

Futuristic cars and trucks are unveiled each year at the North American International Auto Show, but Ford Motor Co. designer Freeman Thomas said his company has a concept vehicle this year that should strike both a visual and emotional chord with the public. Ford will debut the Ford Airstream concept in Detroit today. It is inspired by the iconic aluminum-skinned trailers of Airstream, a company that has become a symbol of travel on U.S. highways and byways. The Ford Airstream has a "story to tell," said Thomas, Ford's director for North American strategic design. "We build a lot of concept vehicles," Thomas said. "This one has some magic involved in it. ... It's about the American road. It's about the journey." Ford designers approached Airstream at last year's auto show about working together on a concept vehicle. Airstream, based in Jackson Center, Ohio, has a colorful and storied history.

Wallace Merle Byam, who started Airstream in 1931, used aircraft construction methods to build a sturdy, lightweight trailer. By the 1950s and '60s, Airstream trailers had become a common sight on roads and at campgrounds.


The Henry Ford in Dearborn has an Airstream on display, NASA used Airstreams to sequester astronauts when they returned from the moon and actor Matthew McConaughey traveled cross-country in an Airstream to promote his movie "Sahara." Ford wanted to capture the Airstream mystique while also pushing the pioneering spirit into the future, Thomas said. In addition to Airstreams, Ford designers also were inspired by images from Stanley Kubrick's film "2001: A Space Odyssey." "America is all about these great expanses of space," Thomas said. "There's an optimism that's still alive in America."

The Ford Airstream exterior has reflective silver paint, ceremonial rivets and windows trimmed in orange. The interior features lounge-like seating with a 360-degree cylindrical screen that can display video feeds, turn into a lava lamp or become a virtual fire. A long door on one side opens upward to provide a picture window to the world. Travelers are meant to park in a scenic spot, kick back, relax and enjoy the view, Thomas said.

The Ford Airstream is powered by a plug-in hydrogen hybrid fuel-cell system borrowed from an experimental Ford vehicle now in test phase. Ford has no plans at this time to build the Ford Airstream, but everything in the vehicle is based on viable technology, Thomas said. "We're showing the media and the public a glimpse into a crystal ball that is a real crystal ball," Thomas said. Bob Wheeler, Airstream president and chief executive officer, said his company was pleased to work on the concept with Ford Airstream executives and designers visit the Detroit auto show each year, but Airstream has never been actively involved in a concept.

"It's really been a broadening experience," Wheeler said.

#### REGION 1 PRESIDENT'S REPORT ON CLASS-A MOTORHOME ISSUE

On Saturday, June 30, 2007, the annual Delegates Meeting of WBCCI will be held in Perry, GA. Unit Presidents will receive an Agenda with copies of motions to be presented to the Delegates Meeting during April. This report provides background on the Class A motorhome motion to be brought forward at the Delegates Meeting. It is urgent that each unit's members understand the issue and provide appropriate direction to their delegate with respect to action at the Delegates Meeting.

In October 2007, the International President, Don Shafer, formed a special Class-A Motorhome Study Committee with Dick Bartram as Chairman. This action was taken because the Airstream Company had announced that it was discontinuing manufacture of Class-A motorhomes and such action could have an impact on the Club's membership.

At the Mid-Winter IBT Meeting at Perry in January 2007, Dick Bartram presented the Study Committee's Report. Dick & Eileen Bartram, Don & Ann Shafer and Jerry & Marilyn Collins had attended the 2006 RVIA Exhibition in Louisville, and had reviewed the Four Winds and Damon product lines of Thor. The Report recommended amendment of the WBCCI Constitution to make owners of certain Four Winds or Damon Class-A motorhomes eligible for membership in WBCCI. The Report resulted in Motion "A" to be presented under New Business.

Motion "A" proposed to direct the Study Committee to develop a motion to be presented to the Delegates Meeting, to allow owners of six specific Class-A motorhomes manufactured by the Four Winds Division of Thor to be members of WBCCI. The motion was presented to the members of the IBT in an open meeting and discussion followed, both pro and con. The Region 1 President, Robert Thompson, moved to strike the motion and substitute a motion by which the IBT would initiate an amendment to the WBCCI Constitution to be presented to the Delegates Meeting in June 2007, to make owners of Class-A motorhomes manufactured by the Four Winds Division of Thor eligible for membership in WBCCI. This motion was passed 18-0 in favor of its substitution. The "new" main motion then passed 18-0 in favor of submitting it to the Delegates Meeting.

The above motion was later deemed "incomplete" by the Constitution and Bylaws Committee Chairman and sent back to the IBT, because the motion did not specify the specific Article(s) and Section(s) of the Constitution to be amended. As a result of this action, the International President called an Emergency IBT Meeting to address the situation.

The Emergency IBT meeting was conducted during the third week of March 2007 and a "new" Motion No. 1, with its rationale, was presented by the Region 12 President. Discussion followed by exchange of e-mail. The discussions included detailed rationales pro and con by some region presidents and by the International 2<sup>nd</sup> VP, who also questioned some of the data in the factual basis of the Rationale for the Motion. Those favoring the motion emphasized the problems long-time members face with maintenance of aging motorhomes, the social importance of keeping long-time members, and the potential costs of a shrinking membership. Those opposed to the motion expressed concern about undermining the "single-brand" nature of the club and, in that respect, permitting owners of used Four Winds motorhomes to be members; and also expressed concern that the IBT had not resolved requirements for 'badging" (labeling units as, for example, "Airstream Edition") the membership eligibility of Four Winds motorhomes.

Electronic voting took place from Noon March 16<sup>th</sup> to Noon March 17<sup>th</sup>. The vote reported by the Secretary of the IBT was: 15 for, 2 against and 1 abstention (one member of the IBT could not be reached). Region 1 was recorded against the motion.

As the issue now stands, Delegates will be asked to address the issue at the Delegates Meeting on June 30, 2007 in Perry. Their decision will determine if owners of Four Winds motorhomes will or will not be admitted to membership in the club. And, of course, the Delegates can change, modify, or amend the motion at their pleasure or as guided by their units' preferences. An officer of Region 1 plans to attend the Spring Business Meeting of each U.S. unit in Region 1, and to respond to members' questions. The Motion, as adopted at the Emergency IBT Board Meeting, follows for your information.

#### I move that

The WBCCI Constitution, Article VI, Titled "Qualifications of Members," Section 1, (page2) be amended after the words...
"Airstream, Inc." and before the words "shall be" by the insertion of the following: "OR A CLASS-A MOTORHOME MANUFACTURED BY THE FOUR WINDS INTERNATIONAL DIVISION OF THOR INDUSTRIES, INC."

