

MaryEllen is employed by the Visiting Nurses Association in Meriden.


Ray has served as a Director for two years, 2nd Vice President and is First Vice President this year.

Midwinter IBT

Anthony, Texas

January 9-14, 2006

The Midwinter International Board of Trustees meeting was held in Anthony, Texas, (one mile from the New Mexico state line), at American RV and Marine at Exit 1 on Interstate 10.

There was a good representation of WBCCI members in attendance, with about 114 Airstreams on site. American RV also has new Airstreams for sale. The stage used for the members of the IBT was flanked by three Airstream Trailers, one at the back and one on each side; a very appropriate setting.

All nineteen members of the IBT, plus the parliamentarian and Larry Huttle, President of Airstream Corporation, were in attendance. For your information, the nineteen members are: International President, three International Vice Presidents, International Secretary, International Treasurer, Immediate Past International President and the Twelve Region Presidents. Many of the Region 1st & 2nd VP's, Standing Committee Chairpersons and WBCCI members were also at the meeting.

In addition to the many usual breakfast, dinners and socials, much business was accomplished. There were a total of eleven motions to be voted on and I will go through them in chronological order.

MOTION =1 was to change the name of our organization to include the word "Airstream." After much discussion, and amendments to the original motion, the name selected is: "AIRSTREAM OWNERS ASSOCIATION INTERNATIONAL, INCORPORATED." Motion adopted.

Since this would be a change in our Constitution, this motion will go forward to the Delegates Meeting on June 30, 2006 at the International Rally this summer in Salem, Oregon. The Delegates will approve, reject or change the name as presented by the IBT.

MOTION = 2 was to change our Logo to be in line with our new name, if the new name is adopted by the Delegates. The new Logo is circular as the one we now have, in colors of Red, White & Blue, with the NEW name written on the perimeter, with a Two Axle Airstream Trailer placed over a world globe in the center. After two amendments, and MUCH discussion it came to a vote.

Motion adopted...

Since this IS NOT a Constitutional change, it is not necessary for the Delegates to vote on this item, but the IBT members thought this was an emotional issue and felt the Delegates should be the final authority.

MOTION =3 was to allow inclusion of the new Airstream "Trailer", called the "Base Camp" to be admitted into WBCCI.

Motion adopted.

MOTION =4 was in regard to Membership and Membership Privileges. This comes under Bylaws & Policy, Article IV, Section 11, page 9. This was changed to include MAL's, (Members at Large). This was primarily a housekeeping change.

Motion adopted.

MOTION = 5 was in regard to Flag Protocol in the U. S., Canada and Mexico. ANY MEMBER OF WBCCI may fly: One, Two, Three or Five flags AUTHORIZED BY WBCCI.

Motion adopted.

MOTION =6 was to allow any member of WBCCI to fly Four flags. As in the previous motion, all flags must be flown with regard to proper "Flag Protocol." in the U.S., Canada and Mexico. As in motion =5, ALL flags must be AUTHORIZED BY WBCCI.

Motion adopted.

MOTION = 7 was for the adoption of a New Unit flag for the Texas Coastal Plains Unit.

Motion adopted.

MOTION =8 was in regard to Lifetime Membership.

Motion withdrawn.

MOTION =9 was in regard to the order of drawing a new Membership number, in the 200 or 300 series, for incoming Region Presidents.

Motion withdrawn

MOTION #10 was in regard to Financial Disbursements for International Officers, Region Officers plus Standing & Special Committee Chairpersons.

Motion defeated.

<u>MOTION =11</u> was in regard to WBCCI's "Acceptance of credit cards over the Internet and by phone, for items that Headquarters has for sale, rally registration and at large dues." <u>UNIT</u> membership will still be paid to the Unit Treasurer.

Motion adopted.

As the photo shows, and like ALL rallies, there is time for FUN. There was a very nice "Margarita" social which was enjoyed by all. All the men were "Loaned" the outfit I'm wearing and the Ladies wore a Shoulder Wrap.







Micky's first trip as a camper and we were quite pleased with his behavior. Looks as if he will be a good traveler in the future


We still need someone to design the bulletin board and if you have any pull tabs or warm hats for kids to go out to Oregon, try to get them to us by May 27th.



Note from the Editor—This article was sent to us from friends we met on our last cruise, who live in Dallas. The note that accompanied the article said "aren't these like your blue streak, or whatever?" We enjoyed the article so much we decided to share it with you. It is reprinted form the Dallas Morning News. It was written by Scott Burns as part of The Airstream Chronicles for the Dallas Morning News.

