




Main Characters Woodstock





PAUL FREED

R. Paul Freed, of Traveler's Rest, Dade City, Fla. died peacefully at his home on April 6, 2004, his 88th birthday. He was in good health and his death was unexpected.

He was born in Guatemala City to missionary parents and soon moved to the U.S. He and Dorothy were married in 1944 and had enjoyed 60 years together.

He was educated at Millikin University, Columbia University and Union Theological Seminary. In 1958, he was awarded a Doctor of Divinity degree by Millikin University. He was a full time Presbyterian minister for 35 years and served churches in New York City (1943-1948), Easton, Pa. (1948 to 1958) and Pompton Plains, N.J. (1958 to 1972) After moving to Southbury, Conn., he held interim positions with churches in North Haven, Cheshire, Waterbury and Danbury, Conn. before fully retiring in 1980.

From 1947 to 1975 he and his family loved to vacation at their cabin near Boothbay, Maine. During the 1960s and early 1970s, the family sponsored weekly church youth camps at the cabin. Following his retirement, he and Dorothy spent their winters at Travelers Rest, eventually buying a home there. They enjoyed traveling around the country with their Airstream trailer visiting their relatives and seeing America. They attended several International rallies and participated in many caravans.

People loved Paul. He had a great ability to build lasting relationships with people and was an able leader. Paul was known for his kindness and grace. He was a skilled teacher and mediator.

Vistas-

A magnificent resource

On 9/11 the twin towers descended into a 1,000,000 ton pile of steel, glass and concrete. Thousands of people were missing. Rescue workers desperately sought equipment to cut huge I-beams and lift heaping mounds of concrete. Some in the heavy ruins were still alive.

A 24-hour search led to Aurora, Ill. The Caterpillar factory had a giant demolition machine.

Its powerful hydraulic shears and towering reach were what New York rescuers needed.

But how to get the machine from Illinois to New York? Caterpillar personnel phoned authorities in states along the route. Could the over-wide, extra high equipment pass over its state roads? Each state, immediately cutting through red tape, said the movement would be possible.

Factory crews, separating the huge machine into three parts, loaded the sections onto trailers, each trailer longer than two Greyhound buses end to end.

Early on the morning of Sept.13, accompanied by escorts with flags waving and lights flashing, the three trailers moved out. Making their way to 1-80, the convoy passed over six different Interstate highways. In 20 hours they were in New York City.

It was all possible because of our Interstate Highway system.

The first national road was cleared by soldiers under George Washington. It led from Baitimore to what is now Pittsburgh.

As the population grew, old Indian trails, buffalo paths and river banks became passageways for horses and wagons.

One hundred years later, automobiles were found bouncing

along the same routes. Exasperated, one government official blurted: "What we need is some way to drive out of any county seat in the United States and drive to any other county seat—and never crack a spring!"

As if in answer, Pennsylvania built its Tumpike.

During WWII, which soon followed, virtually all transportation depended on the steel wheels of railroads.

Coming to office, President Eisenhower determined that the nation's movements must never again be that restricted.

In 1956 he introduced and Congress passed the Interstate Highway Act.

in the next three decades, moving 42 billion cubic yards of dirt and incorporating 1½ million acres of land, engineers bulldozed, paved and opened a 46,677-mile network of safe, swift and scenic roads, up, down and across America.

Curves kept cars safe on the road at 70 miles per hour. Grades were limited to 6 percent. Medians 30' wide, cement barriers, landscaping which screened oncoming lights and breakaway signs were put in place to save lives. There are 104 tunnels and 54,663 bridges. One of them, our own Sunshine Skyway Bridge, is the longest cable-hung concrete bridge in the world.

In 1903, Nelson Jackson crossed the continent by car in 64 days.

Today, on the Interstate, most drivers could make the trip in less than one-eighth the time.

On I-70 perhaps the most impressive section of the Interstate crosses Glenwood Canyon. Two thousand feet below, the Colorado River rushes through a striking scene of jagged rocks and cliffs. Engineers designed safety railings and created a double-deck highway, enabling motorists to see the view.

Soon, many of us will be swinging onto this Interstate highway. In the pleasant knowledge that we go onto one of the greatest engineering feats of history, it is a joy to call to each other the happy words: "See ya' down the road!"

What are they? What do they seek? Most important — are the beings inside them anything like us?

