As I walked along the quay, I was struck by the beauty of the United States flag flying from all those vessels. It is not always easy or convenient to fly our flags when we are traveling but, when you do get the chance, take a few minutes and display your flags. For those of you who have never been to an International Rally, you're in for a treat. In the area where the International Officers are parked, you will see a host of flags displayed. It is truly a sight to behold!

For Sunday morning, please bring 1/2 dozen of your favorite blueberry muffins to share for breakfast. Beverage and juice will be provided.





Enthusiasts bring trailers to 'Wally' fest

n one sense, Audrey and Willis Speirs can never go home again. But, in another sense, they've been traveling the country for the past five years without ever leaving home.

In 1994, when Willis Speirs retired from a career as a hospital finance officer, the couple sold their New Jersey home

and they have lived in a travel trailer ever since. "The only address we can give people is our daughter's house in New Jersey," Speirs said. "When we stop long enough, she forwards our mail to us.'

The Speirs are among about 4,500 owners of Airstream travel trailers and mobile homes expected to spend the next week in various Wright State University parking lots as they participate in the 42nd annual Wally Byam Caravan Club International Rally.

"Sometimes when we're driving along and I see a row of beautiful houses with their manicured lawns, I feel kind of bad that I don't have a place like that for my children and grandchildren to visit," Audrey Speirs said . "But then I think of the lifestyle we'd be giving up to have that house.

"This way, the kids don't get to visit us; we always go to visit them.'

The gathering at Wright State is a small town. complete with small-town standards of hospitality, mutual support, charity and community activities.

Betty Tanner of Cincinnati owns show dogs and often participates in dog shows when she goes to recreational vehicle rallies. She said the rallies also always include bridge competitions,

golf outings, sewing and quilting, sightseeing, charity fund-raising activities and anything else she might think of doing.

"If you want to do anything." Tanner said, "just mention it and there will be a bunch of people getting together ready to do it with you."

Tanner, 77, has owned her trailer, named La Casa De Felicidad ("The House of Happiness"), since 1966. She started traveling during vacations when she was a teacher, and now as a retiree she spends several months a year traveling with her dogs, and often with her lifelong friend Shirley Harris.

Tanner arrived at Wright State before the bulk of the visiting trailer owners so she could work on the traffic-control patrol and other volunteer activities.

"And to eat," she said. "T've been to about 12 different restaurants so far. The Dayton area has some really nice ones."

While in the area, Tanner and Harris are next-door neighbors to Frank and Donna Rothery, who spend the winter months in a house in Melbourne, Fla.

Frank Rothery, 67, retired a few years ago after a 35-year career in law enforcement. The couple travels three

to four months a year, which is fairly typical for the travel-trailer crowd.

They keep in touch with friends and family by sending them newsletters using their laptop computer linked to the Internet.
"It's an inexpensive

"It's an inexpensive way to see the country," Rothery said. "You've got to do maintenance on the trailer, just like you do on your house, but it's a lot cheaper than paying for plane tickets

and motel rooms if you really want to get around."

"And motel rooms aren't always clean," Donna Rothery added. "This place isn't always the cleanest, but at least it's our own dirt."

The Speirs bought their current

34-foot Airstream trailer, the third they have owned, when their last trailer was destroyed in a fire.

It's big by travel-trailer standards, but the Speirs acknowledge it has its limitations. For example, while at the rally here they have only about 15 amperes of electrical power, which is about as much power as a circuit for a single room in a house.

They can run a television and a fan, but not an air conditioner.

Still, they intend to continue traveling.

"We've seen some beautiful places around the country, and we haven't the slightest idea where we're going to settle down," Audrey Speirs said. "We're not thinking about stopping

"We're not thinking about stopping yet," Willis Speirs said. "As long as we're healthy and we're not a danger to others on the road, we'll just keep going."

Jackson Center basks in Airstream's glow

JACKSON CENTER — Audrey Farley of Florida had just finished touring Airstream Inc.'s main assembly plant Thursday when she and other curious members of the Wally Byam Caravan Club International found their way to one of the company's latest motor homes, the 39-foot Land Yacht XL.

