

LUNENBURG, NOVA SCOTIA - REGION 1 RALLY AUGUST 23-26, 2002

The "Old Town" part of Lunenburg proudly preserves the original layout of a planned Colonial settlement, established in 1753. A walk through the town will provide the visitor with examples of 18th and 19th Century churches, homes and commercial buildings. Lunenburg was home to the Bluenose, the undefeated champion of the North Atlantic Fishing Fleet and the winner of four international schooner races. Her likeness is on the Canadian Dime.

The Fisheries Museum of the Atlantic is located on Bluenose Drive, Lunenburg. Visitors can view an aquarium with freshwater and saltwater fish. Other spots of interest include a boat room, displays of ship models and sea artifacts, exhibits detailing the history of rumrunning, and the story of the Bluenose. This is a three story, fun for all ages complex. Lunenburg offers visitors a pleasant setting for sightseeing, boating, golfing, walking, shopping and entertainment.

RV Industry Heritage

King Of The Caravans

As the Airstream Company, which he had founded in 1934, resumed trailer production following its shut down by the material rationing required by World War II, Wally Byam turned the day-to-day operations over to others, and set his course on developing the caravan concept of RV travel.

Wally, however, was never satisfied with the basic or the mundane. Point-to-point in the good ole USA just would not do in his greater scheme of things. He had enjoyed many challenging adventures pulling his own unit and was sure that others would enjoy group RV travel.

In the years from about 1950 through the mid 1960s, he conceived, planned, organized and led large groups of trailer tourists on 27 exotic trips to Mexico, Central and South America, Canada, Alaska, Europe, Africa, China, and around the World. All caravan units were car or truck and trailer; no motorized units participated in his caravans.

The early caravans were open to all brands of trailers but the later ones were exclusively for Airstream owners. One thing Wally did recognize early in his caravan career was that RVers visiting foreign lands were not "Good Will Ambassadors" or United Nations representatives — they were simply tourists and were out to enjoy the sights, sounds, and differences in the people and places they visited while being good neighbors and good citizens. In many cases, the political situation really required that for personal safety they mind their own business very carefully.

Wally developed the concept of pilot trips, advance arrangements, and political expediency that allowed his international trips to go relative-

ly smoothly.

For his 1951 trip from El Paso, Texas, through Mexico, Guatemala, El Salvador, Honduras, Nicaragua, and Costa Rica, and, of course, return, he led 63 RV units on a journey that required passports, visas, food drops, gas drops, medical arrangements and all manner of

special details unlike domestic RV travel.

This trip is generally recognized as the very first international RV caravan. He found that towropes and winches were absolutely essential in many areas where roads and bridges were simply figments of some mapmaker's imagination.

The 25 or so exotic RV adventures that followed over the next 15 years, while quite expensive, were very popular. After about six years of organizing trips that covered all of North and Central America, in 1955 and 56, he organized a trip throughout Europe that included Italy, the French

Riviera, Spain, and north through all of Western Europe to Sweden and Norway.

On this trip he learned that trans-Atlantic shipping companies would not transport more than twelve car-trailer units on a given ship because the bulk space in a ship's hold taken up by a car or truck with a trailer did not equal the ballast weight required for that amount of cargo space

The 35 units on this first overseas caravan thus were relegated to three different ships and arrival schedules. The group departure date had to be delayed until all participants had arrived. This trip, at least, had the advantage of all being traveled on improved and mapped roads with regular service available. Some were not so easy.

KING OF THE CARAVANS - CONTINUED

The African caravan from Capetown, South Africa, to Cairo, Egypt, took over two years to arrange and set up. Forty-one trailers, all pulled by four-wheeldrive trucks, which were required for participation on this adventure, left Capetown on June 30, 1959, and arrived at Cairo 221 days later on February 19, 1960, having traveled 14,307 miles breaking their own trail and fording bridgeless streams much of the way. Road scouts were sometimes required to go ahead to be sure that civil wars in some areas had not negated the prior arrangements made on the pilot trip. On this trip, the participant's ages ranged from a six-year-old child to an 85-yearold doctor who assisted the group with medical services.

The trailers varied in length from 16 to 30 feet with most being 22 to 24-feet long. On his trips through Africa and the later 1964-65 "Caravan Around the World," it was necessary to arrange with oil companies and large trucks to meet the group with fuel, oil, and mechanical supplies, sometimes hundreds of miles from the closest commercial service station.

Wally Byam passed away in 1962 but his team of exotic caravan developers carried on with his dreams. As if the challenges of a south to north trip through Africa had not been enough, in 1964 and 65 they left the Philippine Islands and traveled west through China, Cambodia, Thailand, India, Pakistan, Afghanistan, Iran, Iraq, Syria, Turkey and on into Greece, Italy, and back through France and north again to Scandinavia. The trip closely followed a historic caravan route that Marco Polo had mapped in 1273.

This was listed as the Wally Byam Around-the-World Caravan and was documented in a series of TV shows supported by the National Geographic Society and narrated by movie star Vincent Price. These shows greatly assisted the explosion in RV popularity in the late 1960s.

On his caravans and other travels alike, Wally espoused his Four Freedoms of RV travel:

Freedom from arrangements-reservations, schedules, taxis and tips. "You do not have to worry about your reservations in the next town or where you are going to sleep tonight. You have all of your accommodations right there with you. Home is where you stop."

Freedom from the problems of age-"For some, checkers, clubs, gardening and grandchildren are not enough. Out of this boredom, ailments are born."

Freedom to know-"You meet people on a plane or a train and the next day you separate. When you travel in a trailer, you meet people in their homes and they meet you in yours."

Freedom for fun-"To relax and lose yourself mentally."

Wally Byam's well publicized adventures around the world not only served to expand the imagination of RV owners, but they introduced the RV as a travel concept in parts of the world where automobiles were rarely seen, much less one pulling a small but fully livable house behind it. As the worldwide fame of these adventures grew, the politics of gaining permits to travel through some of the countries became much easier.

Wally Byam's success in building the caravan travel concept added yet another feature to the wonderful world of self-contained travel.

For his many contributions to RVs and the RV lifestyle, Wally Byam was posthumously elected as a member of the first class inducted into the RV/MH Hall of Fame in 1972.



REPORT FROM THE MIDWINTER IBT MEETING

The Midwinter IBT meeting of the WBCCI was held in Kerrville, Texas, January 14-18, 2002. All three Region One officers attended in their trailers/motorhome.