AIRSTREAM ANGEL KEEPS THINGS SIMPLE

Drive past Madrid, N.M., home of the Mineshaft Tavern and a tribe of people who are still wearing tie-dyed T-shirts, and you won't find much.

Pass the last of the roadside miner's cabins and what you'll find is miles of beautiful scenery in all directions.

The road, best known as "the Turquoise Trail" is popular with bikers.

The cruisers ride to the Mineshaft on Sundays and add some class to the weekday crew.

The sport bikers — some with wellscuffed kneepads on their leather outfits — don't stop. They just burn road and run the twisties from Santa Fe to Alburquerque.

But if you go a few miles past Madrid, turn off a dirt road, known to locals as Mail Box Road, and follow the ruts a few miles, you will eventually come to the home of Rick Ruff, Airstream Angel.

Mr. Ruff, who is in his late 50's, lives there with his collection of six Airstreams, all venerable, all collectible.

He has no electricity. He trucks in his water. He trucks in his propane. Solar panels recharge the battery in his home, and two aging generators are cranked up from time to time for the sole purpose of running power tools. He stays in touch with the world with his cellphone.

His Christmas card pictures a lone Bambi
— the coveted 16 foot trailer from the 60s
— covered with snow, the Sandia Mountains far in the distance.

Another photo shows a rainbow landing in the middle of six glistening Airstreams. Talk about austere beauty.

Rick lives lite. A former leather crafts worker, he became familiar with trailer living in the years he went from one craft show to the next and learned that the best way to make the economics of handcraft work was to live in a trailer.

Like me, he was charmed by the odd perfection of the Airstream's ovoid shape.

In time, he gave up making leather bags and other craftwork. He started fixing people's Airstreams. He will also go and pick up a trailer for you and bring it back to your house.

That's how I met him.

Lat November, when I bought my 1971 Safari, a 23 footer, the seller told me about Rick. I called him immediately because, well, I was scared to death about what I had done.

I was even more scared about what I might have to do. While the 35-year-old trailer appeared to be in good shape, I was no judge, and I'm not very good at fixing things.

The fastest way to build a collection of spare parts is to ask Scott Burns to assemble something. Let's leave it at that

So I hired Rick to re-rivet a window, install new tires and perform assorted other tasks before having him tow the Airstream to the B and D, otherwise known as the Burns Family All Hat and No Cattle Ranch.

This is where it now lives with a view of the Sangre de Cristo Mountains from the front window and a view of the Jemez Mountains from the back window, waiting for its first trip in early summer.

Then, the "mobile bunkhouse" will spend a month in Red River, north of Taos.

Before then, I will be counting on Rick to help with a multitude of small but vital repairs. You would be amazed at what happens to 35 year-old plastic parts, how difficult it is to find small replacement fans, etc. Even so our mobile bunkhouse is already earning its keep as a place to start the evening with a glass of wine.

Rick isn't the only person devoted to Airstreams. Use the Web to explore the cult of Airstreams and you'll find dozens, perhaps hundreds of people who either restored their own Airstream or offer to help other do it.

This simple purchase has already had an impact on the how we live. We may never live as austerely as Rick Ruff, but its space has redefined our ideas of what we want or need.

My wife has a new vocabulary for living in the material world. She wants, she says, "to hold things lightly.

Rick Ruff knows how to do that. Most of us would do well to learn.

MEMBER PROFILE

It had not been used for 10 years and due to health reasons, Colonel Doughtery sold it to Jerry and Fran. It moved to their yard in May, 1993.

They did not participate in any meetings or rallies for five years after they purchased the Land Yacht. In 1999, they attended the Region One Rally, in Pont Rouge, Canada. There they met nice people and they were hooked. Jerry often remarks that if you didn't have friends or family, you could buy an Airstream and be instantly adopted. It is interesting that people from so many different backgrounds and walks of life can come together and have fun based on the common interest of being an Airstsream owner.

Since that time they have become very involved with the club. They have hosted several dinner rallies and attend many of the trailer rallies. In addition, they have attended two Internationals and five Region One Rallies. Their favorite Region Rally was Woodstock because it was put on by Charter Oak and they got to participate in planning and working the rally. They were in charge of the Bocci Tournament. Jerry now serves as a First Year Director.

They now own their second Airstream. They purchased a brand new 31 foot Classic in 2003 at the International in Burlington, Vermont. Fran always wanted one with all the 'bells and whistles" and this one fits the bill.

Although no one else in their family has owned an Airstream, they always knew they were the top of the line, the best. They enjoy the fact that so many people remark about the quality of Airstream. They have heard the expression "It's the Cadillac of RVs ' many times.

