



temperature gauge indicates overheating and you have your air conditioner turned on, turn it off. Pull over in a safe place and put on your emergency brake, Don't turn off the engine. Increase the engine idle speed. Lift the engine hood and check for fluid leaks at the radiator overflow outlet. Check to see that all drive belts are intact and the fan is turning. If you have a problem have it fixed at the next opportunity. If there is no problem the light should go off or temperature should come down within one minutes Proceed on the highway a little slower. Ten minutes later resume normal driving.





Passing

WARNING: Never open a radiator cap when the tow vehicle is hot. Check the coolant level when the vehicle is cool.

When going downhill in dry weather, down shift so that engine compression will slow the whole rig clown. Take dips and depressions in the road slowly and do not resume normal driving speeds until you are sure that the trailer wheels are clear of the dip.

WARNING: On slippery pavement do not use engine drag to help slow down as this may cause the rear wheels of the tow vehicle to skid. On icy pavement drive slowly and if you feel the tow vehicle skidding gently apply the trailer brakes only. This will bring the tow vehicle and trailer back into a single line. Chains do not help trailer wheels.

When driving in mud and sand let the momentum carry the rig through. Apply power gently and use as little as possible. Stay in the tracks of the vehicle ahead and keep the tow vehicle in the highest possible gear. If you get stuck it is best to tow out the entire rig together without unhitching.

Despite the best hitch you will notice that whenever a large bus or truck overtakes your rig the displaced air, first pushes the trailer rear slightly to the right and then affects the front. It may be necessary to steer very slightly, momentarily, toward the bus or truck to help compensate for the sway induced by the passing-vehicle. Do not apply the vehicle brakes, as this can tend to exaggerate the situation. You may find, however, that briefly applying the trailer brakes with you manual control will help eliminate sway.

CAUTION: When stopping on a hill or slope, leaving your car in gear is not enough for standstill safety. CHOCK THE TRAILER WHEELS to he double sure. Do not use trailer brakes as parking brakes.



#### WHERE THE ROAD DOESN'T GO BOB & HELEN SANDALL #5593

On September 6, 2000, our 48th wedding anniversary, we left Manchester at 6:00 A.M. for what was to become a trip of nearly 6,000 miles before we returned. Our initial destination was Sioux Falls, S.D., the rendezvous site for the Polar Bear Safari 2000. We arrived there at noon on September 9th and met our caravan leaders, Chuck and Sandie Kiple who would lead the second section of the caravan. This caravan has be-come so popular that it is necessary to run two sections of 25 units each. Norm and Clara Lammers lead the first section.

Since the caravan was not scheduled to leave until September 15th, we had plenty of time to tour the area. As part of the caravan activities while in Sioux Falls, we toured the Gateway (computer) company, a fantastic model railroad exhibit in the Fair Grounds, Business Aviation of Sioux Falls and the USGS EROS (Earth Resources Observation Systems) Data Center. (EROS Data Center holds one of the world's largest collections of images of the earth's land surface) Our tour of EROS was fascinating.

We left Sioux Falls on the 15th of September heading for Aberdeen, S.D. On the way we stopped in Mitchell, S.D. to visit the Corn Palace. Each year, thousands of bushels of corn, grain and grasses are used to decorate the Corn Palace. We arrived in Aberdeen at 2:15 and by 4 o'clock, we were off for a tour of a Hutterite colony. The Hutterites are a religious sect similar to, but not as strict as, the Amish or the Mennonites. They use electricity and modern farm equipment although they maintain a rather closed community with their own school system, church and communal distribution of the work of the colony. We were served a delicious meal prepared by the young women of the village after which we were entertained by their choir. Our time in Aberdeen was very busy - we visited the NOAA weather station, a wildlife refuge where we saw white pelicans, a tour of an ethanol plant for the men and a fashion show for the women sponsored by the women of the local Methodist Church.

On the 19th, we left with the parking crew at 7:30 A.M. for Rugby, N.D. which is the geographical center of the North American continent. We were parked overnight in a restaurant parking lot. Up to this point, the weather had been quite warm and humid with temperatures in the upper eighties and low nineties. However, things changed when we arrived in Rugby - it turned cold and very windy. So much for the shorts and T-shirts!!

We crossed the Canadian Border at the Peace Garden and continued North through Brandon, Mb. (site of the 1994 International Rally) on our way to Dauphin, Mb.. As we were driving through Riding Mountain National Park, we were temporarily delayed by a group of Indians who were picketing against the Canadian government. Although they were beating on their war drums, they caused us no problems. In Dauphin we were treated to supper at the Anglican Church where we were welcomed by Past International President and First lady, Lawrie and Betty Stephen. Lawrie and Betty are parishioners of this church. While in this town of 8,000, we experienced our first taste of frozen precipitation in the form of sleet and snow squalls which sent us scurrying to Wal-Mart for warm gloves and hats which we had forgotten to pack.

After thawing out our water hoses on the morning of September 23rd, we left for Swan River, a community of about 4,000. (after this experience, we learned not to leave our water hoses connected for the rest of the trip). While in Swan River we visited a museum of antique farm tractors and other farm equipment. Here we were treated to a delicious home-cooked meal prepared and served by the museum staff. The highlight of our stay in this town was a visit to a local sculptor where we purchased a stone carving of a mother polar bear with two cubs. After leaving Swan River, we headed North to a town named, The Pas where we had a nice camp-site on the Saskatchewan River. After a couple of days in The Pas, we traveled on to the town of Flin Flon which is named for Josiah Flintabbatey Flonitan, a character that appeared in a dime-novel found in the area by early prospectors. In the early stages of our trip, we had passed through the vast open plains of the mid-west but after leaving Swan River, we found ourselves riding through heavily forested land. As we approached Flin Flon, however, the beautiful forests abruptly changed to great expanses of rocky terrain. In some areas of Flin Flon, the water and sewer pipes are contained in wooden boxes since it is impossible to bury them. The major employer in Flin Flon is the Hudson Bay Mining and Smelting Company which mines copper, zinc, gold, silver and cadmium. While in this town, we were entertained by a group of Indians performing traditional dances and ceremonies. It was here, also, that we first saw the Northern Lights. Our most important drivers' meeting was held at the Victoria Inn in Flin Flon where we were briefed about our upcoming stay in Churchill, Mb., the Polar Continued on next page..... Since we were on the water detail for the move to Thompson, we left with the early workers on the morning of October 1st. Leaving behind the rocky terrain of Flin Flon., we once again found ourselves travelling through thick forests of evergreens and tamaracks. By this time of the year, the tamaracks had turned a brilliant yellow. When we arrived in Thompson, we realized we had driven as far as the paved roads go in northern Manitoba. To go beyond this point, it will be necessary to go by train to Churchill, our ultimate goal in search of the "great white bear". After setting up in the campground we once again made our way to, what else, Wal-Mart to purchase anti-freeze with which to winterize our trailer. The trailer would remain in Thompson for several days while we were in Churchill and we had been told that sometimes the temperatures here went well below freezing. We spent the evening packing and repacking our duffle bags and back-packs. We had been told to travel light as it would be necessary to carry our luggage with us while in Churchill.

FINALLY - THE BIG DAY HAS ARRIVED - October 2nd. The train was to leave at 6:30 P.M.. While waiting outside our trailers for our transportation to the train, it began to snow - how fitting!! Everyone was in a holiday mood. As we boarded the train, we were given our sleeping assignments - some of the group went by coach while the rest of us were in sleeping cars. Helen and I each had a roomette, which while quite small, was more than adequate and very comfortable.

We arrived in Churchill at 8:30 A.M. on October 3rd and went to the Tundra Inn by bus. Helen and I spent the day walking around the town in freezing temperatures and driving snow (it was coming horizontally). Just like any other tourist, we visited several gift shops, a museum and the town complex that houses the town offices, the schools, a curling rink, a swimming pool, a restaurant and many other facilities. It is a practice in this town not to lock any doors so that if someone is on the street and a polar bear appears, that person can quickly find a safe haven. To top off our first day here at 58 degrees, 30 minutes North Latitude, we ate in a unique restaurant that was decorated with items that had washed ashore. The menu even had Roast Caribou which was great.

The next morning, October 4th, we boarded our Tundra Buggy where we rocked and rolled over the tundra all day without any bear sightings until late afternoon. This bear was not sociable so we couldn't get very close but we had a good view of him through our binoculars. At 6 o'clock we headed for the Tundra Lodge right on the shores of Hudson Bay. The Tundra Lodge is made up of several trailers - two bunk houses, a lounge car, and a dining car. We picked out the bunks we would occupy for the night - really not very private but by now, we were one big happy family. Before supper we were treated to a wine party - the combination of the wine and having seen a bear, made for a super party. Since the generator went off at 10 P.M., we all retired early.

Fortunately, Helen and I had elected to take a second Tundra Buggy tour the next day and we were rewarded with an up close and personal encounter with a polar bear not more than thirty yards away. This bear was sociable and stayed close for at least two hours. After all this excitement, we headed back to town to board the train for our trip back to Thompson.

We spent the nights of October 6th and 7th in Thompson and had the thrill of seeing the Northern Lights in a dazzling display.

When we left Thompson, we took the quick route to Winnipeg stopping for one night in the small town of Grand Rapids. Arriving in Winnipeg with all its traffic was quite a shock after so many days travelling in the wilderness when we would often go for an hour or more without seeing another car. To our great surprise, the roads we traveled in Manitoba were in excellent condition - smooth surface and wide shoulders. Although the service stations were few and far between, we knew in advance where they were so there never was any problem in that regard.

Our final banquet was held on October 10th at a very nice restaurant in Bird's Hill Provincial Park on the outskirts of Winnipeg. We said goodbye to our new friends and were homeward bound the next morning, arriving in Manchester on October 15th.

The Manitoba Provincial license plate uses the slogan, "Friendly Manitoba" and we can attest to the fact this is true. We never met anyone who was other than friendly.

This is a unique caravan - it has a lot to offer and we highly recommend it.

# **Wally Byam**

#### The Man Who Started It All

As you read this story of Wally Byam, you will know he was a real person, not a myth, as we have heard some profess. Wally Byam is no longer with us, but his dream goes on. Each one of you, as you travel the highways, here and abroad, are living evidence of Wally's dream. He placed the world at our doorstep, for us all to enjoy!