The following motions were adopted:

- 1. Increasing the member-at-large surcharge from \$10 to an amount set by the IBT. This motion now will become an item to be voted upon by all units at their spring business meeting, and at the June Delegates' Meeting at the International Rally in Rapid City.
- 2. Requiring that any withdrawal in excess of \$10,000 from the International Rally Fund must be approved by the IBT. Lesser amounts must be approved by the Executive Committee of WBCCI.
- 3. Authorizing the Youth, General/Preteens Chairman to withdraw funds from the Common Cents for Kids Fund.
- Establishing an "International Rally Equipment Fund" (maximum of \$20,000) to repair and replace equipment used at International rallies.
- Article IV, Section 9 of the International Bylaws clarified to require members attending any WBCCI event to stay either in an Airstream or at a hotel/motel. No one may attend who is staying in any other brand of RV.
- 6. Ballots for unit or region officers revised for clarity.
- 7. Flag protocol to be reviewed to clarify arrangement in meeting halls. *
- 8. The Pledge of Allegiance recited at WBCCI events will no longer use the phrase "flag of my country." Members will now be told to say the name of their country.
- 9. A motion providing for the listing of owner/members with different last names was withdrawn because WBCCI will have a program in place to accomplish this by midyear 2002.*
- 10 A motion by the Cape Cod Massachusetts Unit to extend the free one-year membership program to include private sales was passed to also include purchases of used Airstreams from any dealer. Legal proof of purchase must be provided. This applies only to individuals who have never before been members of WBCCI. This change is effective January 18, 2002. It does not apply to earlier transactions.

Don't forget to sign up for the International Rally at Rapid City. The application is in the Blue Beret. You'll enjoy the rally -- if you've never been, be sure to plan to attend. And if you have gone to an International Rally before, you already know it's a great experience.

Eileen and I appreciate the opportunity to represent Region One, and we thank each and every one of you for your support.

A NEW ADVENTURE... BIG BEND NATIONAL PARK... AND PARTS IN BETWEEN

Following the Kerrville, Texas Mid-winter Board Meeting of the IBT, the call was, go West young man (and woman), go West. So, following Dick and Mary Ellen Banks' (Region 4 President and First Lady) lead, we shoved off West. Past International President Ed Elmer became a tour guide of sorts (on paper) and mapped out an itinerary for us to follow. After all, this is his neck of the woods and had led groups through Big Bend on many occasions.

Our first stop was at the Sonora Caverns, in Sonora, Texas. There is a very accommodating campground attached right to Caverns, we parked and were ready to hike into the Caverns. We didn't feel like we were traveling deep into the Caverns, but down, down we hiked. The sights were just beautiful and well worth our efforts. Our tour guide was a delightful young man who was well informed about what we were seeing. Deer just came from everywhere to feed in the parking lot where grain had been laid for them along with the peacocks that patrolled the grounds. The white-tailed deer are everywhere in this area!

Off we went to Del Rio, TX. The scenery in this area is pretty much the same, wide open, ranches, prickly pair cactus (lots of it), and sparse dwellings. It was a lonely road we traveled on, once-in-a-while a traffic, it is a long way to travel for a loaf of bread. Homes did begin to poke up as we drove closer to Del Rio. Camp was set up and off we went to Ciudad Acuno, Mexico and Crosby's for dinner. Ed Elmer said, you must go to Crosby's for a meal, it was excellent. The bus ride to the town was definitely the way to go costing us \$2.50 each, round trip. Had we known the distance to the town, we could have walked it, was probably about a mile. This is a very nice and busy boarder town. The shops were packed with wares that the owners were anxious to sell us.

Our next stop was Langtry, TX. That is where Judge Roy Bean conducted his legal business and ran the saloon. It was definitely a step back into his era and the old West. His legal library consisted of one book! Lets face it; the crimes were simple in those days.

Off to Big Bend! As we began our trek into Big Bend, the scenery began to change. The terrain was becoming more rugged and delightful. For those who have never been there, you must see this lovely National Park to believe! We stopped at Panther Junction Visitor's Center and immediately were greeted by a group of Airstreamers who had been at the Kerrville, TX Mid-winter IBT and were invited to their Happy Hour. So, another 20 miles to Rio Grande Village and we immediately saw Ray and Cecile Lemaire (Region 2nd VP) who had arrived earlier in the day. We parked in the dry camping area, as this area is much larger than the full-hook portion. It was late in the afternoon and the spots were not as desirable as they could have been. This was on a first-come-first-served basis so there were some larger spots that we could have fit in better that were taken by smaller rigs. But we did find a spot to squeeze into but this was more difficult for the Banks' with their motor home.


The following morning we shoved off to see the sights of this beautiful spot. The desert, the mountains and then there was the river...the Rio Grande River. There was one spot that we could have walked to the edge of the River and there was a boat to ride across the river. We looked at this area from the distance but Ray and Cecile Lemaire took the challenge and went over into Mexico for lunch. The River was winding its way separating our two countries for the whole park. In some cases, it looked very shallow, but the current was moving pretty swiftly. We walked on the Boquillas Canyon Trail with the Lemaires. As we approached the opening of the Canyon where the River rushes, the wind was at a pretty stiff gale. The sand blasted our faces, and we were all dressed in our winter finery to help protect ourselves. This is a beautiful Canyon Trail, well worth the hike. By the time we hiked back to our vehicles, we were stripping off our winter coats and hats from the warmth. The Hot Springs is just that. There is the Rio Grande River flowing along side of this area that has been built up to contain the hot springs. The water maintains a 105-degree temperature; you are invited to try it out. There was someone doing just that with others arriving to do the same. In this area there are pictographs that were left on the rocks by early dwellers. There were remains of dwellings where once there was active business in this area. The animals most seen at our campground were the Havalinas and the Road Runners. The Havalinas were usually in a pack, they look like pigs, but we were told that their closest relatives are the hippos. They are not friendly, but they look docile. We were constantly reminded not to leave anything that smells of food or we would see what kind of damage they could do. The Road Runners where just a hoot to watch! We were too early to see any desert blooms but the cacti were everywhere and would have been beautiful. We spent 3 nights dry camping in the Rio Grande Village and were ready to shove off. The drive out of the area was a beautiful as everywhere we had been. We headed out Highway 118 into Alpine, Texas. From this spot we tried to see the Marfa Lights in Marfa, TX. These are lights that show up at night, are unexplained and are supposed to be of some sort of terrestrial phenomena. They shall remain just that, since the night we went to catch a glimpse of them, they were in hiding. We trekked to the MacDonald Observatory and Fort Davis, both in Fort Davis. The Observatory houses some mighty powerful and huge telescopes to view the skies. The tour gave us some insight into the building of the telescopes and how they work. Fort Davis is another of those little towns that just thrives on what tourism comes through the area. There is an old Hotel Limpia that was built in 1912 was still decorated in some of the treasures of the time. Another Hotel that housed a soda fountain was a good find as well and a good spot for lunch.

