#### THE PULL-TAB DEVOTION







## NEWSLETTER FROM THE MERIDIAN, MISSISSIPPI MID-WINTER IBT

The Mid-Winter IBT has been completed. Many motions were presented, discussed, modified by amendments and voted on. The entire motions will be printed in an upcoming issue of the Blue Beret.

Motion #1: The pledge of allegiance was passed with the phrase "may be omitted at all WBCCI rallies, events and functions held outside the United States". This motion was presented by the special committee formed to address this issue.

## SPRING INTO RY SEASON WITH TIPS FROM WORKHORSE

## The exterior wash:

- The first clear spring day begs for a thorough exterior wash. Examine the exterior, including the body and roof, for
  any cracks or separation. Look underneath the vehicle for signs of gas or fluid leaks. If one is discovered, note the
  color and location, and then ask a certified technician to inspect the vehicle.
- Avoid using household detergents that may damage paint and diminish the shine. Use a specially formulated soap on the exterior.
- Spray the RV with a power nozzle before applying suds. Be sure the sponge and towels are free of abrasive dirt before scrubbing. Use specialized wheel cleaners to make tires and trim look new.
- Work in the shade since washing a hot surface can result in hard-to-remove streaks on windows.

## The wall-to-wall cleansing:

- If the RV was stored during winter it may need some time to air out. Use a carpet deodorizer and a heavy-duty fabric refresher to eliminate odors. Vacuum carpet, upholstery and door panels. Wash removable cushions and window treatments.
- Polish and protect the dashboard and other vinyl areas by using wipe-on or spray products designed for these surfaces.

#### The fluids and connections check:

- A spring-cleaning session should include a fluid and connections overhaul. Change the oil even if the mileage doesn't call for it because cold weather affects oil quality. Have a new filter installed during the spring-cleaning oil change.
- Check battery connections. Corrosion may have accumulated during the winter. Connections should be removed, cleaned and after reassembly, treated with an anticorrosive product.

#### The tire check:

 Motor home tires are subject to weathering conditions through natural aging and periods of inactivity. Look for cracking and other damage on the tires. A professional can inspect worn, cracked and older tires to determine if they should be replaced.

# The home safety check:

Test batteries in smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors to confirm they are in working order. Check fire
extinguishers and place them in convenient locations.

#### The preparedness check:

Update an emergency kit for spring travel. An emergency kit should include: flares, bottled drinking water, a clean
gas can, reflective triangles, duct tape, jumper cables, heavy rope and a four-way screwdriver.

# The last-minute review:

- Stock up with necessities for cooking, cleaning and entertaining. Review kitchen equipment and the inventory of games, books, puzzles, CDs and DVDs or videotapes that help make trips enjoyable.
- Confirm that appliances are functioning properly if they were not used over winter.





#### **GUIDE TO STAIN REMOVAL**

#### Blood

Treat the blood stain with cold water. If it is safe for the fabric in question, follow up with hydrogen peroxide or chlorine bleach (test a small portion before treating entire area). If not, you may want to try an enzyme pre-soak product or unflavored meat tenderizer on the dampened spot. Finish up with a rinse of cold water, then dry with a clean towel.

#### Chocolate

Several things will work well on chocolate spots: ordinary household detergent, ammonia, an enzyme presoak laundry product or peroxide. Remember to test a small, hidden piece of the material before trying to clean the main spots.

#### Cigarette Burns in Carpet

One solution is to carefully cut away the scorched fibers from the burned spot. Then locate a segment of the carpet that is never seen (in the corner of the closet floor, for example) and trim out some replacement fibers. Squeeze a little liquid glue into the area to be repaired, and set the fresh fibers in the glue.

#### Coffee

This is one instance when you want to use hot water to remove a spot. Begin by soaking the stain with an enzyme pre-soak laundry product or, if the fabric can handle it, a color-safe bleach or chlorine bleach. Then finish up by washing the stain out with hot water. Blot up as much of the moisture as possible with paper towels.

#### Fruit (including catsup)

If you can catch it in time (before it dries), remove the fresh stain with cool water. Once the stain is dried into the fabric, soak it in a solution of cool water and a household detergent. Rinse and dry.

#### Milk, Cream, Ice Cream

Soak the spot in a solution of warm water and an enzyme pre-soak laundry product. Then rinse and blot dry.

#### Muc

Allow the mud to dry out first. Then you can brush it to knock loose as much of the caked-on dirt as possible and vacuum it up. Any mud that remains can be removed by soaking it in cool water. If there is a residual stain, use a household detergent, then rise and blot dry.

#### Mustard

The proven remedy for mustard stains is to use ammonia, another is peroxde. But always run a test on the material before cleaning to see if damage from the cleaning agents will occur.

#### Oil/Grease

If you're dealing with freshly spilled oil or grease, try to sop up as much of it as possible with paper towels or other absorbent materials to prevent it from spreading. The next step is to pick out an inconspicuous little piece of the material on which to test cleaning agents. You can try using mechanic's hand cleaner on the greasy spot. Liquid detergent and dry-cleaning solvents also work. Carburetor cleaner will work very well for all types of oily stains (this is a highly flammable and high-vapor compound so care must be exercised when using it). Finish up by washing the area with cold water and laundry detergent, then rinse and blot dry.

#### Tar

Road tar can make a real mess of things inside a coach. You can try the remedies suggested for oil and grease, but if they don't work, try turpentine. Surprisingly, mayonnaise will also cut tar. As always, make sure you test a hidden piece of the material before cleaning the main spots.

#### Wine

Begin with an enzyme pre-soak laundry product and hot water. If it's safe for the material, try an oxygen bleach and hot water. If the stains remain, and if the material can safely handle it, you can try a chlorine-bleach solution.

#### CHEESE AND SPINACH MUFFINS

Savor the flavor! Fresh spinach, green onions and Swiss and Parmesan cheeses make for incredibletasting savory muffins.

2/3 cup milk

1 tablespoon vegetable oil

1 egg

2 cups Original Bisquick® mix

1/2 cup coarsely chopped fresh spinach

½ cup shredded Swiss cheese (2 ounces)

1/4 cup grated Parmesan cheese

2 tablespoons chopped green onions

Heat oven to 400°F. Grease bottoms of.
 regular-size muffin cups.