"Don't stop. Keep right on going. Hitch up your trailer and go to Canada or down to Old Mexico. Head for Europe, if you can afford it, or go to the Mardi Gras. Go someplace you've heard about, where you can fish or hunt or collect rocks or just look up at the sky. Find out what's at the end of some country road. Go see what's over the next hill, and the one after that, and the one after that."

This is the message and the legacy of Wally Byam. The words, typically simple and direct, were Wally's answer to a caravanner who asked in 1959, "Wally, what are we going to do while you are in the hospital?" It was what Wally would say now to all of us.

Wally taught a generation and more of ordinary persons how to travel to the near and far places of the world. He provided them with a mechanism in the form of a travel trailer, which he offered for sale. More basically, however, he gave them a concept, an idea, a dream come true. He taught by showing them that they could bring "home" with them on their travels, near or far, and that they could feel at home wherever they went.

Where Wally Byam led, people eagerly followed. Somehow in following him they became better able thereafter to lead themselves. Perhaps this was because he had a way of expecting and getting the most that was in a man.

How Wally Byam happened to choose trailers to glorify his life, what inclined him in that direction, is surely contained somehow in the story of his life. But here there is a snag. Wally Byam was an extremely verbal and communicative man. To many he appeared to be an egotist. The fact is that he could rarely be brought into a direct discussion of his own life.

There aren't many details available about Wally and his family. They were never "poor" in the modern sense, certainly never hungry or in debt. But the times were hard, rough, beset by the physical elements, the wind and the rain, the crudeness of the roads.

Later his grandfather acquired a large flock of sheep. He didn't hesitate to put a teenage Wally in charge of them. He sent the boy to lead the flock to their summer pastures high in the mountains of Oregon, to stay there alone with them for months at a time.

As a shepherd boy, Wally lived out of a small, two-wheeled wagon covered with cloth and towed along at a walking pace by a donkey. At night the wagon would be unhitched and propped up by its tongue. The tail board let down to disclose a mat for a bed, a kerosene cook stove, food and water, and "all the other necessities of life"—a wash pail and some books.

Years later, on a trip through some western sheep country, Wally told one of his close friends that the shepherd boy's wagon had something to do with his later interest in trailers.

Wally graduated from Stanford in 1923 with a degree in law. He never applied for a board examination or practiced law in any form for the rest of his life. Instead he went to work for the Los Angeles Times as an advertising copywriter. He held that job long enough to decide that he liked advertising, but did not like to work for other people. He quit and formed his own agency and published a how-to-do-it magazine for home carpenters and builders. In the course of editing and publishing, Wally came across an article on how to build a trailer and bought it for publication. It was rather poor, as he was soon to find out. Every mail brought him complaints.

His curiosity piqued, he decided to follow the instructions himself. He quickly found them impossible. Abandoning the article but not the project, which tremendously intrigued him, he proceeded to build a trailer.

It was a "crude, boxy structure which rested none too easily upon a Model A Ford chassis", Wally wrote later in his book, "Trailer Travel Here and Abroad", "little more than a bed you could crawl into, a shelf to hold a water bottle, a flashlight and some camping equipment ... protected from the elements."

Crude or not, it was Wally's first trailer. It attracted much attention and people even tried to buy it from him. At first he wouldn't sell; he was having too much fun with it himself. He wrote an article on how to build it and sold plans on the side.

He might have published the article himself in his own magazine, except for a very simple fact; he needed more money than he could "pay" himself. It was published by "Popular Mechanics" magazine.

Soon Wally was building trailers in his backyard for sale. They were strictly made-to-order versions of his own trailer and usually the customer would come over to pitch in and help. Parenthetically, from that day until this Wally's customers have always been made to feel free to walk into one of his factories to see "how things are coming along".

For some years the making of trailers was largely a backyard enterprise for Wally. Sometimes it supported his writing and other ventures, sometimes they supported it. Wally conceived the name "Airstream" in 1934 and began applying it to his trailers "because that's they way they travel, like a stream of air".

In those prewar days there was really no such thing as a production line for Airstream. Each was a "custom" model. It was also an experimental model as well. Wally never stopped trying new things, incorporating new construction principles, building "the better travel trailer".

In 1936, Wally experimented with the first systematic use of the so-called "monocoque" construction principles in his trailers. He built riveted aluminum shell trailers which are still in existence to the present day.

Imperceptively building trailers, taking them on trips, helping friends build trailers, building trailers for friends, taking friends on trailer trips—became a business, in a sense the beginning of Airstream, Inc.

The full realization that he was "in the trailer business" came home to Wally as the storms clouds gathered for World War II. It came belatedly and with pain. The explanation of this is integral both to the story of Wally Byam and to the philosophy of the company he founded.

He continued to build trailers for travel until 1942, when the War Production Board ordered that "house trailers shall not be made for the duration of the war, except by manufacturers making them for the government or recognized and approved governmental agencies". That left Wally out.

The end of the war and the lifting of the ban on travel trailers did not immediately put Wally back in business again. A shortage of capital held him back for a time. So did a business venture which was to prove a painful blind alley.

That venture involved entering into a kind of partnership arrangement with another company of much greater facilities. At first it looked like an ideal arrangement with Wally turning over his travel trailer concept, his designs and methods and even the name Airstream in exchange for much needed productive capacity.

For a time there was a mutually beneficial exchange. Wally created an entire travel trailer division and poured into it years of pent up desire, thought and energy. He took all that he had learned of trailer manufacturing during the prewar era and added a new wealth of construction know how gained during his employment by an aircraft company.

But by 1948 the relationship was becoming estranged. It's difficult to say exactly why. Perhaps as much as anything else, Wally was acting characteristically. He had always been restive as an employee. He had always been driven from within, rather than pulled from without.

To protect his rights to the name Airstream, and to preserve what he considered the integrity of his Airstream travel trailer concept, Wally felt forced to buy his way out of the corporation. It was a trying, difficult process which was to require every bit of patience and determination Wally had. It was also to require every penny he could get his hands on.

Wally rented a small building near the Van Nuys, California, airport and announced to the world that he was back in his own trailer business. Thus was formed Airstream Trailers. Inc.

It took a good deal to have much faith in a company with so little capital or equipment (Waily's own tools, that was about all), but some did. The first was a bright young war veteran who had studied administration at Cornell University and was just then looking for some kind of permanent job with a future.

He was Art Costello, who at the time of the original publishing of this article was chairman of the Board of Directors of Airstream. Wally assigned Costello to a flat plank board supported by two orange crates and placed him in charge of "purchasing and accounting". Basically, that meant he was to handle the money to equip and supply a manufacturing facility to produce travel trailers. The money was roughly equal to the retail price of one Airstream at that time.

Soon after that Wally Byam remembered a production genius he had known during his war time days at the aircraft plant; his group leader, Andy Charles. By some verbal magic, Wally persuaded this highly literate, individualistic man that he should become the first production superintendent of Airstream.

Just two years later, Wally gave Charles a check for \$5,000 and a lease to a vacant factory in Jackson Center. Ohio, which had been built to manufacture bazookas. Starting from scratch in an area where trailers were associated with gypsies and fly-by-nights, Charles assembled and organized Airstream's eastern facility. It took him one month to produce the first eastern-made Airstream travel trailer. That was August 1952.

The following 10 years saw Wally's company grow to become a major American business enterprise. The best quick statement of Airstream's present position in the market is this; while producing the acknowledged "Cadillac" of travel trailers, it outsells all but the lowest priced "Chevy".

It is an astonishing fact that in the very midst of building his business, Wally Byam felt entirely free to leave his factories and take personal charge of every foreign caravan between the winter of 1951 and the spring of 1960!

For those who are not acquainted with Wally's caravans, they included, among others, trips to Canada, Mexico, Central America, a six-month caravan through Europe and one 18,000-mile tour from Capetown to Cairo through the continent of Africa.

The fact is that Wally never considered that he was leaving his business but rather that he was moving right in the middle of it. As he conceived it, his business was concerned with the essence, the ideal and the "dream" of romantic travel. Wally felt that Air-stream's product ought to be the very stuff of which dreams are made.

He kept saying over and over again, "I make your travel dreams come true." He meant it most profoundly.

To be sure, those shiny stressed-aluminum things lined up at his factories were vital - even integral - to those dreams, but they were the means as much as the end.

By Wally's thinking, there was a strange reciprocity between the "dream" and the trailer, a give and take. It worked out something like this: The more you could do in a trailer, the more you dreamed of doing. The more you dreamed of doing, the more you could do if you tried - in an Airstream.

The caravans and rallies conceived and personally led by Wally Byam were thus vastly more than mere "stunts". They were more than promotional devices. They were, in fact, the deliberate way by which Wally Byam demonstrated what could be done in a travel trailer.

Then having thus stimulated the "dream" of travel by trailer, Wally sought, through caravans and rallies, to learn what qualities and equipment should be designed and built into his Airstreams.

Wally Byam became the most fanatical critic of Airstream trailers the company ever had. Hardly a day went by that his companies didn't receive a long letter or dictating machine recording of criticism. Not even the smallest detail escaped Wally's personal notice. Factory presidents were never surprised to receive middle-of-the-night calls from London or Mexico City or Capetown. Something should be done about the door; the air-vent was vibrating (perhaps after 18,000 miles of roadless travel), or he had an idea for a new fold down bed for children.

Wally scoured the civilized world looking for efficient hot water heaters, door hinges, butane lamps, chemical toilets, small porcelain sinks, chairs - myriad such large and small items for his beloved Airstreams.

He had thousands of things packaged up and sent back to his factories for consideration. When nothing suitable was available on the world market, Wally sought to motivate somebody to manufacture it. Failing that, he ordered his own factories to make their own - be it a new bed, a window frame of a bathtub.

Wally said there would always be caravans. They would go farther, stay longer, encompass more. They would always be needed to introduce new caravanners to the ever expanding potential of the travel trailer and to feed back more and more information to his factories.

Yet he knew perfectly well that only a small percentage of his Airstream owners could go on very many caravans. Most of them would do the majority of their travel by trailer to places closer to home, family and responsibilities.

He was thus enormously pleased in 1955 when a group of his followers actually beat him to the next logical step; they founded a club of their own which would "localize" caravanning

and put it on a year round basis. Of course, they named it after him.