A fitting close to our "Big Bend" Excursion was a church service that the four of us attended on Sunday morning in Alpine. It certainly gave us a pause to reflect on the good fortunes for which we are blessed and to-travel about these beautiful United States. The friendliness of these church folks left us with the best send off we could have asked for. What a delight this trip was...try it, you'll like it!



REGION ONE NEWSLETTER SPRING 2002

As we look forward to beginning a new camping season, this is a good time to discuss ways of being a courteous camper -- how to be considerate of others while enjoying the outdoors in our Airstream r.v.'s.

First, there are 2 references to pets in the WBCCI Blue Book worth repeating here:

Page 44, section 7.L. states, "A special area shall be provided for members with dogs (1/24/87) at International Rallies." This is not required for Region or Unit rallies so far.

Appendix 14, page 9, #5 states, "Keep pets under control at all times. Clean up after them. Pets should not be in hospitality area." This applies to all WBCCI events. Pets should always be on a leash and never brought into any hospitality area (meaning where a group of people gather for discussions, food, beverage, or entertainment). This applies to all pets, not just dogs.

Do not leave dogs behind in the camper if they are noisy, because that disturbs others and may lead to restrictions such as dog-owners not being able to camp at certain campgrounds (such as state campgrounds in Connecticut).

The following is taken from the WBCCI Blue Book, Bylaws & Policy, Appendix #14, Page 9, Issued 1/21/00:

Courtesies Every Caravanner Should Observe:

- Show courtesy and consideration to all with whom you come in contact so that the goodwill of the WBCCI is enhanced.
- Dispose of all rubbish by the means provided.
- 3. Collect gray-water in the proper receptacle on rally grounds. Dispose of it in the proper manner.
- 4. Be courteous and considerate toward committee workers for they are volunteers.
- 5. Keep pets under control at all times. Clean up after them. Pets should not be in hospitality area.
- When running generators, confine their use to appropriate places and times.
- Wear WBCCI name badges at all times when at WBCCI activities or on caravans.
- 8. Let the officers and committee have the benefit of your ideas for the general improvement of the club.
- Keep the area around trailer/motorhome clean at all times.
- Keep all clothing and laundry hung inside trailer/motorhome. NEVER outside on ropes or wires.
- 11. Advise neighboring trailers/motorhomes of intent to disconnect water or power.
- 12. Protect others' water supply and keep hoses out of the dirt.
- 13. Bring a fair share to potlucks. Bring generous portions for the dinners, as we are one big family.
- 14. Make a point of getting acquainted with new members and make them welcome.
- 15. Be considerate by not smoking at meetings or meals, etc.

COOPERATION

Ways in which every Caravanner should cooperate with Unit officers as they do their work assisting all Caravanners:

- Promptly inform Unit's Secretary AND the International Headquarters of any address change.
- 2. Pay dues PROMPTLY as soon as notified, to insure inclusion in the directory.
- Return rally reservations PROMPTLY to assist the rally planners.
- Volunteer for committee assignment and other tasks as needed.

I know that if each and every one of us observes these simple rules of courtesy, it will make for a very comfortable camping experience for us all.

Eileen and I love dogs and enjoy seeing (and petting) them at various events. But, remember that some of our members, both adults and children, are allergic to pets: cats, dogs, birds, rabbits, etc. Thus, having pets in or near hospitality areas can result in a very serious medical situation - endangering the lives of some of our members.

RV TECH NEWS FROM THE TRAILER LIFE DIRECTORY FEATURE TECH TIP WATER SYSTEM SANITATION

It is not uncommon for RV owners to complain of bad water. The first sign of a contaminated water system is usually a bad taste, followed by strange orders emanating from the water supply. Bacteria may have built up in the water tank, especially if the water tank's supply has not been used frequently and has not been replenished with fresh, clean water on a regular basis. When a rig comes out of storage or is being used extensively on a city-water connection, the tank and entire water system should be sanitized before use. Some of the bacterial buildup can cause serious illness; don't take chances!

Drain the water tank completely, then refill halfway with clean, fresh water.

Mix 1/4 cup of household bleach for every 15 gallons of tank capacity in a container with a gallon or two of clean water.

Pour this mixture into the water tank.

Top off the water tank with fresh water. Drive the rig around the block to mix the solution.

Pump water through each faucet so that all the lines are filled with the water/bleach.

The hot-water tank holds at least 6 gallons of water. Run the hot-water faucets until this much solution has passed to insure that the old water has been purged from the hot-water tank, and it is now filled with the water/bleach solution from the water tank.


Let the water stand for several hours.

Drain the entire water system, hot-water tank included.

To remove the bleach odor, mix 1/2 cup of baking soda with a gallon of water and pour into the freshwater tank.

Fill the tank completely and pump this solution through the water heater and the rest of the water lines. This solution can sit in the system for a few days. Driving the rig around the block will slosh water around and thoroughly clean the tank.

Drain the entire system and refill with fresh, clean water.

The "Old Town" part of Lunenburg proudly preserves the original layout of a planned Colonial settlement, established in 1753. A walk through the town will provide the visitor with examples of 18th and 19th Century churches, homes and commercial buildings. Lunenburg was home to the Bluenose, the undefeated champion of the North Atlantic Fishing Fleet and the winner of four international schooner races. Her likeness is on the Canadian Dime.



HOW I GOT INVOLVED IN CAMPING

Carol and I were heading back from our March vacation in Florida, driving in our Plymouth mini van through South Carolina, when suddenly Carol yells "Airstream dealer! GET OFF THIS EXIT!" (Maybe this explains why my hearing has diminished in my right ear.)

Anyway, we exited 1-95 and visited Donmar RV sales of SC. I was impressed with the units but really was not focused, just trying to hurry Carol along so we could reach my daughter's house in North Carolina before dark. After "ooow-ing" and "ahh-ing" at the different units she asked for a catalog and we continued our journey.

As we continued our trip, Carol read the entire catalog to me and then even showed it in great detail to my daughter and son-in-law.

The next day we drove home.