The last question is easiest to answer: No. They may not have r three rows of teeth, but they d the whole point of having a something other people don't

l Rally will last a week, from uly 4 (birthday of the club's r, Wally Byam — about whom ig caravan segments will head with restaurants and laundromats among the big winners (alas, hoteliers are not so lucky, for Airstreamers take their homes wherever they go). Finally, the gathering affords a rare glimpse into an American sub-culture rife with contradictions, a rebelliously square counter-alternative lifestyle little known to those outside the curved silver doors.

Let's begin with Wally himself. In the world of Airstream, Wally Byam is the man— Henry Ford, Colonel Sanders and Walt Disney rolled into one. Byam co-created and named the Airstream back in the '30s, building on a basic design inherited from previous trailer tinkerers such as Glenn Curtiss (of the Curtiss motorcycle) and William Bowlus (builder of Charles Lindbergh's Atlanticspanning "Spirit of '76").

In the Depression years, building trailers was a capital-intensive, risky venture, but Byam was obsessed with the notion of comfortable travel, having spent much of his teenage years as a shepherd, living out of a donkey cart. He gambled everything on the notion that a single product could satisfy Americans' contradictory urges for adventure and comfort. Applying aerodynamic and engineering principles learned in the aircraft industry, he turned the Airstream into a taut fusion of function and form, launching one of the most durable and enduring American consumer products.

Bear with me now for a few rough specs. The famous Airstream shell is a sandwich of tempered aluminum and insulation, impervious to damn near everything — including "vermin" (early ad copy). This shell was electrically welded to the chassis to realize a "monocoque" (single-shell) design, all weak spots ruthlessly sought out and eliminated. Because screws and bolts gradually shake loose during road travel, each Airstream is all

Leaning into the space-age vibe, print ads ladled on the engineering sweet-talk that flavored consumer-product foreplay in the postwar period ("tensional, compressive, shearing and torsional stresses act in balanced support").

Back in the '60s, an Airstream was placed in a New Mexico dummy town built for an atomic test back in the early sixties. According to company lore, the trailer held up under the full brunt of an H-bomb shock wave, suffering only two broken windows and one dent to the fuselage.

But the real draw of the classic Airstream was always the shape. By the '40s and '50s, product streamlining was often eye candy with no grounding in function, but Airstream design cut down on wind resistance as well as eye resistance. Anyone who has ever thrust a palm out of a car window on the highway can appreciate the value of eliminating every flat spot from the front and sides of a 40-foot trailer.

Another reason Airstreams are such a dream to tow is their surprising lightness. In 1947 Byam, a master at publicity, invited the celebrated French bicyclist Latorneau to pull a trailer with his bike, an event which inspired the company's delightfully odd little logo.

Byam's biggest breakthrough came when

he figured out how to drop the floor of the trailer to axle level, allowing humans to stand up inside. (OK, so the Airstreamers are a little like us.) Once this basic requirement was accommodated, all the trappings of "Airstream living" flowed forth like mayonnaise from a glass jar. Designers injected every home comfort they could think of into each silver capsule, from drop-down tables to stoves and showers and cedar-lined wardrobes.

Despite a brief late-'80s detour into beigerectangle RV hell called the "Land Yacht" (true believers immediately called it the "Squarestream"), the classic bullet design has stayed in circulation from the '30s to the present, albeit with scores of variations in size and appointments. About 20 new units still slip out of the Airstream factory at Jackson Center, Ohio, each week.

The Airstream itself, however, was only the material nucleus of Byam's blue-skies, utopian vision of American travel. 

Lansing Center's biggest events, sales manager Tarena Smith said. The Caravan Club will use the entire building during the June 28-July 4 rally but also sets up offices there two weeks in advance.

And because of its duration with the first arrivals June 7 and departure on July 5 — "a lot of things you wouldn't think are affected by tourism will be," Love said.

take part in more than 300 seminars and evening entertainment events there.

A 700-member advance team of volunteers arrives early to arrange for utilities at the airport and the activities covering everything from line dancing to righitching to bird watching.

But Airstreamers also are expected to find time to fan out in mid-Michigan, visiting area shopping centers and historic towns such as Grand Ledge, DeWitt, Williamston and Mason, Pingston said.