The Wally Byam Caravan Club is now one of the largest clubs in trailering, and it is a remarkable tribute to Wally. It demonstrates once more, and in an excellent way, the effect he had upon those around him. Most men would have insisted upon controlling the club; Wally let his followers keep control.

The WBCC (now WBCCI) has greatly added to the wealth of trailering experiences. Experiences? The temptation is to use the world "thrills" but that would imply cheap, sensational events of the moment. Wally Byam was against such things. Instead, he offered deeper, more lasting satisfactions through experiences of substance and meaning.

Trailering, as practiced by Wally and his followers, has always been more than the pursuit of mere superficial pleasures. It has always been above and beyond what the psychiatrists call the "pleasure principle".

There never was a Wally Byam caravan that wouldn't stop in the midst of having fun to take up a collection for some orphanage somewhere, to collect a pile of "surplus" canned goods for a village whose crop had failed, to drop off clothing, school supplies or books.

Does the point need belaboring? Of course not, nor does the related point that Wally Byam caravanners and club members have always been more than a group of Americans out for a good time, whether here at home or in a foreign country.

This is the way Wally wanted it, and this greatly expanded and multiplied by his Airstream caravanners - is the way it shall be.

During the last year of the war Elsie also assisted with the patients at the base. It had become a convalescent hospital and she took the wheelchair patients for walks on the boardwalk.

The Nelsons had kept in touch through her brother and shortly after the war their courtship began in earnest. They have been together ever since.

It is not unusual for a World II romance to have survived these 50 plus years. In these five instances, however, the couples share not only a lifetime of memories, but also the bond of duty to their country.

# Petrillo served in two wars ... World War II and Korea

Thomas Petrillo was drafted into World War II and due to his reserve status, he was recalled to active duty during the Korean War. "Because I could type I was always in a headquarters company," he said.

Petrillo went into the Army in August 1944 and took his basic training as an engineer at Fort Belvoir, Virginia. From there he was transferred to the Military Police (MPs) and sent to Fort Devens, Massachusetts, where the type of MP training he received was for the protection of strategic locations and positions.

When his typing ability was discovered he was assigned an administrative position at headquarters.

While at Fort Devens he also was occasionally assigned escort duty. Prisoners of war arrived by ship from Germany and Italy. Although some remained at Fort Devens, many were transported to facilities across the United States.

The MPs traveled with these prisoners as guards, then returned to the base. "I was fortunate that all the groups I was involved with worked hard, and didn't cause any trouble. They never tried to escape."

When they traveled with the prisoners by train the MPs stood on the platforms between the cars. "They were steam trains and we got very dirty," he recalled.

"If it wasn't for my ability to type I don't know where I would be," Petrillo said. His best friend from childhood was drafted into the Army at the same time as Tom and was selected for the Infantry. Three months after arriving in Germany his friend was killed crossing the Rhine River.

Petrillo had earned the rank of Staff Sergeant by the time he separated from the Army on June 27, 1946.

At separation, he and many other World War II veterans enlisted in the inactive reserves. Military leaders wanted men as reservists who had training and experience and those who signed up were guaranteed their same rank and group should they be revelled.

1949 he reenlisted and the following year in October, as the conflict in Korea escalated, he was recalled. "We were given very little time to straighten out our affairs. We were retrained and sent to California for embarkation to Korea."

Troops could be detained in California up to four weeks before being sent on. Most were shipped out immediately.

But once again, when it was learned that Petrillo could type, he was held there for administrative duties. He remained for three weeks before being sent to Korea.

"Those three weeks made a big difference. All the friends I had made went up to the front lines. By the time I arrived they were trying to fill in the rear lines.

Again, I was put into an administrative position, assigned to a Lieutenant Colonel at the MP Headquarters."

Petrillo regards himself as a "very lucky soldier." His entire tour of duty in Korea was at MP headquarters in Pusan, Korea, where the MPs were to maintain the safety of the roads and the flow of supplies.

Supplies stored for transport to the front lines had to be guarded. "If you turned your back they would be stolen."

Some of the roads used for transporting the supplies to the battle zones were lined on either side with mountains or hills. The Koreans would attack the supply caravans, kill everyone with it, then steal everything on the caravan.

"It was the MPs' job to keep those roads open and when the caravans were attacked, to go into the hills and find these people. They patrolled the roads with quad 50s (50-caliber machine guns mounted on half-tracks). The Koreans would even try to steal those.

Over there, a soldier's monthly pay would keep a Korean going for six months. The Koreans would steal anything and sell it on the black market just to survive."

Troops were instructed not to go out alone at night or into strange places at night. Petrillo knew of two cases where soldiers were caught out alone and when they fought back they were killed.

Another big problem in Korea was dysentery. The Army supplied the troops with chemically treated water. "It tasted terrible, but it was safe to drink," he said. "I saw one fellow die a terrible death from dysentery. He really suffered. But that was life over there."

Back in the United States there was a public outcry about recalling World War II veterans for active duty in Korea. "Because of that I was able to get out early." He returned home in October 1951, having spent a year in Korea.

Petrillo lost many friends during the two wars. "Being on the front lines is very brutal. I don't know how they did it. You become a different person if you're in a war zone. You do that to survive. Protect yourself at all costs. That's terrible, but that's war."

#### BRAKES ON TOWED VEHICLES

Having just purchased a 1999 Airstream 35' Cutter Diesel-Pusher Motorhome, we began investigating the purchase of a vehicle to tow behind the motorhome. We preferred a wagon-type to tow 4 wheels down and eventually settled on a 2001 Subaru Outback with a 5-speed manual transmission.

We attended the FMCA rally in Brunswick, Maine, and after researching all the possibilities, settled on Roadmaster components, including a braking system for the Subaru.

Not everyone installs a braking system in their "towed", but it should be the law in all states and provinces regardless of the weight of the towed vehicle. Here's why: If the car separates from the motorhome, what will stop the car before it hits someone or something? Safety cables may help, but I wouldn't count on it!

On October 16, 2000, my wife and I were traveling south on I-75, south of Atlanta. We were in the right lane traveling at 65 MPH when suddenly there was a rear-end collision in our lane at a highway exit. Traffic was very heavy, I could not change lanes. Brakes were the only answer. I braked firmly (there was no swaying) and I came to a complete stop a few feet from the car in front of me. My rear-view TV camera revealed cars behind me, leaving the road to avoid hitting us. We were not hit. There is no question in my mind that without brakes in the Subaru, we would have hit the car in front of us, causing severe damage and personal injury.

To me, it is irresponsible to tow a car behind a motorhome without brakes working on the "towed" vehicle.



# THE HOMECOMING WHAT I DID TO GET A NEW MEMBER IN CHARTER OAK!!!!

# REGION ONE NEWSLETTER JANUARY 29, 2001

Region One President and First Lady, Dick and Eileen Bartram; Region One First Vice-president and spouse, Anne and Bob Werth; and Region One Second Vice-president and spouse, Raynold and Cecile Lemaire attended the mid-winter board meeting of the International Board of Trustees of WBCCI at Moultrie, Georgia, from January 15th through January 20th, 2001. Wayne Rutty, Region One Past-President and a member of the International Nominating Committee, also attended the meeting.

International President Craig Lundberg held an open forum where committee reports were presented and upcoming IBT motions were discussed. Audience participation was excellent and lively. (By the way, any WBCCI member is welcome to attend all IBT meetings - mid-winter as well as the IBT meeting at the International Rally).

Committee reports of general interest are summarized as follows:

- 1. Blue Beret articles are always needed and can be written by any member. If you have an idea for an article which would be of general interest, send it to Jackson Center. Pictures of activities at unit and region rallies and caravans which include Airstreams and Airstreamers are very welcome.
- 2. The 2001 Region One Caravan led by Howard and Carolyn Knight will leave on June 9 and park in Sioux Falls on June 22. Everyone is encouraged to join the Region One Caravan. The Knights' caravans are always meticulously planned, reasonably priced, and very interesting. Unit Presidents who have to park early, will be able to break away from the caravan in order to park with the other unit presidents. Support your Region One Caravan program!!
- 3. Be sure to send community service items (stuffed toys, aluminum-pull tabs, "Cents for Sense", hand-made warm hats) to the International Rally. If you are not able to go to the rally, ask someone in your unit to transport the goods to the International Rally. Region One has always led the country on a per-capita basis in the community service programs. Our good deeds benefit the less fortunate in countless ways.
- 4. It was suggested the everyone discontinue using the term "gray water" and use the term "wash water". It might be more acceptable in some communities to dispose of our wash water by letting it drain out on the ground.
- 5. While on the subject of ways of speaking, let us re-double our efforts to not use the term "baldy" in referring to Airstreams without membership numbers; and "S.O.B.." (some other brand) to denote non-Airstreams. Both terms are offensive and create the impression that we think we are better than others. This makes it more difficult to recruit new members.

Speaking of, new members, Airstream sold 920 new vehicles in 2000, 216 to existing WBCCI members (24% of total sold), and 704 to non-members. Of the non-WBCCI new owners, 15% have joined WBCCI. We all need to evaluate how we can include and be more welcoming to new members (new friends!) so that they stay active and enjoy being members of our club.

All the attending WBCCI members at the mid-winter board meeting were reminded that WBCCI by-laws permit each unit to have 2 buddy rallies a year. Buddy rallies can be a great recruitment device. However, having more than 2 buddy rallies a year runs against our IRS tax code status and our insurance policy. Also, Airstream, Inc.'s financial support of WBCCI as well as their support of various club activities will be at risk if we violate these rules.

Statistics were made available regarding membership losses by region and by unit over a five-year period. These numbers are very interesting: Out of the 12 regions that make up WBCCI:

Fewest members lost-----------16.6% (Region 10) Most members lost-------29.0% (Region 4)

Region One members lost------18.6% (we were third "best")

Only 4 units in the entire WBCCI had grown over the 5-year period. Charter Oak CI Unit was one of four units nationwide with membership growth of 15.4%.

Larry Huttle, President of Airstream, Inc., made a very interesting presentation:

- 1. The new 70th Anniversary model, a 30' trailer with a dinette slideout, was in a display at the RV show in Tampa. (The Werths and the Bartrams went there on Saturday afternoon). This trailer is a winner! It is very well laid out.
- 2. A new 26' motorhome is coming with a permanently-set-up bed and will use the GM 8.1 liter engine and the Allison 5-speed transmission. Mileage is 12-13 mpg. The unit is painted silver by the same company that paints Airstream Motorhomes.
- 3. Airstream now will re-build old Airstreams at the factory. Also, new completely factory-owned service centers will soon open in Orlando and Phoenix.