One of our rituals is to bring fruit home for family members up north. As Carol's nephew and his wife were picking up their bounty that evening, he noticed the brochure on the coffee table and Carol explained that we were in the market for an Airstream. (News to me!). He excitedly stated that's his wife's Uncle Hans is selling one for the estate of a neighbor. Carol took Uncle Hans' telephone number, called him and made an appointment to see it the next day. That evening she searched the Internet and had reams of info for me to read in the morning.

In Bloomfield, CT the next day, we got the keys from Uncle Hans and looked over the unit. It was a 1976 31' Excella 500 rear bath model. She had stars in her eyes. The outside appeared to be in good shape except for a patched window next to the door. There were no lights as the battery was dead and the unit was not connected to a 120v source.

We figured the musty smell was from storage, and the mess inside was from the family storing all the Airstream items from the house in the trailer. Uncle Hans told us that they were asking \$3500 but had turned down \$2500. How wrong can you go?

We left Bloomfield for home (at least that's what I thought). Carol suggested that since we were out why not visit the local Airstream dealer that she had found on the Internet: it was only over the border in New York State.

After a short argument that I lost, we headed for Holiday on Wheels in Patterson, NY. We met a sales person who showed us all the new and used units. The prices convinced me that \$3500 sounded very good.

We finally got home that afternoon and decided to offer \$3200. That afternoon Carol called the lawyer handling the estate (also a neighbor of Uncle Hans) and offered \$3200 and they accepted it!

The next morning we drove back up to Bloomfield and traded the check for the keys to our new treasure. Carol investigated the interior while I removed the battery to take home to charge. Later that day we called Holiday on Wheels to have them tow and inspect the Excella. That's when we learned about vacuum brakes. It seems without a controller specifically for vacuum brakes, you cannot tow the unit. Needless to say, the controllers are no longer made. Holiday on Wheels said you need to replace the vacuum brakes with electric brakes (cost about \$1,500). We were referred to a towing company that could handle the job. That cost another \$500.

The results of the inspection were: the unit needed brakes, furnace repaired, hot water control has a gas leak, multiple water leaks so water system could not be tested, air conditioner needs work, tires have dry rot and the propane tanks need to be updated.

So we had Holiday install new brakes check all the running lights and update the tanks. We were going to do the rest of the work at home in our driveway.

The down time for these repairs gave us ample time to get a new tow vehicle. So, again Carol searched the Internet for the truck and we visited many dealers to find the perfect truck, (matching colors for the Airstream) the truck only cost TWICE the cost of my first house and is so high in the air I need to have a step installed or I'll be 1/2" shorter each time I get out.

We had to get temporary plates on the trailer because it was registered out of state, was over 25 years old so it needed to be inspected.

We picked up the trailer from the dealer the following week, drove to Danbury CT DMV for inspection by "Mr. Personality." He failed it because of the tires. These were the tires the dealer told me were bad, but I told Carol, "Naw, they're OK. They're just trying to sell us tires." Bad move! Should have left the talking to her -- she got me into this.

So we drove the unit home, backed it in the driveway and realized with it backed up to the garage door as far as it would go, it stuck three feet into the road. Carol says at this point, "Not so bad. We will just have to find a place to keep it!" (Is this what they mean by the cart before the horse?)

Well, now we needed to start cleaning it out and start the repairs. We unloaded all the closets, bins, drawers and cabinets and hooked up the water hose. Found multiple leaks in the water lines and realized that the unit had not been winterized. I repaired three split pieces of copper tubing behind the rear bathroom (15 hours of labor) and had to replace the shower control. Water now works except for a BIG drip from the hot water heater.

While I was enjoying the pleasures of water leak repair, Carol was attempting to clean the ceiling and walls. The previous owner had been a 2 - 3 pack a day cigarette smoker, who also, by the way, had 3 dogs. Maybe that was what the terrible smell was?

Next I tackled the furnace to no avail. It appeared to just be a pile of rust. The previous owner installed a quick disconnect on the gas line next to the stove and we found the catalytic heater in the closet that plugged into it. So I think maybe the heater has not worked for a while.

At this point we were kind of held up because of 2 days of heavy rain. Now when you are inside, the rain is supposed to be outside. But not on this trailer! We found multiple window and door leaks. As we investigated we found that where the water reached the floor in many places the rug was rotted and the floor damaged. Carol being ever the optimist, sent for samples of cork flooring. By the hum of the univolt, we decided to step back and figure out what we really needed to replace and get some prices.

Since it was Saturday we thought we would take a drive to some RV places, so I could start pricing things like furnaces, hot water heaters, air conditioners, caulking, lots of caulking, etc.

We were driving on Rte 7 in Danbury, had just visited Dave's RV and were heading to Litchfield when I suggested to Carol that maybe we should stop at Holiday on Wheels to get some part prices also. She said we should look at new units. WOW. I had to open my big mouth!

It was about a 30 minute drive so on the way I got a commitment that 25' was the longest unit we could put in our driveway. I also confided in her that I was not looking forward the repairs on the unit we owned, so maybe a newer unit was a consideration.

We looked at 2 different layouts on the 25's and a 22' but ended up buying a 1998 Safari 25' that had just been put on consignment and was in perfect condition.

We delivered our unit for trade in on Thursday, brought it home, loaded it up and went to an Airstream Rally in Rhinebeck, NY the next morning and came back home on Saturday.

We love our trailer and when people ask how long we have been camping we say, "We're not sure but this is our SECOND Airstream." I'm still sleeping with one eye open wondering what is next in my future. Hmm maybe she'll buy an airplane next.

"RESCUED AND DELIVERED, AS PROMISED"

On February 25, 2002, Russell and I, along with tens of other Airstreamers, were standing in the sun on a pier at Jetty Park, Cape Canaveral, Florida, waiting to board a gaming ship. I started to walk over to greet Ruby Wright, but my right foot got tangled in the handles of a tote bag near our feet and down I went. I landed so hard on my left knee, hip, elbow and shoulder that I fractured my pelvis in two places.

After a week in the Cape Canaveral Hospital, I was transferred to Sea Pines Rehabilitation Hospital in Melbourne. The hospital is only three miles from Port o' Call, where Russell had moved the trailer, so he could easily visit me on a daily basis. The rehabilitation hospital was an excellent setting for recuperation purposes. The facility is staffed by competent and caring people and I made steady progress in learning how to walk again.