 Beat milk, oil and egg in medium bowl until blended. Stir in remaining ingredients just until moistened. Fill muffin cups 2/3 full.

Bake 15 minutes or until golden brown; cool slightly. Remove from pan. Serve warm

"Don't stop. Keep right on going. Hitch up your trailer and go to Canada or down to Old Mexico. Head for Europe, if you can afford it, or go to the Mardi gras. Go someplace you've heard about, Where Wally Byam led, people eagerly followed. Somehow in following him they became better able thereafter to lead themselves. Perhaps this was because he had a way of expecting and getting the most that was in a man.

How Wally Byam happened to choose trailers to glorify his life, what inclined him in that direction, is surely contained somehow in the story of his life. But here there is a snag. Wally Byam was an extremely verbal and communicative man. To many he appeared to be an egotist. The fact is that he could rarely be brought into a direct discussion of his own life.

Years later, on a trip through some western sheep country, Wally told one of his close friends that the shepherd boy's wagon had something to do with his later interest in trailers.

Wally graduated from Stanford in 1923 with a degree in law. He never applied for a board examination or practiced law in any form for the rest of his life. Instead he went to work for the Los Angeles Times as an advertising copywriter. He held that job long enough to decide that he like advertising, but did not like to work for other people. He quit and formed his own agency and published a how-to-doit magazine for home carpenters



where you can fish or hunt or collect rocks or just look up at the sky. Find out what's at the end of some country road. Go see what's over the next hill, and the one after that, and the one after that."

This is the message and the legacy of Wally Byam. The words, typically—simple—and—direct,—were Wally's answer to a caravanner who asked in 1959, "Wally, what are we going to do while you are in the hospital?" It was what Wally would say now to all of us.

Wally taught a generation and more of ordinary persons how to travel to the near and far places of the world. He provided them with a mechanism in the form of a travel trailer, which he offered for sale. More basically, however, he gave them a concept, an idea, a dream come true. He taught by showing them that they could bring "home" with them on their travels, near or far, and that they could feel at home wherever they went.

There aren't many details available about Wally and his family. They were never "poor" in the modern sense, certainly never hungry or in debt. But the times were hard, rough, beset by the physical elements, the wind and the rain, the crudeness of the roads.

Later his grandfather acquired a large flock of sheep. He didn't hesitate to put a teenage Wally in charge of them. He sent the boy to lead the flock to their summer pastures high in the mountains of Oregon, to stay there alone with them for months at a time.

As a shepherd boy, Wally lived out of a small, two-wheeled wagon covered with cloth and towed along at a walking pace by a donkey. At night the wagon would be unhitched and propped up by its tongue. The tail board let down to disclose a mat for a bed, a kerosene cook stove, food and water, and "all of the other necessities of life"—a wash pail and some books.

and builders. In the course of editing and publishing, Wally came across an article on how to build a trailer and bought it for publication. It was rather poor, as he was soon to find out. Every mail brought him complaints.

His curiosity piqued, he decided to follow the instructions himself. He quickly found them impossible. Abandoning the article but not the project, which tremendously intrigued him, he proceeded to build a trailer.

It was a "crude, boxy structure, which rested none too easily upon a Model A Ford chassis", Wally wrote later in his book, "Trailer Travel Here and Abroad", "little more than a bed you could crawl into, a shelf to hold a water bottle, a flashlight and some camping equipment...protected from the elements."

Crude or not, it was Wally's first trailer. It attracted much attention

him. At first he wouldn't sell; he was having too much fun with it himself. He wrote an article on how to build it and sold plans on the side.

He might have published the article himself in his own magazine, except for a very simple fact; he needed more money that he could "pay" himself. It was published by "Popular Mechanics" magazine.

Soon Wally was building trailers in his backyard for sale. They were strictly made-to-order versions of his own trailer and usually the customer would come over to pitch in

and people even tried to buy it from and help. Parenthetically, from that day until this, Wally's customers have always been made to feel free to walk into one of his factories to see "how things are coming along."





# **Building a classic** 1920s-30s Americans were beginning to take to the roads in greater numbers, and Wally's new trailer was a hit. The fledgling business survived the crash of 1929. By 1930, he had abandoned advertising and publishing to become a full-time builder of travel Those first trailers were built of plywood, but he soon switched to Masonite and began adding amenities like chemical toilets, ice boxes, gasoline stoves and water pumps. The trailers began to take on a more "aerodynamic" look as Wally incorporated aircraft construction methods to lessen wind resistance and improve the strength-to-weight ratio of his trailers.

## Airstream's founding father

Wally Byam, (above) Arstream's founder, was practically born a traveler. As a young child, he toured extensively with his grandfather, who led a mule train in Baker, Ore.

Later, as an adolescent, he was a shepherd, living in a twowheeled donkey cart outfitted with a kerosene cookstove, food and water, and a sleeping bag and wash pail. These early experiences no doubt contributed in large part to the direction his life would eventu-

could not build them fast enough to keep up with the orders.

Of more than 300 trailer builders operating in 1936, Airstream was the only one to survive.

### 1940s-50s

Wally Byam closed his doors in 1941 with the onslaught of World War II and took his experience with aluminum fabricating first to Lockheed, then Curtis Wright, for the duration of the war.

With the war's end, the economy boomed and by 1948, Airstream Trailers Inc., was helping to satisfy the renewed demand at its new facility in Van Nuys, Calif. Wally had learned much about alu-

#### 1980s-now

In 1989, Airstream rolled out the all-new Land Yacht motorhome.

ness, first as a copywriter for the Los Angeles Times and then as the owner of his own agency. He apparently did well in advertising, but soon switched to the opposite side of the street and became a publisher, starting several magazines.

One of these, a do-it-yourself magazine, published an article describing plans for the construction of a travel trailer. When readers began complaining about the plans, Wally tred them out and found himself agreeing with his readers — the plans were no good. Thereupon, he set out to build his own model, and while he considered it primitive, it was widely admired and sold immediately.

An article in his magazine describing how to build his improved traiter for less than \$1,00 drew an enthusiastic response, and Wally began selling sets of plans for \$5. Soon, in response to demand, he was building improved versions of his traiter in his back yard in Los Angeles.

Sales were good. Wally's great innovation was to drop the floor down between the wheels, allowing him to raise the ceiling, making it possible for the campers to stand up straight inside the trailer. Airstream Trailer Co. introduced the "Clipper," and an American legend was born.

