



Mid-Winter IBT and International Rally

Your International and Region Officers were joined by Airstreamers from all regions at the recent midwinter IBT meeting hosted by Region 9 and its units. Cool but clear weather contributed to a productive atmosphere for the meeting.

Committee Reports:

<u>Budget Committee</u>: Joe Bublis, Chairman, reviewed results for the six months ended December 31, 2008, expressing concern that declining income accompanied by increasing costs was causing increasing deficits for the International Club.

Constitution & Bylaws Committee: Darryl Ewles, Chairman, remarked upon the ongoing failure of several units to maintain up-to-date constitu-

tions or bylaws. Ralph Forrester noted the risk to the not-for-profit status of the club presented by such failures.

International Rally - 2009: Jerry Larson, International President, reported 686 units signed-up for the 52nd International Rally in Madison, WI, of which 471 had selected 30 amp. electric service.

International Rally – 2010: Tom Collier, International 1st VP, reported plans for the 2010 Int'l Rally in Gillette, WY were on track.

Planning Guide and Merit Award Program: Jim Haddaway, Chairman, proposed that qualification for a Unit Superior Merit Award be conditioned upon the unit showing a net increase in membership for the year. The proposal was rejected by the IBT based upon objections of the region presidents that such a requirement was contrary to the objectives of the program related to unit planning and operations.

Electronics Committee: Charlie Burke, Chairman, presented a proposal for updating the WBCCI.org Forum, including prescription of Terms of Service for the site. The report received favorable comment, but was returned to the committee for refinement prior to formal adoption, likely at the IBT Meeting on June 26th.

2020 Long Range Planning Committee: Bill Schrader, Chairman, summarized its lengthy report, which has been widely circulated via e-mail and internet postings, and has received widespread recognition for the quality of the committee's work. An action item, to create Vision and Mission Statements for WBCCI was presented. (See below.)

New Business:

International Marketing Committee: The International Executive Committee approved formation of an International Marketing Committee with the purpose of increasing internal and external awareness of WBCCI through the Blue Beret and the Web. The committee, which presently has six members, chose Fred Richardson, currently President of

the Texas Gulf Coast Unit, as its Chairman. The committee has been asked to confer with the WBCCI webmaster, 2020 Committee Chair, Bill Schrader, Blue Beret Chairman Theda McGrath, and Corporate Manager Cindy Reed to formulate a plan of action for recruiting and retaining members.

<u>Delegates Meeting Representation:</u>
Four similar motions, asking the IBT to propose to the 2009 Delegates Meeting that units be permitted to appoint delegates who were not their regular members, were filed for consideration at the IBT meetings.

At the request of President Larson, the authors met, revised one motion, and presented it for consideration; the other three motions being withdrawn. The motion presented permits a unit to appoint an Alternate Delegate who must be an Affiliate Member of such unit and a Regular Member of a unit in the same region. The revised motion also proposed necessary changes in the Bylaws, to address voting restrictions otherwise affecting Affiliate Members so appointed.

The IBT approved the revised motion and forwarded it to the 2009 Delegates Meeting.

Dues Increase: International Treasurer Ralph Forrester's motion to increase International Dues from \$55 per year to \$70 per year received no support at the Seminar, and was withdrawn before the formal IBT Meeting. The difficult financial situation of the International Club was recognized by all, but the consensus was that increasing membership deserved further attention, and that increasing dues would be counterproductive.

<u>Travel Expenses:</u> Int'l Treasurer Ralph Forrester's motion to clarify that an international or region officer's personal car expense was acceptable in the same manner as rental car expense, and that rally meals with separate charges were acceptable expenses — so long as they were an integral part of the rally, was adopted by the IBT.

Conflict of Interest Policy: Ralph Forrester proposed that the WBCCI Bylaws be amended to adopt a "conflict of interest" policy applicable to all officers and trustees of WBCCI, and that the policy, which tracks IRS-suggested wording, be set forth as Appendix 16. The IBT adopted the motion. The conflict of interest policy will be incorporated in the Model Unit Constitution & Bylaws at its next revision.