# THE CASE OF THE MISSING DOLLAR.....



The holidays were spent in Charlotte, NC with daughter Nancy and son Jeff flying in from CT for Christmas. Time was spent courtesy parking until departure time for the mid-winter IBT meeting in Moultrie, GA. We enjoyed the reunions/meetings/fellowships during our stay there. We then mini-caravanned to Traveler's Rest, Dade City, FL for a few days before departing for the "Gold Coast" of FL. We stopped off at Briny Breezes, FL where Fred and Olive Norton from the White Mountains Unit live. Our campsite was a stone's throw to the Atlantic Ocean. We heard the ocean sounds all the time, terrific! Once particular day brought high surf for that area. It also brought the local surfers in droves to ride the waves. We understand that the school kids take the day off to ride.

Our next stop was to the Florida Keys. Given our close proximity to the Keys, we just had to get there. We stayed at a campground in Key Largo and drove to Key West. #### **REGION 1 CARAVAN CANCELED**

Please be advised that the Region 1 Caravan R-239 "New England to the Big Sioux River Caravan" to the International Rally in Sioux Falls has been canceled due to lack of participation. The early cancellation is caused by low attendance at this time and the need to start confirming reservations at campgrounds and tours. ### OVERFILL PROTECTION DEVICE BY CHARLES BURKE

For the RV owner a new problem is on the horizon for us all to deal with. The official name is the OPD valved LP tark. OPD stands for Overfill Protection Device. In fact it is the title for a series of changes to DOT certified portable LP tanks. These are not to be confused with the ASME certified permanently mounted tanks found on motorhomes. It will be of particular concern to owners of older Airstreams and folks with aluminum LP tanks.

The rules with the most immediate impact have to do with older tanks which LP vendors are required to ensure are safe to fill. The requirement was established several years ago to have tanks more than 12 years from manufacturer or 5 years from last certification to be tested and recertified. The test is for operation and condition. The new OPD requirement, effective 1 Oct. 1998, is that in order to be certified a tank must have an OPD valve. The next step will be effective 1 Apr 2002. At that time all tanks must have the OPD valve to be refilled. In other words it's coming and we can't stop it.

As I mention earlier there is more to it than the overfill protection device. The OPD is a float which restricts the amount of LP which can be put into a tank. The valve also has a flow restrictor in a 56 orifice. This limits the maximum amount of LP that can be released through an open valve to 125,000 btu's. The new valve can be attached with either the standard left-hand thread pigtail or the new ACME pigtail. The ACME pigtail first showed up in home barbecues. This year OEM RV manufacturers will be required to install them.

The new ACME pigtail has in it's self added protection with a thermal sensitive shutoff. Used in conjunction with the OPD valve it has another safety feature to limit flow. In the future, purging and testing coaches for LP leaks will be slower and more difficult. It is possible to open a valve too fast, resulting in a safety shutdown. The result will be the need to restart the whole procedure. It seems likely at this point that many dealers and vendors that have done purging as a courtesy will have to charge for it. And an LP leak test will take longer.

The valve handle will have a unique appearance and the tank will have several labels indicating it is an OPD valve. It is important even now to know the difference. If you see an LP tank for sale at a seemingly very good price it may be because it is not an OPD tank. While the tank will be ok to use now, it will be unusable starting in 2002.

New OPD tanks are coming available. Careful shopping is necessary. Tank prices will vary widely depending on manufacturer, source and location. You don't want to find out while on vacation in the wilds of America that your LP tank can not be refilled. New 20# tanks will cost from 24-50 dollars each. For folks with the 30 or 40# aluminum tanks you will want to pursue replacement valves. New steel tanks are about the same cost as a replacement valve, making replacing valves in them overly expensive. However, with the aluminum tanks, their cost is such that a valve replacement is much less expensive. A replacement aluminum tank will run 300-400 dollars each. 



#### How to identify an OPD Valve:





#### Maintenance & Care Instructions for Atwood Water Heaters

#### GENERAL INFORMATION

- 1 LP and Water system must be turned on.
- 2 Have gas pressure tested periodically. Should be set at 11 inches of water column with three appliances running.
- 3 Drain water heater at regular intervals (at least one time during the year).
- 4 Drain water heater before storing RV for the winter.

#### PREVENTATIVE MAINTENANCE

#### PILOT MODELS

- Check main burner orifice and pilot assembly for contamination (dirt, spider webs, etc.).
- 2 Clean main burner tube with small brush.
- 3 Main burner adjustment open air shutter 1/4 way.
- 4 Low pilot flame. Check for contamination if clean have the pilot orifice replaced.
- 5 Pilot will not stay on when pilot button released. Have service technician check thermocouple and valve.

#### **ELECTRONIC IGNITION MODEL**

- 1 Check main burner orifice
- 2 Clean and adjust main burner.
- 3 Be sure that main burner and valve manifold aligned with each other.
- 4 Check electrode for cracked porcelain.
- 5 Check electrode for proper gap 1/8" between electrode and ground.
- 6 If module board functions intermittently, remove board and clean terminal block with pencil eraser.
- 7 If no ignition, check thermal cut-off. If blown, clean burner and flue tube. Then replace thermal cut-off.

#### WATER HEATER TANK CARE

#### WINTERIZING (FLUSHING) INSTRUCTIONS

- Turn off main water supply, your pump or your water hook up source.
- 2 Drain water heater inner tank. Due to the location of the drain plug, approximately two quarts of water will remain in the bottom of the tank. This water contains most of the harmful corrosive particles. While draining the unit, if the water flows sporadically or trickles instead of flowing steadily, we recommend one of two things. First open the relief valve to allow air into the tank and secondly, take a small gauge wire or coat hanger device and poke through the drain opening to eliminate any obstructions.
- 3 After thoroughly draining the tank, flush it with air pressure or fresh water. If you use air pressure, it may be applied either through the inlet or outlet on the rear of the tank. It may also be applied

through the pressure temperature relief valve but first remove the relief valve support flange. With the drain valve open, the air pressure will force the remaining water along with the corrosive particles, out of the unit. Your unit can be flushed with fresh water if air pressure is not available. Fresh water should be pumped into the tank with the assistance of the on-board pump or external water through the inlet or outlet found on the rear or the pressure relief valve support located on the front of the unit. Continue this flushing process for approximately five minutes to allow ample time for the fresh water to agitate the stagnant water on the bottom of the tank and force the deposits through the drain opening.

- 4 Close off the drain valve as well as the pressure temperature relief valve
- 5 After this procedure, there will be approximately two quarts of water left at the bottom of the inner tank. Should this water freeze it will not cause any splitting of the tank.

#### ATWOOD CLAD TANK

The Atwood water heater tank is constructed of a core of high strength aluminum. The interior of the tank consists of a 15% thickness of type 7072 aluminum (pure aluminum and zinc) that is fused to the core during the rolling process. This material protects the tank from the affects of heavy metals and salts found in waters throughout the country. It is anodic to these heavy metals and acts much like an anode in a steel glass lined tank except it will last much longer. There is also no need to replace an anode on a yearly basis.

Flushing the tank on a regular basis has been found to be helpful in insuring the best performance of your water hater and adding to the useful life of the tank. See flushing instructions above, your owners manual or contact Atwood for a copy of our recommended procedures.

#### WATER HEATER TANK CORROSION

Pinhole leaks from galvanic corrosion may cause the water heater tank to fail.

Microscopic particles of metals (like iron and copper) suspended in water, set up a reaction inside the water heater that is not unlike the principle on which an automotive battery operates. The aluminum tank is the anode and the metals in the water serve as the cathode. Consequently, the aluminum gradually sacrifices itself and aluminum particles are carried away with the water flow.

A white scaly material (aluminum oxide) often is formed around the points where the heaviest action is taking place and heat accelerates the process. Severity of the problem varies considerably in different locales depending on the metal and mineral content of the water. White deposits inside the water heater tank are usually from water impurities that have settled out.

Periodic flushing of the water heater tank under pressure is recommended to slow down this process. For flushing instructions see your owners manual or contact Atwood for a copy of our recommended procedure.

#### PRESSURE-TEMPERATURE RELIEF VALVE

Weeping or dripping of a pressure-temperature relief valve while the water heater is running DOES NOT mean it is defective.

This is normal expansion of water as it is heated in the closed water system of a recreation vehicle.

The Atwood water heater tank is designed with an internal air gap at the top of the tank to reduce the possibility of weeping and dripping. In time, the expanding water will absorb this air.

#### To replace the air follow these steps:

Step 1: Turn off water heater

Step 2: Turn off incoming water supply

Step 3: Open a faucet in the coach

Step 4: Pull handle of pressure-temperature relief valve straight out and allow water to flow until it stops.



Step 5: Allow pressure-temperature relief valve to snap shut; close faucet; turn on water supply

### FLUSHING YOUR WATER HEATER TO REMOVE UNPLEASANT ODOR

Hydrogen Sulfide can result when the protective cladding on the interior of the tank is doing its' job by preventing corrosion and therefore premature tank failure. The electro galvanic action of the cladding material releases hydrogen from the water. If sulfur or any of its' combinations are present in the water the two will combine and produce hydrogen sulfide. This compound produces the "rotten egg odor". Hydrogen sulfide can also be present in your fresh water supply. It is the product of the decay of animal matter and as little as 1 mg/liter can cause a perceptible odor. Smell the water before starting the flushing procedure. If your fresh water has the rotten egg odor you will need to find another source of fresh water before flushing and refilling the entire water storage system.

See Flushing Instructions and use four parts vinegar mixed with two parts water to flush tank.

The Atwood water heater is designed for Recreational Vehicles.

If you use your vehicle frequently or for long periods of time, flushing the water heater several times a year will prolong the life of the storage tank

#### AIRSTREAM SERIAL NUMBERS

Your serial number - What does it mean? By Charles Burke

Prior to 1967 the serial numbers on Airstream products were intended to provide merely sequential information and a means to meet state title registration requirements but here is a little insight into your coach.