The Clipper was truly revolutionary. With its monocoque, riveted auminium body, it had more in common with the eiroraft of its day than with its predecessors, it could sleep four, thanks to its tubular steel framed dinette that could convert to a bed, carried its own water supply, had an enclosed galley, and was fitted with electric lights, throughout. The Clipper boasted of its advanced insulation and ventilation system, and even offered "air conditioning" that used dry loe.

At \$1,200, the Clipper was expensive, especially during the Depression years, yet the company

minum fabrication and design in the aircraft industry, and he was ready to begin applying that knowledge to his trailer concepts.

In July 1952, the lease was signed for a facility in Jackson. Center, Ohio, to serve the eastern market. By August the first Ohiomade Airstream rolled off the production line, and the California factory was moved to larger facilities in Sonta Fe Springs.

#### 1960s-70s

In 1961-63, President John F. Kennedy used an Airstream for his mobile rival office.

In 1962, Wally Byam passed away at age 66. Many companies would find it difficult to survive the loss of such a dynamic, visionary leader, but Wally's technical and organizational skills had been absorbed by his successors, and the company communed to flourish.

Airstream was purchased by Beatrice Foods in December 1967. In contrast to the Classic, this motornome featured laminated fiberglass construction and had front and rear end caps so innovative that a patent was granted for them. The Land Yacht was an immediate success and is still the best-setting Airstream motorhome.

Arstream's long tradition of design and manufacturing excellence led Money magazine to declare them one of "99 things that, yes, Americans make best."

Airstreams are found in places flee the Smithsonian institution, the Henry Ford Museum, the lobby of MTV studies and the San Francisco Museum of Modern Art. An Airstream trailer was selected by NASA to house the first astronauts back from the moon. Airstream motorhomes continue to be an integral part of the space shuttle program. Airstreams have truly become an American legend.

More than 60 percent of all Airstreams ever built — including some built from the original \$5 plans — are still rolling down the highways. Airstreams have traveled millions of miles around the world.

A 22-foot Airstream CCD carries the company into the future.





# The fan man

Give Dave Peirce 20 minutes and \$200, and he'll cool down your Airstream.

Peirce, who lives year-round in his Airstream, works for Fan-Tastic Vent. The Michigan company set up shop at the rally to install roof vents in the trailers, signing up customers and then sending several work crews on routes



threading throughout the Champlain Valley Exposition.

Saturday afternoon, Peirce stopped at the 31-foot, 1972 Airstream Sovereign belonging to John and Rose Ann Schwartz of Olney, Ill., to make an installation. The couple wanted a fan with a rain sensor that automatically shut the fan's protective cover, but they needed relief from the heat more.

"Oh yeah," Rose Ann said, relaxing in the shade of her trailer's blue, pullout awning. "We're counting on it especially here where your electricity is limited. You can't use your AC, but you can use your fan."

On the other side of the trailer, Peirce extended a collapsible metal ladder. The top rungs wore a canvas hood to prevent the ladder from scratching the trailer's silvery exterior. Peirce wore long pants and work gloves to protect himself from any heat the trailer's aluminum roof had soaked up sitting in the sun.

Last week's heat wave had made Peirce rethink his choice of career.

"Tuesday and Thursday were unbelievable up here on the roofs," Peirce said, sitting sidesaddle on the roof of the Schwartz's trailer and tapping out, one by one, the 48 rivets holding the couple's old fan in place. "Those two days, I had the beginnings of heat exhaustion — dizziness. It was brutal.

"I'm 64, and I thought, what the hell am I doing up here?"

Peirce — who hailed from Keene, N.H., before deciding to live full-time in his Airstream — quickly realized that a co-worker was almost a decade older.

"So," Peirce said, "I can do this for a couple more years."





# RVs take a shine to Vermont

ESSEX JUNCTION - A steady line of more than 50 curvaceous aluminum trailers crept down Vermont 15 on Thursday afternoon. They were like a parade of giant ball bearings rolling toward the entrance of the Champlain Valley Exposition.

Commerce, flew to the club's last two rallies in South Da-kota to pitch Vermont as a destination. Max Carmichael, the 2002-2003 international rally president, said the decision to head east for a gathering was easy.

lead caravans of his silver trailers on trips throughout the world.

Airstreams crossed India's Ganges River on rickety bridges. The trailers camped in the shadow of Egypt's pyramids and rolled through London. By the time Byam died in 1962, Airstream fans had already embraced the caravaning culture and had formed the Wally Byam Caravan Club International.

The club's arrival means more than sleek, sparkling sil-ver trailers and boxy motorhomes. Part of the mission of the club is to help local charlties through blood drives and donations of time, money and even a knitted hat or two.

Locke said the club will also give a boost to Vermont's economy during their stay. They will visit tourist attrac-tions like the Vermont Teddy Bear Factory, dine at local retaurants and, of course, buy things like gas and propane for their recreational vehicles.

"We're talking about \$5 million from these guys, state-wide," Locke said.

# Wally Byam: The Airstream

Second in the three-part series written by Frank Palmer after the death of Wally Byum in 1962.

or some years, the making of trailers was largely a backyard enterprise for Wally Byam. Sometimes it supported his writing and other ventures, sometimes they supported it.

Wally conceived the name "Airstream" in 1934 and began applying it to his trailers "because that's the way they travel, like a stream of air."

In those prewar days there was really no such thing as a production line for Airstream. Each was a "custom" model. It was also an experimental model as well. Wally never stopped trying new things, incorporated new construction

ufacturers making them for the government or recognized and approved governmental agencies." That left Wally out.


The end of the war and the lifting of the ban on travel trailers did not immediately put Wally back in business again. A shortage of capital held him back for a time. So did a business venture which was to prove a painful blind alley?

That venture involved entering into a kind of partnership arrangement with another company of much greater facilities. At first it looked like an ideal arrangement with Wally turning over his travel trailer concept, his designs and methods and even the name Airstream in exchange for much needed production capacity.

Wally rented a small building near the Van Nuys, California, airport and announced to the world that he was back in his own trailer business. Thus was formed Airstream Trailers, Inc.

It took a good deal to have much faith in a company with so little capital or equipment (Wally's own tools, that was about all), but some did. The first was a bright young war veteran who had studied administration University and was just then looking for some kind of permanent job with a future.

