Rally Site Remembered

"Many of you will remember the stone formations on Jack Cable's property from Charter Oak's Blueberry Rallies in early August of 1992, 1994, and 1996. The following article appeared in many newspapers. This one is from the Hartford Courant."—Dick Bartram

Massive Stones On Farm In Berkshires Defy Attempts to Unlock Their Puzzle

HEATH, Mass. — They have fascinated generations and now the New England Antiquities Research Association is trying to solve the puzzle of the standing stones atop Burnt Hill.

All told, 15 to 30 stones, some weighing 300 to 500 pounds, stand on end on the barren 1,855-foot-high knoll in the state's wild northwest corner.

Some say that writer H. P. Lovecraft was among those to fall under their spell.

According to local legend, the master of New England tales of the supernatural used the Heath stones for the opening lines of his story "The Dunwitch Horror." "Oldest of all are the gatherings on tough-hewn stone columns on the hilltops . . ."

Some point toward Mount Greylock and the other high peaks of the Berkshires and the Green Mountains of Vermont.

Others appear to mark the spot where the sun rises on the summer solstice and sets on the winter solstice, according to Colgate Gilbert, who heads the society's three-year, \$3,000 study begun this fall.

The purpose of the others remains wreathed in mystery. And no one knows who placed the standing stones on John Cable's 200-acre blueberry farm or why.

"I haven't a clue," Gilbert said. "We don't have enough information to know exactly what this is."

"We didn't anticipate that the site would be as complex as it is," he said. "We expected it to be very straightforward and very clear, with some tie to historical background."


Still, the stone patterns that radiate from a locus of five stones on the southeast corner of the knoll don't appear to fit into any of the historical boundaries of the property or just about anything else we could think of," Gilbert said.

As part of its research, the 350-member association is reviewing old deeds and pouring over the journals of military officers stationed at nearby forts during the French and Indian War.

A trail leading from Fort Shirley to Fort Taylor passed through the site, and presumably journals kept by the officers would have mentioned the site, Gilbert said.

Caleb said he wasn't aware of the stones when he bought the property in 1966. He calls it guesswork, but he suspects they predate white settlements. Burnt Hill is believed to have gotten its name from the fires set by Indians to encourage the growth of blueberries.

"Standing stones are fairly rare throughout New England," Gilbert said. "It's one of the reasons we're fascinated."

Pear Crisp with Yogurt Sauce

Filling

- 6 bosc, anjou, comice or nelis pears, washed, cored, and sliced (peeled or unpeeled)
- 2 tablespoons freshly squeezed lemon iuice
- 1 tablespoon freshly squeezed orange juice
- 1 teaspoon orange zest
- 1/2 cup light or dark brown sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon freshly ground nutmeg

Topping:

- 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
- 11 tablespoon canola oil or butter
- 2 tablespoons apple or orange juice
- 1/4 cup oat bran
- 1/4 cup old fashioned rolled oats
- 1/2 cup fat-free or low-fat granola
- 2 tablespoons flour
- 2 tablespoons brown sugar

Yogurt Sauce:

- 1 cup plain nonfat yogurt, drained 15 minutes
- 3 to 4 tablespoons maple syrup or white corn syrup
- 1/4 teaspoon maple extract
- 1/2 teaspoon orange zest
- 1/4 cup sifted confectioner's sugar

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees (or microwave). Lightly spray an 8 by 8-inch glass (if microwaving) baking or pie dish with no-stick vegetable oil spray, and place the sliced pears in the dish. Sprinkle on the lemon juice, orange juice, zest, brown sugar, and nutmeg.

In a small, nonstick saucepan, add the cinnamon, oil or butter and cook, stirring over medium heat for 1 minute until hot (or when the butter is melted). Add the oat bran, rolled oats, granola, flour, brown sugar, and cook, stirring continually, on medium heat, about 3 minutes. Spoon the mixture over the pears, lightly spray the mixture with no-stick vegetable oil spray, and bake in the microwave for 20 minutes on high, or in the oven for 45 minutes. Check to be sure pears are tender but not mushy. Remove and let the pears cool to room temperature.

For the sauce: in a small bowl, whisk together the drained yogurt, syrup, maple extract, orange zest, and confectioner's sugar. Drizzle onto the plate and with a wide spatula, place the pear crisp on the sauce. Serves 8

Thursday supposedly was a free day, but a caucus was planned for 8:30 A.M. to be attended by all Region Officers.

All Region First Ladies and International Officer's ladies were

invited to be the guest of our First Lady at a luncheon to be held at a beautiful plantation home. Fortunately I was invited rather than Ken who usually receives the honors. It was truly a privilege to be entertained in this home and only came about due to the fact Dannie Kelly's (Region 6 Past First Lady) daughter married into the family of the plantation owner.