#### Article VI Section 1 would then read:

An adult who owns a hard sided recreational vehicle manufactured by Airstream, Inc. OR A CLASS-A MOTORHOME MANU-FACTURED BY THE FOUR WINDS INTERNATIONAL DIVISION OF THOR INDUSTRIES, INC., shall be eligible for membership.

#### AND

The WBCCI Constitution, Article VI, Titled "Qualifications of Members," Section 2 B, (page2) be amended after the words...
"recreational vehicle" and before the words " as defined in this Article" by striking of the following: "MANUFACTURED BY
AIRSTREAM, INC."

#### Article VI Section 2 B would then read:

Ownership, except as otherwise provided herein, of a recreational vehicle as defined in this Article, and the payment of annual Unit and International dues to a Unit is prerequisite to retaining membership as a Regular Member.

#### Rationale:

WBCCI is facing a highly probable major decline in membership within the next 3 to 5 years and needs to begin to address this very critical issue now in a positive way. The largest part of the potential membership decline, over this period, will come from the Airstream Inc., decision to stop all production of Class-A motor homes. This is because our caravanning friends, who currently own Class-A motor homes and choose or need to continue to do so, represent approximately 20% of the Club membership, and they will be forced to leave our great Club, due to the lack of motorized product, unless we do something about it now. Not only are these members our friends, but also their volunteerism is a giant part of the life-blood of our organization. This is an issue about our friends being able to continue to be members and their tremendous value to our Club and in keeping it alive, not about product.

When the additional loss of the Class-A motor home members is combined with our "normal" yearly loss rate of -12% over 3 to 5 years this can result in a loss of-33% to -50% of overall membership in the club, crippling the organization. As the organization begins to shrink, dues will escalate sharply to make up for lost revenues, which in turn will most likely cause other members to leave the Club. The loss in member volunteers will mean the loss of most, if not all, large events such as International, Special Event, National and Region Rallies, as well as most Club caravans.

The acceptance of the Four Winds Class-A motor homes for WBCCI membership permits owners of these RV's to be a part and contribute to WBCCI as members, continuing to share their friendships and talents. Additionally, passage of this motion will allow those members that choose, as well as need, to own Class-A motor homes to remain members and help keep the vitality of our Club.

The words "manufactured by Airstream, Inc." are superfluous in Article VI of Section 2 B, as Section 1 of Article VI already provides the criteria for the manufacturer of eligible recreational vehicles. This also would make Section 2 consistent with Sections 3 and 4 of this same Article.

The WBCCI Constitution & Bylaws Committee recommends the issue of an "identifier," for the Four Winds Class-A motor homes, not be addressed in the WBCCI Constitution i.e. this motion, but in the Bylaws and Policy Section of the Blue Book, page 56.1. Therefore, upon passage of this motion the WBCCI International President will bring forward to the IBT for vote a motion addressing type, size and placement of this Four Winds Class-A motor home "identifier."

We also recognize that not all members desire to own a brand new motorized product, so acceptance of the motion will be for new, as well as used, Four Winds Class-A motor homes.

### THE INTERNATIONAL RALLY AT PERRY, GEORGIA

The 50th WBCCI International Rally was held at the Georgia National Fairgrounds. The Fairgrounds covers 628 acres along I-75 in south central Georgia. It was an outstanding facility for the International. There was plenty of electricity to stay cool. Over 1000 Airstreams lined the Fairgrounds with flags flying. It was a beautiful sight.

In attendance from Charter Oak were Dick and Eileen Bartrum, Raymond and Cynthia Richard, Mike and Sandy Sasuta, Bob and Ann Werth, Sally Kerr, as well as affiliates Raynold and Cecile Lemarie, Dan Dureko and Bob Butler.

On June 30 the Delegates meeting was held. The amendment to the Constitution of the Wally Byam Club International, which would have allowed the owners of motorhomes manufactured by the Four Winds International Division of Thor Industries, Inc. to be members of the organization, was defeated at the meeting. There were a total of 6,112 votes cast with 2,435 voting for the motion and 3,677 voting against the motion. 128 abstained. There were 17 units that did not have delegates at the meeting. Charter Oak's delegate Raymond Richard, cast 7 votes for and 63 votes against. There were no abstentions. Region One voted 22 for and 243 against and no abstentions.

There was plenty to do and see and Charter Oak members took full advantage. There was a trip to the Peach Orchard, dinners at a local Fish House and a country restaurant, as well as a trip to the Farmer's Market.

Charter Oak's Bulletin Board won second place in the theme division. Many thanks to Rosalie Jefferson for doing a great job! Our unit directory won second place this year and thanks go to Rich Kushman and Sandy Sasuta for another job well done.

A total 2,433 pounds of pull tabs was brought to the rally by club members was worth \$1600 to the Ronald McDonald House. There was also \$78 in coins found in the pull tabs and that was also donated to RMH. This year a total 1,939 stuffed animals were donated, plus 2,438 hats, 103 baby blankets, 94 infant hats, 110 lap blankets and 250 sets of booties. Club members also donated 65 pints of blood during a blood drive by the American Red Cross held at the Rally.

Next year the International Rally will be held in Bozeman, Montana. Four hundred registrations were done at the Perry Rally. At the IBT meeting on July 5, 2007 1st Vice president Jerry Larson announced a contract has been signed to hold the 2009 International Rally at the Alliant Energy Center in Madison, Wisconsin. In 2010 the International Rally will be held in Gillette, Wyoming.

In other news at the IBT our own Region One President, Bob Thompson, announced that he would be a candidate for the International Third Vice President in 2008-09.


Welcome to TRI STATE RV Park in Matamoras, PA our gathering place and departure point for the Charter Oak CT Unit Fall 2007 Caravan! TRI STATE RV Park is located on the banks of the majestic Delaware River where the state borders of Pennsylvania, New York, and New Jersey meet. Be sure to take advantage of the lower fuel tax structure and distribution costs of New Jersey and fill your tanks. The price differential between Connecticut and New Jersey has recently been approximately \$0.30 to \$0.40 per gallon. Take the first exit east of the bridge. There are several fuel stations, a grocery store, and a selection of restaurants to choose from. Also, while you are here in the Park be aware that both Propane and Ice are available if desired. What's more the Park offers free WIFI Access allowing you to email friends and family prior to the beginning of our great adventure.

One more entertainment option, weather permitting, this evening before or after our Fire and Ice (Ice Cream served around the Campfire) take advantage of the paved walkway and meander down to the banks of the Delaware River and enjoy a moonlit view of the water as you walk off some calories before bedtime.

Our caravan begins here at Exit 53 on I-84 on Thursday and our travel goal for the day is to reach Penn Wood, an Airstream park in Limestone, PA.