The Wally Byam Caravan Club, the world's oldest recreational vehicle club, is named for the Airstream inventor, who first built trailers with aircraft aluminum on Model A Ford chassis in his Los Angeles garage, Caravan club International President Daryl Ewles said. The rallies are held every year in a different state around his July 4 birthday. Byam came up with the name Airstream in 1934. He led the first travel caravans in 1951, and Airstreamers now wander the globe.

Ewles, 67, a native of Hillsdale and a retired Livonia teacher, chose Lansing for this year's event. Organizers were impressed by the amenities and area recreational activities, he said, as well as the cooperative spirit of local officials.

Ewles bought a 31-foot trailer more than 30 years ago. The family traded up four times.

He and his wife, Myrna, are now what's called "full-timers" who live in their top-of-the-line 39-foot Airstream motor home.

"Airstreams are known for their longevity and towability," Ewles said.

Airstream Inc., of Jackson Center, Ohio, sells trailers from \$32,000 to \$82,000 and its loaded Land Yacht motor home goes for \$247,800.

But it's the streamlined shape of the original "silver palaces" that's an American icon, symbol of our love for the open road. Restored vintage Airstreams (those more than 25 years old) are rising in value, Skelton said.

'Silver city' is setting up shop with a little neighborly help

It takes nearly three years, 150 volunteer committees, three semitrailer trucks and an aerial photographer to produce a successful Wally Byam Caravan Club International rally.

'The "silver city" of about 1,700 aluminum-clad Airstream travel trailers and Airstream motor homes near Capital City Airport has everything a town needs. It started taking shape on June 7.

Rigs are arriving at scheduled intervals, mainly from June 25 to June 27.

The Lansing Board of Water and Light provides hookup to a hydrant, from which volunteers link three miles of surface plas-

tic water piping from trailer to trailer, international club president Daryl Ewles said.

Officials didn't immediately know how much the club will pay BWL for the service.

The BWL also is selling \$45,000 worth of electrical service strung from special poles, said Julie Pingston of the Greater Lansing Convention and Visitors Bureau.

The 30-amp service is just enough to keep batteries charged and run a TV — no microwaves, air conditioning or computers, Ewles said.

More electrical power is available to those parking near the Marshall Street Armory. Rally attendees who have disabilities are parking next to the Lansing Center.

Recent heavy rains threw a wrench in the club's meticulous plans, preventing rigs from parking this week on airport grounds.


They're scattered temporarily at several Grand River Avenue businesses and along an airport service road.




The club even has its own post office on site — in a specially fitted Airstream, of course. And the city is hauling the club's garbage by contract.







OFF TO ALASKA PART 4

At the last writing, we were about to leave Prince George and at last, finally be on our way. We passed through Chetwynd, BC, which claims to be the "Chain Saw Sculpture" capital of the world. Interesting, but I wouldn't want any of them in my yard. Our next overnight stop was Dawson Creek, BC the official start of the Alaska Highway. Of course, pictures had to be taken to document the occasion. Milepost Zero is truly in the middle of the street. Fortunately we were there on a Sunday and the traffic was very light. All of the towns that you pass through in this area on the Alaska Highway have museums and other items of interest, mostly related to the building of the highway. Next stop was Fort Nelson for one night and then on to Muncho Lake, BC. We spent two nights in Muncho Lake and were sorry that we couldn't stay longer. This truly was a beautiful place. Between Muncho Lake and Watson Lake is Liard Hot Springs. We made two trips to the hot springs to soak in the delightful water. We were now reaching the ends of civilization where your cell phone no longer picks up a signal and the email access is sparse. Also the North America powder grid ends at Mile Post 100 and power after that point is mostly by private generators. The next stop was Watson Lake, home of the Sign Post Forest. We brought home town signs and the leaders had an Airstream Sign to commemorate the Caravan. I will attach a picture. There was also a planetarium featuring a show about the Northern Lights. This is the only opportunity to see anything related to them at this time of year as it stays light too late to see the real thing. At 11:00 PM, it is still broad daylight. No problems sleeping as your days are so busy; you are more than ready to go to bed.

