Executive Board.

Article VIII

AMENDMENTS

- Section 1: Proposed amendments to this Constitution shall be submitted to the Executive Board in writing. The Executive Board shall submit all such amendments to the members for their consideration.
- Section 2: Any Article or Section of this Constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the Regular Members present and voting at a business meeting of the Unit or a special meeting called for that purpose, providing in either case, a notice containing the proposed amendment or amendments has been mailed first-class to each member of the Unit at least fifteen (15) days prior to such a meeting.
- Section 3: All amendments to this Constitution shall become effective upon adoption.

This Constitution adopted and effective May 8, 1993 at Townsend, Vermont.

Bylaws

Article I

ORDER OF BUSINESS

Section 1: Parliamentary procedures for all meetings of the Unit and Executive Board shall be governed by the current edition of Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised except when they are in conflict with the Constitution or Bylaws of this Club.

Section 2: The order of business shall be:

- 1. Pledge of Allegiance
- 2. Roll call of Executive Board and determination of quorum
- 3. Reading of minutes of previous meeting
- 4. Treasurer's report
- 5. Reading of correspondence
- 6. Report of committee chairpersons
- 7. Unfinished business
- 8. New business
- 9. Announcements
- Adjournment

Article II

COMMITTEES

Section 1: Standing Committees shall comprise:

- 1. Constitution and Bylaws
- Ethics and Grievances
- 3. Hospitality
- Legislative
- 5. Membership 6. Program
- 7. Publicity

All Standing Committees shall consist of a chairperson and of as many members as deemed necessary by the President. Chairpersons of Standing Committees shall report to the Executive Board, at the call of the President.

Section 2: Special committees may be appointed by the President as required.