Their other travels include a trip to Oregon and down the Pacific coast. They have also visited National Parks in Utah, Maine and Tennessee. In 2005 they spent a month in Florida traveling down the West Coast to Key West and then up the East Coast. Some of their favorites places are Crater Lake in Oregon, Acadia National Park in Maine and the Great Smokey Mountains in Tennessee. They have also enjoyed camping in Myrtle Beach at a campground located right on the beach.

Jerry retired after 32 years from Pratt and Whitney as a mechanical engineer. Fran retired in 2000 after working for Dr. Lawrence Andrus for 20 years, to devote her time to skiing, Airstreaming and summering in Westerly, Rhode Island.

No one knows better than Jerry and Fran how quickly life can change. In February, 2005, on their way home from Florida, Jerry had a stroke. He spent 3 1/2 weeks in a rehab facility in Savannah, GA and Fran lived in the Airstream.

When they returned home, Jerry was in a wheel chair. They knew he would walk again but how much he would regain of his old self was anyone's guess. Today, he is walking, thanks to prayers from family and friends. He is able to do many things he did before. He even got on skis three times this winter with Adaptive Ski Program at Ski Sundown. The big test was whether he could handle the Airstream. In May of this year, they took a three week trip with the Airstream to Myrtle Beach. They have attended two rallies so far this year and he handles the Airstream as well as ever.

We are glad to see Jerry doing so well. He and Fran bring a lot to the club. What would a rally be without Jerry's ever present camera. And the group shot which Jerry oversees in his own Cecile B. DeMille style.




WALLY BYAM CONTROL

Economic impact

The rally is estimated to generate \$3 million in economic activity in the area, said Diane Childs of the Oregon State Fairgrounds & Expo Center. Early rally participants already have helped boost business at area restaurants and laundromats and visited popular destinations

such as the Oregon Coast, the Evergreen Aviation Museum in McMinnville and Silverton, she said.

Held at a different location each year, the international rally always is the high point of a year, said Jim Franklin, the club's international president and a member since 1972. Rallies also are held at regional and state levels each year. Franklin, who lives in Strawberry, Ariz., with his wife, Dixie, said that Airstreamers share a common bond.

Franklin said Oregon's scenery was a big selling point to bring the rally to Salem for the first time since ing their mark on the Salem area. In addition to boosting the local economy, some are making substantial contributions to local non-profit organizations.

Franklin said that doing good work is part of the fun of club membership.

"We do it for our love of travel," Franklin said. "We've met a lot of friends through the years on the road, and going to rallies is a great way to reconnect. A lot of the members even come early."

Airstreamers don't arrive empty-handed

In the Jackman-Long Building, where much of the rally's official business is conducted, David Gaehring of Pedricktown, N.J., was sifting through thousands of tabs taken from beverage containers. Airstreamers have carried bags and boxes full of rings that have been collected throughout the year with them to Salem.

Gaehring, 86, said that the money made by selling the rings to a scrap dealer is augmented by at least a few dollars in change that he finds mixed in with the rings. All money raised this year will be donated to the Ronald receive monthly shots through next year that cost \$1,100 per month. The Holland family's insurance will pay only for the first three months.

Through the Airstreamers' Common Cents program, club members across the nation donate loose change at meetings and events. And like the beverage-can tops and stuffed animals, that change, at least \$6,000, made its way to Salem and to a bank account to help pay for Keely's medical needs.

Byam promoted in the earliest caravans. During a trek
from South Africa to Egypt,
Byam raised money for African villages and people.

The early arrivals help set up and plan the rally's many activities. Among the activities planned for the week are general business meetings, youth pageants, concerts, and art and hobby shows featuring photography and handicrafts.



do it in style, Keasling explained. In the mid-1930s, Byam refined the design by incorporating aircraft construction methods to lessen wind resistance and im-prove the trailers' strength-toweight ratio, according to the

company.
The "Clipper" model was unveiled on Jan. 17, 1936, and that marked the beginning of decades of success for the busi-

Neither the Great Depression Neither the Great Depression of the 1930s or World War II could stop Americans from getting the travel bug, and Airstream continued to thrive. The reason Byam picked "Airstream" as the company's name was when the trailers traveled down the read they are

eled down the road, they ap-peared to be in flight because of their lightweight aluminum con-struction.

By the late 1940s and 1950s, the silver-colored Airstream trailers could be seen traveling all over the country

Byam died in 1962 at age 66, but not before he founded the Wally Byam Caravan Club International, which gave thousands of Airstream owners across the country, and later the world, a chance to get together and enjoy

large-scale rallies. Byam personally led caravans of Airstream trailers and began a tradition of having them form a large circle so they could hold all of their activities inside it, as

all of their activities inside it, as wagon trains did in the 1800s.
The caravan club has 10,000 members worldwide and holds 1,500 rallies each year, including the one that the New England Region One group is holding this weekend in Rochester.