Once we exit the campground, we want to head west on I-84 which requires a right turn at the traffic light onto eastbound Route 6. Once you pass the Pennsylvania Welcome Center on your right you will see the entrance ramp for westbound I-84. This is a right turn at a traffic light onto the entrance ramp.

Today will be traveling west approximately 290 miles on three different Interstates. We start on I-84 West traveling about 55 miles to Scranton where we turn onto I-81 South traveling about 36 miles to I-80 Westbound near Drums, PA. Stay on I-80 West for about 195 miles. Near Clarion, PA you will take **Exit 64** onto Southbound Route 66; a left turn at the end of the exit ramp. Head south on Route 66 about 4.5 miles then turn **RIGHT** onto Kindel Road. Look for the Penn Wood sign. This ends our first day of travel.

#### Penn Wood Airstream Park

Penn Wood Airstream Park is located 4 miles south of Interstate I-80, Exit 64, near Clarion, PA. Penn Wood Airstream Park is owned and operated by the Penn Wood Campground Association as a non-profit corporation. It was formed to develop and maintain a park for Airstream owners and their guests. The park is headquarters of the Pennsylvania Unit of WBCCI. Situated in the heart of Western Pennsylvania's recreational area, many activities and scenic attractions are within minutes of our grounds. The sixty-acre park is nestled in a beautiful and scenic wooded glen. Considerable effort has been

Friday, our 2<sup>nd</sup> day of travel will take us further west into Ohio. We will travel about 148 miles to 77-Gulliver's Travel Plaza in Canton, Ohio. This will be our gathering point where we will meet and then travel together to the rally grounds in Sugarcreek.

Take Route 66 north back to I-80 making a left turn onto the entrance ramp of **westbound** I-80. You might consider resting at the Barkeyville Travel Center at Exit 29 on Route 8 near Grove City, PA.

Once into Ohio continue straight to take I-76 west towards Akron. Keep left to Exit 23A onto I-77 South to Canton, Ohio. Take Exit 101 off I-77 for SR 627 – Faircrest Street. At the end of the exit ramp, turn left going eastbound. 77-Gulliver's Travel Plaza will be just ahead.

Ohio's Finest Truck Stop and Travel Plaza Located in Canton, Ohio Interstate 77 @ Exit 101 77 Gulliver's is the area's largest and finest facility for Truck Drivers and Travelers of all kinds. Several Airstreamers suggested this travel plaza as a good location for our final gathering place. From here we will travel the last 26.5 miles to our final destination at Winklepleck Grove just north of Sugarcreek.

We will leave 77-Gulliver's Travel Plaza westbound on SR 627 back to I-77. Turn left taking the entrance ramp for I-77 **South.** Continue south to Exit 83 turning right onto SR 39 **West.** Continue westbound on SR 39 about 6 miles, there will be a McDonald's on the right, continue on SR 39 to CR 73 immediately past the railroad tracks. Turn **Right** onto CR 73 (Edelweiss Drive NE. Follow the WBCCI parking signs to the rally site.

Welcome and thank you for joining the Charter Oak CT unit fall caravan to the 45<sup>th</sup> Swiss Festival WBCCI National Rally hosted by the Land-O-Lakes of Ohio unit in Sugarcreek, Ohio. The rally site is located at Winklepleck Grove just outside of the Village of Sugarcreek. The quaint and old-world Village of Sugarcreek is about two hours east of Columbus in Tuscarawas County, or approximately 18 miles east of Millersburg on State

Route 39. Sugarcreek is 30 minutes south of Canton, 45 minutes north of Cambridge and about 8 miles west of Dover. Picturesque Sugarcreek and the surrounding region are known for its diverse culture of Swiss, German, and Amish beliefs and traditions. This Driver's Information Guidebook is intended to inform you of some of the major activities associated with the Swiss Festival and augment the additional information provided by the Land-O-Lakes of Ohio unit. It is of utmost importance that you find this entire Airstream caravan and rally a most enjoyable and memorable experience.



Tourism in the region was the result of actual lifestyle evolution rather than planned marketing. The strong Swiss-German heritage of the area's citizens resulted in the establishment of cheese factories throughout the region. The cheese factories established the now famous Ohio Swiss Festival in 1953 to promote the Swiss cheese industry and help sell surplus cheese. From then on, the Swiss building fronts emerged and tourism began to flourish. Sugarcreek is known as the center of the Swiss cheese industry in Ohio. At the same time, the intrigue of the Amish community led many visitors to the frequent the area. Similarly, this years Charter Oak caravan to the

rally and festival continues our cultural exchange and learning experience from last year's caravan to the Amish country surrounding Lancaster, Pennsylvania.

Please take advantage of the many tours, Amish dinners, buggy rides, hobby shows, and entertainment every evening as arranged by the Land-O-Lakes of Ohio unit during the WBCCI rally. This national rally is scheduled to enable attendees to take in the Swiss Festival activities in downtown Sugarcreek from Wednesday September 26 through Saturday September 29, 2007.

The Swiss festival includes music, rides, crafts, food, and wine & cheese tasting from local cheese makers and Ohio wineries. Festival hours are from 6PM to 10PM Wednesday and Thursday, Noon to 11PM on Friday and 8:45AM to 11PM on Saturday. There is a Kiddies Parade on Friday at 2PM and the Grand Parade on Saturday at 2PM.



Here is a little history about the County we will visit on this caravan. This information is lifted from <u>History of The First United Church of Christ, Sugarcreek, Ohio</u>; and the <u>History of Tuscarawas County Ohio</u> 1884.

Settlers began arriving in Shanesville as early as 1806, and the area quickly became a "rallying point for pioneers from Westmoreland County, Pennsylvania." Among the early settlers, who formed the nucleus of the German Reformed Church, were Henry Sliffe, Jacob Dietz, Ernest Dietz, David Seltonright, Lewis Laubaugh, and others.

"At Shanesville are three religious societies, each sixty or more years old. The German Reformed congregation organized at Shanesville in 1821, by Rev. W. Reiter who remained in charge until 1825. For two years the society remained without a stated pastor; then in 1827, Rev. D. Schaerer became the pastor. Up to this time meetings had been held in the schoolhouse, during the summer of 1828, the German Reformed and Lutheran Churches jointly erected a house of worship."

Church services were initially held in the old schoolhouse, located on lot 100. This property had been set aside, in 1814, by Abraham Shane, when he laid out the Village of Shanesville, for a "German School and Meeting House."

Rev. William Reiter was the first German Reformed pastor, preaching for the first time on September 23, 1821; and for the last time on August 8, 1825. Rev. David Shearer became the next pastor, and Rev. Abraham Snyder was the first Lutheran pastor.