Meanwhile, we were fretting about how we would get home. I knew I wouldn't be able to drive for months. Not only were Russell and I in Florida, 1200 miles from home, but so were the Airstream and the GMC. We made contact with the Sky Med representative, who assured us that by the time I was discharged, he and the social worker at Sea Pines would have worked out the details of our trip to Boston.

The Sky Med rep was as good as his word. On the appointed day a driver from Florida Medicoach arrived at the hospital at 6 a.m. and I had a wheelchair ride up into the van, on one of those little exterior platforms. That was a first for me! The driver and I then proceeded to Port o' Call to pick up Russell, who had been busy preparing the trailer for transport. Of course I had to send all my knitting needles back to Boston in the Airstream, dangerous weapons that they are, especially when wielded by sweet little old ladies! At any rate, the van operator drove us the 70 miles to Orlando International Airport. He went in and picked up two wheelchairs, as previously arranged, one for me because I could hardly walk, and one for Russell who can no longer manage those long airport walks. Then the driver turned us over to the airline personnel. We were frisked (another first) and otherwise inspected. I was able to ride in the wheelchair right up to the door of the plane, but at that point the arrangements weren't so good. Our seats were halfway down the plane and since my walker would not fit in the skinny aisle, I had to struggle along, leaning on chairs, and hurting every step of the way. Russell, watching me from behind, suffered sympathetic pains.

The flight to Dulles was uneventful. At Dulles the wheelchairs were provided again and we were transported to the second plane. No luggage pickups were necessary; we had deliberately traveled very light. In addition to my purse, Jezabel the walker, and a package of x-rays to show the Boston doctor, each of us carried only a shoulder bag.

Once settled on the second plane we ate the lunch Russell had prepared and snoozed away the time until we landed in Boston's Logan Airport. There, a friend met us and whisked us home. We arrived at 4:10 p.m., and glad indeed we were to be back in our humble little ranch house! We turned up the heat, ate a light supper, and hit the sack at 6:30, to sleep for twelve hours!!

Less than 48 hours later, a ring at the doorbell announced the arrival of the bonded driver Sky Med had hired to bring home the GMC and the trailer. Sky Med's reliable assistance made the whole experience less of a nightmare than it might have been and we are thankful that we had subscribed.

2 3/4 TABLESPOONS BAKING POWDER

1 TABLESPOON SALT

4 EGGS

1 QUART MILK

3/4 CUP OIL

MAKES ABOUT 20-23 Pancakes

Mix Dry Ingredients together.
Beat eggs slightly, add cold milk and oil.
Combine with dry ingredients.
Mixed dry ingredients can be made up days ahead. Uncooked batter can be kept refrigerated for 2-3 days.

1/2 BATCH

10 CUPS FLOUR

1 CUP SUGAR

5 1/2 TABLESPOONS BAKING POWDER

2 TABLESPOONS SALT

8 EGGS

2 QUARTS MILK

1 1/2 CUPS OIL

MAKES ABOUT 40-45 Pancakes

REGION 1 NEWSLETTER JULY 2002

The 45th International Rally "Rapid City Rendezvous", Rapid City, South Dakota, was recently completed. The IBT Meeting of 6/26/02 presided over by President Ewart Phillips, adopted the following motions:

- Flag Code Addition to Appendix 12; the flag code etiquette was clarified and adopted.
- Unit Planning Guide & Merit Award Program is a voluntary program to assist units in planning programs. In so doing, those units who are successful will be recognized and presented with an award in the form of a banner to be flown with their unit flag. Motion passed.
- Founder's Award Bolo to be presented at an International Rally or Region Rally in recognition of recruitment accumulation of 15 new members to the honoree; and with increments of 5 new members, a bar will be presented. Motion passed.

The IBT Meeting presided over by newly installed President Max Carmichael on 7/5/02 adopted these motions:

- Common Sense for Kids will accumulate residual contributions from the Youth Charity Projects for an excess over \$6,000 collected in a given
 year. In the event that in one year there isn't a sufficient total collected to be given to an area recipient, the fund would be tapped to make the
 total gift of \$6,000. Interest will accrue to this fund. Withdrawals are to be authorized by the Chairman of this committee and two of the
 members of this committee that are present at the rally. This motion was approved.
- New Owner Incentive Program...voted to continue the one-year free memberships for new owners.
- Motion to gather relevant information from current/former club members regarding restructuring the club and increasing club membership. This
 motion was tabled.
- Motion to authorize the Classic Airstream Club to become an intra-club was passed.
- Motion to amend By-Laws Article IV, Sec. 12A was passed to read: "A unit, once each calendar year, may host a rally or caravan or combination thereof with a recreation vehicle club not chartered by the WBCCI, Inc., and it may conduct, twice each calendar year (but not more than 50% of the rallies and caravans conducted by that unit in any calendar year) a buddy rally or a buddy caravan, or combination thereof, to which each member of the unit may invite not more than one non-member recreation vehicle family. The non-member recreation vehicle family to be invited is intended to be one which is a prospective member and which does not own an Airstream. The family invited to the buddy rally or caravan is to introduce them to the WBCCI "way of life" and the unit members; in hope they might decide to purchase an Airstream and join the club. A buddy rally is not intended to be used by current or past WBCCI members to attend a WBCCI rally in their non-Airstream vehicles."
- The motion to remove the requirement for the American Pledge of Allegiance...this motion was voted to be tabled and will be assigned a study
 committee for discussion at the mid-winter IBT meeting.
- Voted to approve a new flag for the Greater New Orleans Louisiana Gulf States Unit.



"and Affiliate Members" will be removed. Their rights are spelled out in Art.III, Sec.5.


By-laws Article XI

1/2 cup oil


1/4 cup honey



THE SWISS FESTIVAL RALLY AT SUGARCREEK, OHIO SEPT. 21 TO SEPT.29, 2002

"A Swiss Festival, where?", was Art's response when he first heard about the rally in Sugarcreek, Ohio, as visions of Swiss cheese danced in his head. It took him about a nanosecond to decide we were going. It took him slightly longer to convince WBCCI #12461-1/2.

We set off on Sept. 19th for Sugarcreek via Pennwood Airstream Park in Clarion, PA. We were pleasantly surprised to find 16 other units (most of them COC members) also headed to the Swiss Festival Rally. It was #12461-1/2's first visit to an Airstream Park and she was very impressed its beauty (not to mention the free mug and postcard: they even supplied the stamp.) An impromptu happy hour was held at the working end of the Price's temperamental refrigerator. Later, Pennwood provided us with a campfire, cake and ice cream.

After a refreshing rain during the night, we caravanned the short distance to Winklepleck's Grove, the location of the Rally. As we entered, each attendee was welcomed and announced over the PA system.