Beatrice Foods bought the company in 1967 and continues to produce new lines of Safari and Classic trailers along with new trailer models and mo-torhomes.

The Smithsonian Institution in Washington, D.C., created an exhibit for Airstream trailers as part of its American National History Museum. People also can view exhibits at the Henry Ford Museum in Michigan.

The National Aeronautics Space Administration chose Airstream trailers to house the first astronauts who returned from the Moon in 1969. It still use Airstream motorhomes today a part of the Space Shuttle pro-gram, according to the company

For four days, they will celebrate what it means to be part of the Airstream family, Bleakney

explained.

"The Airstream is a whole culture in itself," said Bleakney, who along with her husband Chuck is the proud owner of a 1998 Airstream Cutter motorhome and a 19-foot, 1967 Airstream Caravel trailer.

The Bleakneys have been members of the New England branch of the caravan club for 11 years. She said she still marvels at how the owners come together as if one big family and revel in their shared love of the campers and the roaming lifestyle they enable.

This weekend they held a celebration, decorating their trailers and motorhomes with festive lights. They also have held night-

Sbrogna, 80, and his wife, Vera, have traveled all over the country and Canada in Airstream trailers for the past 34 years, he said. Sbrogna said the couple bought a Tradewinds trailer in 1966 and never looked back.

They own a 35-foot 2000 Airstream Land Yacht Motorhome today and have no intention of retiring from the Airstream rally circuit anytime soon.

"This club, these people are worth more than the trailers themselves," Gus Sbrogna said. "You can go anywhere in the country and meet somebody you've seen before at one of the rallies."

The more than 120 Airstream owners converging in Rochester represent just a handful of the people who have adopted this lifestyle, said Jini Keasling, a spokeswoman for Airstream, Inc., in Jackson Center, Ohio.

She said there are 80,000 to 100,000 Airstreams on the road today, and 60 percent of all the Airstreams produced from the 1930s to the present are still on the road today.

Thousands of owners attend caravan club rallies across the country, Keasling said.

In the last three years, Airstream's sales to dealers have increased 15 percent, Keasling said. Company officials believe more younger people are buying them because of the Internet and increased use by Hollywood celebrities like Johnny Depp and Martha Stewart.

She said the Airstream trailers also are being featured in more Hollywood films and prime-time television shows like "Grey's Anatomy."

More people also are choosing to vacation and travel within the United States after the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks, Keasling added.

Bleakney said the rallies are displaying a more intergenerational quality, with members as old as the Sbrognas rubbing elbows with newer members in their 20s and 30s.

The rallies also let owners admire each other's trailers and motor homes, which span decades of history.

Andre and Susan Baillargeon of Exeter own a 25-foot Airstream Tradewinds Land Yacht trailer and a 20-foot 1977 Argosy motorhome, made by the same company.

Throughout the campground, Airstream owners choose different themes to adorn their trailers and patios beneath roll-out canopies. The Baillargeons liked the 1970s, so they stay with that theme.

Andre Baillargeon said he bought the 1975 trailer three years ago in Ohio for \$9,500 from a man who traveled from Wisconsin to meet him. He decided to restore the trailer to its '70s style.

He even plays nothing but 70s rock music inside.

Andre Baillargeon is still in the process of restoring the Argosy motorhome and added that it will make the perfect in-law apartment when Susan's parents stay with them this weekend.

Like the Baillargeons, Cathy Leoffleo and her husband, Jim Pfeiffer, of Milford, are relative newcomers to the Airstream culture.

They bought a 16-foot 2004 Bambi Airstream trailer that cost a little more than \$30,000.

She said they had been camping for years and wanted to buy a trailer, but never found the right one. One day she saw a small photo of an Airstream trailer in a magazine. After investigating further, Leofleo said it was love at first sight.

Leoffleo, who directs a social service agency in Massachusetts, and her husband, who works as a teacher at Nashua High School, now take weekend trips all the time, including fall and winter camping trips.

"I find myself inspired by the older folks, too," she said. "These folks are positive; they're happy."

Jim Pfeiffer said attending a caravan club rally with fellow Airstream owners is "a retreat in the classic sense of the word."





Constitution

Article I

Name of Organization

Section 1: This organization, incorporated in the State of Connecticut, is a chartered Unit of the Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc., and shall be known as the Charter Oak Connecticut Unit of the Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc.