From Watson Lake we moved on to Teslin, another camp ground on a lake. Again museums, one at the camp ground with a wonderful display of wild life. Shortly after Teslin, we left the Alaska Highway and moved on to Whitehorse, Yukon Territory. Now the emphasis is on the Yukon gold rush. The history of the miners and how they reached the mine fields and all that they went through makes for quite a story. At Whitehorse we attended the "Frantic Follies", a review which was wonderful. The talent of the performers was outstanding and you have to wonder why they were there and not in a venue more deserving of their skills. On then to Minto, Yukon Territory, a beautiful, but dry campground of the banks of the Yukon River. Then the next day we were on our way to Dawson City, YT. This is a town which has tried to remain unchanged since the days of the gold rush. Muddy streets, turn of the century buildings, all in all, quite a pleasure to see and enjoy.

Leaving Dawson City required a trip by ferry across the Yukon River, a service provided free of change by the Canadian government. We all got up early as we were told that there might be a lengthy delay as the ferry is small and only can accommodate a few vehicles at a time. However the wait was short and the river quickly crossed. Once on the other side, we then began to travel the "Top of the World Highway" This road is appropriately named. The road travels mostly above the tree line and the views are breathtaking. The road through Canada is fairly good. Some "chip seal" and some gravel. After the US Customs, the road turns to dirt and leaves a lot to be desired, but it was exciting as now we were finally in Alaska! Our destination was the town of "Chicken". Again dry camping, but a place that turned out to be nearly everyone's favorite. Year round population of less than 30! Camp ground was new with very congenial owners who really went out of their way to please us. We panned for gold, some of us found some, but no one struck it big!

From Chicken, we traveled back to civilization and cell phones and email at Delta Junction. After washing away the mud of the Yukon and the "Top of the World" highway we then set out for Fairbanks. I will continue from this point on next time.

Sadly, I have also known a number of real beauties whose lives have not been happy or full of love. I wish I could convey that message to the adolescents of today. Nowadays, as a senior citizen, I am comfortable with myself. I know who I am, and I like myself. If others don't like parts of my personality, that's too bad. It is a refreshing piece of self-knowledge.

Once in a while I wear mismatched sox downtown. I chuckle to myself when I imagine how my teen-age self would have had a hissy fit about such a "crisis." Usually nobody notices an older woman with mismatched sox, or if they do they're too polite to comment. One of my friends DID get an adverse comment, to which she cheerfully replied, "That's okay; I have another pair just like them at home!"

My two favorite appreciations of being older are "savoring" and "long-lasting friendships". Instead of frantically rushing about, (usually necessary when one is working and raising children), we older citizens can take time to relish the little segments of life that are so delightful. For instance, if I get up at the right time in July and walk out into the kitchen, the morning sun is streaming into the side porch, moving through the dining room window, and illuminating the kitchen in such a way as to bring joy to the beholder.

And how about seeing a child chasing a butterfly? Or watching a child noticing waves breaking for the first time? How about a child's first experience of snow? Or when we see a bright cluster of Shasta daisies? Or the beauty of an ice storm, dangerous as it is. These precious sights are worth relishing and then storing in our memory banks to re-examine in an idle moment or "down" time. Oftentimes in our younger days, we just forgot to take the time to savor those moments, or were too busy, or thought we were too busy.

The long friendships mentioned above are a source of great satisfaction to me. I know several families in which I have met no less than FIVE generations, only one family whose SIX generations I have known, and more than a handful of FOUR generation families. It is fascinating to observe those families, to spot similar characteristics, to note shared personality traits. I enjoy watching the generations unfurl. No thirty-year-old can possibly claim that! It's like watching your own personal Forcyte Saga.

In conclusion, between the aches and the pains, and the moans and the groans, let us appreciate the everyday wonders of this world.

OFF TO ALASKA PART 5

At the last writing, we had arrived in Delta Junction, AK. This was a place to call the family (Cell phones now worked). We could scrape the mud off trucks, trailers, cars, motor homes, ourselves, charge camera batteries and do laundry! In other words, prepare for the rest of the trip! I am now back in Connecticut writing this. Not much time for writing en route as after Delta Junction, we were kept very busy!

I will only touch briefly on the sights that we saw from this point on. There was so much to see and each place had its own charm and variety. Just when you think you have seen it all, you came upon something just as spectacular in its own way. It is impossible to describe it all.

Constitution

Article I

Name of Organization

Section 1: This organization, incorporated in the State of Connecticut, is a chartered Unit of the Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc., and shall be known as the Charter Oak Connecticut Unit of the Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc.