In the summer of 1828 the German Reformed and Lutheran congregations constructed a log church (1828-1851) in the northernmost section of Shanesville, at the west end of the old cemetery. On September 3, 1828, the cornerstone of the new church was laid, with Lutheran ministers Rev. Wagenhals and Rev. Snyder and Reformed minister, Rev. Shearer, officiating. A cemetery was platted to the east of the building, and additional adjoining land was deeded to the German Reformed Society, by Jacob Dietz, when he died in 1836, for church and burial purposes. In 1849 the Lutheran congregation laid the cornerstone of their new brick church, disolving the Lutheran-Reformed partnership. Both congregations had concluded the old log church was too small for two congregations, and both sought newer and more modern churches. In 1851, the Reformed Church built a brick church (1851-1914) on the property left to them by Jacob Dietz.

History of the First United Church of Christ Sugarcreek, Ohio states: "Many of the churches in this part of Ohio began as a union of the Reformed and Lutheran people. Often the union of the two congregations worshipping in the same building was so close that the members of each congregation had the right to vote for the pastors and church officers of both congregations. The children were also commonly instructed in a union catechetical class, and were confirmed occasionally by either pastor as Reformed or Lutheran according to their choice. At one time efforts were made to unite the Reformed and Lutheran Synods of Ohio. A committee on union was appointed, but the movement came to naught for it was gradually buried under the rising tide of denominational consciousness."

Those buried in the old Shanesville Cemetery include Jacob Deatz (1774-1836), Lutheran minister, Rev. Abraham Snyder (1780-1834), and Reformed minister, Rev. William Reiter (d. May 9, 1826).

During your stay in the area, please be sure to visit the world's largest cuckoo clock located at Grandma's Alpine Homestead restaurant in nearby Holmes County. Truly a sight to behold.





Also consider visiting the Amish and Mennonite Heritage Center in neighboring Berlin, Ohio. The center is called "Behalt" meaning "to keep or remember", and includes a gift shop and a 10 foot high by 265 foot long cyclorama illustrating the heritage of the Amish and Mennonite people from

the Anabaptist beginning in Zurich, Switzerland, in 1525 to the present day. The story begins with the resurrected Jesus and follows the development of the early Christian church, the acceptance of the Christian church by the Roman Empire under Constantine, and the early development of the Roman Catholic Church.

Following the depiction of the first documented adult baptisms in modern times, which occurred in Zurich in 1525 among these believers, the cyclorama continues to follow the spread of the Anabaptist movement throughout the world. Heavily persecuted by the state churches (both Protestant and Catholic), these Christians were forced to migrate across Europe into Russia and across the Atlantic Ocean to North America.


Unique and educational, this exciting and beautifully artistic exhibit will leave you with a deep understanding of and respect for these peaceful people. This area is home to the largest Amish settlement in the world. The beautiful scenery, combined with old-fashioned hospitality, will provide an unforgettable experience that will keep you coming back for years to come.



The Ohio Railway Museum is located in historic Worthington, Ohio a northern suburb of Columbus and is well worth the visit. Exit off Interstate 71 at Route 161 (Worthington) and go west one mile. Proprietors Road is the first traffic light west of the three railroad underpasses. Go north on Proprietors and the museum is on the right 1/2 mile north of Dublin-Granville Road, at 990 Proprietors Road, Worthington, OH 43085.

Take a two mile round trip demonstration ride on one of the museum's streetcars or interurbans. Trace the history of steam & electric powered rail transportation

and its effects on the economic growth of Ohio in the first half of the 20th century. The collection, numbering over thirty pieces, includes streetcars dating from the 1900 to 1949, the interurbans dating from 1905 to 1965, passenger cars dating from 1918 to 1925, and also includes electric and steam locomotives.



Founded in 1948, the Ohio Railway Museum is one of the oldest railway museums in America. The museum began with the acquisition of Ohio Public Service Interurban Car #21, which is now listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Admission is \$5.00 for seniors, Children (age 4 - 12) are \$4.00, and Children age 3 and under are FREE. (Unlimited rides on a trolley car is included in the price of General admission).

The Alpine Hills Museum explores the story of the Amish people who settled in the area during the early 1800s. An exhibit depicting an Amish kitchen, and artifacts and exhibits that present the early Amish lifestyle immerse the visitors in a unique time and culture. Come and visit this wonderful local museum rated as one

of the best town historical museums in the nation. The hours are 9AM to 4:30PM - Monday thru Saturday. Suggested donation is \$2.00 per person, and children are free.



Another point of interest may be the Warther Carving Museum and Knife factory in Dover, Ohio at 311 Karl Avenue. Ernest, Mooney, Warther began carving wood at the age of 5. From the age of 14 to 38 he worked in the local steel mill, with wood carving as a hobby. Warther only used hand tools to complete his carvings. He had a second grade education and was a self-taught wood carver. The Warther wood carving museum is the home to over 64 model trains all carved to exacting

detail. In addition there are numerous smaller wood carvings including, walking canes, plaques, and "whittlings" on display at the wood carving museum.

Mooney Warther loved the steam engine and began carving the history of the steam engine. At first he carved using walnut wood and bone for his carvings, later he carved in walnut, ebony, ivory, and pearl.

At the age of 68, Mooney Warther completed his goal of carving the history of the steam engine. So, at the age of 72 he began carving major events in steam history. With these carvings, he used ivory exclusively. The Empire State Express, measuring 8' long, is the largest working ivory carving in the world.

The guided tour of the Warther Carving Museum includes a visit to the kitchen cutlery shop. Here you can watch 3rd & 4th generation family members hand craft kitchen knives using the same techniques developed by Mooney Warther, generations ago.

The knife making process uses "old world" craftsmanship and high quality materials to make the Warther knives some of the best in the world. The knives are made of high carbon tool steel, hand ground nine times and polished to a mirror finish. Then the trademark Warther swirl is added to the blade for a smooth distinctive finish. Watch as the birch handles are riveted onto the knife. The handles are then sanded and buffed to a luster finish. You will also view the wood shop where our Oak, Cherry and Walnut knife holders are made. There are no assembly lines here, just craftsmen creating fine kitchen knives by hand.

Hours of operation are Monday through Friday from 9AM to 5PM with an admission of \$10.50 for adults. Warther is just a quarter of a mile east of I-77 on State Route 211. Entrance is right at the first light after the rail road tracks.







#### Amish Country

In Amish Country, traffic habits are different from the ordinary. Travelers need to be alert and cautious and watch for the slow-moving horse and buggy. Many Amish ride bicycles and walk along the roadsides. Reduced speed and assured clear distance are important for safety. Respecting the beliefs and practices of the Amish is a very important part of a trip to the area. The Amish people, though friendly and congenial, prefer not to be photographed; please do not ask them to pose for photographs.