WBCCI Badges: Region 2 President Don McKelvay presented three related motions, proposing revised identification strips in badges for Teen Queens, Past Region Officers, and Past International Officers, to emphasize the unit affiliations of these persons, and reduce misperceptions that past region officers were past international officers. These Bylaw modifications were adopted by the IBT.

Unit Territories, Names and Flags: Several motions were adopted, which would (1) extend Region 10's territory to include the Northwest Territory of Canada (where Airstream owners have been observed); (2) rename the Tri-County California Unit as Central Coast California Unit and approve its new flag; and (3) approve a new flag for the Virginia Unit.

Vision & Mission Statements: International 2nd VP Norm Beu presented a motion to adopt Vision and Mission Statements proposed by the Long Range Planning 2020 Committee. Following thorough discussion of the Statements, it was agreed that they should be included in Article III of the International Constitution, be made more concise, and be forwarded to the 2009 Delegates Meeting for adoption. The revised Statements were so approved.

International Convention/Rally 2011: International Second VP Norman Beu was authorized to contract with one of three proposed sites for the 54th International Convention/Rally, namely: Champlain Valley Exposition, Essex Junction, VT; DuQuoin State Fairground, DuQuoin, IL; or State Fair of West Virginia, Lewisburg, WV.



KOA AND AIRSTREAM JOIN FORCES

Driven by troubled times and eager to find a silver lining, the Airstream trailer people and the KOA campground people have struck up a new relationship. Not only are they spending nights together, they'd like us to join them.

In recent months, <u>Airstream</u> has sold an armada of 25 shiny silver trailers to Kampgrounds of America, including 10 to the Las Vegas KOA <u>campground</u> near the Circus Circus <u>Hotel</u>, within walking distance of the Strip.

Now the KOA is hoping travelers will come — out of nostalgia, or appreciation for cool design, or frugality, or just plain curiosity — and sleep in them.

Cost: Rates for the brand-new units start as low as \$45 nightly (that's the special rate through Feb. 28), and each of the 25-footlong Vegas Airstreams sleeps up to four people on one queen bed and two twins. Units features bathrooms, kitchen, plates and linens.

"We've already sold out Valentine's Day weekend," says Greg Dunagan, manager of the KOA Las Vegas site, which opened up its first Airstream on Dec. 23.

This new campaign, a spokesman says, will give travelers a chance to rent those sleek silver trailers in at least three U.S. cities, and may later expand. (The KOA-Airstream sites are campgrounds owned by the Billings, Mont.-based Kampgrounds of America Inc. Most of the roughly 450 KOA sites in North America are owned and operated by franchisees.)

You have to imagine that lately Airstream is having some trouble selling those 25-foot luxury trailers, which typically sell for about \$65,000. And clearly, some among KOA's hundreds of campgrounds in North America have enough room to do a little experimenting. As KOA's Dunagan says, "We've seen the same effects that everybody else has."

So comes this chance for travelers to sleep in a handsome retro icon without having to drag one up the road, or park it, or even deal with the hookups.

Besides Las Vegas, Airstream rentals are earmarked for KOA

campgrounds in <u>Sugarloaf Key</u>, Fla. (which already has units renting); and <u>Bar</u> Harbor, Maine, which will open up its trailers in the spring. Though no California venues have yet been named, an Airstream spokesman said, several more cities are expected to join the list before summer.

Surely this move shows how frantic hospitality companies are to woo customers outside their usual corner of the marketplace. But keep in mind, trailer-tolerant bargain hunters, that many KOA sites have been renting out cabins and other facilities for years. Also, the KOA people are not the first to look at a trailer and see a potential hotel room.






That evening we enjoyed a pot luck dinner and campfire complete with ice cream treats.



Annual Delegates Meeting June 30, 2009

WBCCI International Headquarters recently advised WBCCI Unit Presidents of questions to be decided at this year's Annual Delegates Meeting, forwarding two proposed constitutional amendments, and also forwarded the Report of the 2008-2009 Nominating Committee for International Officer and 2009-2010 Nominating Committee positions.

Amendment No. 1: The International Board of Trustees proposes to revise the Constitution, Article III, to add Vision and Mission Statements reflecting the work of the 2020 Planning Committee. The Vision Statement would read:

Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc. maintains its unique position of strength and visibility among recreational vehicle organizations as the recreational vehicle club of choice for Airstream owners.