Article II

Objectives

Section 1: The objectives of this non-profit organization shall be to furnish encouragement and assistance in the development of the Unit and thus afford fraternization for Airstream trailer and motorhome owners; to encourage safe driving and assist in improving the general welfare of the recreational vehicle public through assistance and active participation of all its members in building a strong organization for the betterment of goodwill toward trailer and motorhome travel; to coordinate with and participate in the interests and activities of the International and the Region; to cooperate with other organizations and units within our sphere which are seeking to elevate the standards and ethics of the various groups; to disseminate information of an advisory and educational nature which will be of value to its members and the public; to study, advise and recommend legislation which is in the interest of the trailering and motoring public and oppose all legislation which is discriminatory and injurious to the trailering and motoring public; and to encourage government and private agencies to provide more and better trailer and motorhome parks and facilities.

Article III

Membership Qualifications

- Section 1: Adult ownership of a fully self-contained and hard sided recreational vehicle manufactured by Airstream, Inc., is a prerequisite for membership in this Unit.
- Section 2: There are two classes of membership in this unit: Regular and Affiliate Members.
- Section 3: An applicant for membership in this Unit must submit an application in writing and, upon the payment of International and Unit dues, shall be a Regular Member of this Unit.
- Section 4: Regular Members who have sold their recreational vehicle manufactured by Airstream, Inc., may, upon request, retain their membership as Regular Members of this Unit pursuant to the provisions of Article VI Sec.2C of the International Constitution. Such Regular Members shall possess all the rights and privileges of the International Club, including full voting rights in all elections and on all questions.
- Section 5: Regular Members of another Unit may become Affiliate Members in this
 Unit by an application to the Membership Committee and upon acceptance shall
 possess all the rights and privileges of the Unit, except the right to hold office in
 the Unit or the right to vote in the selection or election of officers in the Unit,
 Region, or International or on any amendment to the Unit or the International
 Constitution or on the dissolution of the Unit or the merger of the Unit with
 another Unit.
- Section 6: Applicants for membership in this Unit must submit dues and join the International Club simultaneously or show evidence of membership in the International Club through another duly chartered unit.
- Section 7: Failure to pay either Unit or International dues will automatically terminate membership in the Unit.

Constitution

Section 8: In those cases of co-ownership of an fully self-contained hard sided recreational vehicle manufactured by Airstream, Inc., the rights and privileges of membership shall be deemed to include the spouses of such co-owner but collectively such co-owners shall possess one vote only except such co-owners who each pay International and Unit dues to this Unit shall each have one vote.

Article IV

Officers and Their Election

- Section 1: The Officers of the Unit shall consist of a President, a First Vice President, a Second Vice President, a Corresponding Secretary, a Recording Secretary, a Treasurer and Directors (four). The Executive Board shall consist of all of the Unit Officers plus the Immediate Past President of the Unit.
- Section 2: The Officers shall be elected at the annual business meeting and shall be installed and shall assume office at that time. An officer shall serve in office for a term of one year or until a successor is elected but in no case shall an officer, except the Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary or Treasurer, be eligible to serve more than two consecutive terms in the same office, provided said officers are duly nominated and elected for each term of office.
- Section 3: An officer who advances to an office pursuant to the provisions of Sec. 5 of this ARTICLE shall not be deemed to have served a full term in such office unless said service is for a period of greater than one-half (1/2) the term of such office.
- Section 4: The Directors shall be elected at the annual business meeting, each for a term of two years commencing at the annual meeting, but arranged so that only one-half such Directors' terms expire in any one year. No Director shall serve more than one two-year term consecutively.
- Section 5: In the event of the death or resignation of the President or the death, advancement or resignation of a Vice President, or an officer's inability to fulfill the duties of office, the next ranking Vice President (in the order first, second) shall advance thereto. All other vacancies on the Executive Board, except that of the Immediate Past President, shall be filled by majority vote of the Executive Board.

Article V

Executive Board

Section 1: The Executive Board shall be the administrative body of the Unit and shall define the policies of and have full administrative authority in all matters pertaining to the Unit, and shall exercise general control and supervision of all officers and committees.

Section 2: A guorum of the Executive Board shall consist of a majority of the members.

Article VI

Business Meetings

- Section 1: The annual business meeting of the members of this organization shall be held during the month of November in each calendar year. Such a meeting shall be announced by written notice and delivered to the members not less than fifteen (15) days prior to the meeting. The notice shall indicate the date, time, and location of the meeting. A quorum for conducting business at the annual meeting, or at any additional business meeting, shall not be less than ten (10) percent of members.
- Section 2: Additional business meetings of the members may be held at a suitable time and place during the second day of each rally of the members. If the rally or meeting is of less than two days duration, written notice to the members

indicating the time, location, and purpose of such meeting shall be delivered to the members not less than ten (10) days prior to the meeting.