He was Art Costello, who at the time of the original publishing of this article was chairman of the Board of Directors of Airstream. Wally assigned Costello to a flat



principles, building "the better travel trailer."

In 1936, Wally experimented with the first systematic use of the so-called "monocoque" constructions principles in his trailers. He built riveted aluminum shell trailers, which are still in existence to the present day.

Building trailers, taking them on trips, helping friends build trailers, building trailers for friends, taking friends on trailer trips—became a business, in a sense the beginning of Airstream, Inc.

The full realization that he was "in the trailer business" came home to Wally as the storm clouds gathered for World War II. It came belatedly and with pain. The explanation of this is integral both to the story of Wally Byam and to the philosophy of the company he founded.

He continued to build trailers for travel until 1942, when the War Production Board ordered "house trailers shall not be made for the duration of the war, except by manFor a time there was a mutually beneficial exchange. Wally created an entire travel trailer division and poured into it years of pent up desire, thought and energy. He took all that he had learned of trailer manufacturing during the prewar era and added a new wealth of construction know-how gained during his employment by an aircraft company.

But by 1948 the relationship was becoming estranged. It's difficult to say exactly why. Perhaps as much as anything else, Wally was acting characteristically. He had always been restive as an employee. He had always been driven from within, rather than pulled from without.

To protect his rights to the name Airstream, and to preserve what he considered the integrity of his Airstream travel trailer concept, Wally felt forced to buy his way out of the corporation. It was a trying, difficult process, which was to require every bit of patience and determination Wally had. It was also to require every penny he could get his hands on.

The following ten years saw Wally's company grow to become a major American business enterprise. The best quick statement of Airstream's present position in the market is this; while producing the acknowledged "Cadillac" of travel trailers, it outsells all but the lowest priced "Chevy".

It is an astonishing fact that in the very midst of building his business, Wally Byam felt entirely free to leave his factories and take personal charge of every foreign caravan between the winter of 1951 and the spring of 1960!

For those who are not acquainted with Wally's caravans, they included, among others, trips to Canada, Mexico, Central America, a six-month caravan through Europe and one 18,000-mile tour from Cape Town to Cairo through the continent of Africa.

The fact is that Wally never considered that he was leaving his business but rather that he was As he conceived sit, his business was concerned with the essence, the ideal and the "dream" of romantic travel. Wally felt that Airstream's product ought to be the very stuff of which dreams are made.

He kept saying over and over again, "I make your travel dreams come true". He meant it most profoundly.

To be sure, those shiny stressedaluminum things lined up at his factories were vital – even integral – to those dreams, but they were the means as much as the end.

By Wally's thinking, there was a strange reciprocity between the "dream" and the trailer, a give and take. It worked out something like this: The more you could do in a trailer, the more you dreamed of doing. The more you dreamed of doing, the more you could do if you tried – in an Airstream.

# Wally Byam: Living the Caravan Dream

Third in a three-part series written by Frank Palmer after the death of Wally Byam in 1962.

The caravans and rallies conceived and personally led by Wally Byam were more than mere "stunts". They were more than promotional devices. They were, in fact, the deliberate way by which Wally Byam demonstrated what could be done in a travel trailer.

Then having thus stimulated the "dream" of travel by trailer, Wally sought, through caravans and rallies, to learn what qualities and equipment should be designed and built into his Airstreams.

Wally Byam became the most fanatical critic of Airstream trailers the company ever had. Hardly a day went by that his companies didn't receive a long letter or dictating machine recording of criticism. Not even the smallest detail escaped Wally's personal notice. Factory presidents were never surprised to receive middle-of-thenight calls from London or Mexico City or Cape Town. Something should be done about the door; the air vent was vibrating (perhaps after 18,000 miles of road less travel), or he had an idea for a new fold down bed for children.

Wally scoured the civilized world looking for efficient hot water

heaters, door hinges, butane lamps, chemical toilets, small porcelain sinks, chairs - myriad such large and small items for his beloved Airstreams.

He had thousands of things packaged up and sent back to his factories for consideration. When nothing suitable was available on the world market, Wally sought to motivate somebody to manufacture it. Failing that, he ordered his own factories to make their own - be it a new bed, a window frame or bath-

Wally said there would always be caravans. They would go farther, stay longer, and encompass more. They would always be needed to introduce new caravanners to the ever-expanding potential of the travel trailer and to feed back more and more information to his factories.

Yet he knew perfectly well that only a small percentage of his Airstream owners could go on very many caravans. Most of them would do the majority of their travel by trailer to places closer to home, family and responsibilities.

He was thus enormously pleased in 1955 when a group of his followers actually beat him to the next logical step; they founded a club of their own which would "localize"

Trailering, as practiced by Wally and his followers, has always been more than the pursuit of mere superficial pleasures. It has always been above and beyond what the psychiatrists call the "pleasure principle".

There never was a Wally Byam caravan that wouldn't stop in the midst of having fun to take up a collection for some orphanages somewhere, to collect a pile of "surplus" canned goods for a village who crop had failed, to drop off clothing, school supplies or books.

Does the point need belaboring? Of course not, nor does the related point that Wally Byam caravanners and club members have always been more than a group of Americans out for a good time, whether here at home or in a foreign country.

This is the way Wally wanted it, and this - greatly expanded and multiplied by his Airstream caravanners - is the way it shall be.



#### REGION 1 NEWSLETTER JUNE/JULY, 2003

The 46<sup>th</sup> International Rally was held in Essex Junction, Vermont. Region 1 was pleased to be the "hosting" Region for this event. The area provided everyone with a beautiful spot in New England. Region 1 received a great deal of interest from prospective members for our units and we look forward to seeing them at upcoming events in WBCCI.