Friday, with its colors of Red, White and Blue, dawned in its usual glory of rain and more rain,

It was Board Meeting day and the reason for being here.
All committee reports had been read and reviewed during
the seminar thus little to add:

Linda Amme gave an update on the baby from Huntsville. The baby had rejected the first liver transplant and was now the recipient of a second one, but there were no results as of this writing. Linda reported that many regions had picked up the "Cents for Sense" project and hoped more would do so. Apparently other regions felt as did Region I, this was a project that must be continued wherever International might be..

The Blue Beret Committee had a questionnaire as part of their report. The result of the survey will indicate whatever changes might be forthcoming in the Blue Beret.

The Budget Committee reported the budget of the Club to be right on target, and financially sound in every way, as indicated in the December 31, 1997 Financial Statements.

The Legislative Committee asked that more attention be paid to legislation in the individual states where RV's are concerned. More information was given with regard to the increase in the National Park fees. They also advised that more information is needed on RV's and towed vehicles in Canada. The key note speaker this year at International will address these issues.

Lifetime members have increased to 772. The 1997 additions are a result of Airstream's Lifetime membership offer in the Spring of 1997.

The Membership Committee showed us the draft cut of the WBCCI Huntsville 1997 promotional film, as produced by Road Trip Productions of Portland, Oregon.. The length is approximately fifteen minutes. The Committee asked and received several comments with regard to additions, deletions and/or modifications. Hopefully, the final draft will be available at

The Public Relations Committee did an outstanding job insofar as TV and Radio coverage at Baton Rouge, and if this is an indication of what will happen at Boise we will have more than our share of publicity.

The Special Committee on RV Parks did what one would have deemed to be impossible. They have an entire section in the new Directory dedicated to RV parks willing to give a discount to WBCCI members.

The Executive Director, Dave Reed, handed out copies of the new brochure which will be a part of the February issue of the Blue Beret. The brochure was exceedingly well done, and certainly addresses the concerns of all who did not feel we had an adequate tool for recruiting new members. It provided a 1998 Rally and Caravan schedule as well as serving as a membership recruitment tool.

In addition, Dave made note of the fact that the new Directory listed all officers of the units in all cases where the information was available. NOTE: These two items were presented by Region I in the form of motions at the July 5, 1997 IBT. They were withdrawn inasmuch as assurance was received that both items would be addressed by this IBT meeting. There was complete satisfaction by one and all.

Dave also made a point of the fact that even though the December, 1997 membership figures has decreased it has done so to a lesser degree than previous years. Consideration is being given to a Membership Card in conjunction with out dues receipt. The WBCCI Webb site is functioning well and to date fifteen applications have been received via this medium.

The Dayton contract for the 1999 International Rally has been signed. To date the 1997 Huntsville International Rally shows a profit of \$3,375.05. The Boise registrations to date is over 1,800.

In conclusion, Dave reported that the Multi-Year dues program has caused undue confusion among Treasurers, and has generated a significant increase in the workload at Head-quarters in both the administration and interpretation. He requested that the program be discontinued. Region I became his advocate.

Several motions that overlapped the recommendations of the Task Force were withdrawn during Seminar. The Special Task Force Committee, headed by Laurie Stephen, brought forth and were given direction, via a motion that passed unanimously, to proceed on several issues. 1.) Down sizing the Board of Trustees both on the International level as well as the Region level; 2.) Restructure the Regions by decreasing the number, modification as to the Region Officer's duties and obligations, and thoroughly investigate what is most feasible taking into consideration distance and population; 3.) Consider what is best for WBCCI overall with regard to the length of term for the Region Officers; 4.) Investigate the feasibility of a permanent International Rally Committee.

The Task Force has been given the directive to present something definitive at the June IBT Meeting.

It should also be reported that there was a great deal of discussion with regard to the possible availability of 30 amp electricity at International. The discussion was directed towards the cost to be offset by those who wished the convenience. Our President, Charles Duran, had complete figures as to the cost involved if we had this convenience available at Boise. Craig Lundberg likewise had cost figures available. The additional cost for those who desired 30 amp electricity at either of these sites would be from an additional \$200 - \$300 on the rally fee. The cost just to bring the necessary lines to the rally site were more than prohibitive - from \$175,000 upward.

Motions that were brought forward are as follows:

- Unit Dissolution Amendment, Appendix #6 Bylaws provides direction and guidance on the procedures to be followed by a Unit. Passed unanimously.
- Statement as to the Month, Day and Year and Town, State or Province that the Unit Bylaws were last amended and the amendments as adopted became effective. Passed unanimously.
- Multi-Year due program discontinued in its entirety.Passed 17 to 1.
 - 4. Task Force Recommendations Passed unanimously.
- Classic Airstream Trailer Intra-Club Failed: 14 Against, 3 For, 1 Abstained.
- International Rally Dates: Asked that the International Rally Committee be encouraged to hold the International Rally within the dates of June 30 and July 7 where feasible and practical. Passed 15 For, 2 Against, 1 Abstained.
- 7. Voting for Regional Officers. Change the Unit method of voting to correspond with the method being used by the Delegates at International with regard to the International Officers, namely each Unit President shall be entitled to vote the strength of the unit by percentage votes.

Failed: 14 Against, 4 For.