Additional information on the history, culture, and lifestyle of the Amish and Mennonite people can be found at the AMISH & MENNONITE HERI-TAGE CENTER located on County Road 77 east of Berlin. Here you will find a 265-foot cyclorama, "Behalt," created by the late internationally known artist, Heinz Gaugel. The mural tells the story of the Amish, Mennonite, and Hutterite people. In addition, a video presentation of the local Amish and Mennonite communities prepares you for a visit to the area. A bookstore and gift shop offers crafts, cards and books about Amish and Mennonite people.

Step back into the elegance of the late 19th Century by visiting the J.E. Reeves Victorian Home and Museum n Dover. This opulent mansion, the ormer home of prominent Dover industrialist Jeremiah E. Reeves, is owned by the Dover Historical Society.

The 17-room home, topped by a third-floor ballroom, has been carefully

restored by the Society to its original splendor. This lovely mansion features all of the original furniture and antiques that were the property of Mr. and Mrs. Jeremiah Reeves-all of which are arranged as they would have been 100 years ago. Visitors to the home acquire the feeling that the Reeves Family has just stepped out for a brief moment, but left the home open for guests.

The beautiful family furniture and decorative objects can be viewed up close, as there are no ropes or barriers prohibiting your entrance into the rooms. Adjacent to the mansion is the Carriage House Museum, which contains an interesting collection of vehicles and special display areas which include records, photographs, local products, and mementos tracing the events of Dover's past. Before or after tours, tourists can browse through the Carriage House Gift Shop.

#### Dennison Railroad Depot Museum

The beautifully restored 1873 Pennsylvania Railroad Depot Museum exhibits fill the original women's waiting room, baggage room, ticket office, and Railway Express Building at the Depot. Displays feature local history such as the baptism of Clark Gable, the Pennsylvania Railroad turn-of-the-century baseball teams on which George W. Bush's great-grandfather, Samuel Prescott Bush played, a large model train layout in N-

scale depicting the town of Dennison, clay artifacts from when the area was the clay capital of the country and of course, railroad and canteen artifacts.

The Dennison Depot stands exactly halfway between Pittsburgh and Columbus - 100 miles to the east and the west, and is located specifically at that point because a steam engine could only go 100 miles before it required water

At its peak, the Dennison shop and yards were claimed to be some of the most complete and extensive in the country.

The Museum's Canteen Room tells of the area's efforts during WWII when volunteers from eight counties staffed a servicemen's canteen 24 hours a day. Free sandwiches, coffee and donuts were passed out to 13% of all U.S. personnel. Over 600,000 hours were donated by area women.

The Museum Gift Shop is full of railroad souvenirs and gifts. Also stop by our restaurant and ice cream shoppe for a tasty meal or treat to top off your stop. The museum offers a year-round calendar of events, special exhibits, and train ride excursions.


Today, Zoar visitors can revisit the 19th century at this German-style village. The historic district abounds with restored private homes, shops, res-



#### Sugarcreek - "The Little Switzerland of Ohio"

Sugarcreek was settled by immigrants from Switzerland and is now famous for its Swiss cheese, Swiss-style architecture and the Ohio Swiss Festival, one of the state's premier outdoor events. Sugarcreek is also well known as the eastern gateway to the World's largest Amish community. It is quite common to see buggies traveling through downtown, or hitched outside the offices of The Budget,

the weekly Amish newspaper published in Sugarcreek since 1890, and distributed internationally.

No wonder Sugarcreek is one of Ohio's top tourist destinations. The tranquil village is home to many restaurants featuring Swiss, German and Amish specialties, as well as bulk food stores, craft and quilt shops. In the rolling hills surrounding Sugarcreek are cheese shops, bakeries, furniture stores and unique specialty shops. Overnight guests have an abundance of choices from charming bed and breakfasts to full-service lodging. The Alpine Hills Museum and Information Center in downtown Sugarcreek features three floors of audio-visual displays of Sugarcreek's Swiss, German and Amish heritage. The John S. Yoder Home also offers visitors a glimpse into Amish life during the 1800's and today. A narrated bus tour through the Amish countryside will top off your day in this quaint village. Tours of either museum provide excellent learning opportunities for school groups and other children.

Sugarcreek also hosts several community events and will host the 17th annual Fabulous Fifties Fling and Car Show, June 8-9, 2007, and the 55th annual Ohio Swiss Festival, the oldest ongoing outdoor festival in Ohio, September 28-29, 2007.



#### Newcomerstown -Alive with History!

Newcomerstown, situated in southern Tuscarawas County along the Tuscarawas River, was once the capital of the Delaware Indian Nation. Newcomerstown is home to three historic sites and several annual events. The Frontier Apple Festival, Cy Young Festival and other community events add to the culture of the village.




Ohio Canal or on local stagecoach routes, was built in 1841 and its displays include items from such famous native sons as baseball pitcher Cy Young and Ohio State Buckeyes coach, Woody Hayes. The museum also houses artifacts and items that tell the history of the village and its residents. The U.S.S. Radford National Naval Museum is a unique museum which offers visitors a chance to experience the U.S.S. Radford's 25 years in commission; years that included valiant service during World War II. Korea and Vietnam, and in which the ship and her crews rescued over 800 men from the sea. On display are uniform collections, artifacts, vintage photos and a gift shop. Cy Young Park is home to the Cy Young Memorial. The park also hosts playgrounds, hiking trails, a swimming pool and recreational activities.

ADMISSION: Both museums accept donations as admission cost.



A major visitors attraction is Schoenbrunn Village, operated by the Ohio Historical Society. Founded in 1772 as a Moravian mission, the village is reconstructed to appear as it did over 200 years ago. As the Moravian missionaries, led by David Zeisberger, spread education and Christianity throughout the region, the Christian Indian population of Schoenbrunn Village grew. The tending of livestock and crops, hunting and



Today the village of Schoenbrunn consists of 17 reconstructed log buildings, the original cemetery and 2 1/2 acres of planted fields. A self-guided tour lasts about one hour. A recorded tour is available in both English and German. The village also includes a museum, a video orientation program, a gift shop, and picnic facilities.

#### The Village of Gnadenhutten

Gnadenhutten, Ohio's oldest existing settlement, prospered until the outbreak of the Revolutionary War when the Indians were driven from their homes. In February 1782, they were allowed to return to their village. On March 8, 1782, following a night of prayer and hymn singing, 90 men, women and children were massacred and all the cabins of the settlement set on fire by the Pennsylvania Militia. Today, a museum, mass grave and monument, and two reconstructed log buildings commemorate

this tragic event.

In 1798, the village was reestablished as a white settlement. A 35-foot memorial was erected on the grounds of the Historic park. Also on the grounds sets the museum which contains an extensive arrowhead collection, artifacts, old ledgers, books, Bibles from the 16th, 17th, and 18th Centuries, and implements that were used in the village.