The IBT of 6/25/03 resulted in the following business:

- (a) Bylaws & Policy (page 35) Financial Management #10: Foreign Liability Insurance to cover specific functions and activities while in a foreign country upon approval of the Executive Committee and the WBCCI Insurance company ... requester paying the insurance cost. Guidelines from Headquarters for approval and payment of insurance fee.
- (b) Bylaws & Policy, (page 47), Policy, Caravans #1: Caravans to Mexico and Central America WBCCI sanctioned Intra-Club, Region or National Caravans are authorized to enter and travel to Mexico and Central America only if WBCCI Foreign Liability Ins. Covers them. The process to obtain the insurance must be initiated at least 6 months in advance of the start of the Caravan. This motion was adopted.
- 2. Motion for name change of the San Bernardino California Unit to El Camino Real California Unit was defeated.
- 3. Motion for a decal and flag for the Classic Airstream Club (Intra) was adopted.
- 4. Motion to authorize Int'l 2<sup>rd</sup> Vice President Jim Haddaway to sign a contract with Springfield, Missouri was adopted.
- Motion to change WBCCI Bylaws and Policy, Page 15, Article VI, Section 2 allowing, "Incorporated units to use their Incorporation Documents as the Unit Constitution"
  - . The motion was adopted.

Letter introduced by Guadalajara Mexico Unit (#126) President Ed Barrett to cease to exist after 40 years of life. Further requested that the Mexican flag and anthem be no longer used.

- July 5, 2003, the IBT convened to conduct business under President Daryl Ewles. The following business was conducted:
  1.The Board authorized Int'l 2<sup>nd</sup> VP Jim Franklin to sign a contract with Salem, Oregon State Fairgrounds, if negotiations are successful, to hold the 2006 International Rally in Salem, Oregon. This rally would host the 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Airstream.
  - 2. Motion to discontinue the free membership program effective June 30, 2003. Motion adopted.
  - 3. Motion to "refund pre-paid rally fees upon individual request" was withdrawn.
  - Motion to create a WBCCI flag was withdrawn.
  - Motion to remove "Canine Court" and establish regular parking for individuals with animals; and new restricted regular parking to accommodate those members who do not have animals (dogs). Motion was tabled.
  - 6. Motion for a change in "generator parking" was tabled.
  - 7. Motion to change the wording regarding International Rally Parking & Scating was withdrawn.
  - 8. Motion to change the wording in "carriage case parking" (wheelchairs) was tabled.
  - 9.Motion to resubmit the name change for the San Bernadino California Unit to El Camino Real California Unit was defeated.

Letter from the Southern Arizona Unit, WBCCI voting to dissolve with funds and assets being transferred to the Arizona Unit.

#### Two study committees...

President Ewles has established two study committees to look into the future of WBCCI. One committee is being chaired by Ron Starcher, Reg. 11, 2<sup>nd</sup> VP. This committee will look at all aspects of our club, how it could be structured, the Blue Book, etc. Next is a special committee for membership initiatives under Membership Chairman Marilyn Collins. They will identify and recommend to the WBCCI membership a way to enhance the quality of our club, evaluate membership goals, and a direction to proceed.

The next meeting of the IBT is in Rayne, Louisiana January 12-16, 2004. Everyone is welcome at this mid-winter meeting and we look forward to seeing you there this winter.



### **NEWSLETTER REPORTING ON THE REGION 1 RALLY**

"A Whale of a Time on Olde Cape Cod" was the theme of the Region 1 Rally, hosted by the Cape Cod Massachusetts Unit and was held at the Barnstable Fairgrounds in East Falmouth, Massachusetts August 7-10, 2003. The Opening Ceremonies took place at 6:30 p.m. on August 7. Susan Rutty, Past Region 1 First Lady, was the Emcee for these festivities. Rally Chairman Rich Walbridge was introduced and he welcomed the membership to the "Whale of a Time" Rally. Rich next introduced Mike Scranton of the Barnstable Fairground Staff and presented him with a "Whale of a Time" hat. President Anne welcomed everyone and then gaveled the Region 1 Rally OPEN! Emcee Raynold Lemaire changed his hat to began announcements for the evening. Entertainment began with introductions by Winnie Mangano. Winnie kept us entertained with outstanding events throughout the rally including the surprise appearance of her granddaughter doing her dance routines.

The Forum on Saturday morning brought some lively discussions regarding the newly appointed study committees regarding the restructuring of WBCGI. Int'l 2nd VP Jim Franklin again replied that the cost was about \$35,000 resulting in lost income and achieved few repeat members. Impressions from members about the Int'l Rally being too long, that the last few days were the flea market and the parade causing early departures. Luncheons, dinners, entertaining officers and other freebees were mentioned as not benefiting the members. This brought a response from past int'l officers as well as Jim Franklin. It was noted that the Unit President's Dinner and the Committee Chairman's Luncheon are the only events that are rally funded. Participants pay for other events. It was also noted that the Region Officers are not compensated for International Rally expenses but compensated for their travel to the Mid-Winter Board Meetings. That means that for 4 years, the vice presidents pay for their own way to the Mid-Winter Board Meetings if they attend. Vice presidents should attend the Mid-Winter Board Meetings so that they will be prepared to step into the Presidency position for the IBT, but they do it at their own expense. Another first-timer noted that these facts should be made known to the membership to help remove any criticism of favoritism. It also would help to have the 1st timers have access to the Int'l Officers. The length of the Int'l Rally was discussed. Jim Franklin thought that the rally wasn't long enough. The early workers come early to work and then the rally starts leaving them no time to participate in sightseeing. The Int'l Rally must, according to the Constitution, incorporate the 2 National Holidays of Canada (July 1) and the U.S.A. (July 4). Reg. 1 2nd VP, Bob Thompson noted the number of workers that it takes to do the water, electrical and carpentry crews. He felt that the early worker benefits (the pancake breakfasts for one) were a way to say "thank you" to all the early workers for the many hours of hard work. Anne Werth closed the Forum at 10:10 a.m.

A quorum was present. The minutes were read and approved from the 2002 Region 1 Rally in Lunenburg. The committee reports were read and accepted, and the Treasurer's report accepted pending audit. Nominating Committee Chairman Dick Bartram presented the candidacy of Franklin Sanders, current President of the White Mountains New Hampshire Unit, for 2nd VP of Region 1 and Franklin was introduced. The ballots were prepared and given to the Unit Presidents for presentation at the Fall Business Meetings with voting completed in November. Caravan Training Certificates were presented to those in attendance. Nineteen Region 1 members completed the 9 hours of caravan seminars at the International Rally. Following the Unit Presidents, Treasurer, Parliamentarian and VP's remarks, President Anne Werth thanked the Cape Cod Massachusetts Unit for hosting the rally with a special thanks to Dottie and Rich Walbridge for chairing this event. A special thanks to all of the units present and all the individuals who made the Rally a success. Meeting adjourned at 11:30 a.m.