- Associate Members as Unit Officers: Failed 17 Against,For.
 - 9. Georgia Unit Flag Approval: Passed Unanimously.
 - 10.Penn-Lehigh Unit Flag Approval: Passed Unanimously.

As you will readily acknowledge the week was one of discussion, analysis, action and decision.

It mattered not that the sun decided not to favor us. It mattered not that the skies opened for the daily downpour and even more so during the sleeping hours. The week became one of work, good food and loads of fun and laughter. The planned events were all in the Cajun mode which is fun, fun and more fun. Friday's eve final banquet was no exception, with good food, and entertainment by the Region 6 Officers, the Friday work group and a well known Cajun Story Teller.

It should be noted that the Committee had planned work groups for each day, under the leadership of individual Region 6 Units. Every one in attendance at the Rally was assigned to a work group and the work groups were a mix from all Regions. What a fim way to get to work and know others.

There has been an increase in the showing of Airstream products in various advertisement on TV. Larry feels there has been an improvement in addition to the enlarged coverage. Over a 3 months time frame Taco Bell will have an Airstream pictured on their place mats. Airstream has become involved with Architectural Digest of California, and are looking forward to results. At present there is a limit on the Diesel Pusher Motors, and Airstream has a Motor Home chassis timetable, which they are working to resolve.

Thor continues to make changes that will make the company more profitable. At the present time they have a pending approval for the purchase of Champion Bus. Airstream itself is looking into a possible B-Van manufacturer.

Larry advised that many states have laws regarding dealers, i.e. in 1999 all dealers in Ohio must have a valid dealers license. State laws in Texas and Wisconsin prohibit dealers that do not have a license, and some states prohibit dealers who are not specifically invited.

Airstream Company is not on the Internet at this time but steps are being taken to do so soon.

Larry advised that there are several changes at the factory inasmuch as they have senior people who are retiring. They have hired a man who was formerly with Avion and Fleetwood who brings a great deal of know-how and experience to the plant. Sharon Rhodes has been newly hired for the Service Area. She has proceeded to modernize and update the Service Area, and Larry stated that she, being a woman, has seen many necessary changes that would normally be overlooked.

He reported that Bill VanHorn has improved to 80% of his former capacity, and is looking into the possibility of being a Caravaner.

Larry informed that there are 142 brands of RVs, 7 manufacturers in control and the Airstream Company has 8% of the market being served.





In Search of Colorful Language


One of the greatest pleasures in traveling with our Airstream is the opportunity it provides to hear picturesque language. A few years ago, for instance, on our southward journey to Florida, we stopped for ice cream in a small town in North Carolina. It was an unusually warm mid-February day; the mature woman who dished out our cones grumbled about being at work. "I ought to be to home plantin' my field peas," she complained. "Usually they're in by now!" Odd speech to New England ears, accustomed as we are to listening to cold winds howling in February.

Last May we drove down the East Coast on a trip which Russell designed and named "Following the Flowers." Our itinerary listed gardens in the Carolinas and Virginia which we would visit. One day we became hopelessly lost in the vicinity of Virginia City. A kind woman came to our rescue and led us to a ferry slip. While we waited for the ferry which would take us from Knotts Island to Currituck, our guide, Azalea, leaned on the car door and talked about the area. She told us that the town of Rodanthe, where we were planning to stay overnight, had the smallest post office in the country. A few years ago the decision was made to tear it down, but said Azalea, the natives had a "hissy fit" and organized to save it. I was delighted to hear such a colorful expression, new to me.

This February we drove for a day in rural South Carolina. We wanted to visit Blackwell Mills in Johnsonville, where our favorite yellow grits are ground. After traveling over miles and miles of back-country roads, we stopped in Hemingway and went to a diner-like place called The Sharecropper for lunch. We each had collards with various meats from the buffet. The menu listed "Chicken Bog." To me, a BOG is a swampy area, but it turns out that chicken bog is chicken cooked with rice and chopped peppers and onions. What's in a name? Somehow it doesn't sound appetizing.

We had an interesting visit to the Mill, which is run by one machine operator, one boss, and one truck driver. On our return trip to the campground, we patronized a supermarket, where I paid with a credit card. Since it is an unfamiliar process, I asked the cashier for help. She instructed me to run the card through the machine and then "Mash that button there." I was overjoyed with her use of the word "mash." Friends told me it is a common expression in the South, but I never heard it again. Better luck next time!





After several weeks' labor of love, they thought it was time to let others see what had been accomplished with their recently purchased 1975 Airstream trailer. It was an impressive sight; which caused this viewer to paraphrase an old saying that older trailers never die especially when they fall into the hands of dedicated people. Years of abuse and neglect are now a thing of the past because the Burnhams spent the winter months restoring and replacing any number of parts.

They plan to be at the Hammonasset Rally and will have open house to all who wish to view their handiwork.

Jim also offered to bring his new gauge and check propane pressure on trailers.

Do yourself a favor and respond to both of these invitations. One will be a feast for your eyes while the other will set your mind at rest on this important safety measure.