Then the fun began! The Land of Lakes unit's been doing this rally for 40 years and it shows. 



MY BENT SCREWDRIVER ADVENTURE

My trailer toilet suddenly began to not hold water in the bowl. When the valve leaks water down, it also leaks smells up. Panic - Panic.

Usually this involves a piece of toilet paper caught between the slider valve and the seat. Not the seat people sit on. First I tried some methods I'd rather not discuss in polite company. When these did not work, next idea was to call Thetford customer service, and see if they had any ideas. This personable lady wanted to know the information on the serial number sticker. If you become involved in looking for the serial number on one of these toilets, first make an appointment with your chiropractor. It is up under the seat and quite a challenge to see.

Next she asked me if I had a bent screwdriver. This sounded strange and different, and I allowed I didn¹t have one in my toolbox. Since my toilet was in warranty, having been put in recently, she said she would send me one.

It turned out that the bent screwdriver is not really a screwdriver. It has a screwdriver handle. Otherwise it is piece of $3/16\,$ hex rod with the end flattened and bent over at a right angle. The hexagonal part goes down $8\frac{1}{2}$ inches before the bend. The flattened part is $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches long. Thetford's instructions were:

- 1. Depress the two foot pedals to slide the blade back and fully expose the seal groove for cleaning. (A roll of duct tape jammed sideways between the body of the toilet and the pedals worked for me, and it is soft enough that it doesn't scratch. RAB).

 2. Insert the tool at the 4 o'clock position.
- 3. Rotate the tool clockwise to scrape out the debris. (You may experience resistance, which may require added twisting force to remove the build up.)
- 4. The tool should leave the seal at about the 6 o'clock position.

The instructions also suggest tying a string on the tool, in case it is dropped. My guess is that a heavy wire coat hanger, folded over at a right angle, would work also.

Constitution

Article I

Name of Organization

Section 1: This organization, incorporated in the State of Connecticut, is a chartered Unit of the Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc., and shall be known as the Charter Oak Connecticut Unit of the Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc.

Article II

Objectives

Section 1: The objectives of this non-profit organization shall be to furnish encouragement and assistance in the development of the Unit and thus afford fraternization for Airstream trailer and motorhome owners; to encourage safe driving and assist in improving the general welfare of the recreational vehicle public through assistance and active participation of all its members in building a strong organization for the betterment of goodwill toward trailer and motorhome travel; to coordinate with and participate in the interests and activities of the International and the Region; to cooperate with other organizations and units within our sphere which are seeking to elevate the standards and ethics of the various groups; to disseminate information of an advisory and educational nature which will be of value to its members and the public; to study, advise and recommend legislation which is in the interest of the trailering and motoring public and oppose all legislation which is discriminatory and injurious to the trailering and motoring public; and to encourage government and private agencies to provide more and better trailer and motorhome parks and facilities.

Article III

Membership Qualifications

- Section 1: Adult ownership of a fully self-contained and hard sided recreational vehicle manufactured by Airstream, Inc., is a prerequisite for membership in this Unit.
- Section 2: There are two classes of membership in this unit: Regular and Affiliate Members.
- Section 3: An applicant for membership in this Unit must submit an application in writing and, upon the payment of International and Unit dues, shall be a Regular Member of this Unit.
- Section 4: Regular Members who have sold their recreational vehicle manufactured by Airstream, Inc., may, upon request, retain their membership as Regular Members of this Unit pursuant to the provisions of Article VI Sec.2C of the International Constitution. Such Regular Members shall possess all the rights and privileges of the International Club, including full voting rights in all elections and on all questions.

- Section 5: Regular Members of another Unit may become Affiliate Members in this Unit by an application to the Membership Committee and upon acceptance shall possess all the rights and privileges of the Unit, except the right to hold office in the Unit or the right to vote in the selection or election of officers in the Unit, Region, or International or on any amendment to the Unit or the International Constitution or on the dissolution of the Unit or the merger of the Unit with another Unit.
- Section 6: Applicants for membership in this Unit must submit dues and join the International Club simultaneously or show evidence of membership in the International Club through another duly chartered unit.
- Section 7: Failure to pay either Unit or International dues will automatically terminate membership in the Unit.
- Section 8: In those cases of co-ownership of an fully self-contained hard sided recreational vehicle manufactured by Airstream, Inc., the rights and privileges of membership shall be deemed to include the spouses of such co-owner but collectively such co-owners shall possess one vote only except such co-owners who each pay International and Unit dues to this Unit shall each have one vote.

Article IV

Officers and Their Election

- Section 1: The Officers of the Unit shall consist of a President, a First Vice President, a Second Vice President, a Corresponding Secretary, a Recording Secretary, a Treasurer and Directors (four). The Executive Board shall consist of all of the Unit Officers plus the Immediate Past President of the Unit.
- Section 2: The Officers shall be elected at the annual business meeting and shall be installed and shall assume office at that time. An officer shall serve in office for a term of one year or until a successor is elected but in no case shall an officer, except the Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary or Treasurer, be eligible to serve more than two consecutive terms in the same office, provided said officers are duly nominated and elected for each term of office.
- Section 3: An officer who advances to an office pursuant to the provisions of Sec. 5 of this ARTICLE shall not be deemed to have served a full term in such office unless said service is for a period of greater than one-half (1/2) the term of such office.
- Section 4: The Directors shall be elected at the annual business meeting, each for a term of two years commencing at the annual meeting, but arranged so that only one-half such Directors' terms expire in any one year. No Director shall serve more than one two-year term consecutively.
- Section 5: In the event of the death or resignation of the President or the death, advancement or resignation of a Vice President, or an officer's inability to fulfill the duties of office, the next ranking Vice

President (in the order first, second) shall advance thereto. All other vacancies on the Executive Board, except that of the Immediate Past President, shall be filled by majority vote of the Executive Board.

Article V

Executive Board

- Section 1: The Executive Board shall be the administrative body of the Unit and shall define the policies of and have full administrative authority in all matters pertaining to the Unit, and shall exercise general control and supervision of all officers and committees.
- Section 2: A quorum of the Executive Board shall consist of a majority of the members.