The park hosts many events including Pioneer Days, Native American Gatherings, Apple Butter Days, a Drive-It-Yourself Fall Foliage Tour and a Christian Indian Christmas Drive Through Display.

# Our Constitution and Your Vote

Below is a recommendation to change a section of our unit's constitution regarding voting. Please give this issue some consideration and be prepared to vote at the November meeting

#### Present Article VI section 6

#### Article VI

Section 6: A mail ballot may be used to obtain the vote of the members of the Unit on a proposal when such is deemed desirable or necessary. When a mail ballot is used to obtain the vote of the member of the Unit on a proposal, no other method of voting on such a proposal shall be utilized.

## Proposed Article VI section 6

A ground mail or email ballot may be used to submit a unit members vote on a proposal. The mail or email ballot must be submitted to a unit board member or designee and must be postmarked or time stamped no later than midnight two days prior to such vote.

#### Rational

The need to be present at a business meeting to vote on an important issue will no longer be necessary if this proposal is adopted. There are many valid reasons why an active club member, someone who cares about our club and the issue at hand, might be absent, including what our club was founded for – travel. Promoting the exploration of North America in an Airstream trailer and then demanding a member be present at a specific time and place to exercise their voting rights seems, well, a little strange.

Not allowing absentee ballots has and will continue to push some members to other units where their absentee vote will count.

Written notice must be delivered to the members not less than fifteen (15) days prior to the meeting. The notice shall indicate the date, time, and location of the meeting. A quorum for conducting business at the annual meeting, or at any additional business meeting, shall not be less than ten (10) percent of members.

#### Rational

The October rally is historically well attended. Many of our members leave for warmer locations and are not available to attend a November meeting. The more relaxed setting a rally offers will help avoid time constraints and certainly contribute to more open discussion regarding issues facing the club.

#### Constitution

#### Article I

### Name of Organization

Section 1: This organization, incorporated in the State of Connecticut, is a chartered Unit of the Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc., and shall be known as the Charter Oak Connecticut Unit of the Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc.

### Article II

#### Objectives

Section 1: The objectives of this non-profit organization shall be to furnish encouragement and assistance in the development of the Unit and thus afford fraternization for Airstream trailer and motorhome owners; to encourage safe driving and assist in improving the general welfare of the recreational vehicle public through assistance and active participation of all its members in building a strong organization for the betterment of goodwill toward trailer and motorhome travel; to coordinate with and participate in the interests and activities of the International and the Region; to cooperate with other organizations and units within our sphere which are seeking to elevate the standards and ethics of the various groups; to disseminate information of an advisory and educational nature which will be of value to its members and the public; to study, advise and recommend legislation which is in the interest of the trailering and motoring public and oppose all legislation which is discriminatory and injurious to the trailering and motoring public; and to encourage government and private agencies to provide more and better trailer and motorhome parks and facilities.

#### Article III

#### Membership Qualifications

- Section 1: Adult ownership of a fully self-contained and hard sided recreational vehicle manufactured by Airstream, Inc., is a prerequisite for membership in this Unit.
- Section 2: There are two classes of membership in this unit: Regular and Affiliate Members.
- Section 3: An applicant for membership in this Unit must submit an application in writing and, upon the payment of International and Unit dues, shall be a Regular Member of this Unit.
- Section 4: Regular Members who have sold their recreational vehicle manufactured by Airstream, Inc., may, upon request, retain their membership as Regular Members of this Unit pursuant to the provisions of Article VI Sec.2C of the International Constitution. Such Regular Members shall possess all the rights and privileges of the International Club, including full voting rights in all elections and on all questions.
- Section 5: Regular Members of another Unit may become Affiliate Members in this Unit by an application to the Membership Committee and upon acceptance shall possess all the rights and privileges of the Unit, except the right to hold office in the Unit or the right to vote in the selection or election of officers in the Unit, Region, or International or on any amendment to the Unit or the International Constitution or on the dissolution of the Unit or the merger of the Unit with another Unit.
- Section 6: Applicants for membership in this Unit must submit dues and join the International Club simultaneously or show evidence of membership in the International Club through another duly chartered unit.

#### Constitution

- Section 7: Failure to pay either Unit or International dues will automatically terminate membership in the Unit.
- Section 8: In those cases of co-ownership of an fully self-contained hard sided recreational vehicle manufactured by Airstream, Inc., the rights and privileges of membership shall be deemed to include the spouses of such co-owner but collectively such co-owners shall possess one vote only except such co-owners who each pay International and Unit dues to this Unit shall each have one vote.

### Article IV

#### Officers and Their Election

- Section 1: The Officers of the Unit shall consist of a President, a First Vice President, a Second Vice President, a Corresponding Secretary, a Recording Secretary, a Treasurer and Directors (four). The Executive Board shall consist of all of the Unit Officers plus the Immediate Past President of the Unit.
- Section 2: The Officers shall be elected at the annual business meeting and shall be installed and shall assume office at that time. An officer shall serve in office for a term of one year or until a successor is elected but in no case shall an officer, except the Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary or Treasurer, be eligible to serve more than two consecutive terms in the same office, provided said officers are duly nominated and elected for each term of office.
- Section 3: An officer who advances to an office pursuant to the provisions of Sec. 5 of this ARTICLE shall not be deemed to have served a full term in such office unless said service is for a period of greater than one-half (1/2) the term of such office.
- Section 4: The Directors shall be elected at the annual business meeting, each for a term of two years commencing at the annual meeting, but arranged so that only one-half such Directors' terms expire in any one year. No Director shall serve more than one two-year term consecutively.
- Section 5: In the event of the death or resignation of the President or the death, advancement or resignation of a Vice President, or an officer's inability to fulfill the duties of office, the next ranking Vice President (in the order first, second) shall advance thereto. All other vacancies on the Executive Board, except that of the Immediate Past President, shall be filled by majority vote of the Executive Board.

#### Article V

### **Executive Board**

- Section 1: The Executive Board shall be the administrative body of the Unit and shall define the policies of and have full administrative authority in all matters pertaining to the Unit, and shall exercise general control and supervision of all officers and committees.
- Section 2: A quorum of the Executive Board shall consist of a majority of the members.