Wanted . . . A Little Illumination

Four of the fluorescent lights in my 25-foot Airstream were inoperative when I bought my trailer. This led me to try reverse engineering these lamps to see if they could be repaired. The circuit is a single transistor transformer coupled oscillator with the two lamps driven in series. There is no ballast or other similarity to a 60 Hz florescent. The transistors failed. So far a suitable fix of these lamps has eluded me.

The challenge of finding a solution has been dulled, because halogen dome lights sold by West Marine came to my attention. These lamps come in two sizes: 5 1/2 inches and 7 inches diameter. They draw a little more current than the fluorescents, are at least as bright and the bulbs cost considerably less. The bulbs are 20 watt 12 volt halogens. I have replaced the five failed fluorescents (one more failed) and the two incandescents over the gaucho with these lamps. While I can't specify the relative light in lumens, reading is more comfortable with the new lamps.

The West Marine part numbers are 298168 for the 5 1/2 inch model and 298150 for the 7 inch. My 1997 catalog shows them costing \$12.99 and \$13.99 respectively.





We put what food we thought was needed in a cooler and put it out on the deck. We got out the candles, flash lights, oil lamps, Coleman stove and the percolator. Filled the wood box and the kerosene heater. The heater was put in the cellar so the pipes wouldn't freeze. The wood stove going in the kitchen kept it real cozy. The gas stove in the Airstream came in handy for good meals.

Our neighbors Martha & Carl Henrickson, were our sanity and we became best of friends. We got together every morning after breakfast to talk over the day and plan our meals for lunch and supper. We shared our food and ate together every day. We ate well. After the sun or daylight went down, we put the oil lamps around and played cards until it was time to turn in and hopefully get a good night's sleep. The third night into the storm, we decided the safest place to sleep would be in the basement — just in case a tree came down. The ice was so heavy on the trees that we soon knew after the crackle sound of the ice, that a tree was about to land — hopefully on the ground.


I was sitting in front of the sliding door, just for a little breather, when I heard the crackle and ran to the window where the noise was coming from and watched a tree over at my father's place fall, just missing his boat. I also witnessed two more trees of his come down, falling in the right places. Others weren't as lucky.

Our place made out good with no damage but a lot of heavy bangs on the roof. One was so loud I bolted to the basement. Claire had moved our car over to the Inlet Restaurant and walked in with a hard hat on. A large limb did come down where the car would have been. One limb fell across the truck which pulled the wire with it that was attached to Carl's house. A small branch went through our shed roof. Many neighbors had trees fall that did go through their roofs.

Claire received word that there was a need for help at Bonny Eagle School that was turned into a shelter. We both would go over during any hours that the help was needed to get meals ready. The first few days they fed 150 people. It was a good feeling to help and know a hot meal would be there for those less fortunate.

We ventured out a few days later bound or Scarboro to take a nice warm shower and to do the laundry. As wires were down on Route 25, almost in Standish Center, we had a detour to make to get to Scarboro. On our way home we took advantage of lunch at a restaurant and really enjoyed being waited on and really got to relax. When reaching Standish a detour took us through Oak Hill then onto Job Road to get home. What a beautiful sight. The trees were filled with so much ice they bent across the road giving only a path for one way. Others were down and laid at the edge of the road. On Job Road we had to go under a few branches to get through. What a sight!







Many programs at the International permit taping, but some do not want videos taken. Almost without exception all PROFESSIONAL PROGRAMS will not permit their program to be taped. If you want to tape a program, check with the Entertainment Receptionist Chairman and get their permission ahead of time and avoid any embarrassment.



member volunteer band.


"We always try to leave a community in better condition than we found it," said Wayne Fluitt, rally spokesman.

Rally-goers have turned rooms on the Boise State University campus into a workshop, designing stocking caps for the needy.

Blue, red and yellow scraps of Polar fleece donated by Malding Mills lie scattered on the floor where rally workers cut out cap pieces using cardboard patterns. They stuff the pieces into kits that others take back to their trailers and put together on their sewing machines.

Club members have strung crocheted caps from the staircase in the Student Union Building, which has been taken over by caravaners. Mittens and scarves made out of left-over scraps line tables in the ballroom.

Caravaners hope to distribute 7,000 hats to churches.



Ronald McDonald House.

Others have taken their string ensemble band and pets into nursing homes to entertain the residents.

They've presented lap robes to senior citizens, put on an educational program for kids in day-care and read books for the local mobile book

They plan to contribute the collection they take at today's church service to community charities. And they've collected a quarter-million aluminum pull-tabs to donate to the Ronald McDonald House.

Likewise, the 150 kids and grandkids accompanying their elders to the rally have collected more than \$1,000 worth of pennies that they plan to give to Julianne Prudhomme. Prudhomme, a 5-year-old Caldwell girl, received a rare five-organ transplant 16 months ago.

They also are busy collecting and dressing a couple hundred teddy bears that they plan to give to police and firefighters to give to children who have been involved in accidents or trauma cases.