Article VI

Business Meetings

- Section 1: The annual business meeting of the members of this organization shall be held during the month of November in each calendar year. Such a meeting shall be announced by written notice and delivered to the members not less than fifteen (15) days prior to the meeting. The notice shall indicate the date, time, and location of the meeting. A quorum for conducting business at the annual meeting, or at any additional business meeting, shall not be less than ten (10) percent of members.
- Section 2: Additional business meetings of the members may be held at a suitable time and place during the second day of each rally of the members. If the rally or meeting is of less than two days duration, written notice to the members indicating the time, location, and purpose of such meeting shall be delivered to the members not less than ten (10) days prior to the meeting.
- Section 3: The Executive Board, by majority vote, may call additional business meetings of the members.
- Section 4: The President or any two members of the Board may call a business meeting of the Executive Board at any time deemed necessary.
- Section 5: All Regular and Affiliate Members voting at the annual or additional business meetings of this Unit, and each such membership, identified by the International Club Membership number, shall be considered one vote, except for co-owners who each pay International and Unit Dues to this Unit as provided for in Article III, Section 9.
- Section 6: A mail ballot may be used to obtain the vote of the members of the Unit on a proposal when such is deemed desirable or necessary. When a mail ballot is used to obtain the vote of the member of the Unit on a proposal, no other method of voting on such a proposal shall be utilized.

Article VII

Bylaws

Section 1: Bylaws not inconsistent with this Constitution, and with the Constitution, Bylaws and Policy of the Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc., embodying additional provisions for the government of the Unit may be adopted by the Executive Board.

Article VIII

Amendments

- Section 1: Proposed amendments to this Constitution shall be submitted to the Executive Board in writing. The Executive Board shall submit all such amendments to the members for their consideration.
- Section 2: Any Article or Section of this Constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the Regular Members present and voting at a business meeting of the Unit or a special meeting called for that purpose, providing in either case, a notice containing the proposed amendment or amendments has been mailed first-class to each member of the Unit at least fifteen (15) days prior to such a meeting.
- Section 3: All amendments to this Constitution shall become effective upon adoption.

This Constitution adopted and effective May 3, 1997, at Lakeville, Massachusetts.

This Constitution was amended effective November 8, 1998, at Vernon, Connecticut.




Committees

Section 1: Standing Committees shall be:

- K. Public Relations

The President shall appoint and be an ex-officio member of all committees except the Nominating Committee.





Standing Committees

General Duties

- Budget In cooperation with the incoming and outgoing Treasurer of the Unit, prepare for the Executive Board a budget projecting the unit's income and expenditures for the calendar (or fiscal) year next ensuing.
- Caravan To plan, organize, and obtain leaders for unit caravans that are operated or conducted for the Unit within the scope of the WBCCI Caravan Handbook. To develop an aggressive Unit Caravan program and to coordinate unit caravan matters with appropriate Region and International Caravan Committee personnel.
- Constitution and Bylaws To conduct a continuing review and study of the Unit and the International Constitution and Bylaws and to make recommendations for any amendments or additions deemed desirable and in the best interest of the Club.
- Ethics and Grievance To investigate and assess all grievances or complaints made by members and others and to make recommendations thereon to the Unit Executive Board.
- Family/Youth Plan programs to encourage participation of family/youth at unit functions and to be the liaison person between the Unit and International Family/Youth Standing Committee.
- Historical To record events including written and pictorial material associated with unit activities and to maintain a historical record of such.
- Hospitality To receive and make welcome guests and new members at club functions. Recommend ways to meet and greet all club members and guests at rallies and/or seasonal functions.
- Legislative To study, advise and recommend legislation in the interest of the Club and its members; to recommend opposition to all legislation which is discriminatory and injurious to the interest of the Club and its members.
- Membership be the Unit/Club contact for prospective new members and explain the purpose and objectives of the Wally Byam Caravan Club International. Extend invitations to prospective members to attend a rally or meeting when making application for membership.
- 10. Publicity To collect newsworthy items of interest to club members and to publish monthly a newsletter containing past and future events of the Unit, Region and International. To publish yearly a roster in the form and content as directed by the Executive Board. Forward material to Headquarters for publishing in the Blue Beret and Directory with respect to the Unit's activities schedule.

- Public Relations To maintain communications with the International and Region Public Relations Committee for maintaining a continuing program of public relations between WBCCI and communities being exposed to rallies and caravans.
- Section 3: Special committees may be appointed by the President as required.

Article III

Guests

- Section 1: A guest (or guests) sponsored and invited by a member in good standing and sharing that member's facilities may attend activities of the Unit. Members sponsoring such a guest shall pay one extra rally fee exclusive of the parking fee.
- Section 2: A member in good standing in this Unit may sponsor and invite a prospective member to attend activities of the Unit.
- Section 3: Members in good standing in the International Club may attend activities of the Unit provided that such members, and where required, shall have made prior reservation for each attendance.
- Section 4: The Unit, once each calendar year, may host a rally, caravan or combination thereof with a recreational vehicle club not chartered by the Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc., and, it may conduct twice each calendar year, a Buddy Rally or a Buddy Caravan or combination thereof to which each member may invite not more than one nonmember recreational vehicle family.

Article IV

Nominating Committee

Section 1: The Executive Board shall, not less than 90 days prior to the Unit's annual business meeting, appoint a three member Nominating Committee who shall, after having obtained the prior consent of each proposed nominee, place in nomination one candidate for each office and director to be filled by election, and submit a written report to the Executive Board which shall include the names of all candidates considered, and the President shall distribute the report to the membership not less than fifteen (15) days prior to said business meeting. Additional candidates, who have previously consented, may be placed in nomination from the floor of that meeting. No seconds are required for any nomination.

Article V Duties of Officers

Section 1: The President shall preside at all meetings of the Unit and Executive board, enforce the Constitution and Bylaws, appoint all standing committees and have such powers and duties as normally pertain to the principal executive officer.

- Section 2: The 1st Vice President shall attend all business meetings of the Unit and the Executive Board and shall assist the President and assume the duties of the President, when absent.
- Section 3: The 2nd Vice President shall attend all business meetings of the Unit and the Executive Board and shall assist the President and 1st Vice President and assume the duties of the President and 1st Vice President in their absence, and will perform the duties assigned by the Executive Board.
- Section 4: The Corresponding Secretary shall issue notices of all meetings of the Unit and Executive Board as prescribed in Article VI, Sections 1 and 2 and Article VIII, Section 2 of the Constitution. The Corresponding Secretary shall prepare an agenda of pending business for use by the presiding officer at each meeting and shall keep a register of all members of the Unit.
- Section 5: The Recording Secretary shall record and preserve the minutes of all official meetings of the Unit and the Executive Board; copies of same shall be available to members of the Executive Board not more than fifteen (15) days following each meeting, upon request. The Recording Secretary shall record the attendance of the officers and directors at each meeting and shall advise the presiding officer if a quorum is present.
- Section 6: The Treasurer shall maintain the financial records of the Unit and shall receive all moneys and promptly deposit them in the bank previously chosen by the Executive Board; shall notify members of expiration of dues and issue receipts for dues paid; shall submit a full written report of finances to the Executive Board at each meeting and before retirement shall have the books and accounts audited by a committee of not less than three members selected by the incoming President. All books, monies, and property of the Unit held by the Treasurer shall be delivered promptly to the successor.
- Section 7: The duties of the Directors shall be as prescribed in Section 1, Article V, of the Constitution and to attend all meetings of the Unit and the Executive Board; to accept special assignments as directed by the President.