Section 3: The Executive Board, by majority vote, may call additional business meetings of the members.

Section 4: The President or any two members of the Board may call a business meeting of the Executive Board at any time deemed necessary.

Section 5: All Regular and Affiliate Members voting at the annual or additional business meetings of this Unit, and each such membership, identified by the International Club Membership number, shall be considered one vote, except for co-owners who each pay International and Unit Dues to this Unit as provided for in Article III, Section 9.

Section 6: A mail ballot may be used to obtain the vote of the members of the Unit on a proposal when such is deemed desirable or necessary. When a mail ballot is used to obtain the vote of the member of the Unit on a proposal, no other method of voting on such a proposal shall be utilized.

Article VII

Bylaws

Section 1: Bylaws not inconsistent with this Constitution, and with the Constitution, Bylaws and Policy of the Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc., embodying additional provisions for the government of the Unit may be adopted by the Executive Board.

Article VIII

Amendments

Section 1: Proposed amendments to this Constitution shall be submitted to the Executive Board in writing. The Executive Board shall submit all such amendments to the members for their consideration.

Section 2: Any Article or Section of this Constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the Regular Members present and voting at a business meeting of the Unit or a special meeting called for that purpose, providing in either case, a notice containing the proposed amendment or amendments has been mailed first-class to each member of the Unit at least fifteen (15) days prior to such a meeting.


Section 3: All amendments to this Constitution shall become effective upon adoption.

This Constitution adopted and effective May 3, 1997, at Lakeville, Massachusetts. This Constitution was amended effective November 8, 1998, at Vernon, Connecticut. Incorporated in Hartford, CT, April 14, 1998









Article I

Order of Business

Section 1: Parliamentary procedures for all meetings of the Unit and Executive Board shall be governed by the current edition of Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised except when they are in conflict with the Constitution or Bylaws of this Club.

Section 2: The order of business shall be:

- 2. Roll call of Executive Board and determination of quorum
- 3. Reading of minutes of previous meeting
- 4. Treasurer's report
- 5. Reading of correspondence
- 6. Report of committee chairpersons
- 7. Unfinished business
- 8. New business
- 9. Announcements
- Adjournment

Article II

Committees

Section 1: Standing Committees shall be:

- A. Budget
- B. Caravan
- C. Constitution and Bylaws
- D. Ethics and Grievances
- E. Family/Youth
- F. Historical
- G. Hospitality
- H. Legislative
- Membership
- J. Publicity
- K. Public Relations

The President shall appoint and be an ex-officio member of all committees except the Nominating Committee.

Section 2: All Standing Committees shall consist of a Chairperson and as many members as deemed necessary by the President. Chairpersons of Standing Committees shall report at each meeting of the Executive Board.

Standing Committees

General Duties

- A. Budget In cooperation with the incoming and outgoing Treasurer of the Unit, prepare for the Executive Board a budget projecting the unit's income and expenditures for the calendar (or fiscal) year next ensuing.
- B. Caravan To plan, organize, and obtain leaders for unit caravans that are operated or conducted for the Unit within the scope of the WBCCI Caravan Handbook. To develop an aggressive Unit Caravan program and to coordinate unit caravan matters with appropriate Region and International Caravan Committee personnel.
- Constitution and Bylaws To conduct a continuing review and study of the Unit and the International Constitution and Bylaws and to make

- recommendations for any amendments or additions deemed desirable and in the best interest of the Club.
- Ethics and Grievance To investigate and assess all grievances or complaints made by members and others and to make recommendations thereon to the Unit Executive Board.
- E. Family/Youth Plan programs to encourage participation of family/youth at unit functions and to be the liaison person between the Unit and International Family/Youth Standing Committee.
- F. Historical To record events including written and pictorial material associated with unit activities and to maintain a historical record of such.
- G. Hospitality To receive and make welcome guests and new members at club functions. Recommend ways to meet and greet all club members and guests at rallies and/or seasonal functions.
- H. Legislative To study, advise and recommend legislation in the interest of the Club and its members; to recommend opposition to all legislation which is discriminatory and injurious to the interest of the Club and its members.
- Membership be the Unit/Club contact for prospective new members and explain the purpose and objectives of the Wally Byam Caravan Club International. Extend invitations to prospective members to attend a rally or meeting when making application for membership.
- J. Publicity To collect newsworthy items of interest to club members and to publish monthly a newsletter containing past and future events of the Unit, Region and International. To publish yearly a roster in the form and content as directed by the Executive Board. Forward material to Headquarters for publishing in the Blue Beret and Directory with respect to the Unit's activities schedule.
- K. Public Relations To maintain communications with the International and Region Public Relations Committee for maintaining a continuing program of public relations between WBCCI and communities being exposed to rallies and caravans.