The Mission Statement would read:

Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc. is a diverse community of Airstream owners with a commitment to Fun, Fellowship and Adventure.

Rationale:

A common theme during 2020 Committee conversations over the past year has been that WBCCI suffers from a lack of vision, a strategy to achieve the vision, and a way of providing continuity of management in implementing the

strategy. The Committee's first priority has been to create Vision and Mission Statements for the organization that provide direction for the future.

Amendment No. 2: The International Board of Trustees has proposed to amend the Constitution, Article XII, Delegates Meeting, Section 4, to read as follows:

Sec. 4 Each Unit shall be represented at the Delegates Meeting by one Delegate or an Alternate. The Delegate shall be a Regular Member of the Unit represented; the Alternate may be a Regular Member of the Unit represented or an Affiliate Member of the Unit to be represented and a Regular Member of a Unit within the same Region as the Unit represented. No Delegate or Alternate may represent more than one Unit at the Delegates Meeting.

Rationale:

As the cost of travel increases, several of our Units, on the fringes of the North American Continent, and several smaller Units have no one in attendance at the International Rally. Thus, their members are not represented and votes not cast at the annual Delegates Meeting. A method is needed to provide members of Units who do not have a Regular Member in attendance at the International Rally and annual Delegates Meeting to cast their votes.

This change allows a unit to designate a Regular Member to be its Delegate (no change), and also allows an Affiliate Member of the Unit who is a Regular Member of a Unit within the same Region to be designated the Alternate Delegate.

Allowing any Affiliate Member of a unit to be the Alternate Delegate is unacceptable. It is too easy to become an Affiliate, obtain a Delegates credential and know absolutely nothing of the culture of the Unit to be represented and to use the authority to support the personal agenda of the Alternate – not necessarily that of the unit's members. By requiring that the Alternate Delegate be a Regular Member of a Unit within the same Region, there is reasonable expectation that the designated Alternate Delegate will have a familiarity with the membership and culture of the represented unit and could, thus, more accurately interpret and vote the unit's actual desires if so required.

The preceding proposed amendments to the constitution were accompanied by a report

of the International Constitution and Bylaws Committee. Unit Presidents received a copy of the report, which is favorable to the proposed amendments.

On Saturday some choose to navigate the NY Transit system and went into Manhattan to see a play. Others took a tour of Arthur Street and City Island.



LIFE IN THE AIRSTREAM

ICONIC TRAILERS LET AFICIONADOS ENJOY GREAT ESCAPES, EVEN IF OCCASIONALLY ONE REQUIRES AN EXTREME MAKEOVER

hen Bard and Kathy
Fuller head out on the
highway, looking for
adventure, they tow the
latest in trailer design, the
latest, that is, for 1964. The
trailer is an Airstream, the tubular silver
symbol of American mobility.


Airstream founder Wally Byam made his first trailer, so the legend goes, because his wife would not go camping without a kitchen. By the 1930s, he was making trailers commercially in his backyard and later in a factory.

At a time when hitting the road was associated with dire financial calamity, Airstreams exemplified the fashion for streamlined industrial design. They were made of lightweight aluminum and had a curved form for diminished wind resistance.

While new Airstreams are still being produced, the vintage models remain popular. The Fullers' Bambi 2 is a mid-century favorite. For Bard, it evokes boyhood memories of road trips with his parents in the early 1960s. He and Kathy have continued that tradition. They live in Southington and spend their free time exploring the country, often in the company of

fellow Airstream enthusiasts.

Raymond and Cynthia Richard of Moodus own an Excella 500 from the late 1970s. It's a less-idealized period in modern history, but the trailer has family value. It was inherited from Raymond's mother, who lived in it for many years in a Florida retirement park

By the time the Richards towed it north in the late 1990s, the Excella needed a serious overhaul. "That's

The finish is another distinguishing characteristic. The like-new mirror finish is in fashion, as befits a modern design icon, but it takes at least 80 hours of polishing. 'The weathered, oxidized gray patina is a lot less work," Bard says.