Farley, owner of an Airstream trailer for 20 years, peeked into the bedroom, admired the wood kitchen cabinets and leather couches and stopped with a look of wonderment in her eyes.

Asked if she was doing some comparison shopping, Farley laughed and said, "No, honey. I'm just wishing right now."

The object of Farley's affection was a \$220,000, top-of-the-line motor home complete with television, stereo system, microwave and queen-sized bed. About a dozen of the swank homes on wheels will be available for sale by the end of August.

For more than 50 years, the

Airstream name has been synonymous with quality and comfort. To many, Airstreams are the Cadillacs of recreational vehicles.

Neil Armstrong, Buzz Aldrin and Michael Collins were quarantined in an Airstream trailer upon returning from their mission to the moon in 1969. Today, space shuttle astronauts are driven to the launch pad in an Airstream motor home.

While a long-time favorite of well-heeled retirees, in more recent years Airstreams have also become revered by younger consumers and celebrities. Actors Anthony Edwards and Tom Hanks are among the more famous Airstream owners. They use them as dressing rooms or to get to and from movie sets.

The only place in the world where Airstream trailers and motor homes are built is in Jackson Center, population 1,400, about 60 miles north of Dayton in Shelby County.

No one is sure why Airstream founder Wally Byam picked Jackson Center to open a plant in 1952. Byam started building them in California in the early 1930s, but was forced to stop production during World War II, after the aluminum alloy he was using was classified as a critical war material.

Byam, for whom the Wally Byam
Caravan Club International is named,
resumed production in 1947. He started
building Airstreams in Jackson Center,
most long-time employees think,
because he wanted to improve
Airstream's distribution in the eastern
United States and received economic
incentives from the village, said Mark
Wahl, Airstream's vice president of
manufacturing.

Byam died in 1962, but the Airstream product lives on as an American icon.

Each day at 2 p.m., employees conduct tours for a few dozen people, mostly Airstream owners and potential owners who want to see how the product is made.

For the past two weeks, with the Wally Byam rally taking place in Fairborn, those tours have become larger and more frequent.

That's fine with Wahl. "We think it's important for people to see how their products are built," he said, adding that some come specifically for the chance to see their own trailer or motor home being built.

Roy Uyematsu of California took a tour Thursday morning with 40 other early arrivals for this year's Wally Byam rally. Uyematsu became an Airstream convert in 1968 for one simple reason: "It was easier to tow than the one I had," he said.

"This is overwhelming for me," said Eileen Stadler of Oregon, as she toured the plant with her husband, Bill. Both retirees, the Stadlers are spending their summer in their 3-year-old Airstream motor home. Next on the travel itinerary is a road trip to Newfoundland.

It's that type of loyalty that helped

Airstream weather the tough times, such as the late 1970s when gasoline availability was at an all-time low. That blow severely curtailed production and prompted the company to lay off three-quarters of its employees, shut down facilities in Versailles and Cerritos, Calif., and merge all operations in Jackson Center.

Today, Airstream has more than 400 employees who work out of eight facilities in Jackson Center. They make 11 motor homes and 12 trailers each week. The manufacturing cycle for a

trailer is about eight days, while motor homes take an average of 13 days to complete. Wahl estimates it takes about 300 work hours to assemble some of the longer trailers.

"We've improved on efficiency, but the units are much more complex today," Wahl said.

The main assembly plant looks more like an overgrown garage than the well-oiled manufacturing center it is.

There's no assembly line; rather, teams of workers perform various tasks in different buildings. One team assembles the trailers' famous rounded shell out of large sections of aluminum and aluminum alloy, while other employees build the chassis.

Following assembly, finished units are inspected and tested for leaks in a booth that simulates strong winds and torrential rain.

The 47-year marriage of Jackson Center and Airstream seems solid.

"They've been a very good business partner. We are really blessed to have them here," said Jackson Center Mayor Scott Klopfenstein, a former employee in Airstream's engineering department and mayor for 16 years.