Section 3: Special committees may be appointed by the President as required.

Article III

Guests

- Section 1: A guest (or guests) sponsored and invited by a member in good standing and sharing that member's facilities may attend activities of the Unit. Members sponsoring such a guest shall pay one extra rally fee exclusive of the parking fee.
- Section 2: A member in good standing in this Unit may sponsor and invite a prospective member to attend activities of the Unit.
- Section 3: Members in good standing in the International Club may attend activities of the Unit provided that such members, and where required, shall have made prior reservation for each attendance.
- Section 4: The Unit, once each calendar year, may host a rally, caravan or combination thereof with a recreational vehicle club not chartered by the Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc., and, it may conduct twice each calendar year, a Buddy Rally or a Buddy Caravan or combination thereof to which each member may invite not more than one nonmember recreational vehicle family.

Article IV

Nominating Committee

Section 1: The Executive Board shall, not less than 90 days prior to the Unit's annual business meeting, appoint a three member Nominating Committee who shall, after having obtained the prior consent of each proposed nominee, place in nomination one candidate for each office and director to be filled by election, and submit a written report to the Executive Board which shall include the names of all candidates considered, and the President shall distribute the report to the membership not less than fifteen (15) days prior to said business meeting. Additional candidates, who have previously consented, may be placed in nomination from the floor of that meeting. No seconds are required for any nomination.

Article V

Duties of Officers

- Section 1: The President shall preside at all meetings of the Unit and Executive board, enforce the Constitution and Bylaws, appoint all standing committees and have such powers and duties as normally pertain to the principal executive officer.
- Section 2: The 1st Vice President shall attend all business meetings of the Unit and the Executive Board and shall assist the President and assume the duties of the President, when absent.
- Section 3: The 2nd Vice President shall attend all business meetings of the Unit and the Executive Board and shall assist the President and 1st Vice President and assume the duties of the President and 1st Vice President in their absence, and will perform the duties assigned by the Executive Board.
- Section 4: The Corresponding Secretary shall issue notices of all meetings of the Unit and Executive Board as prescribed in Article VI, Sections 1 and 2 and Article VIII, Section 2 of the Constitution. The Corresponding Secretary shall prepare an agenda of pending business for use by the presiding officer at each meeting and shall keep a register of all members of the Unit.
- Section 5: The Recording Secretary shall record and preserve the minutes of all official meetings of the Unit and the Executive Board; copies of same shall be available to members of the Executive Board not more than fifteen (15) days following each meeting, upon request. The Recording Secretary shall record the attendance of the officers and directors at each meeting and shall advise the presiding officer if a quorum is present.
- Section 6: The Treasurer shall maintain the financial records of the Unit and shall receive all moneys and promptly deposit them in the bank previously chosen by the Executive Board; shall notify members of expiration of dues and issue receipts for dues paid; shall submit a full written report of finances to the Executive Board at each meeting and before retirement shall have the books and accounts audited by a committee of not less than three members selected by the incoming President. All books, monies, and property of the Unit held by the Treasurer shall be delivered promptly to the successor.
- Section 7: The duties of the Directors shall be as prescribed in Section 1, Article V, of the Constitution and to attend all meetings of the Unit and the Executive Board; to accept special assignments as directed by the President.

Article VI

Delegates

Section 1: The Executive Board shall select one delegate and one alternate from among the officers and Regular and Associate members who will attend the annual Delegates meeting of the parent organization, the Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc. Any vacancy occurring following such selection shall be filled by appointment by the President. The delegate and alternate should be instructed respecting the wishes of the Unit on matters to come before the meeting. The President and Secretary shall certify to these selections.

Article VII

Dues

Section 1: The annual dues of Regular and Affiliate members shall be set by the Executive Board.

Section 2: A member who fails to pay properly assessed International and Unit dues before November 15 may not be listed in the Annual Membership Directory of the International Club for the following year. If the dues are not paid and receipted by the Treasurer on or before December 31, membership will be terminated.

Article VIII

Code of Ethics

Section 1: All members shall abide by the following Code of Ethics:

- A. To be ever mindful of our responsibility to the Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc., and through conduct indicate to the public that membership in this organization is an assurance of courtesy on the road and of goodwill to all peoples and countries.
- B. To say or print nothing which may reflect unfavorably on others and to dedicate ourselves to the work of cementing together the members of our units and the Club in bonds of friendship, good fellowship, and mutual understanding.
- C. To conduct ourselves so as to inspire others also engaged in recreational vehicle travel to a full appreciation of the intent and meaning of this code.
- To maintain our camps and parking areas in an orderly manner and to leave them in a neat and clean condition.