"In the process, the kids develop friends all over the country," said Linda Amme, of Pittsgrove, N.J. "Not only do they learn geography and history by participating in the rally but they also learn about the needs many people face."





Region 1 President Wayne Rutty then spoke of the game plan for Saturday. There were three discussion groups led by region officers -- President Wayne Rutty, 1st Vice President Dick Bartram and 2nd Vice President Anne Werth. Folks were assembled in different areas to progress through a series of questions regarding membership recruiting in the morning with a regroup to discuss the three groups' ideas before a break for lunch. Harvest Moon Egg Bake

1 pkg. Precooked Bacon (crumbled) 8 oz. (2 cups) Shredded Cheddar Cheese

10 Eggs

10 oz. Frozen Shredded Hash Browns 1/2 pint Half & Half 1/4 cup Chopped Onion 1/4 cup Green Bell Pepper (chopped)

Salt and Pepper to Taste

Night before: Spray 9x13x2 pan or dish, line bottom with hash browns — crack eggs on top and break yolks (don't scramble) - salt & pepper. Spread 1/2 of cheese on next. Pour half and half over mixture in pan. Sprinkle onion, green pepper and bacon and top with remaining cheese. Cover and refrigerate overnight. Warm Hats for Children . . . A Simple Crochet Pattern

Using "H" Hook, chain 40 stitches. At the end of row, return down row using single crochet. At end of row, chain one and turn work. In the back stitch, and all the way down row, single crochet to the end . . . will become stretchy, like an accordion. Chain one (1) and turn work. Note: Always work in back stitch.

Continue this pattern until the piece becomes about 18 inches long. Different colors can be used to make stripes, make sure the joining yarn is at the end where your yarn tail begins since the other side will be the brim and you want no long yarn tails hanging out.

When the desired width is reached, start at the end where the brim will be and join the two sides together by single crocheting down to the end. Cut off yarn to about 10 inches. Using large-eyed needle, thread yarn and weave yarn in and out of the top and draw hole tightly. Anchor and knot.

At this point turn your work and fold the brim up. You are now done or you can make a pompom. Wrap colors used in your hat around three fingers, tie in center, and knot. Cut the loops apart, trim if necessary. Thread tie yarn, one at a time and feed to inside near top joined part. Repeat with other tie yarn. Once both yarns are inside, make a knot and then a double bow. Turn to outside and admire your work.

Single colors are the easiest. Stripes are a way to use small balls of yarn. Baby yarn can be doubled, tow colors for a nice soft version. To make a baby size, use less than an 18" finished size. Keep folding it in half to see if it would fit a baby's head and proceed a above. Have fun and make warm hats for children.





- Rally Parking Park rally hosts together. These are the people who are responsible for the success of the rally. Be sure everyone knows where to locate officers and hosts.
- 6. Meetings Wally patterned "Meeting Time" after the old town hall meetings. Meetings may be strictly social or a combined social and business meeting. Meetings give everyone an opportunity to get together. Meetings provide a time to get acquainted, to exchange ideas, to discuss objectives and accomplishments. This is a time to take part and a time to recognize individual contributions. The sidewalk cafe meeting is always fun. Members bring their refreshments and sit around and talk about what has been done or seen, trips made, etc. This usually takes place about 4:30 in the afternoon.

If a business meeting or a combined business meeting and social meeting is planned, notice should be posted. Everyone will make an extra effort to get back from sight-seeing or shopping.

- Bulletin Board Place a bulletin board in a central location (the hospitality RV is often used) as a center of activities for announcements and program news. If you have a printed program, post one on the board. Keep everyone informed about what is going on.
- Church Services Post notices of local church services on the bulletin board.
- 9. Head Table Arranging the head table and the seating of guests depends upon the size of the table and the number to be seated. If possible, your own officers and their spouses should be seated at the head table. If there isn't room for the spouses, they should be placed as near the head table as possible. The President should sit in the center position. Visiting VIPs and International officers would normally be seated at the head table. A special table for officers, past and present, may be arranged. If you have overlooked someone who might reasonably expect to sit at the head table, ask them to stand and be acknowledged. This helps to overcome what could be an embarrassing situation.

Guidelines for Rallies & Meetings

- Chatter Article Appoint someone in advance to write a news article for the Chatter describing the event and ask them to submit the article to the Chatter editor within a few days after the event. This is the responsibility of the host. Failure to do so will result in a delay in publishing our newsletter.
- Advance Notice When preparing flyers, include information regarding rally fees, dates, parking, deposits, activities, potluck dinners, etc. Submit a flyer (sign-up sheet) to the Chatter editor in advance of your event.
- Rally Expenses All rallies should be self-supporting, each
 person paying his share of the expenses. When visitors pay the
 same as members, they feel free to take part. This also prevents
 criticism over treasury funds being used for activities in which all
 members do not participate.
- Suggestions for Making a Successful "First Impression" at a WBCCI Rally
 - a. Have a Greeting Committee to meet arrivals with a . . . "Hi! Glad you're here!" Some may be new owners and new to our program. Make them feel at home. Give each person a name tag, give each RV a program, or if you do not have programs, tell them to check the bulletin board for the schedule of activities.
 - b. Have a hospitality center so that on arrival the greeters can say ... "the coffee is on ... get set up and then come over _____." Have a bulletin board at the hospitality center. Post announcements and program, and perhaps a sign ... "Welcome to the Charter Oak Connecticut Unit, WBCCI."
 - Take a snapshot of each family and paste it in the Unit history book. These books are of interest to everyone and should be on display at all Unit rallies.
 - d. Have a Unit guest book and ask everyone to sign it at each rally.
 - e. Award a "gate" prize. One thought . . . number the programs and lucky number gets the prize . . . use some kind of gag.
 - Plan something for the children. It will make a more enjoyable rally for everyone.