Susan Rutty, Past Region 1st Lady, led Church on Sunday morning at 8:00 a.m. The theme was "America". Susan's words were heartfelt and meaningful given today's world conditions. Wayne Rutty, Past Region 1 President, assisted with the music portion. Collection for the service was taken with a total of \$118.50 to be presented to the "Cents for Kids".

The closing ceremonies began with President Anne. Rich Walbridge spoke thanking the workers for their hard work putting the rally together with two years planning coming to a close. Anne spoke of the challenges during the week with the weather, but our spirits weren't dampened. ## Constitution

## Article I

#### Name of Organization

Section 1: This organization, incorporated in the State of Connecticut, is a chartered Unit of the Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc., and shall be known as the Charter Oak Connecticut Unit of the Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc.

### Article II

#### **Objectives**

Section 1: The objectives of this non-profit organization shall be to furnish encouragement and assistance in the development of the Unit and thus afford fraternization for Airstream trailer and motorhome owners; to encourage safe driving and assist in improving the general welfare of the recreational vehicle public through assistance and active participation of all its members in building a strong organization for the betterment of goodwill toward trailer and motorhome travel; to coordinate with and participate in the interests and activities of the International and the Region; to cooperate with other organizations and units within our sphere which are seeking to elevate the standards and ethics of the various groups; to disseminate information of an advisory and educational nature which will be of value to its members and the public; to study, advise and recommend legislation which is in the interest of the trailering and motoring public and oppose all legislation which is discriminatory and injurious to the trailering and motoring public; and to encourage government and private agencies to provide more and better trailer and motorhome parks and facilities.

## Article III

## Membership Qualifications

- Section 1: Adult ownership of a fully self-contained and hard sided recreational vehicle manufactured by Airstream, Inc., is a prerequisite for membership in this Unit.
- Section 2: There are two classes of membership in this unit: Regular and Affiliate Members.
- Section 3: An applicant for membership in this Unit must submit an application in writing and, upon the payment of International and Unit dues, shall be a Regular Member of this Unit.
- Section 4: Regular Members who have sold their recreational vehicle manufactured by Airstream, Inc., may, upon request, retain their membership as Regular Members of this Unit pursuant to the provisions of Article VI Sec.2C of the International Constitution. Such Regular Members shall possess all the rights and privileges of the International Club, including full voting rights in all elections and on all questions.

- Section 5: Regular Members of another Unit may become Affiliate
  Members in this Unit by an application to the Membership
  Committee and upon acceptance shall possess all the rights and
  privileges of the Unit, except the right to hold office in the Unit or
  the right to vote in the selection or election of officers in the Unit,
  Region, or International or on any amendment to the Unit or the
  International Constitution or on the dissolution of the Unit or the
  merger of the Unit with another Unit.
- Section 6: Applicants for membership in this Unit must submit dues and join the International Club simultaneously or show evidence of membership in the International Club through another duly chartered unit.
- Section 7: Failure to pay either Unit or International dues will automatically terminate membership in the Unit.
- Section 8: In those cases of co-ownership of an fully self-contained hard sided recreational vehicle manufactured by Airstream, Inc., the rights and privileges of membership shall be deemed to include the spouses of such co-owner but collectively such co-owners shall possess one vote only except such co-owners who each pay International and Unit dues to this Unit shall each have one vote.

## Article IV

#### Officers and Their Election

- Section 1: The Officers of the Unit shall consist of a President, a First Vice President, a Second Vice President, a Corresponding Secretary, a Recording Secretary, a Treasurer and Directors (four). The Executive Board shall consist of all of the Unit Officers plus the Immediate Past President of the Unit.
- Section 2: The Officers shall be elected at the annual business meeting and shall be installed and shall assume office at that time. An officer shall serve in office for a term of one year or until a successor is elected but in no case shall an officer, except the Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary or Treasurer, be eligible to serve more than two consecutive terms in the same office, provided said officers are duly nominated and elected for each term of office.
- Section 3: An officer who advances to an office pursuant to the provisions of Sec. 5 of this ARTICLE shall not be deemed to have served a full term in such office unless said service is for a period of greater than one-half (1/2) the term of such office.
- Section 4: The Directors shall be elected at the annual business meeting, each for a term of two years commencing at the annual meeting, but arranged so that only one-half such Directors' terms expire in any one year. No Director shall serve more than one two-year term consecutively.
- Section 5: In the event of the death or resignation of the President or the death, advancement or resignation of a Vice President, or an officer's inability to fulfill the duties of office, the next ranking Vice

President (in the order first, second) shall advance thereto. All other vacancies on the Executive Board, except that of the Immediate Past President, shall be filled by majority vote of the Executive Board.

#### Article V

#### **Executive Board**

- Section 1: The Executive Board shall be the administrative body of the Unit and shall define the policies of and have full administrative authority in all matters pertaining to the Unit, and shall exercise general control and supervision of all officers and committees.
- Section 2: A quorum of the Executive Board shall consist of a majority of the members.

#### Article VI

#### **Business Meetings**

- Section 1: The annual business meeting of the members of this organization shall be held during the month of November in each calendar year. Such a meeting shall be announced by written notice and delivered to the members not less than fifteen (15) days prior to the meeting. The notice shall indicate the date, time, and location of the meeting. A quorum for conducting business at the annual meeting, or at any additional business meeting, shall not be less than ten (10) percent of members.
- Section 2: Additional business meetings of the members may be held at a suitable time and place during the second day of each rally of the members. If the rally or meeting is of less than two days duration, written notice to the members indicating the time, location, and purpose of such meeting shall be delivered to the members not less than ten (10) days prior to the meeting.
- Section 3: The Executive Board, by majority vote, may call additional business meetings of the members.
- Section 4: The President or any two members of the Board may call a business meeting of the Executive Board at any time deemed necessary.
- Section 5: All Regular and Affiliate Members voting at the annual or additional business meetings of this Unit, and each such membership, identified by the International Club Membership number, shall be considered one vote, except for co-owners who each pay International and Unit Dues to this Unit as provided for in Article III, Section 9.
- Section 6: A mail ballot may be used to obtain the vote of the members of the Unit on a proposal when such is deemed desirable or necessary. When a mail ballot is used to obtain the vote of the member of the Unit on a proposal, no other method of voting on such a proposal shall be utilized.