#### Article VI

#### **Business Meetings**

Section 1: The annual business meeting of the members of this organization shall be held during the month of November in each calendar year. Such a meeting shall be announced by written notice and delivered to the members not less than fifteen (15) days prior to the meeting. The notice shall indicate the date, time, and location of the meeting. A quorum for conducting business at

- the annual meeting, or at any additional business meeting, shall not be less than ten (10) percent of members.
- Section 2: Additional business meetings of the members may be held at a suitable time and place during the second day of each rally of the members. If the rally or meeting is of less than two days duration, written notice to the members indicating the time, location, and purpose of such meeting shall be delivered to the members not less than ten (10) days prior to the meeting.
- Section 3: The Executive Board, by majority vote, may call additional business meetings of the members.
- Section 4: The President or any two members of the Board may call a business meeting of the Executive Board at any time deemed necessary.
- Section 5: All Regular and Affiliate Members voting at the annual or additional business meetings of this Unit, and each such membership, identified by the International Club Membership number, shall be considered one vote, except for co-owners who each pay International and Unit Dues to this Unit as provided for in Article III, Section 9.
- Section 6: A mail ballot may be used to obtain the vote of the members of the Unit on a proposal when such is deemed desirable or necessary. When a mail ballot is used to obtain the vote of the member of the Unit on a proposal, no other method of voting on such a proposal shall be utilized.

### Article VII

#### Bylaws

Section 1: Bylaws not inconsistent with this Constitution, and with the Constitution, Bylaws and Policy of the Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc., embodying additional provisions for the government of the Unit may be adopted by the Executive Board.

#### Article VIII

#### Amendments

- Section 1: Proposed amendments to this Constitution shall be submitted to the Executive Board in writing. The Executive Board shall submit all such amendments to the members for their consideration.
- Section 2: Any Article or Section of this Constitution may be amended by a twothirds vote of the Regular Members present and voting at a business meeting of the Unit or a special meeting called for that purpose, providing in either case, a notice containing the proposed amendment or amendments has been mailed first-class to each member of the Unit at least fifteen (15) days prior to such a meeting.
- Section 3: All amendments to this Constitution shall become effective upon adoption.

This Constitution adopted and effective May 3, 1997, at Lakeville, Massachusetts. This Constitution was amended effective November 8, 1998, at Vernon, Connecticut. Incorporated in Hartford, CT, April 14, 1998



### Article II

#### Committees

Section 1: Standing Committees shall be:

- A. Budget
- B. Caravan
- C. Constitution and Bylaws
- Ethics and Grievances
- E. Family/Youth
- F. Historical
- G. Hospitality
- H. Legislative
- Membership
- J. Publicity
- K. Public Relations



Section 2: All Standing Committees shall consist of a Chairperson and as many members as deemed necessary by the President. Chairpersons of Standing Committees shall report at each meeting of the Executive Board.

#### **Standing Committees**

#### **General Duties**

Budget - In cooperation with the incoming and outgoing Treasurer of the Unit, prepare for the Executive Board a budget projecting the unit's income and expenditures for the calendar (or fiscal) year next ensuing.

Caravan - To plan, organize, and obtain leaders for unit caravans that are operated or conducted for the Unit within the scope of the WBCCI Caravan Handbook. To develop an aggressive Unit Caravan program and to coordinate unit caravan matters with appropriate Region and International Caravan Committee personnel.

Constitution and Bylaws - To conduct a continuing review and study of the Unit and the International Constitution and Bylaws and to make recommendations for any amendments or additions deemed desirable and in the best interest of the Club.



- Ethics and Grievance To investigate and assess all grievances or complaints made by members and others and to make recommendations thereon to the Unit Executive Board.
- Family/Youth Plan programs to encourage participation of family/youth at unit functions and to be the liaison person between the Unit and International Family/Youth Standing Committee.
- Historical To record events including written and pictorial material associated with unit activities and to maintain a historical record of such.
- Hospitality To receive and make welcome guests and new members at club functions. Recommend ways to meet and greet all club members and guests at rallies and/or seasonal functions.
- Legislative To study, advise and recommend legislation in the interest of the Club and its members; to recommend opposition to all legislation which is discriminatory and injurious to the interest of the Club and its members.
- Membership be the Unit/Club contact for prospective new members and explain the purpose and objectives of the Wally Byam Caravan Club International. Extend invitations to prospective members to attend a rally or meeting when making application for membership.
- Publicity To collect newsworthy items of interest to club members and to publish monthly a newsletter containing past and future events of the Unit, Region and International. To publish yearly a roster in the form and content as directed by the Executive Board. Forward material to Headquarters for publishing in the Blue Beret and Directory with respect to the Unit's activities schedule.
- Public Relations To maintain communications with the International and Region Public Relations Committee for maintaining a continuing program of public relations between WBCCI and communities being exposed to rallies and caravans.
- Section 3: Special committees may be appointed by the President as required.

### Article III

#### Guests

- Section 1: A guest (or guests) sponsored and invited by a member in good standing and sharing that member's facilities may attend activities of the Unit. Members sponsoring such a guest shall pay one extra rally fee exclusive of the parking fee.
- Section 2: A member in good standing in this Unit may sponsor and invite a prospective member to attend activities of the Unit.
- Section 3: Members in good standing in the International Club may attend activities of the Unit provided that such members, and where required, shall have made prior reservation for each attendance.
- Section 4: The Unit, once each calendar year, may host a rally, caravan or combination thereof with a recreational vehicle club not chartered by the Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc., and, it may conduct twice each calendar year, a Buddy Rally or a Buddy Caravan or combination thereof to which each member may invite not more than one nonmember recreational vehicle family.

#### Article IV

#### **Nominating Committee**

Section 1: The Executive Board shall, not less than 90 days prior to the Unit's annual business meeting, appoint a three member Nominating Committee who shall, after having obtained the prior consent of each proposed nominee, place in nomination one candidate for each office and director to be filled by election, and submit a written report to the Executive Board which shall in-

clude the names of all candidates considered, and the President shall distribute the report to the membership not less than fifteen (15) days prior to said business meeting. Additional candidates, who have previously consented, may be placed in nomination from the floor of that meeting. No seconds are required for any nomination.

### Article V

#### **Duties of Officers**

- Section 1: The President shall preside at all meetings of the Unit and Executive board, enforce the Constitution and Bylaws, appoint all standing committees and have such powers and duties as normally pertain to the principal executive officer.
- Section 2: The 1st Vice President shall attend all business meetings of the Unit and the Executive Board and shall assist the President and assume the duties of the President, when absent.
- Section 3: The 2nd Vice President shall attend all business meetings of the Unit and the Executive Board and shall assist the President and 1st Vice President and assume the duties of the President and 1st Vice President in their absence, and will perform the duties assigned by the Executive Board.
- Section 4: The Corresponding Secretary shall issue notices of all meetings of the Unit and Executive Board as prescribed in Article VI, Sections 1 and 2 and Article VIII, Section 2 of the Constitution. The Corresponding Secretary shall prepare an agenda of pending business for use by the presiding officer at each meeting and shall keep a register of all members of the Unit.
- Section 5: The Recording Secretary shall record and preserve the minutes of all official meetings of the Unit and the Executive Board; copies of same shall be available to members of the Executive Board not more than fifteen (15) days following each meeting, upon request. The Recording Secretary shall record the attendance of the officers and directors at each meeting and shall advise the presiding officer if a quorum is present.
- Section 6: The Treasurer shall maintain the financial records of the Unit and shall receive all moneys and promptly deposit them in the bank previously chosen by the Executive Board; shall notify members of expiration of dues and issue receipts for dues paid; shall submit a full written report of finances to the Executive Board at each meeting and before retirement shall have the books and accounts audited by a committee of not less than three members selected by the incoming President. All books, monies, and property of the Unit held by the Treasurer shall be delivered promptly to the successor.
- Section 7: The duties of the Directors shall be as prescribed in Section 1, Article V, of the Constitution and to attend all meetings of the Unit and the Executive Board; to accept special assignments as directed by the President.