Article IX

This procedure is in accordance with the meaning of Section 501 (c) (7) of the Internal Revenue Service Code. None of the funds shall enure to the benefit of any member and the Unit Charter and all International club property shall be returned to International Club Headquarters.

Article VI

DELEGATES

Section 1: The Executive Board shall select one delegate and one alternate from among the officers and Regular and Associate members who will attend the annual Delegates meeting of the parent organization, the Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc. Any vacancy occurring following such selection shall be filled by appointment by the President. The delegate and alternate should be instructed respecting the wishes of the Unit on matters to come before the meeting. The President and Secretary shall certify to these selections.

Article VII

DUES

Section 1: The annual dues of Regular and Affiliate members shall be set by the Executive Board.

Section 2: A member who fails to pay properly assessed International and Unit dues before November 15 may not be listed in the Annual Membership Directory of the International Club for the following year. If the dues are not paid and receipted by the Treasurer on or before December 31, membership will be terminated.

Article VIII

CODE OF ETHICS

Section 1: All members shall abide by the following Code of Ethics:

- (a) To be ever mindful of our responsibility to the Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc., and through conduct indicate to the public that membership in this organization is an assurance of courtesy on the road and of goodwill to all peoples and countries.
- (b) To say or print nothing which may reflect unfavorably on others and to dedicate ourselves to the work of cementing together the members of our units and the Club in bonds of friendship, good fellowship, and mutual understanding.
- (c) To conduct ourselves so as to inspire others also engaged in recreational vehicle travel to a full appreciation of the intent and meaning of this code.
- To maintain our camps and parking areas in an orderly manner and to leave them in a neat and clean condition.

Article V

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

- Section 1: The President shall preside at all meetings of the Unit and Executive board, enforce the Constitution and Bylaws, appoint all standing committees and have such powers and duties as normally pertain to the principal executive officer.
- Section 2: The 1st Vice President shall attend all business meetings of the Unit and the Executive Board and shall assist the President and assume the duties of the President, when absent.
- Section 3: The 2nd Vice President shall attend all business meeting so the Unit and the Executive Board and shall assist the President and 1st Vice President and assume the duties of the President and 1st Vice President in their absence, and will perform the duties assigned by the Executive Board.
- Section 4: The Corresponding Secretary shall issue notices of all meetings of the Unit and the Executive as prescribed in Article VI, Sections 1 and 2 and Article VIII, Section 2 of the Constitution. The Corresponding Secretary shall prepare an agenda of pending business for use by the presiding officer at each meeting and shall keep a register of all members of the Unit.
- Section 5: The Recording Secretary shall record and preserve the minutes of all official meetings of the Unit and the Executive Board; copies of same shall be available to members of the Executive Board not more than fifteen (15) days following each meeting, upon request. The Recording Secretary shall record the attendance of the officers and directors at each meeting and shall advise the presiding officer if a quorum is present.
- Section 6: The Treasurer shall maintain the financial records of the Unit and shall receive all moneys and promptly deposit them in the bank previously chosen by the Executive Board; shall notify members of expiration of dues and issue receipts for dues paid; shall submit a full written report of finances to the Executive Board at each meeting and before retirement shall have the books and accounts audited by a committee of not less than three members selected by the incoming President. All books, monies, and property of the Unit held by the Treasurer shall be delivered promptly to the successor.
- Section 7: The duties of the Directors shall be as prescribed in Section 1, Article V, of the Constitution and to attend all meetings of the Unit and the Executive Board; to accept special assignments as directed by the President.

Section 3: Special committees may be appointed by the President as required.

Article III

GUESTS

Section 1: A guest (or guests) sponsored and invited by a member in good standing and sharing that member's facilities may attend activities of the Unit. Members sponsoring such a guest shall pay one extra rally fee exclusive of the parking fee.

Section 2: A member in good standing in this Unit may sponsor and invite a prospective member to attend activities of the Unit.

Section 3: Members in good standing in the International Club may attend activities of the Unit provided that such members, and where required, shall have made prior reservation for each attendance.

Section 4: The Unit, once each calendar year, may host a rally, caravan or combination thereof with a recreational vehicle club not chartered by the Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc., and, it may conduct twice each calendar year, a Buddy Rally or a Buddy Caravan or combination thereof to which each member may invite not more than one nonmember recreational vehicle family.