To be sure, Airstream generates significant income for the village. But Klopfenstein also is proud of the other things Airstream has provided the community, such as the two new village welcome signs erected this month and the new generator for the village fire department.

Airstream is equally enamored of Jackson Center. Airstream plans to expand its 249,000-square-feet of manufacturing space to accommodate larger models of trailers and motor homes with even more amenities. All of that expansion will take place in Jackson Center, Wahl said.

"We've developed some strong roots in the community," he said. "There's a great work ethic here. It just makes, sense to stay."


Facts and figures about RVs and retirees

The recreational vehicle business had the best season in 20 years in 1998, according to the Recreational Vehicle Industry Association. The

- industry shipped 292,700 motor homes, travel trailers and other camping vehicles last year, a 15 percent increase over 1997.
- ▶ In Ohio, recreational vehicle registrations rose from 159,000 in 1993 to 169,000 in 1998.
- Association officials said the sales were driven by baby boomers buying recreational vehicles for family travel, and owners from 35 to 54 years old account for 45 percent of all sales. But people older than 55, most of them retired and having no children at home, still make up 40 percent of the market. That segment will expand further as the baby boom generation finishes raising families and moves into the empty-nester phase.
- ▶ Jeff Beddow, public relations manager for the association, said another important trend in recreational vehicles will be the mobile semi-retiree. He said it will be increasingly convenient for people to travel while working on a free-lance basis from a laptop computer. "We have every reason to believe the growth trend will continue," Beddow said.
- ➤ The median age of retirement in 1950 was about 67. In 1998, it was
- ▶ In 1997, people who were 65 years old could expect to live another 17.6 years. Life expectancies are gradually increasing.
- ▶ The total number of people 65 or older in the United States in 1997 was about 34.1 million, or 12.7 percent of the population. By 2010, there will be 39.4 million Americans 65 or older. By 2030, about 69.4 million people, 20 percent of the population, will be 65 or older.
- ▶ A poll by Modern Maturity magazine in 1995 indicated 2 percent of adults younger than 50 used recreational vehicles for vacations. The percentage was three times as high, 6 percent, for people older than 50.

ON THE ROAD TO DAYTON

It's the journey, not the destination. That is the prevailing principle of the trips Russell and I take, and I'd like to share with you some of our adventures en route to Dayton.

We went first to the Thousand Islands, a collection of 1,855 islands, including an artificial one. By an agreement in 1793, two-thirds of the islands lie in Canadian waters and one-third in U.S. waters, although the areas are equal. On Father's Day we took a delightful three-hour boat trip around the Islands, passing under a large International Bridge erected in 1938, and also sailing past the "World's Shortest International Bridge" between two islands. About 15 to 20 feet long, it is adorable. The biggest tourist attraction in the Thousand Islands is the 120-room Boldt Castle, begun as a summer home in 1900 by the owner of the Waldorf Astoria for his beloved wife Louise. She died in 1904 while the building was still being constructed; it has never been finished nor furnished.

The town nearest our campground was Gananoque. When I referred to it as "GanaNOKE," the campground owner politely corrected me: "Gan-an-OCK-way." It has a population of 5200 and is one of those friendly small towns. The helpful residents gave unique directions: "The bookstore is the sixth store on the right from the corner," said one person. On another occasion, a townsman said, "You want a video rental store? It's the twelfth one from the corner." By the way, the used bookstore is named "The Intelligent Bean." It features used books and exotic coffee beans. After leaving Gananoque we steered the Suburban toward London, Ontario, which necessitated driving through Toronto, a prospect that made us both nervous. Just before we came to the outskirts of the city we pulled into a rest area to have lunch in the trailer. We saw another Airstream driving in, far away past dozens of trucks. Pretty soon two smiling women approached us and I realized that one of them was Linda Wright, who had been on the Florida Fantasy Caravan with us last winter. She and her husband Peter Spencer live in Brighton, Ontario, about halfway between Gananoque and Toronto. The other woman was Linda's mother, who lives in London, Ontario.