Article II

Objectives

Section 1: The objectives of this non-profit organization shall be to furnish encouragement and assistance in the development of the Unit and thus afford fraternization for Airstream trailer and motorhome owners; to encourage safe driving and assist in improving the general welfare of the recreational vehicle public through assistance and active participation of all its members in building a strong organization for the betterment of goodwill toward trailer and motorhome travel; to coordinate with and participate in the interests and activities of the International and the Region; to cooperate with other organizations and units within our sphere which are seeking to elevate the standards and ethics of the various groups; to disseminate information of an advisory and educational nature which will be of value to its members and the public; to study, advise and recommend legislation which is in the interest of the trailering and motoring public and oppose all legislation which is discriminatory and injurious to the trailering and motoring public; and to encourage government and private agencies to provide more and better trailer and motorhome parks and facilities.

Article III

Membership Qualifications

- Section 1: Adult ownership of a fully self-contained and hard sided recreational vehicle manufactured by Airstream, Inc., is a prerequisite for membership in this Unit.
- Section 2: There are two classes of membership in this unit: Regular and Affiliate Members.
- Section 3: An applicant for membership in this Unit must submit an application in writing and, upon the payment of International and Unit dues, shall be a Regular Member of this Unit.
- Section 4: Regular Members who have sold their recreational vehicle manufactured by Airstream, Inc., may, upon request, retain their membership as Regular Members of this Unit pursuant to the provisions of Article VI Sec.2C of the International Constitution. Such Regular Members shall possess all the rights and privileges of the International Club, including full voting rights in all elections and on all questions.

- Section 5: Regular Members of another Unit may become Affiliate Members in this Unit by an application to the Membership Committee and upon acceptance shall possess all the rights and privileges of the Unit, except the right to hold office in the Unit or the right to vote in the selection or election of officers in the Unit, Region, or International or on any amendment to the Unit or the International Constitution or on the dissolution of the Unit or the merger of the Unit with another Unit.
- Section 6: Applicants for membership in this Unit must submit dues and join the International Club simultaneously or show evidence of membership in the International Club through another duly chartered unit
- Section 7: Failure to pay either Unit or International dues will automatically terminate membership in the Unit.
- Section 8: In those cases of co-ownership of an fully self-contained hard sided recreational vehicle manufactured by Airstream, Inc., the rights and privileges of membership shall be deemed to include the spouses of such co-owner but collectively such co-owners shall possess one vote only except such co-owners who each pay International and Unit dues to this Unit shall each have one vote.

Article IV

Officers and Their Election

- Section 1: The Officers of the Unit shall consist of a President, a First Vice President, a Second Vice President, a Corresponding Secretary, a Recording Secretary, a Treasurer and Directors (four). The Executive Board shall consist of all of the Unit Officers plus the Immediate Past President of the Unit.
- Section 2: The Officers shall be elected at the annual business meeting and shall be installed and shall assume office at that time. An officer shall serve in office for a term of one year or until a successor is elected but in no case shall an officer, except the Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary or Treasurer, be eligible to serve more than two consecutive terms in the same office, provided said officers are duly nominated and elected for each term of office.
- Section 3: An officer who advances to an office pursuant to the provisions of Sec. 5 of this ARTICLE shall not be deemed to have served a full term in such office unless said service is for a period of greater than one-half (1/2) the term of such office.
- Section 4: The Directors shall be elected at the annual business meeting, each for a term of two years commencing at the annual meeting, but arranged so that only one-half such Directors' terms expire in any one year. No Director shall serve more than one two-year term consecutively.
- Section 5: In the event of the death or resignation of the President or the death, advancement or resignation of a Vice President, or an officer's inability to fulfill the duties of office, the next ranking Vice

President (in the order first, second) shall advance thereto. All other vacancies on the Executive Board, except that of the Immediate Past President, shall be filled by majority vote of the Executive Board.

Article V

Executive Board

- Section 1: The Executive Board shall be the administrative body of the Unit and shall define the policies of and have full administrative authority in all matters pertaining to the Unit, and shall exercise general control and supervision of all officers and committees.
- Section 2: A quorum of the Executive Board shall consist of a majority of the members.