1967 and 1968 \* 1st digit; I=International or L=Landyacht \* 2nd & 3rd digit; Trailer length \* 4th digit; Model year, 7=1967, 8=1968 \* 5th digit; Factory location, S=CA., J=OH \* 6-8 digit; Sequence number

1969 to 1980 \* 1st digit - I=International; L=Land Yacht; M=Motorhome \* 2nd & 3rd digit - Vehicle length \* 4th digit - D=rear bath double bed; T=rear bath twin bed; A=center bath twin beds; B=center bath double bed \* 5th digit - Model Year \* 6th digit - J=Jackson Center, OH; S=Cerritos, CA; V=Versailles, OH \* 7-10th digits - Sequential Serial Number

1981 to present, when federal government regulators got involved. The meaning of specific digits makes up a small book.

#### WHEN WAS YOUR RY BUILT?


You can tell the year that your RV was built by checking 10th digit of the Vehicle Identification Number (VIN). The VIN number is located on a the front left corner of trailers and in the drivers door or cab area of the motorhome.

For example a 2000 model the 10th digit will be the letter Y. For 1999 models the digit will a X and a letter W fro 1998 and so on. Please see the following list to find your unit's date of manufacture for units after 1980.

In most states a motorhome is titled and registered by the RV year, not the chassis year. Since chassis years commonly differ from the RV year, and chassis features may vary from model year to model year, it is important to know what year you own or are buying. This information can be critical when ordering replacement parts.

It is also important to your Rv's resale value - be sure your RV is registered by the RV year. You don't want to lose a year's worth of depreciation just because an inattentive clerk at the motor vehicle department uses the wrong VIN number.

# -A Brief History-

Over 60 years ago, Wally Byam had a dream. After a brief stint in the merchant marine, he started his career as a Stanford law graduate, became a newspaper copywriter, and then formed his own advertising agency. But it was as the publisher of do-it-yourself magazines that Wally's dream took shape. After complaints from readers came in about plans for a travel trailer he had printed in one of his magazines, Wally decided he could do better himself. He devised a method that would prove to be a milestone—dropping the floor between the axles and raising the ceiling, enabling the owner to stand upright.

He wrote his first article about how to build his improved travel trailer for less than \$100, including materials. He began selling instruction booklets and blueprints by mail and, in response to growing demand, began to build improved versions of the trailer in his Los Angeles backyard. By 1930 Wally Byam had left law, advertising, and publishing for good; by 1932 he had formed the Airstream Trailer Co.

Wally continually modified and improved every new trailer he built, progressing from wood to metal, and adding dozens of livability features. Then, January 17, 1936, Wally Byam's Airstream Trailer Co. introduced the "Clipper," built along aircraft principles in a monocoque, riveted aluminum configuration! The revolution had begun; acceptance for Airstream's outstanding products was immediate and continued to boom.

Then came Pearl Harbor, and the structural aluminum alloy that formed the Airstream body was classified as a critical war material. Trailers gave way to fighters and bombers, and Wally was forced to close his shop doors and went to work for Curtis-Wright Aircraft in Los Angeles.

After the war, on May 15, 1947, Wally decided to go back into the trailer business. Times were tough; but despite a very meager bankroll, Wally resumed production in a single rented building at the Van Nuys, California, airport. Despite all the drawbacks, the first steps toward realizing Wally's dream of the perfect travel trailer were taken in this tiny plant. Working with a newly-hired truck driver/purchasing agent, Art Costello (who ultimately became the president of Airstream), Wally and his tiny company created a travel trailer light enough to be towed by a passenger car, rugged enough to travel anywhere on earth, yet complete enough to provide at-home comfort and convenience wherever the owner traveled. Demand for the new trailers exceeded production capacity, and in July, 1952, the facilities in Jackson Center, OH, were opened. One month later, the first Ohio made Airstream rolled off the production line.

Wally Byam was, however, a traveling man above all else, so it was inevitable that he would conceive of Airstreaming as a way of life. Thus began the series of caravans, the first one taking place in 1951 and traveling though Central America. So popular was the caravan concept that by 1955, during a caravan to eastern Canada, a group of Airstreamers met to form the nucleus of the Wally Byam Caravan Club International.

Soon Caravans were traveling throughout Mexico and Canada, then to Europe and even Africa. Caravans and rallies brought excitement and satisfaction to the adventurous Airstream owners and set them apart from all others.

The Wally Byam Caravan Club International (WBCCI) is an important part of Airstream's Way of Life and the means by which Wally's concept of travel has become "localized" and made available to all Airstream owners, Wally Byam caravans spend from six weeks to six months exploring foreign countries; smaller groups, called units, provide weekend get-togethers and localized trailer trips.

The WBCCI guides the activities of some 10,000 Airstream families (more than 20,000 individuals) enrolled as active, dues-paying members. All our states, including Hawaii and Alaska, are represented. Even Canada, Mexico, England and continental Europe have members.

Today the Wally Byam Caravan Club has more individual members, represents more owners of trailers and motorhomes, has more local units, and engages in more activities of all sizes than any other single-brand travel trailer club in the Western Hemisphere. No other recreation vehicle club anywhere compares with it.

Airstream has helped thousands of people discover new worlds of adventure, and Airstream products are now the most sought after in the recreation vehicle field. They are sought after because their owners have access to a whole new "way of life" available to them after the purchase of an Airstream—and, of course, because it is the world's finest name in recreation vehicles.





From the time he was five months old, he and his mother and grandmother spent the entire summer at Dolly Copp Campground in Gorham, New Hampshire, just north of the White Mountains. His dad and grandfather came up weekends and also, of course, spent their weeks' vacations there. A few years later Keith's parents had another little boy and the camping experience continued.

I grew up in Berlin, six miles north of Gorham. My family, too, had camped at Dolly Copp for several summers and I welcomed the opportunity to reminisce with Keith. We talked about the central role of the Peabody River in our respective childhoods. Keith and his little brother spent a great deal of time playing in the river, cold as it was from the runoff of Mount Washington's melting show. My sister and I enjoyed the river in this way: we had a set of little bisque dolls which we hid among the rocks in the river. Then, of course, the other sister had to find them. We spent many happy hours playing that game. I often think of those halcyon, sunny days when I hear of today's beleaguered parents paying \$30 per child for a birthday party!!

Keith asked if I remember Gorham's "Silver Bridge", since demolished. Indeed I do; we had a favorite swimming place in the Peabody River near that bridge. Keith went on to describe on of his most vivid memories of those carefree summers. Looking at the silver bridge gleaming in the hot sun, he and his brother watched as large numbers of silver Airstreams crossed the bridge. Like me, Keith called them "majestic" as they rolled along in single file. It was an intense sight he has never forgotten. The sight was so memorable that is was recorded acutely in his mind's eye. I am grateful that he shared it with me.

Since pool houses aren't essential structures (you could, after all survive without one), pesky matters of necessity like plumbing and electricity may be abandoned. Fun can dominate the form. Think of it as a refuge from reality, a license to kill time, a return to the no-grown-ups-allowed summer clubhouse days. We're talking prime waterfront real estate where no laundry needs folding, no phone calls need answering, and clothing is strictly optional. In fact, the only rule—proved by the four very different examples on these pages—is that you express yourself. By Melissa Davis

# COOL

o the uninitiated, Barbara Jakobson's pool house sits like an overfed silver marshmallow at the south end of her Long Island backyard. But for rabid fans of the Airstream aesthetic (including actors Sean Penn and John Travolta), the handriveted-aluminum trailer represents, as Jakobson puts it, "one of the key objects of 20th-century design." And she should know. A trustee of New York City's Museum of Modern Art and a serious collector of contemporary art and industrial design objects, Jakobson had no doubts about purchasing one of these funky mobile homes. "I had to annex an Airstream to me, as a person," she explains, "but I had no intention of going around in one." A weekday Manhattanite, she also faced the problem that confronts all collectors: where to put the thing. Near the pool, she says, "was the only logical place." So, eight years ago, Jakobson located a dealer in New Jersey who was selling a 1973 model aptly dubbed the Land Yacht. She had the 21-foot-long trailer hauled to the end of her pool with little hassle. No site preparation, no grading, no foundation-instant retro retreat. And while Jakobson did have to rip up the original orange shag carpeting after mice discovered it, she kept the gold-brocade upholstery on its two banquettes, which pull out to become a single and a double bed. In addition to housing guests in her Airstream, Jakobson serves drinks from its galley kitchen and escapes from the sun beneath its striped awning. These trailers may have gotten their name for the way they cruise down the road like "a stream of air," but Jakobson has no intention of moving hers an inch from the pool.

The 2001 Yankee Doodle Dandy Rally was a resounding success. The rally earned a profit for the Region treasury. After considerable discussion between your region officers and the International Special Events Chairman, it was decided to change the date of the rally from May to the end of July. The reasons are:

1. The YDDR will not interfere with the units' spring business meetings which are all held in May.

 The YDDR will then be held during vacation/caravanning season. This will bring in more people from outside the region (which is the objective of a Special Events rally).

3. It will not interfere with the Region Two region rally.

4. When held in July, it will precede the "Statue Of Liberty Rally".

In the future, we are asking if any of the Region One units, either by themselves or in conjunction with another unit, want to work as the sponsoring group that puts on the rally; sharing proportionally in the surplus revenue.

#### REGION ONE RALLY'S SAFETY PROGRAM

Region One is sponsoring a special safety program at this year's region rally in Tunbridge, Vermont. I urge that everyone come prepared to participate in this worthwhile program. It can save lives and property damage.

The program involves rv safety in tow vehicles, trailers, and motor homes. Here is a small sampling of the topics to be covered:

a. hitch problem failures for 1992-99 Suburbans

b. overloading of tow vehicles & trailers

setting up of equalizer spring bars

d. motor home weights relative to tire pressure

e. regulations regarding installation of brakes on towed vehicles

The program will include:

1. Bob Young of the US DOT in Washington, D.C. will present information that he gave at the International Rally in Sioux Falls; information that could save lives and avoid property damage. Bob had a standing-room-only crowd at the International Rally. He has agreed to present this program at our region rally.

- 2. John Anderson of "A'Weigh We Go" and the "Recreation Vehicle Safety Education Foundation, Inc." will also be at Tunbridge to weigh each wheel of our tow vehicles, trailers, or motor homes. The cost is only \$30, and he will give each participant a full written report. (Once you have heard Bob Young's program, you will want to have your equipment weighed and analyzed).
- 3. Bob Young will bring with him a Suburban hitch receiver which was removed from a vehicle at Sioux Falls. It shows numerous serious cracks and was ready to totally fall off the tow vehicle. Bob will inspect the receiver of any tow vehicle at no charge, as long as the owner agrees.