### Article VI

#### Delegates

Section 1: The Executive Board shall select one delegate and one alternate from among the officers and Regular and Associate members who will attend the annual Delegates meeting of the parent organization, the Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc. Any vacancy occurring following such selection shall be filled by appointment by the President. The delegate and alternate should be instructed respecting the wishes of the Unit on matters to come before the meeting. The President and Secretary shall certify to these selections.

#### Article VII

#### Dues

Section 1: The annual dues of Regular and Affiliate members shall be set by the Executive Board.

Section 2: A member who fails to pay properly assessed International and Unit dues before November 15 may not be listed in the Annual Membership Directory of the International Club for the following year. If the dues are not paid and receipted by the Treasurer on or before December 31, membership will be terminated.

#### Article VIII

#### Code of Ethics

Section 1: All members shall abide by the following Code of Ethics:

- A. To be ever mindful of our responsibility to the Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc., and through conduct indicate to the public that membership in this organization is an assurance of courtesy on the road and of goodwill to all peoples and countries.
- B. To say or print nothing which may reflect unfavorably on others and to dedicate ourselves to the work of cementing together the members of our units and the Club in bonds of friendship, good fellowship, and mutual understanding.
- C. To conduct ourselves so as to inspire others also engaged in recreational vehicle travel to a full appreciation of the intent and meaning of this code.
- To maintain our camps and parking areas in an orderly manner and to leave them in a neat and clean condition.

### Article IX

#### Liability

Section 1: Neither the Unit nor its officers are responsible for the loss of or damage to property or for injury to or death of a person on the premises of any club function. This freedom for responsibility for loss or damage to property applies regardless of whether that property has been received by any member or officer or left upon the premises.

#### Article X

#### **Amendments**

Section 1: These Bylaws may be amended at any business meeting of the Executive Board by two-thirds vote, provided the proposed amendment has been submitted to all members of the Executive Board in writing at least ten (10) days prior to such meeting.

Section 2: Such amendments shall become effective upon adoption.

### Article XI

### Dissolution

Section 1: In the event of dissolution of this Unit, the members shall, through the President, assign all assets to the International Club, or in the case of an incorporated unit, to such other trustee appointed in accordance with the laws governing non-profit corporation in the State or province of their incorporation, to be held in trust until such time as the charter is restored, the unit is reorganized, or a new charter is issued when such assets shall be returned or transferred to the newly functioning unit. This procedure is in accordance with the meaning of Section 501 © (7) of the Internal Revenue Service Code. None of the funds shall inure to the benefit of any member and the Unit Charter and all International club property shall be returned to International Club Headquarters.

### **Guidelines for Rallies and Meetings**

#### 1. Chatter Article

Appoint someone in advance to write a news article for the Chatter describing the event and ask them to submit the article to the Chatter editor within a few days after the event. This is the responsibility of the host. Failure to do so will result in a delay in publishing our newsletter.

#### 2. Advance Notice

When preparing flyers, include information regarding rally fees, dates, parking, deposits, activities, potluck dinners, etc. Submit a flyer (sign-up sheet) to the Chatter editor in advance of your event.

#### 3. Rally Expenses

All rallies should be self-supporting, each person paying his share of the expenses. When visitors pay the same as members, they feel free to take part. This also prevents criticism over treasury funds being used for activities in which all members do not participate.

#### 4. Successful "First Impression" at an Airstream Rally

- a. Have a Greeting Committee to meet arrivals with a . . . "Hi! Glad you're here!" Some may be new owners and new to our program. Make them feel at home. Give each person a name tag, give each RV a program, or if you do not have programs, tell them to check the bulletin board for the schedule of activities.
- b. Have a hospitality center so that on arrival the greeters can say . . . "the coffee is on . . . get set up and then come over \_\_\_\_\_." Have a bulletin board at the hospitality center. Post announcements and program, and perhaps a sign . . . "Welcome to the Charter Oak Connecticut Unit, Airstream Rally."
- c. Take a snapshot of each family and paste it in the Unit history book. These books are of interest to everyone and should be on display at all Unit rallies.
- d. Have a Unit guest book and ask everyone to sign it at each rally.
- e. Award a "gate" prize. One thought... number the programs and lucky number gets the prize... use some kind of gag.
- Plan something for the children. It will make a more enjoyable rally for everyone.

#### 5. Rally Parking

Park rally hosts together. These are the people who are responsible for the success of the rally. Be sure everyone knows where to locate officers and hosts.

### **Guidelines for Rallies and Meetings**

#### 6. Meetings

Wally patterned "Meeting Time" after the old town hall meetings. Meetings may be strictly social or a combined social and business meeting. Meetings give everyone an opportunity to get together. Meetings provide a time to get acquainted, to exchange ideas, to discuss objectives and accomplishments. This is a time to take part and a time to recognize individual contributions. The sidewalk café meeting is always fun. Members bring their refreshments and sit around and talk about what has been done or seen, trips made, etc. This usually takes place about 4:30 in the afternoon. If a business meeting or a combined business meeting and social meeting is planned, notice should be posted. Everyone will make an extra effort to get back from sight-seeing or shopping.

#### 7. Bulletin Board

Place a bulletin board in a central location (the hospitality RV is often used) as a center of activities for announcements and program news. If you have a printed program, post one on the board. Keep everyone informed about what is going on.

#### 8. Church Services

Post notices of local church services on the bulletin board.

#### 9. Head Table

Arranging the head table and the seating of guests depends upon the size of the table and the number to be seated. If possible, your own officers and their spouses should be seated at the head table. If there isn't room for the spouses, they should be placed as near the head table as possible. The President should sit in the center position. Visiting VIPs and International officers would normally be seated at the head table. A special table for officers, past and present, may be arranged. If you have overlooked someone who might reasonably expect to sit at the head table, ask them to stand and be acknowledged. This helps to overcome what could be an embarrassing situation.