Article VI

Business Meetings

- Section 1: The annual business meeting of the members of this organization shall be held during the month of November in each calendar year. Such a meeting shall be announced by written notice and delivered to the members not less than fifteen (15) days prior to the meeting. The notice shall indicate the date, time, and location of the meeting. A quorum for conducting business at the annual meeting, or at any additional business meeting, shall not be less than ten (10) percent of members.
- Section 2: Additional business meetings of the members may be held at a suitable time and place during the second day of each rally of the members. If the rally or meeting is of less than two days duration, written notice to the members indicating the time, location, and purpose of such meeting shall be delivered to the members not less than ten (10) days prior to the meeting.
- Section 3: The Executive Board, by majority vote, may call additional business meetings of the members.
- Section 4: The President or any two members of the Board may call a business meeting of the Executive Board at any time deemed necessary.
- Section 5: All Regular and Affiliate Members voting at the annual or additional business meetings of this Unit, and each such membership, identified by the International Club Membership number, shall be considered one vote, except for co-owners who each pay International and Unit Dues to this Unit as provided for in Article III, Section 9.
- Section 6: A mail ballot may be used to obtain the vote of the members of the Unit on a proposal when such is deemed desirable or necessary. When a mail ballot is used to obtain the vote of the member of the Unit on a proposal, no other method of voting on such a proposal shall be utilized.

Article VII

Bylaws

Section 1: Bylaws not inconsistent with this Constitution, and with the Constitution, Bylaws and Policy of the Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc., embodying additional provisions for the government of the Unit may be adopted by the Executive Board.

Article VIII

Amendments

Section 1: Proposed amendments to this Constitution shall be submitted to the Executive Board in writing. The Executive Board shall submit all such amendments to the members for their consideration.

Section 2: Any Article or Section of this Constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the Regular Members present and voting at a business meeting of the Unit or a special meeting called for that purpose, providing in either case, a notice containing the proposed amendment or amendments has been mailed first-class to each member of the Unit at least fifteen (15) days prior to such a meeting.

Section 3: All amendments to this Constitution shall become effective upon adoption.

This Constitution adopted and effective May 3, 1997, at Lakeville, Massachusetts.

Standing Committees

General Duties

- Budget In cooperation with the incoming and outgoing Treasurer of the Unit, prepare for the Executive Board a budget projecting the unit's income and expenditures for the calendar (or fiscal) year next ensuing.
- Caravan To plan, organize, and obtain leaders for unit caravans that are operated or conducted for the Unit within the scope of the WBCCI Caravan Handbook. To develop an aggressive Unit Caravan program and to coordinate unit caravan matters with appropriate Region and International Caravan Committee personnel.
- Constitution and Bylaws To conduct a continuing review and study of the Unit and the International Constitution and Bylaws and to make recommendations for any amendments or additions deemed desirable and in the best interest of the Club.
- Ethics and Grievance To investigate and assess all grievances or complaints made by members and others and to make recommendations thereon to the Unit Executive Board.
- Family/Youth Plan programs to encourage participation of family/youth at unit functions and to be the liaison person between the Unit and International Family/Youth Standing Committee.

- Hospitality To receive and make welcome guests and new members at club functions. Recommend ways to meet and greet all club members and guests at rallies and/or seasonal functions.
- Legislative To study, advise and recommend legislation in the interest of the Club and its members; to recommend opposition to all legislation which is discriminatory and injurious to the interest of the Club and its members.
- Membership be the Unit/Club contact for prospective new members and explain the purpose and objectives of the Wally Byam Caravan Club International. Extend invitations to prospective members to attend a rally or meeting when making application for membership.
- 10. Publicity To collect newsworthy items of interest to club members and to publish monthly a newsletter containing past and future events of the Unit, Region and International. To publish yearly a roster in the form and content as directed by the Executive Board. Forward material to Headquarters for publishing in the Blue Beret and Directory with respect to the Unit's activities schedule.

- Public Relations To maintain communications with the International and Region Public Relations Committee for maintaining a continuing program of public relations between WBCCI and communities being exposed to rallies and caravans.
- Section 3: Special committees may be appointed by the President as required.

Article III

- Section 1: A guest (or guests) sponsored and invited by a member in good standing and sharing that member's facilities may attend activities of the Unit. Members sponsoring such a guest shall pay one extra rally fee exclusive of the parking fee.
- Section 2: A member in good standing in this Unit may sponsor and invite a prospective member to attend activities of the Unit.
- Section 3: Members in good standing in the International Club may attend activities of the Unit provided that such members, and where required, shall have made prior reservation for each attendance.
- Section 4: The Unit, once each calendar year, may host a rally, caravan or combination thereof with a recreational vehicle club not chartered by the Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc., and, it may conduct twice each calendar year, a Buddy Rally or a Buddy Caravan or combination thereof to which each member may invite not more than one nonmember recreational vehicle family.