Many lives can be saved and considerable equipment losses can be prevented if everyone participates.


Trailer Brakes

The principles are simple, and a performance checkup can lead to safer towing

railer brakes seem simple. They're in place when we buy a trailer, and the dealer equips our tow vehicle with a trailer-brake controller. It may seem there is little more to it than hitching the trailer, inserting the electrical connector and checking out the lights. Once under way, we apply finger pressure to the trailer-brake controller (or step on the brake pedal) and feel braking action for our quick functional check.

So, with confidence, we roll on down the road, enjoying the beautiful scenery, never giving our trailer brakes another thought. Then the fog closes in, the traffic stops abruptly, and we wonder if we are going to be able to stop the rig in time. "Hey, that was a close call! I don't think our brakes held the way they should have!" We begin to wonder about the



trailer brakes and decide not to follow other vehicles as closely. We begin to think about paying a bit more attention to the trailer brakes.

Just what maintenance checks should an owner reasonably make on trailer brakes? Is the electrical system working properly, and why do the front-axle wheels always seem to skid during severe braking while the rears do not? Does the trailer's suspension system have any effect on how the brakes work? Is there an effect on axle load when the brakes are applied?

# Suspension Types

The suspension of a trailer may seem to have little to do with function of the trailer brakes, but it does! There are three general trailer-suspension systems: the rocker arm, the independent wheel and the walking beam systems. The first two are common among trailers, with the rocker arm being most popular. Single-axle trailers have a relatively simple suspension system, compared with tandem-axle arrangements, and tandem-axle systems present more challenges in brake design and selection. This is due to load transfers that occur from one axle to another while braking. Let's take a quick look at how load can be transferred from front axle to rear axle when applying brakes, on the rocker-arm suspension system, using tandem axles.

The rocker-arm suspension system utilizes an equalizing link between the two springs, and then is frame mounted between the two axles (see illustration). This equalizing link provides ride smoothness, along with movement of the axles. The equalizer

tric current flow from the controller

link pivots as brake load (torque) is applied, and the front part of the equalizer link pivots (lifts) upward, moving the front spring shackle and spring toward the frame. This decreases the load on the front axle and front wheels, and may cause the front tires to skid. In turn, this pulls down on the rear-axle spring shackle and spring, increasing the load on the rear axle and wheels. This means there should be less brake effort on the front axle than on the rear axle, preventing wheel lockup/skidding (tire hop) on the front-axle wheels.

### The Basics

Before we consider some easy maintenance checks on the trailer braking system, let's understand some system basics. The quick brake-function check you make after pulling out of your campsite activates an electrical system that meters out a smoothly graduated electric current. This produces a magnetic attraction between magnets and rotating armatures attached to the brake drums. In turn, this action converts into friction at the brake linings/drums, which develops heat. Then the heat is dissipated into the atmosphere and, in so doing, kinetic energy (energy in motion) is arrested, stopping the trailer. (Energy cannot be destroyed; it must be converted.) With a hydraulically actuated brake controller, a hydraulic line is teed off the rear brake circuit of a dual master cylinder to the electric/hydraulic controller. This permits hydraulic brake pressure to activate the electric trailer brakes via the controller a moment before the tow-vehicle brakes are applied. We also know that they can be actuated by finger pressure on the controller bar/handle.


Electricity is coming from the battery/alternator, and it is metered through the controller. Either it is electronic or it uses a multiple resistor/ multiple contact principle. The elecmay be adjusted via controls on the controller until balanced tow-vehicle/ trailer braking is achieved. This provides a metered current through the variable system resistor (if used). This resistor properly proportions the braking power of the trailer brakes to the trailer weight. The wiring harness is routed along the truck frame, the power cable and the trailer frame. This brings current to each magnet in the trailer-brake assemblies.


As electrical current flows, an electromagnetic field is energized in each

magnet. This brings the magnet into contact with the rotating armature in the brake drum. That, in turn, pulls on a lever arm/cam, which forces the brake shoes/linings into contact with the brake drum. The greater the designed electrical current flow metered into the magnet, the stronger the electromagnetic field. Therefore, a greater torque (braking effort) is applied to the wheel/tire for stopping. When the hydraulic brakes of the tow vehicle are released, springs that are attached to the brake shoes return the trailer brake shoes to their retracted/released position.

The electrical brake wiring system should be protected by installing a 20amp (for four brakes) momentary-delay-type circuit breaker in the positive (hot) wire between the battery and the controller. The circuit breaker will protect the electric brake wiring (circuitry) from possible short circuits. A fuse should not be used since fuse burn-out would make trailer brakes completely inoperative. To complete the circuit to the tow vehicle, automotive type multistranded 12-gauge wire with thermoplastic insulation should be used. Connections made from the battery to the controller should be soldered and insulated with heat shrink or electrician's tape. Do not use wire nut connectors at the controller!

From the controller, wires are routed to the stoplights and the system resistor (if used), and are secured along the body/frame away from exhaust or moving components. They terminate at the rear of the tow vehicle at a heavy-duty electrical socket, which mates to the trailer power-cable plug. This completes the electrical brake circuitry on the tow vehicle, except for ground. The return path (negative) for this circuit is the towvehicle chassis/body. Good ground connections are essential for proper operation. The trailer's fifth-wheel or hitch and ball are not to be part of the ground circuit. A separate ground wire routed through the trailer wiring harness, power cable and tow-ve-



hicle electric socket must be used. The basic rule for any ground is that just because it feels tight doesn't necessarily mean it's electrically tight. Use a star washer when installing the ground to the tow-vehicle chassis/body. Voltage drop (loss) through a ground connection should be zero.

The trailer circuit for electric trailer brakes begins at the power cord; the wiring harness is routed along the frame to each axle and brake assembly. In addition, there is the trailer battery with a positive (hot) wire to the breakaway switch. This switch feeds the main wiring harness when the pin

is pulled, applying trailer brakes in case of accidental tow-vehicle and trailer separation.

## Routine Maintenance


Maintenance on the electrical circuit of the trailer brake system is minimal. Start with a visual inspection of the trailer power cord, the breakaway switch, and wiring along the frame, plus inspection of the connections to the brake magnets. Examine the magnets when the wheel/brake drums are removed. Magnets should be replaced when the small screw heads are showing wear, if the magnet grooves

are gone, or if the magnet face is not wearing evenly (check with a straightedge). Also, replacement is necessary if the magnet is shorted or has an open circuit. Time intervals for brake inspection will vary, depending upon trailer load and miles covered. Every 10,000 miles is a good time to inspect the brake lining and magnets, and to pack the wheel bearings. Every 90 days, check and/or lube the breakaway-switch pin, using an anti-seize compound. If you see that wiring is loose or hanging down, tape is coming off, or connections are loose at the wheels, now is the time to repair it. This is a safety system. Let's not put off the needed repair!

On the road, if we notice that the tow vehicle wiggles right or left as the controller is fingered (pulsed) heavily, then possibly a brake assembly (one or both) is not working on the opposite side from the direction of pull. This could be a magnet that is worn out or a connection that has become corroded or loose. It may also mean that the brake adjustment is tighter on one side than the other, or there is a friction difference between brake linings from side to side. There may be wheel-bearing grease leaking past the wheel-bearing seal onto the lining, or the lining may be worn out. Brake shoes and lining are always replaced in axle sets.

To test for total current flow into the system and operation of the electric-hydraulic controller, an ammeter needs to be placed in series, or an induction ammeter may be placed around the wire. Install it in/around the brake wire directly after the controller. Connect the trailer power cord to the tow vehicle, and apply the tow vehicle's hydraulic brakes lightly (with engine running). This will activate the electric-hydraulic controller. Light pressure should register 1 to 1¾ amps. Heavy pedal application should produce 12 amps for a tandem-axle (four-brake) trailer that does not utilize an electrical resistor on the front axle; the minimum should be

When an electronic controller is used, set the gain control for maximum braking and move the control handle to the maximum position. Make sure the controller is mounted in a level position. Ammeter reading should be the same as above. If you want to check the automatic apply feature of this controller, you will have to drive the rig. This is because a pendulum action is used to trigger the circuitry of the unit. Natural g-forces of deceleration swing the pendulum, which activates the electronics when the tow vehicle's brakes are applied. An assistant will be necessary to read the ammeter while you keep your eyes safely on the road.

If the brakes lock up or seem to be applied when you are trying to pull away, the breakaway switch may be activated. Check to see that the cable and pin are in place. To test the breakaway switch, jerk the cable, pulling the pin from the switch, and try moving the trailer, or check for current flow going to all brake assemblies. To do this, install an ammeter in series at the breakaway switch. It should read 12-plus amps (at least 2.5 amps per brake) without the use of a front-axle resistor when the pin is pulled (tandem axle - four brakes). If it goes over 15 amps, immediately reinstall the breakaway pin into the switch, shutting off the current flow. High amperage can overheat the trailer circuit, causing damage. Find and repair the

To check for voltage at the brake assembly, a test light or voltmeter can be used. However, the presence of voltage does not mean that the magnet is working. The amount of voltage or brightness of the test light is dependent upon controller adjustment and brake pedal or finger pressure applied to the controller bar/handle. There must be current flow to each magnet. Measure it with an ammeter in series with each magnet positive (hot) wire; it is easier to use an induction-type ammeter around the wire. Maximum braking should bring approximately 3 amps at each wheel, or full power should produce about 6 amps per axle without a resistor on the axle. Again, this is dependent upon the controller setting and the variable system resistor setting (if one is used). Use of a resistor in series with the front-brake

assemblies would reduce current flow by about one-half on the front axle only. Use of a resistor on the front axle only allows more braking action without wheel skidding by applying more current to the rear-brake assemblies, which carry more weight due to the aforementioned action of the rocker-arm suspension.

If the ammeter reads excessively high, a shorted magnet/wiring is indicated. This may cause the circuit breaker to pulse the system. Internally wired axles sometimes have intermittent shorts inside the axle tube, and they should be rewired outside the tube.