#### Article VII

#### **Bylaws**

Section 1: Bylaws not inconsistent with this Constitution, and with the Constitution, Bylaws and Policy of the Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc., embodying additional provisions for the government of the Unit may be adopted by the Executive Board.

#### Article VIII

#### Amendments

Section 1: Proposed amendments to this Constitution shall be submitted to the Executive Board in writing. The Executive Board shall submit all such amendments to the members for their consideration.

Section 2: Any Article or Section of this Constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the Regular Members present and voting at a business meeting of the Unit or a special meeting called for that purpose, providing in either case, a notice containing the proposed amendment or amendments has been mailed first-class to each member of the Unit at least fifteen (15) days prior to such a meeting.

Section 3: All amendments to this Constitution shall become effective upon adoption.

This Constitution adopted and effective May 3, 1997, at Lakeville, Massachusetts.

This Constitution was amended effective November 8, 1998, at Vernon, Connecticut.

#### Order of Business

Section 1: Parliamentary procedures for all meetings of the Unit and Executive Board shall be governed by the current edition of Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised except when they are in conflict with the Constitution or Bylaws of this Club.

- 10. Adjournment


#### Article II

#### Committees

Section 1: Standing Committees shall be:

- A. Budget
- B. Caravan
- C. Constitution and Bylaws
- D. Ethics and Grievances
- E. Family/Youth
- F. Historical
- G. Hospitality
- H. Legislative
- Membership
- J. Publicity
- K. Public Relations

The President shall appoint and be an ex-officio member of all committees except the Nominating Committee.





## Standing Committees

#### **General Duties**

- Budget In cooperation with the incoming and outgoing Treasurer of the Unit, prepare for the Executive Board a budget projecting the unit's income and expenditures for the calendar (or fiscal) year next ensuing.
- Caravan To plan, organize, and obtain leaders for unit caravans that are operated or conducted for the Unit within the scope of the WBCCI Caravan Handbook. To develop an aggressive Unit Caravan program and to coordinate unit caravan matters with appropriate Region and International Caravan Committee personnel.
- Constitution and Bylaws To conduct a continuing review and study of the Unit and the International Constitution and Bylaws and to make recommendations for any amendments or additions deemed desirable and in the best interest of the Club.
- Ethics and Grievance To investigate and assess all grievances or complaints made by members and others and to make recommendations thereon to the Unit Executive Board.
- Family/Youth Plan programs to encourage participation of family/youth at unit functions and to be the liaison person between the Unit and International Family/Youth Standing Committee.
- Historical To record events including written and pictorial material associated with unit activities and to maintain a historical record of such.
- Hospitality To receive and make welcome guests and new members at club functions. Recommend ways to meet and greet all club members and guests at rallies and/or seasonal functions.
- Legislative To study, advise and recommend legislation in the interest of the Club and its members; to recommend opposition to all legislation which is discriminatory and injurious to the interest of the Club and its members.
- Membership be the Unit/Club contact for prospective new members and explain the purpose and objectives of the Wally Byam Caravan Club International. Extend invitations to prospective members to attend a rally or meeting when making application for membership.
- 10. Publicity To collect newsworthy items of interest to club members and to publish monthly a newsletter containing past and future events of the Unit, Region and International. To publish yearly a roster in the form and content as directed by the Executive Board. Forward material to Headquarters for publishing in the Blue Beret and Directory with respect to the Unit's activities schedule.

- Public Relations To maintain communications with the International and Region Public Relations Committee for maintaining a continuing program of public relations between WBCCI and communities being exposed to rallies and caravans.
- Section 3: Special committees may be appointed by the President as required.

## Article III

#### Guests

- Section 1: A guest (or guests) sponsored and invited by a member in good standing and sharing that member's facilities may attend activities of the Unit. Members sponsoring such a guest shall pay one extra rally fee exclusive of the parking fee.
- Section 2: A member in good standing in this Unit may sponsor and invite a prospective member to attend activities of the Unit.
- Section 3: Members in good standing in the International Club may attend activities of the Unit provided that such members, and where required, shall have made prior reservation for each attendance.
- Section 4: The Unit, once each calendar year, may host a rally, caravan or combination thereof with a recreational vehicle club not chartered by the Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc., and, it may conduct twice each calendar year, a Buddy Rally or a Buddy Caravan or combination thereof to which each member may invite not more than one nonmember recreational vehicle family.

## Article IV

## **Nominating Committee**

Section 1: The Executive Board shall, not less than 90 days prior to the Unit's annual business meeting, appoint a three member Nominating Committee who shall, after having obtained the prior consent of each proposed nominee, place in nomination one candidate for each office and director to be filled by election, and submit a written report to the Executive Board which shall include the names of all candidates considered, and the President shall distribute the report to the membership not less than fifteen (15) days prior to said business meeting. Additional candidates, who have previously consented, may be placed in nomination from the floor of that meeting. No seconds are required for any nomination.

## Article V

#### **Duties of Officers**

Section 1: The President shall preside at all meetings of the Unit and Executive board, enforce the Constitution and Bylaws, appoint all standing committees and have such powers and duties as normally pertain to the principal executive officer.

- Section 2: The 1st Vice President shall attend all business meetings of the Unit and the Executive Board and shall assist the President and assume the duties of the President, when absent.
- Section 3: The 2nd Vice President shall attend all business meetings of the Unit and the Executive Board and shall assist the President and 1st Vice President and assume the duties of the President and 1st Vice President in their absence, and will perform the duties assigned by the Executive Board.
- Section 4: The Corresponding Secretary shall issue notices of all meetings of the Unit and Executive Board as prescribed in Article VI, Sections 1 and 2 and Article VIII, Section 2 of the Constitution. The Corresponding Secretary shall prepare an agenda of pending business for use by the presiding officer at each meeting and shall keep a register of all members of the Unit.
- Section 5: The Recording Secretary shall record and preserve the minutes of all official meetings of the Unit and the Executive Board; copies of same shall be available to members of the Executive Board not more than fifteen (15) days following each meeting, upon request. The Recording Secretary shall record the attendance of the officers and directors at each meeting and shall advise the presiding officer if a quorum is present.
- Section 6: The Treasurer shall maintain the financial records of the Unit and shall receive all moneys and promptly deposit them in the bank previously chosen by the Executive Board; shall notify members of expiration of dues and issue receipts for dues paid; shall submit a full written report of finances to the Executive Board at each meeting and before retirement shall have the books and accounts audited by a committee of not less than three members selected by the incoming President. All books, monies, and property of the Unit held by the Treasurer shall be delivered promptly to the successor.
- Section 7: The duties of the Directors shall be as prescribed in Section 1, Article V, of the Constitution and to attend all meetings of the Unit and the Executive Board; to accept special assignments as directed by the President.