Article VI

Delegates

Section 1: The Executive Board shall select one delegate and one alternate from among the officers and Regular and Associate members who will attend the annual Delegates meeting of the parent organization, the Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc. Any vacancy occurring following such selection shall be filled by appointment by the President. The delegate and alternate should be instructed respecting the wishes of the Unit on matters to come before the meeting. The President and Secretary shall certify to these selections.

Article VII

Dues

Section 1: The annual dues of Regular and Affiliate members shall be set by the Executive Board.

Section 2: A member who fails to pay properly assessed International and Unit dues before November 15 may not be listed in the Annual Membership Directory of the International Club for the following year. If the dues are not paid and receipted by the Treasurer on or before December 31, membership will be terminated.

Article VIII

Code of Ethics

Section 1: All members shall abide by the following Code of Ethics:

- (a) To be ever mindful of our responsibility to the Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc., and through conduct indicate to the public that membership in this organization is an assurance of courtesy on the road and of goodwill to all peoples and countries.
- (b) To say or print nothing which may reflect unfavorably on others and to dedicate ourselves to the work of cementing together the members of our units and the Club in bonds of friendship, good fellowship, and mutual understanding.
- (c) To conduct ourselves so as to inspire others also engaged in recreational vehicle travel to a full appreciation of the intent and meaning of this code.
- (d) To maintain our camps and parking areas in an orderly manner and to leave them in a neat and clean condition.

Article IX

Liability

Section 1: Neither the Unit nor its officers are responsible for the loss of or damage to property or for injury to or death of a person on the premises of any club function. This freedom for responsibility for loss or damage to property applies regardless of whether that property has been received by any member or officer or left upon the premises.

Article X

Amendments

Section 1: These Bylaws may be amended at any business meeting of the Executive Board by two-thirds vote, provided the proposed amendment has been submitted to all members of the Executive Board in writing at least ten (10) days prior to such meeting.

Section 2: Such amendments shall become effective upon adoption.





Article XI

Dissolution

Section 1: In the event of dissolution of this Unit, the members shall, through the President, assign all assets to the International Club, or in the case of an incorporated unit, to such other trustee appointed in accordance with the laws governing non-profit corporation in the State or province of their incorporation, to be held in trust until such time as the charter is restored, the unit is reorganized, or a new charter is issued when such assets shall be returned or transferred to the newly functioning unit. This procedure is in accordance with the meaning of Section 501 © (7) of the Internal Revenue Service Code. None of the funds shall enure to the benefit of any member and the Unit Charter and all International club property shall be returned to International Club Headquarters.

Guidelines for Rallies & Meetings

1. Chatter Article

Appoint someone in advance to write a news article for the Chatter describing the event and ask them to submit the article to the Chatter editor within a few days after the event. This is the responsibility of the host. Failure to do so will result in a delay in publishing our newsletter.

2. Advance Notice

When preparing flyers, include information regarding rally fees, dates, parking, deposits, activities, potluck dinners, etc. Submit a flyer (sign-up sheet) to the Chatter editor in advance of your event.

3. Rally Expenses

All rallies should be self-supporting, each person paying his share of the expenses. When visitors pay the same as members, they feel free to take part. This also prevents criticism over treasury funds being used for activities in which all members do not participate.

4. Suggestions for Making a Successful "First Impression" at a WBCCI Rally

- a. Have a Greeting Committee to meet arrivals with a . . . "Hi! Glad you're here!" Some may be new owners and new to our program. Make them feel at home. Give each person a name tag, give each RV a program, or if you do not have programs, tell them to check the bulletin board for the schedule of activities.
- b. Have a hospitality center so that on arrival the greeters can say . . . "the coffee is on . . . get set up and then come over ____." Have a bulletin board at the hospitality center.
 Post announcements and program, and perhaps a sign . . . "Welcome to the Charter Oak Connecticut Unit, WBCCI."
- c. Take a snapshot of each family and paste it in the Unit history book. These books are of interest to everyone and should be on display at all Unit rallies.
- Have a Unit guest book and ask everyone to sign it at each rally.
- e. Award a "gate" prize. One thought . . . number the programs and lucky number gets the prize . . . use some kind of gag.
- Plan something for the children. It will make a more enjoyable rally for everyone.

5. Rally Parking

Park rally hosts together. These are the people who are responsible for the success of the rally. Be sure everyone knows where to locate officers and hosts.

6. Meetings

Wally patterned "Meeting Time" after the old town hall meetings. Meetings may be strictly social or a combined social and business meeting. Meetings give everyone an opportunity to get together. Meetings provide a time to get acquainted, to exchange ideas, to discuss objectives and accomplishments. This is a time to take part and a time to recognize individual contributions. The sidewalk café meeting is always fun. Members bring their refreshments and sit around and talk about what has been done or seen, trips made, etc. This usually takes place about 4:30 in the afternoon. If a business meeting or a combined business meeting and social meeting is planned, notice should be posted. Everyone will make an extra effort to get back from sight-seeing or shopping.

7. Bulletin Board

Place a bulletin board in a central location (the hospitality RV is often used) as a center of activities for announcements and program news. If you have a printed program, post one on the board. Keep everyone informed about what is going on.

8. Church Services

Post notices of local church services on the bulletin board.

9. Head Table

Arranging the head table and the seating of guests depends upon the size of the table and the number to be seated. If possible, your own officers and their spouses should be seated at the head table. If there isn't room for the spouses, they should be placed as near the head table as possible. The President should sit in the center position. Visiting VIPs and International officers would normally be seated at the head table. A special table for officers, past and present, may be arranged. If you have overlooked someone who might reasonably expect to sit at the head table, ask them to stand and be acknowledged. This helps to overcome what could be an embarrassing situation.