Low current flow with the hydraulic controller set for maximum braking and with maximum pressure applied to brake pedal/handle (with engine running) may indicate that the system variable resistor is set incorrectly, or resistance in the wiring either on the tow vehicle or the trailer. Completely inspect tow-vehicle/ trailer circuitry for damaged wiring, loose connections or undersize wiring, and do not forget the ground connections! Separate the trailer power cable from the tow vehicle, and pull the pin from the breakaway switch. Then recheck the trailer current flow. If normal, the problem is on the tow vehicle. If current flow is still low, there is a problem in the trailer circuitry. (Make sure the trailer battery has a full state of charge and the terminal connections are clean.) Installation of an under-dash ammeter can be helpful in evaluating on-theroad trailer brake performance.

When brake service work is done, the rig needs to be road-tested. Apply brakes several times at low speeds, fingering the controller bar/handle. Trailer brakes should respond with steady braking, without pulling to the left or right. The front-axle wheels/tires should not skid. If maximum braking is not satisfactory without front-axle wheels/tires skidding, a resistor may be necessary on that axle. If overall braking is too severe, a variable system resistor may need to be installed (Warner Electric Part Nos. 1100-51). Make a habit of listing all brake repairs on a maintenance guide.

Electric trailer-brake systems are relatively simple to diagnose and repair, and the payoff is safer trailering. TL



#### WBCCI FLAG POLICY

In this time of national pride and the desire to display our country's flag, it is appropriate to state the WBCCI Flag Policy. The policy governs all official events, whether it is an International, Region or Unit event. The policy is based on long-standing flag protocol.

When flying only one national flag, always fly the flag of the country you are in. Never fly another country's flag. You may also fly your 1. state of provincial flag, or the flag of your WBCCI office.

When flying two national flags on two flagpoles; both flags must be of the same size and flown at the same height. Always respect the protocol of the country you are in. The positions of the flags are as follows (as viewed looking at the front of the RV):

On your left

On your right

USA

Canadian Mexican State

Your WBCCI office

When in Canada

When in USA

Canadian

USA Mexican Provincial

Your WBCCI office

When in Mexico

Mexican

USA

Canadian

Your WBCCI office

In the USA and Mexico, you may fly two flags on the same flagpole (when using only one flagpole), but only when the USA and Mexican flag is at the top in their respective countries. No other national flag may be flown below the higher national flag, but you may fly your state flag when in the USA; or you may fly your office flag. In Mexico, only your office flag may be flown below the national (Mexican) flag. This configuration of two flags on one flagpole is not authorized in Canada.

When flying three flags on equal length flagpoles, the center one will be higher than the outer two on the fan-type holders commonly

used. While this situation is also not authorized in Canada, it may be used in the USA and Mexico as follows:

On your left

Center

On your right

When in USA

State or current

USA

Current or prior office flag

WBCCI office flag

When in Mexico

International or Region office flag Mexican

Region or unit office flag

When flying three flags on a fan-type holder with more than one national flag, the center flag must be flown at a reduced height so that the center flag is at the same height from the ground as the outer flags. Using this arrangement, the following protocol applies:

Note that the above arrangement allows choices in Canada and Mexico on where the USA flag is flown, governed by what other flags also fly. In the USA, there is no choice - the USA flag must be on your left.

There is other etiquette regarding the USA flag worth knowing, but they are too numerous for this memo. They will be in a future memo. Remember, fly your flags with pride, often, and always respect the protocols of the country you are in. When in doubt, ask a knowledgeable citizen of the host country.

# Constitution

#### Article I

# Name of Organization

Section 1: This organization, incorporated in the State of Connecticut, is a chartered Unit of the Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc., and shall be known as the Charter Oak Connecticut Unit of the Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc.

#### Article II

# **Objectives**

Section 1: The objectives of this non-profit organization shall be to furnish encouragement and assistance in the development of the Unit and thus afford fraternization for Airstream trailer and motorhome owners; to encourage safe driving and assist in improving the general welfare of the recreational vehicle public through assistance and active participation of all its members in building a strong organization for the betterment of goodwill toward trailer and motorhome travel; to coordinate with and participate in the interests and activities of the International and the Region; to cooperate with other organizations and units within our sphere which are seeking to elevate the standards and ethics of the various groups; to disseminate information of an advisory and educational nature which will be of value to its members and the public; to study, advise and recommend legislation which is in the interest of the trailering and motoring public and oppose all legislation which is discriminatory and injurious to the trailering and motoring public; and to encourage government and private agencies to provide more and better trailer and motorhome parks and facilities.

### Article III

### Membership Qualifications

Section 1: Adult ownership of a fully self-contained and hard sided recreational vehicle manufactured by Airstream, Inc., is a prerequisite for membership in this Unit.

Section 2: There are two classes of membership in this unit: Regular and Affiliate Members.

Section 3: An applicant for membership in this Unit must submit an application in writing and, upon the payment of International and Unit dues, shall be a Regular Member of this Unit.

- Section 4: Regular Members who have sold their recreational vehicle manufactured by Airstream, Inc., may, upon request, retain their membership as Regular Members of this Unit pursuant to the provisions of Article VI Sec.2C of the International Constitution. Such Regular Members shall possess all the rights and privileges of the International Club, including full voting rights in all elections and on all questions.
- Section 5: Regular Members of another Unit may become Affiliate Members in this Unit by an application to the Membership Committee and upon acceptance shall possess all the rights and privileges of the Unit, except the right to hold office in the Unit or the right to vote in the selection or election of officers in the Unit, Region, or International or on any amendment to the Unit or the International Constitution or on the dissolution of the Unit or the merger of the Unit with another Unit.
- Section 6: Applicants for membership in this Unit must submit dues and join the International Club simultaneously or show evidence of membership in the International Club through another duly chartered unit.
- Section 7: Failure to pay either Unit or International dues will automatically terminate membership in the Unit.
- Section 8: In those cases of co-ownership of an fully self-contained hard sided recreational vehicle manufactured by Airstream, Inc., the rights and privileges of membership shall be deemed to include the spouses of such co-owner but collectively such co-owners shall possess one vote only except such co-owners who each pay International and Unit dues to this Unit shall each have one vote.

#### Article IV

#### Officers and Their Election

- Section 1: The Officers of the Unit shall consist of a President, a First Vice President, a Second Vice President, a Corresponding Secretary, a Recording Secretary, a Treasurer and Directors (four). The Executive Board shall consist of all of the Unit Officers plus the Immediate Past President of the Unit.
- Section 2: The Officers shall be elected at the annual business meeting and shall be installed and shall assume office at that time. An officer shall serve in office for a term of one year or until a successor is elected but in no case shall an officer, except the Recording Secretary, Corresponding

Secretary or Treasurer, be eligible to serve more than two consecutive terms in the same office, provided said officers are duly nominated and elected for each term of office.

- Section 3: An officer who advances to an office pursuant to the provisions of Sec. 5 of this ARTICLE shall not be deemed to have served a full term in such office unless said service is for a period of greater than one-half (1/2) the term of such office.
- Section 4: The Directors shall be elected at the annual business meeting, each for a term of two years commencing at the annual meeting, but arranged so that only one-half such Directors' terms expire in any one year. No Director shall serve more than one two-year term consecutively.
- Section 5: In the event of the death or resignation of the President or the death, advancement or resignation of a Vice President, or an officer's inability to fulfill the duties of office, the next ranking Vice President (in the order first, second) shall advance thereto. All other vacancies on the Executive Board, except that of the Immediate Past President, shall be filled by majority vote of the Executive Board.

#### Article V

#### **Executive Board**

- Section 1: The Executive Board shall be the administrative body of the Unit and shall define the policies of and have full administrative authority in all matters pertaining to the Unit, and shall exercise general control and supervision of all officers and committees.
- Section 2: A quorum of the Executive Board shall consist of a majority of the members.

# Article VI

#### **Business Meetings**

Section 1: The annual business meeting of the members of this organization shall be held during the month of November in each calendar year. Such a meeting shall be announced by written notice and delivered to the members not less than fifteen (15) days prior to the meeting. The notice shall indicate the date, time, and location of the meeting. A quorum for conducting business at the annual meeting, or at any additional business meeting, shall not be less than ten (10) percent of members.

- Section 2: Additional business meetings of the members may be held at a suitable time and place during the second day of each rally of the members. If the rally or meeting is of less than two days duration, written notice to the members indicating the time, location, and purpose of such meeting shall be delivered to the members not less than ten (10) days prior to the meeting.
- Section 3: The Executive Board, by majority vote, may call additional business meetings of the members.
- Section 4: The President or any two members of the Board may call a business meeting of the Executive Board at any time deemed necessary.
- Section 5: All Regular and Affiliate Members voting at the annual or additional business meetings of this Unit, and each such membership, identified by the International Club Membership number, shall be considered one vote, except for co-owners who each pay International and Unit Dues to this Unit as provided for in Article III, Section 9.
- Section 6: A mail ballot may be used to obtain the vote of the members of the Unit on a proposal when such is deemed desirable or necessary. When a mail ballot is used to obtain the vote of the member of the Unit on a proposal, no other method of voting on such a proposal shall be utilized.

### Article VII

# **Bylaws**

Section 1: Bylaws not inconsistent with this Constitution, and with the Constitution, Bylaws and Policy of the Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc., embodying additional provisions for the government of the Unit may be adopted by the Executive Board.

### Article VIII

#### **Amendments**

- Section 1: Proposed amendments to this Constitution shall be submitted to the Executive Board in writing. The Executive Board shall submit all such amendments to the members for their consideration.
- Section 2: Any Article or Section of this Constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the Regular Members present and voting at a business meeting of the Unit or a special meeting called for that purpose, providing in either case, a notice containing the proposed amendment or

The President shall appoint and be an ex-officio member of all committees except the Nominating Committee.

Section 2: All Standing Committees shall consist of a Chairperson and as many members as deemed necessary by the President. Chairpersons of Standing Committees shall report at each meeting of the Executive Board.

### Standing Committees

#### General Duties

- Budget In cooperation with the incoming and outgoing Treasurer of the Unit, prepare for the Executive Board a budget projecting the unit's income and expenditures for the calendar (or fiscal) year next ensuing.
- Caravan To plan, organize, and obtain leaders for unit caravans that are operated or conducted for the Unit within the scope of the WBCCI Caravan Handbook. To develop an aggressive Unit Caravan program and to coordinate unit caravan matters with appropriate Region and International Caravan Committee personnel.
- Constitution and Bylaws To conduct a continuing review and study of the Unit and the International Constitution and Bylaws and to make recommendations for any amendments or additions deemed desirable and in the best interest of the Club.
- Ethics and Grievance To investigate and assess all grievances or complaints made by members and others and to make recommendations thereon to the Unit Executive Board.
- Family/Youth Plan programs to encourage participation of family/youth at unit functions and to be the liaison person between the Unit and International Family/Youth Standing Committee.