Article IX

Liability

Section 1: Neither the Unit nor its officers are responsible for the loss of or damage to property or for injury to or death of a person on the premises of any club function. This freedom for responsibility for loss or damage to property applies regardless of whether that property has been received by any member or officer or left upon the premises.

Article X

Amendments

Section 1: These Bylaws may be amended at any business meeting of the Executive Board by two-thirds vote, provided the proposed amendment has been submitted to all members of the Executive Board in writing at least ten (10) days prior to such meeting.

Section 2: Such amendments shall become effective upon adoption.

Article XI

Dissolution

Section 1: In the event of dissolution of this Unit, the members shall, through the President, assign all assets to the International Club, or in the case of an incorporated unit, to such other trustee appointed in accordance with the laws governing non-profit corporation in the State or province of their incorporation, to be held in trust until surtime as the charter is restored, the unit is reorganized, or a new charter is issued when such assets shall be returned or transferred to the newly functioning unit. This procedure is in accordance with the meaning of Section 501 © (7) of the Internal Revenue Service Code. None of the funds shall inure to the benefit of any member and the Unit Charter and all International club property shall be returned to International Club Headquarters.

Guidelines for Rallies & Meetings

1. Chatter Article

Appoint someone in advance to write a news article for the Chatter describing the event and ask them to submit the article to the Chatter editor within a few days after the event. This is the responsibility of the host. Failure to do so will result in a delay in publishing our newsletter.

2. Advance Notice

When preparing flyers, include information regarding rally fees, dates, parking, deposits, activities, potluck dinners, etc. Submit a flyer (sign-up sheet) to the Chatter editor in advance of your event.

3. Rally Expenses

All rallies should be self-supporting, each person paying his share of the expenses. When visitors pay the same as members, they feel free to take part. This also prevents criticism over treasury funds being used for activities in which all members do not participate.

4. Successful "First Impression" at an Airstream Rally

- a. Have a Greeting Committee to meet arrivals with a . . . "Hi! Glad you're here!" Some may be new owners and new to our program. Make them feel at home. Give each person a name tag, give each RV a program, or if you do not have programs, tell them to check the bulletin board for the schedule of activities.
- b. Have a hospitality center so that on arrival the greeters can say . . . "the coffee is on . . . get set up and then come over _____." Have a bulletin board at the hospitality center. Post announcements and program, and perhaps a sign . . . "Welcome to the Charter Oak Connecticut Unit, Airstream Rally."
- Take a snapshot of each family and paste it in the Unit history book. These books are of interest to everyone and should be on display at all Unit rallies.
- d. Have a Unit guest book and ask everyone to sign it at each rally.
- e. Award a "gate" prize. One thought . . . number the programs and lucky number gets the prize . . . use some kind of gag.
- Plan something for the children. It will make a more enjoyable rally for everyone.

5. Rally Parking

Park rally hosts together. These are the people who are responsible for the success of the rally. Be sure everyone knows where to locate officers and hosts.

6. Meetings

Wally patterned "Meeting Time" after the old town hall meetings. Meetings may be strictly social or a combined social and business meeting. Meetings give everyone an opportunity to get together. Meetings provide a time to get acquainted, to exchange ideas, to discuss objectives and accomplishments. This is a time to take part and a time to recognize individual contributions. The sidewalk café meeting is always fun. Members bring their refreshments and sit around and talk about what has been done or seen, trips made, etc. This usually takes place about 4:30 in the afternoon. If a business meeting or a combined business meeting and social meeting is planned, notice should be posted. Everyone will make an extra effort to get back from sight-seeing or shopping.

7. Bulletin Board


Place a bulletin board in a central location (the hospitality RV is often used) as a center of activities for announcements and program news. If you have a printed program, post one on the board. Keep everyone informed about what is going on.

8. Church Services

Post notices of local church services on the bulletin board.


9. Head Table

Arranging the head table and the seating of guests depends upon the size of the table and the number to be seated. If possible, your own officers and their spouses should be seated at the head table. If there isn't room for the spouses, they should be placed as near the head table as possible. The President should sit in the center position. Visiting VIPs and International officers would normally be seated at the head table. A special table for officers, past and present, may be arranged. If you have overlooked someone who might reasonably expect to sit at the head table, ask them to stand and be acknowledged. This helps to overcome what could be an embarrassing situation.