Article IV

NOMINATING COMMITTEE

Section 1: The Executive Board shall, not less than 90 days prior to the Unit's annual business meeting, appoint a three member Nominating Committee who shall, after having obtained the prior consent of each proposed nominee, place in nomination one candidate for each office and director to be filled by election, and submit a written report to the Executive Board which shall include the names of all candidates considered, and the President shall distribute the report to the membership not less than fifteen (15) days prior to said business meeting. Additional candidates, who have previously consented, may be placed in nomination from the floor of that meeting. No seconds are required for any nomination.

Standing Committees General Duties

- Budget In cooperation with the incoming and outgoing Treasurer of the Unit, prepare for the Executive Board a budget projecting the unit's income and expenditures for the calendar (or fiscal) year next ensuing.
- Caravan To plan, organize, and obtain leaders for unit caravans that are operated or conducted for the Unit within the scope of the WBCCI Caravan Handbook. To develop an aggressive Unit Caravan program and to coordinate unit caravan matters with appropriate Region and International Caravan Committee personnel.
- Constitution and Bylaws To conduct a continuing review and study of the Unit and the International Constitution and Bylaws and to make recommendations for any amendments or additions deemed desirable and in the best interest of the Club.
- Ethics and Grievance To investigate and assess all grievances or complaints made by members and others and to make recommendations thereon to the Unit Executive Board.
- Family/Youth Plan programs to encourage participation of family/ youth at unit functions and to be the liaison person between the Unit and International Family/Youth Standing Committee.
- Historical To record events including written and pictorial material associated with unit activities and to maintain a historical record of such.
- Hospitality To receive and make welcome guests and new members at club functions. Recommend ways to meet and greet all club members and guests at rallies and/or seasonal functions.
- Legislative To study, advise and recommend legislation in the interest of the Club and its members; to recommend opposition to all legislation which is discriminatory and injurious to the interest of the Club and its members.
- Membership be the Unit/Club contact for prospective new members and explain the purpose and objectives of the Wally Byam Caravan Club International. Extend invitations to prospective members to attend a rally or meeting when making application for membership.
- Publicity To collect newsworthy items of interest to club members and to publish monthly a newsletter containing past and future events of the Unit, Region and International. To publish yearly a roster in the

Article I

ORDER OF BUSINESS

Section 1: Parliamentary procedures for all meetings of the Unit and Executive Board shall be governed by the current edition of Roben's Rules of Order Newly Revised except when they are in conflict with the Constitution or Bylaws of this Club.

Section 2: The order of business shall be:

- Pledge of Allegiance
- Roll call of Executive Board and determination of quorum
- Reading of minutes of previous meeting
- Treasurer's report
- Reading of correspondence Report of committee chairpersons
- Unfinished business
- New business
- Announcements
- Adjournment

Article II

COMMITTEES

Section 1: Standing Committees shall be:

- A. Budget
- B. Caravan
- Constitution and Bylaws
- Ethics and Grievances
- Family/Youth
- Historical
- Hospitality G.
- Legislative H.
- Membership Publicity
- K. Public Relations
- The President shall appoint and be an ex-officio member of all committees except the Nominating Committee.

Section 2: All Standing Committees shall consist of a Chairperson and as many members as deemed necessary by the President. Chairpersons of Standing Committees shall report at each meeting of the Executive Board.

- Section 4: The President or any two members of the Board may call a business meeting of the Executive Board at any time deemed necessary
- Section 5: All Regular, Associate, and Unit Members voting at the annual or additional business meetings of this Unit, and each such membership, identified by the International Club Membership number, shall be considered one vote, except for co-owners who each pay International and Unit Dues to this Unit as provided for in Article III, Section 9.
- Section 6: A mail ballot may be used to obtain the vote of the members of the Unit on a proposal when such is deemed desirable or necessary. When a mail ballot is used to obtain the vote of the member of the Unit on a proposal, no other method of voting on such a proposal shall be utilized.

Article VII BYLAWS

Section 1: Bylaws not inconsistent with this Constitution, and with the Constitution, Bylaws and Policy of the Wally Byam Caravan Club

International, Inc., embodying additional provisions for the government of the Unit may be adopted by the Executive Board.

Article VIII

AMENDMENTS

- Section 1: Proposed amendments to this Constitution shall be submitted to the Executive Board in writing. The Executive Board shall submit all such amendments to the members for their consideration.
- Section 2: Any Article or Section of this Constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the Regular Members present and voting at a business meeting of the Unit or a special meeting called for that purpose, providing in either case, a notice containing the proposed amendment or amendments has been mailed first-class to each member of the Unit at least fifteen (15) days prior to such a meeting.
- Section 3: All amendments to this Constitution shall become effective upon adoption.
- This Constitution adopted and effective May 3, 1997 at Lakeville, Massachusetts.

Constitution

Article I

NAME OF ORGANIZATION

Section 1: This organization is a chartered Unit of the Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc., and shall be know as the Charter Oak Connecticut Unit of the Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc.