Article IV

Nominating Committee

Section 1: The Executive Board shall, not less than 90 days prior to the Unit's annual business meeting, appoint a three member Nominating Committee who shall, after having obtained the prior consent of each proposed nominee, place in nomination one candidate for each office and director to be filled by election, and submit a written report to the Executive Board which shall include the names of all candidates considered, and the President shall distribute the report to the membership not less than fifteen (15) days prior to said business meeting. Additional candidates, who have previously consented, may be placed in nomination from the floor of that meeting. No seconds are required for any nomination.

Article V

Duties of Officers

Section 1: The President shall preside at all meetings of the Unit and Executive board, enforce the Constitution and Bylaws, appoint all standing committees and have such powers and duties as normally pertain to the principal executive officer.

- Section 2: The 1st Vice President shall attend all business meetings of the Unit and the Executive Board and shall assist the President and assume the duties of the President, when absent.
- Section 3: The 2nd Vice President shall attend all business meetings of the Unit and the Executive Board and shall assist the President and 1st Vice President and assume the duties of the President and 1st Vice President in their absence, and will perform the duties assigned by the Executive Board.
- Section 4: The Corresponding Secretary shall issue notices of all meetings of the Unit and Executive Board as prescribed in Article VI, Sections 1 and 2 and Article VIII, Section 2 of the Constitution. The Corresponding Secretary shall prepare an agenda of pending business for use by the presiding officer at each meeting and shall keep a register of all members of the Unit.
- Section 5: The Recording Secretary shall record and preserve the minutes of all official meetings of the Unit and the Executive Board; copies of same shall be available to members of the Executive Board not more than fifteen (15) days following each meeting, upon request. The Recording Secretary shall record the attendance of the officers and directors at each meeting and shall advise the presiding officer if a quorum is present.
- Section 6: The Treasurer shall maintain the financial records of the Unit and shall receive all moneys and promptly deposit them in the bank previously chosen by the Executive Board; shall notify members of expiration of dues and issue receipts for dues paid; shall submit a full written report of finances to the Executive Board at each meeting and before retirement shall have the books and accounts audited by a committee of not less than three members selected by the incoming President. All books, monies, and property of the Unit held by the Treasurer shall be delivered promptly to the successor.
- Section 7: The duties of the Directors shall be as prescribed in Section 1, Article V, of the Constitution and to attend all meetings of the Unit and the Executive Board; to accept special assignments as directed by the President.

Article VI

Delegates

Section 1: The Executive Board shall select one delegate and one alternate from among the officers and Regular and Associate members who will attend the annual Delegates meeting of the parent organization, the Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc. Any vacancy occurring following such selection shall be filled by appointment by the President. The delegate and alternate should be instructed respecting the wishes of the Unit on matters to come before the meeting. The President and Secretary shall certify to these selections.

Article VII

Dues

Section 1: The annual dues of Regular and Affiliate members shall be set by the Executive Board.

Section 2: A member who fails to pay properly assessed International and Unit dues before November 15 may not be listed in the Annual Membership Directory of the International Club for the following year. If the dues are not paid and receipted by the Treasurer on or before December 31, membership will be terminated.

Article VIII

Code of Ethics

Section 1: All members shall abide by the following Code of Ethics:

- (a) To be ever mindful of our responsibility to the Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc., and through conduct indicate to the public that membership in this organization is an assurance of courtesy on the road and of goodwill to all peoples and countries.
- (b) To say or print nothing which may reflect unfavorably on others and to dedicate ourselves to the work of cementing together the members of our units and the Club in bonds of friendship, good fellowship, and mutual understanding.
- (c) To conduct ourselves so as to inspire others also engaged in recreational vehicle travel to a full appreciation of the intent and meaning of this code.
- (d) To maintain our camps and parking areas in an orderly manner and to leave them in a neat and clean condition.