- Historical To record events including written and pictorial material associated with unit activities and to maintain a historical record of such.
- Hospitality To receive and make welcome guests and new members at club functions. Recommend ways to meet and greet all club members and guests at rallies and/or seasonal functions.
- Legislative To study, advise and recommend legislation in the interest of the Club and its members; to recommend opposition to all legislation which is discriminatory and injurious to the interest of the Club and its members.
- Membership be the Unit/Club contact for prospective new members and explain the purpose and objectives of the Wally Byam Caravan Club International. Extend invitations to prospective members to attend a rally or meeting when making application for membership.
- 10. Publicity To collect newsworthy items of interest to club members and to publish monthly a newsletter containing past and future events of the Unit, Region and International. To publish yearly a roster in the form and content as directed by the Executive Board. Forward material to Headquarters for publishing in the Blue Beret and Directory with respect to the Unit's activities schedule.
- Public Relations To maintain communications with the International and Region Public Relations Committee for maintaining a continuing program of public relations between WBCCI and communities being exposed to rallies and caravans.

Section 3: Special committees may be appointed by the President as required.

#### Article III

#### Guests

- Section 1: A guest (or guests) sponsored and invited by a member in good standing and sharing that member's facilities may attend activities of the Unit. Members sponsoring such a guest shall pay one extra rally fee exclusive of the parking fee.
- Section 2: A member in good standing in this Unit may sponsor and invite a prospective member to attend activities of the Unit.
- Section 3: Members in good standing in the International Club may attend activities of the Unit provided that such members.

and where required, shall have made prior reservation for each attendance.

Section 4: The Unit, once each calendar year, may host a rally, caravan or combination thereof with a recreational vehicle club not chartered by the Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc., and, it may conduct twice each calendar year, a Buddy Rally or a Buddy Caravan or combination thereof to which each member may invite not more than one nonmember recreational vehicle family.

#### Article IV

#### Nominating Committee

Section 1: The Executive Board shall, not less than 90 days prior to the Unit's annual business meeting, appoint a three member Nominating Committee who shall, after having obtained the prior consent of each proposed nominee, place in nomination one candidate for each office and director to be filled by election, and submit a written report to the Executive Board which shall include the names of all candidates considered, and the President shall distribute the report to the membership not less than fifteen (15) days prior to said business meeting. Additional candidates, who have previously consented, may be placed in nomination from the floor of that meeting. No seconds are required for any nomination.

# Article V Duties of Officers

- Section 1: The President shall preside at all meetings of the Unit and Executive board, enforce the Constitution and Bylaws, appoint all standing committees and have such powers and duties as normally pertain to the principal executive officer.
- Section 2: The 1st Vice President shall attend all business meetings of the Unit and the Executive Board and shall assist the President and assume the duties of the President, when absent.
- Section 3: The 2nd Vice President shall attend all business meetings of the Unit and the Executive Board and shall assist the President and 1st Vice President and assume the duties of the President and 1st Vice President in their absence, and will perform the duties assigned by the Executive Board.
- Section 4: The Corresponding Secretary shall issue notices of all meetings of the Unit and Executive Board as prescribed in

Article VI, Sections 1 and 2 and Article VIII, Section 2 of the Constitution. The Corresponding Secretary shall prepare an agenda of pending business for use by the presiding officer at each meeting and shall keep a register of all members of the Unit.

- Section 5: The Recording Secretary shall record and preserve the minutes of all official meetings of the Unit and the Executive Board; copies of same shall be available to members of the Executive Board not more than fifteen (15) days following each meeting, upon request. The Recording Secretary shall record the attendance of the officers and directors at each meeting and shall advise the presiding officer if a quorum is present.
- Section 6: The Treasurer shall maintain the financial records of the Unit and shall receive all moneys and promptly deposit them in the bank previously chosen by the Executive Board; shall notify members of expiration of dues and issue receipts for dues paid; shall submit a full written report of finances to the Executive Board at each meeting and before retirement shall have the books and accounts audited by a committee of not less than three members selected by the incoming President. All books, monies, and property of the Unit held by the Treasurer shall be delivered promptly to the successor.
- Section 7: The duties of the Directors shall be as prescribed in Section 1, Article V, of the Constitution and to attend all meetings of the Unit and the Executive Board; to accept special assignments as directed by the President.

### Article VI

#### Delegates

Section 1: The Executive Board shall select one delegate and one alternate from among the officers and Regular and Associate members who will attend the annual Delegates meeting of the parent organization, the Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc. Any vacancy occurring following such selection shall be filled by appointment by the President. The delegate and alternate should be instructed respecting the wishes of the Unit on matters to come before the meeting. The President and Secretary shall certify to these selections.

# Article VII

#### Dues

Section 1: The annual dues of Regular and Affiliate members shall be set by the Executive Board.

Section 2: A member who fails to pay properly assessed International and Unit dues before November 15 may not be listed in the Annual Membership Directory of the International Club for the following year. If the dues are not paid and receipted by the Treasurer on or before December 31, membership will be terminated.

#### Article VIII

#### Code of Ethics

Section 1: All members shall abide by the following Code of Ethics:

- (a) To be ever mindful of our responsibility to the Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc., and through conduct indicate to the public that membership in this organization is an assurance of courtesy on the road and of goodwill to all peoples and countries.
- (b) To say or print nothing which may reflect unfavorably on others and to dedicate ourselves to the work of cementing together the members of our units and the Club in bonds of friendship, good fellowship, and mutual understanding.
- (c) To conduct ourselves so as to inspire others also engaged in recreational vehicle travel to a full appreciation of the intent and meaning of this code.
- (d) To maintain our camps and parking areas in an orderly manner and to leave them in a neat and clean condition.

### Article IX

#### Liability

Section 1: Neither the Unit nor its officers are responsible for the loss of or damage to property or for injury to or death of a person on the premises of any club function. This freedom for responsibility for loss or damage to property applies regardless of whether that property has been received by any member or officer or left upon the premises.

#### Article X

#### **Amendments**

Section 1: These Bylaws may be amended at any business meeting of the Executive Board by two-thirds vote, provided the proposed amendment has been submitted to all members of the Executive Board in writing at least ten (10) days prior to such meeting.


Section 2: Such amendments shall become effective upon adoption.

### Article XI

#### Dissolution

Section 1: In the event of dissolution of this Unit, the members shall, through the President, assign all assets to the International Club, or in the case of an incorporated unit, to such other trustee appointed in accordance with the laws governing non-profit corporation in the State or province of their incorporation, to be held in trust until such time as the charter is restored, the unit is reorganized, or a new charter is issued when such assets shall be returned or transferred to the newly functioning unit. This procedure is in accordance with the meaning of Section 501 © (7) of the Internal Revenue Service Code. None of the funds shall enure to the benefit of any member and the Unit Charter and all International club property shall be returned to International Club Headquarters.

# Guidelines for Rallies & Meetings

#### 1. Chatter Article

Appoint someone in advance to write a news article for the Chatter describing the event and ask them to submit the article to the Chatter editor within a few days after the event. This is the responsibility of the host. Failure to do so will result in a delay in publishing our newsletter.

#### 2. Advance Notice

When preparing flyers, include information regarding rally fees, dates, parking, deposits, activities, potluck dinners, etc. Submit a flyer (sign-up sheet) to the Chatter editor in advance of your event.

# 3. Rally Expenses

All rallies should be self-supporting, each person paying his share of the expenses. When visitors pay the same as members, they feel free to take part. This also prevents criticism over treasury funds being used for activities in which all members do not participate.

### Suggestions for Making a Successful "First Impression" at a WBCCI Rally

- a. Have a Greeting Committee to meet arrivals with a . . . "Hi! Glad you're here!" Some may be new owners and new to our program. Make them feel at home. Give each person a name tag, give each RV a program, or if you do not have programs, tell them to check the bulletin board for the schedule of activities.
- b. Have a hospitality center so that on arrival the greeters can say . . . "the coffee is on . . . get set up and then come over \_\_\_\_." Have a bulletin board at the hospitality center.
   Post announcements and program, and perhaps a sign . . . "Welcome to the Charter Oak Connecticut Unit, WBCCI."
- c. Take a snapshot of each family and paste it in the Unit history book. These books are of interest to everyone and should be on display at all Unit rallies.
- Have a Unit guest book and ask everyone to sign it at each rally.
- e. Award a "gate" prize. One thought . . . number the programs and lucky number gets the prize . . . use some kind of gag.
- Plan something for the children. It will make a more enjoyable rally for everyone.

# 5. Rally Parking

Park rally hosts together. These are the people who are responsible for the success of the rally. Be sure everyone knows where to locate officers and hosts.

### Meetings

Wally patterned "Meeting Time" after the old town hall meetings. Meetings may be strictly social or a combined social and business meeting. Meetings give everyone an opportunity to get together. Meetings provide a time to get acquainted, to exchange ideas, to discuss objectives and accomplishments. This is a time to take part and a time to recognize individual contributions. The sidewalk café meeting is always fun. Members bring their refreshments and sit around and talk about what has been done or seen, trips made, etc. This usually takes place about 4:30 in the afternoon. If a business meeting or a combined business meeting and social meeting is planned, notice should be posted. Everyone will make an extra effort to get back from sight-seeing or shopping.

#### Bulletin Board

Place a bulletin board in a central location (the hospitality RV is often used) as a center of activities for announcements and program news. If you have a printed program, post one on the board. Keep everyone informed about what is going on.

#### 8. Church Services

Post notices of local church services on the bulletin board.

#### 9. Head Table

Arranging the head table and the seating of guests depends upon the size of the table and the number to be seated. If possible, your own officers and their spouses should be seated at the head table. If there isn't room for the spouses, they should be placed as near the head table as possible. The President should sit in the center position. Visiting VIPs and International officers would normally be seated at the head table. A special table for officers, past and present, may be arranged. If you have overlooked someone who might reasonably expect to sit at the head table, ask them to stand and be acknowledged. This helps to overcome what could be an embarrassing situation.