## Article VI

#### Delegates

Section 1: The Executive Board shall select one delegate and one alternate from among the officers and Regular and Associate members who will attend the annual Delegates meeting of the parent organization, the Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc. Any vacancy occurring following such selection shall be filled by appointment by the President. The delegate and alternate should be instructed respecting the wishes of the Unit on matters to come before the meeting. The President and Secretary shall certify to these selections.

## Article VII

#### Dues

Section 1: The annual dues of Regular and Affiliate members shall be set by the Executive Board.

Section 2: A member who fails to pay properly assessed International and Unit dues before November 15 may not be listed in the Annual Membership Directory of the International Club for the following year. If the dues are not paid and receipted by the Treasurer on or before December 31, membership will be terminated.

## Article VIII

#### Code of Ethics

Section 1: All members shall abide by the following Code of Ethics:

- (a) To be ever mindful of our responsibility to the Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc., and through conduct indicate to the public that membership in this organization is an assurance of courtesy on the road and of goodwill to all peoples and countries.
- (b) To say or print nothing which may reflect unfavorably on others and to dedicate ourselves to the work of cementing together the members of our units and the Club in bonds of friendship, good fellowship, and mutual understanding.
- (c) To conduct ourselves so as to inspire others also engaged in recreational vehicle travel to a full appreciation of the intent and meaning of this code.
- (d) To maintain our camps and parking areas in an orderly manner and to leave them in a neat and clean condition.

## Article IX

### Liability

Section 1: Neither the Unit nor its officers are responsible for the loss of or damage to property or for injury to or death of a person on the premises of any club function. This freedom for responsibility for loss or damage to property applies regardless of whether that property has been received by any member or officer or left upon the premises.

## Article X

#### Amendments

Section 1: These Bylaws may be amended at any business meeting of the Executive Board by two-thirds vote, provided the proposed amendment has been submitted to all members of the Executive Board in writing at least ten (10) days prior to such meeting.


Section 2: Such amendments shall become effective upon adoption.

#### Article XI

#### Dissolution

Section 1: In the event of dissolution of this Unit, the members shall, through the President, assign all assets to the International Club, or in the case of an incorporated unit, to such other trustee appointed in accordance with the laws governing non-profit corporation in the State or province of their incorporation, to be held in trust until such time as the charter is restored, the unit is reorganized, or a new charter is issued when such assets shall be returned or transferred to the newly functioning unit. This procedure is in accordance with the meaning of Section 501 © (7) of the Internal Revenue Service Code. None of the funds shall enure to the benefit of any member and the Unit Charter and all International club property shall be returned to International Club Headquarters.

## Guidelines for Rallies & Meetings

#### 1. Chatter Article

Appoint someone in advance to write a news article for the Chatter describing the event and ask them to submit the article to the Chatter editor within a few days after the event. This is the responsibility of the host. Failure to do so will result in a delay in publishing our newsletter.

#### 2. Advance Notice

When preparing flyers, include information regarding rally fees, dates, parking, deposits, activities, potluck dinners, etc. Submit a flyer (sign-up sheet) to the Chatter editor in advance of your event.

## 3. Rally Expenses

All rallies should be self-supporting, each person paying his share of the expenses. When visitors pay the same as members, they feel free to take part. This also prevents criticism over treasury funds being used for activities in which all members do not participate.

# 4. Suggestions for Making a Successful "First Impression" at a WBCCI Rally

- a. Have a Greeting Committee to meet arrivals with a . . . "Hi! Glad you're here!" Some may be new owners and new to our program. Make them feel at home. Give each person a name tag, give each RV a program, or if you do not have programs, tell them to check the bulletin board for the schedule of activities.
- b. Have a hospitality center so that on arrival the greeters can say . . . "the coffee is on . . . get set up and then come over \_\_\_\_." Have a bulletin board at the hospitality center.
   Post announcements and program, and perhaps a sign . . . "Welcome to the Charter Oak Connecticut Unit, WBCCI."
- c. Take a snapshot of each family and paste it in the Unit history book. These books are of interest to everyone and should be on display at all Unit rallies.
- d. Have a Unit guest book and ask everyone to sign it at each rally.
- e. Award a "gate" prize. One thought . . . number the programs and lucky number gets the prize . . . use some kind of gag.
- Plan something for the children. It will make a more enjoyable rally for everyone.

## 5. Rally Parking

Park rally hosts together. These are the people who are responsible for the success of the rally. Be sure everyone knows where to locate officers and hosts.

## 6. Meetings

Wally patterned "Meeting Time" after the old town hall meetings. Meetings may be strictly social or a combined social and business meeting. Meetings give everyone an opportunity to get together. Meetings provide a time to get acquainted, to exchange ideas, to discuss objectives and accomplishments. This is a time to take part and a time to recognize individual contributions. The sidewalk café meeting is always fun. Members bring their refreshments and sit around and talk about what has been done or seen, trips made, etc. This usually takes place about 4:30 in the afternoon. If a business meeting or a combined business meeting and social meeting is planned, notice should be posted. Everyone will make an extra effort to get back from sight-seeing or shopping.

#### 7. Bulletin Board

Place a bulletin board in a central location (the hospitality RV is often used) as a center of activities for announcements and program news. If you have a printed program, post one on the board. Keep everyone informed about what is going on.

#### 8. Church Services

Post notices of local church services on the bulletin board.

#### 9. Head Table

Arranging the head table and the seating of guests depends upon the size of the table and the number to be seated. If possible, your own officers and their spouses should be seated at the head table. If there isn't room for the spouses, they should be placed as near the head table as possible. The President should sit in the center position. Visiting VIPs and International officers would normally be seated at the head table. A special table for officers, past and present, may be arranged. If you have overlooked someone who might reasonably expect to sit at the head table, ask them to stand and be acknowledged. This helps to overcome what could be an embarrassing situation.