Article II

OBJECTIVES

Section 1: The objectives of this non-profit organization shall be to furnish encouragement and assistance in the development of the Unit and thus afford fraternization for Airstream trailer and motorhome owners; to encourage safe driving and assist in improving the general welfare of the recreational vehicle public through assistance and active participation of all its members in building a strong organization for the betterment of goodwill toward trailer and motorhome travel; to coordinate with and participate in the interests and activities of the International and the Region; to cooperate with other organizations and units within our sphere which are seeking to elevate the standards and ethics of the various groups; to disseminate information of an advisory and educa-tional nature which will be of value to its members and the public; to study, advise and recommend legislation which is in the interest of the trailering and motoring public and oppose all legislation which is discriminatory and injurious to the trailering and motoring public; and to encourage government and private agencies to provide more and better trailer and motorhome parks and facilities.

Article III

MEMBERSHIP QUALIFICATIONS

- Section 1: Adult ownership of a fully self-contained and hard sided recreational vehicle manufactured by Airstream, Inc., is a prerequisite for membership in this Unit.
- Section 2: There are two classes of membership in this unit: Regular and Affiliate Members.
- Section 3: An applicant for membership in this Unit must submit an application in writing and, upon the payment of International and Unit dues, shall be a Regular Member of this Unit.

- Section 4: Regular Members who have sold their recreational vehicle manufactured by Airstream, Inc., may, upon request, retain their membership as Regular Members of this Unit pursuant to the provisions of Sec. 2 ARTICLE V of the International Constitution. Such Regular Members shall possess all the rights and privileges of the International Club, including full voting rights in all elections and on all questions.
- Section 5: Regular Members of another Unit may become Affiliate Members in this Unit by an application to the Membership Committee and upon acceptance shall possess all the rights and privileges of the Unit, except the right to hold office in the Unit or the right to vote in the selection or election of officers in the Unit, Region, or International or on any amendment to the Unit or the International Constitution or on the dissolution of the Unit or the merger of the Unit with another Unit.
- Section 6: Applicants for membership in this Unit must submit dues and join the International Club simultaneously or show evidence of membership in the International Club through another duly chartered unit.
- Section 7: Failure to pay either Unit or International dues will automatically terminate membership in the Unit.
- Section 8: In those cases of co-ownership of an fully self-contained hard sided recreational vehicle manufactured by Airstream, Inc., the rights and privileges of membership shall be deemed to include the spouses of such co-owner but collectively such co-owners shall possess one vote only except such co-owners who each pay International and Unit dues to this Unit shall each have one vote.

Article IV

OFFICERS AND THEIR ELECTION

- Section 1: The Officers of the Unit shall consist of a President, a First Vice President, a Second Vice President, a Corresponding Secretary, a Recording Secretary, a Treasurer and Directors (four). The Executive Board shall consist of all of the Unit Officers plus the Immediate Past President of the Unit.
- Section 2: The Officers shall be elected at the annual business meeting and shall be installed and shall assume office at that time. An officer shall serve in office for a term of one year or until a successor is elected but in no case shall an officer, except the Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary or Treasurer, be eligible to serve more than two consecutive terms in the same office, provided said officers are duly nominated and elected for each term of office.
- Section 3: An officer who advances to an office pursuant to the provisions of Sec. 5 of this ARTICLE shall not be deemed to have served a full term in such office unless said service is for a period of greater than one-half (1/ 2) the term of such office.

- Section 4: The Director shall be elected at the annual business meeting, each for a term of two years commencing at the annual meeting, but arranged so that only one-half such Directors' terms expire in any one year. No Director shall serve more than one two-year term consecutively.
- Section 5: In the event of the death or resignation of the President or the death, advancement or resignation of a Vice President, or an officer's inability to fulfill the duties of office, the next ranking Vice President (in the order first, second) shall advance thereto. All other vacancies on the Executive Board, except that of the Immediate Past President, shall be filled by majority vote of the Executive Board.

Article V

EXECUTIVE BOARD

- Section 1: The Executive Board shall be the administrative body of the Unit and shall define the policies of and have full administrative authority in all matters pertaining to the Unit, and shall exercise general control and supervision of all officers and committees.
- Section 2: A quorum of the Executive Board shall consist of a majority of the

Article VI

BUSINESS MEETINGS

- Section 1: The annual business meeting of the members of this organization shall be held during the month of November in each calendar year. Such a meeting shall be announced by written notice and delivered to the members not less than fifteen (15) days prior to the meeting. The notice shall indicate the date, time, and location of the meeting. A quorum for conducting business at the annual meeting, or at any additional business meeting, shall not be less than ten (10) percent of members.
- Section 2: Additional business meetings of the members may be held at a suitable time and place during the second day of each rally of the members. If the rally or meeting is of less than two days duration, written notice to the members indicating the time, location, and purpose of such meeting shall be delivered to the members not less than ten (10) days prior to the meeting.
- Section 3: The Executive Board, by majority vote, may call additional business meetings of the members.