Article IX

Liability

Section 1: Neither the Unit nor its officers are responsible for the loss of or damage to property or for injury to or death of a person on the premises of any club function. This freedom for responsibility for loss or damage to property applies regardless of whether that property has been received by any member or officer or left upon the premises.

Article X

Amendments

Section 1: These Bylaws may be amended at any business meeting of the Executive Board by two-thirds vote, provided the proposed amendment has been submitted to all members of the Executive Board in writing at least ten (10) days prior to such meeting.


Section 2: Such amendments shall become effective upon adoption.

Article XI

Dissolution

Section 1: In the event of dissolution of this Unit, the members shall, through the President, assign all assets to the International Club, or in the case of an incorporated unit, to such other trustee appointed in accordance with the laws governing non-profit corporation in the State or province of their incorporation, to be held in trust until such time as the charter is restored, the unit is reorganized, or a new charter is issued when such assets shall be returned or transferred to the newly functioning unit. This procedure is in accordance with the meaning of Section 501 © (7) of the Internal Revenue Service Code. None of the funds shall enure to the benefit of any member and the Unit Charter and all International club property shall be returned to International Club Headquarters.

These by laws were last printed on April 5, 1992, at East Hartford, Connecticut.

Guidelines for Rallies & Meetings

1. Chatter Article

Appoint someone in advance to write a news article for the Chatter describing the event and ask them to submit the article to the Chatter editor within a few days after the event. This is the responsibility of the host. Failure to do so will result in a delay in publishing our newsletter.

2. Advance Notice

When preparing flyers, include information regarding rally fees, dates, parking, deposits, activities, potluck dinners, etc. Submit a flyer (sign-up sheet) to the Chatter editor in advance of your event.

3. Rally Expenses

All rallies should be self-supporting, each person paying his share of the expenses. When visitors pay the same as members, they feel free to take part. This also prevents criticism over treasury funds being used for activities in which all members do not participate.

4. Suggestions for Making a Successful "First Impression" at a WBCCI Rally

- a. Have a Greeting Committee to meet arrivals with a . . . "Hi! Glad you're here!" Some may be new owners and new to our program. Make them feel at home. Give each person a name tag, give each RV a program, or if you do not have programs, tell them to check the bulletin board for the schedule of activities.
- b. Have a hospitality center so that on arrival the greeters can say . . . "the coffee is on . . . get set up and then come over ___." Have a bulletin board at the hospitality center.
 Post announcements and program, and perhaps a sign . . . "Welcome to the Charter Oak Connecticut Unit, WBCCI."
- c. Take a snapshot of each family and paste it in the Unit history book. These books are of interest to everyone and should be on display at all Unit rallies.
- Have a Unit guest book and ask everyone to sign it at each rally.
- e. Award a "gate" prize. One thought . . . number the programs and lucky number gets the prize . . . use some kind of gag.
- Plan something for the children. It will make a more enjoyable rally for everyone.

5. Rally Parking

Park rally hosts together. These are the people who are responsible for the success of the rally. Be sure everyone knows where to locate officers and hosts.

6. Meetings

Wally patterned "Meeting Time" after the old town hall meetings. Meetings may be strictly social or a combined social and business meeting. Meetings give everyone an opportunity to get together. Meetings provide a time to get acquainted, to exchange ideas, to discuss objectives and accomplishments. This is a time to take part and a time to recognize individual contributions. The sidewalk café meeting is always fun. Members bring their refreshments and sit around and talk about what has been done or seen, trips made, etc. This usually takes place about 4:30 in the afternoon. If a business meeting or a combined business meeting and social meeting is planned, notice should be posted. Everyone will make an extra effort to get back from sight-seeing or shopping.

7. Bulletin Board

Place a bulletin board in a central location (the hospitality RV is often used) as a center of activities for announcements and program news. If you have a printed program, post one on the board. Keep everyone informed about what is going on.

8. Church Services

Post notices of local church services on the bulletin board.

9. Head Table

Arranging the head table and the seating of guests depends upon the size of the table and the number to be seated. If possible, your own officers and their spouses should be seated at the head table. If there isn't room for the spouses, they should be placed as near the head table as possible. The President should sit in the center position. Visiting VIPs and International officers would normally be seated at the head table. A special table for officers, past and present, may be arranged. If you have overlooked someone who might

reasonably expect to sit at the head table, ask them to stand and be acknowledged. This helps to overcome what could be an embarrassing situation.