Linda and I greeted each other warmly. One of our bonds is that we both love dulse, which most people don't know about, or, if they do, they dislike it. It is a dried seaweed which tastes like iodine liberally sprinkled with salt! It's hard to find in the States, but is readily available in New Brunswick. At any rate, when I asked for tips on driving through Toronto, Linda said, "Just follow us!" It was my turn to drive, so Russell and Linda chatted on the radio while Peter and I drove. After some minutes of pleasant conversation, Linda instructed us, "For the next several miles we're going to be moving to the left. By the time we get to the middle of Toronto there will be six lanes of heavy traffic, and we want to be in the correct position." I swallowed hard and told Russell to announce, "Dorothy says she's as ready as she'll ever be." Linda's response delighted me. "Go, girl," she said, and go I did, right through that never-ending city of heavy traffic! How lucky we were to find friendly guides familiar with Toronto!

The next day we re-entered the U.S.A. at Port Huron, Michigan, and found our way to the county park in Davison, just outside of Flint, where we had reservations. The check-in woman drew our route on the campground map, as they always do, and told us to keep going left until we came to the top of the hill, where our site was located. When we got there, Russell (rightfully) accused me of being a New England snob because I asked, "WHAT hill?" We were all of 20 feet above the campground entrance!! Another small town we liked as we got closer to Dayton was Wapakoneta, 60 miles north. We needed to find a GMC repair shop. The woman at the KOA campground provided us with a phone number and directed us to the pay phone outside, which costs 5 cents!!! A local phone company is hanging in there, since it's one of the town's claims to fame. The last time I made a nickel phone call I was in college -- and that was half a century ago!!! Dale, the mechanic who solved our automotive problem, is the proprietor of an auto glass company. While he installed a new side mirror he discussed the local hero Neil Armstrong. Dale's theory is that the astronauts didn't really walk on the moon; they'd been "brain-warshed" into thinking they had. Dale said Armstrong had appeared in a few parades after his adventures in space, but then "the brain-warshing wore off and he was too embarrassed to come back." I love it!!

The last adventure before we arrived at the Rally took place when we did a "dry run" to the Rally site, without the trailer. Russell claims, "Real men don't ask directions; they send Dorothy in," and I relish those assignments. Into an American Legion Hall in Fairborn I walked, wondering if I'd find a group of beery men. Instead, I found a nice middle-aged man with his ten year-old daughter, the exact age of the children I taught. In addition to telling me in words how to get to the Nutter Center, he drew a map. As he and I and the little girl bent over a table, he pointed out, "Right here is a red light." The little girl said, "Or green," and I added, "Or yellow," and every time after that when he mentioned a red light, the daughter and I twinkled at each other and chorused, "or green or yellow!"

Thus we arrived at the Rally, which has been eloquently written up by Pam Bleakney in the Yankee Quipper and by Bob Sandall in the Charter Oak Chatter.

IT ALL BEGAN WITH A QUESTION

In 1969, 3,402 Airstream trailers gathered in Hershey, PA for the thirteenth International Rally. Among those attending were Roger and Ruth Crockett who were members of the Berkshire N.Y. Unit. When they mentioned that their home was in Torrington, CT people asked: "Why didn't Connecticut have a unit of their own?" We, of a later date, must remember that in the early days of the Club, WBCCI was growing at a rapid rate. Consequently, this challenge started several Connecticut Airstreamers thinking, which lead to several informal meetings. All of this was brought to fruition when Emil Raboin was installed as Charter Oak's First President in 1971. Much credit was given to Emil in making our unit a reality.

All this information was given in an after-dinner conversation with our last three active Charter members; Audrey Clark and Ruth and Roger Crockett. They then went on to recall some early highlights.

- Of course, money was needed, so when they had a rally at a public campground, the members would clean out their attics and cellars so they could hold an auction. Then Dave Clark and Roger Crockett would hook up a loud speaker and travel around the campground announcing that great things would be auctioned. They did quite well.
 - Percy Hurlburt and Cad Freeman would prepare a much appreciated bean hole dinner.
 - Harry and Ingrid Hulton would often lead the group in Square Dancing.
- If there was a common size and age trailer in the early days, it would have been a 1972 25ft unit. At least the Clarks, Crocketts, Nelsons and Rosenbecks owned one through the years.
 - Membership varied through the years but today's 61 members is probably the largest.
 - They thought Rud Blommer was a great recruiter and his Rally at the Stone House in NY was outstanding.
- We, who did not join until 1977 were impressed with the fare at the first rally of the season, at Wolf's Den in East Haddam. Audrey, Lydia and others served a Friday night dinner of soups in crock pots. They did this for several years. This prepared us for the annual hike to Gillette Castle on Saturday.

Well, for us, it was a delightful evening's conversation with the last three active charter members of COCU, whose loyalty has only increased through the years. We all owe them a great big Thank You!



THE SILVERSHADOW TRAIL

I'm sitting in our brand new Airstream trailer and I think it is just wonderful. Three years ago this shiny silver home was not even a glimmer in our eyes. The Silvershadow, as we lovingly refer to it, was never a lifelong dream or something we diligently saved to acquire. We had hiked and camped in the forest, but had little knowledge of the RV world. However, over the past few years we have become quite familiar with Airstream trailers and Airstreamers. We see how they enjoy their weekend camping trips and camping vacations, but I must say, sitting here, looking at the workmanship and luxury, experiencing the comfort and conveniences - this is not camping. We are in fact at home, in the woods, at the beach, in any town, or down the end of most any road, and as we have so pleasantly learned, not alone.

We unknowingly started our journey toward Airstream ownership by shopping for backpacks, water bottles, sleeping bags and a tent. On March 2, 1996, we started Hiking the Appalachian Trail and completed almost a thousand miles to Harpers Ferry, West Virginia. We did not have time to complete the entire trail and the excessive heat was getting to Nexmo (Kathy). "Nexmo", by the way, is a trail name. Trail names are used by all thru-hikers who are those people hiking a large section of trail or hopefully the entire trail. Kathleen's trail name was "Nexmo", which found its origin in "next motel". Airstreamers would call them nicknames or handles. My trail name was "Download"; I was sending, or downloading, our story as we hiked, for publication on the web. The Trail became a Love-Hate-Love relationship for both Kathy and myself. Love - every mile behind, Hate - every mile ahead, and Love - the spirit of family among thruhikers. That camaraderie and sense of family is what we missed most when we left the trail. Below are exerts from my writings, first I quote "Bronco", a good friend with whom we shared many miles, then myself.

The following is an excerpt from a short story written by David Appell, a free-lance writer from Arizona, and published in the Appalachian Trailway News. The story is titled - What I Really Saw - and I feel it identifies one of the blessings of hiking the Appalachian Trail. David Appell is "Bronco".


*****BLUE BLAZE - WHAT I REALLY SAW ******

... The day before, on the fourth of July, Sharon and I rode the gondola to Stratton Village, in search of real food and a telephone booth. While Sharon was making a phone call, I stood off to the side and noticed a man approach. He stepped toward the other phone, and our eyes met, and I began to nod and say hello. Then I saw him quickly avert his glance and look away.

As the dusk settled in around Spruce Peak Cabin, I realized that, on the Trail, everyone says hello, and usually more. That is one of the things that makes it what it is, one of the best things. The rest of the world is too crowded, too busy, and too often afraid to look directly at one another and say hello - too wary and cynical to worry about such unprofitable things as a sense of community, of participating in something common. On the Trail, you see and feel everything, and you see yourself and other people in a new way.

This is not something you see from a car, ever.

David touches on what Nexmo and I feel is the essence of hiking the Appalachian Trail. What brings former hikers back, what keeps section hikers returning year after year, and what keeps some hiking the trail longer than expected. The Appalachian Trail represents the heart of a healthy family experience.