Look, too, at the front and back for proof of membership in the Wally Byam Caravan Club. Members have one red star for every five years of membership and a number that corresponds with their entry in the club directory. The directory tends to be kept handy in the glove compartment, so you can look up a trailer's owner and wave, or not wave, as the case may be.

The Excella had curtains that were fitted to withstand swings and vibrations. They were used as a pattern for the new ones. The fabric was a Wal-Mart special. The price (\$1 a yard) helped to offset the cost of hiring a seamstress. "We saved about \$1,000 doing it that way." says

All Creatures Great and Small

"The best laid plans of mice and men gang aft agley" is a phrase from a poem by Robert Burns that seems very appropriate to our recent caravan experience. Cynthia and I have been looking forward to the Fall Unit Caravan for most of the year. Co-hosted with Bob and Helen Sandall, the caravan was well planned, had ten rigs registered, and promised to be great fun. Oh how plans can change in but an instant.

We left Sunday from the safari field at Water's Edge campground; the location of a most enjoyable October Rally hosted by Mike and Sandy Sasuta, and drove without incident to the Desert Dunes campground in Freeport, ME. The rest of the Caravaners soon arrived just in time for happy hour. That evening after going out to dinner, all the Caravaners enjoyed a warm visit around the campfire; a marvelous end to a beautiful day. Cynthia and I retired to our cozy Airstream for what we thought would be our first restful night in Maine. Awoken from a sound sleep at 2 AM, Cynthia is plagued by the worst headache she has ever had. Filled with compassion, I prescribed two aspirins and encouraged her to lay flat, be calm and very still. Her head pain intensified and fostered vomiting. By 4 AM, I shared in her pain, albeit in a much lower body location (think neck). By 6 AM we arrived at the emergency room of Parkview Hospital in Brunswick, ME seeking proper medical attention. Side note: I wonder, is it too late for me to receive a refund of my tuition paid for the mail-order medical degree I have? Dr. Richard, I am not.

At one point I was asked to leave the examining room while the nurses and doctor performed a "procedure". So I walked outside for some fresh air. After a while, the Chaplin came out and as he approached me, he announced that he was "very sorry" and wondered if there was anything he could do. I immediately assumed the worst – thinking that Cynthia had past away. As my heart fell to my feet, the look on my face must have telegraphed my thoughts, as the kind Padre quickly said "no Cynthia is fine, I am here to help you". I assured him that he had done enough and thanked him for his concern. I then signed a consent form allowing him to pray with me, and then say a prayer for Cynthia.

By 1:30 PM Cynthia is moved to the Intensive Care Unit (ICU) where she remained comatose till Tuesday morning. Her temperature was 104, and her white blood cell count slightly elevated, yet by this point the Doctors had only ruled out a stroke. This is the first good news I have heard. After a slew of blood tests, a CAT scan, a series of X-rays, and a spinal tap we knew for certain what is NOT causing the problem, but had yet to identify the cause of her condition. A regiment of antibiotics via IV and pill eventually aided in Cynthia returning to normal and being released from ICU Wednesday afternoon to return to our beloved Airstream parked in Freeport. Although inconclusive, the consensus of the Doctors believes it may have been meningitis delivered by a Connecticut mosquito, or maybe Lime disease from a tick. We are still awaiting the culture results from the State of Maine to confirm the Hospital findings.

A sincere "thank you" to Bob and Helen Sandall for picking up the slack resulting from Cynthia and I leaving the caravan. We will forever be thankful for the thoughts and cares of all our Airstream friends.

Register Before January 1 and Save \$20

Be sure and register for the 53rd International Convention/Rally before January 1, 2010 and save \$20.00 per couple or \$10.00 for a single. Not only do you save a few bucks, but the earlier we know how many are going to attend, the better we can plan for the best rally possible. It is much easier for hosts to schedule events and activities if they know how many are planning to attend.

2020 Committee

Chairman Darrell Waters and members of the 20/20 Committee have been diligently working these past six months. They have some ideas on how Region Officers can assist Unit 1st Vice Presidents to better plan their unit rallies, such as including members of all ages and hosting events that are new and well attended. These ideas, along with the Unit Planning Guide, the Mentor Program, the Media Program should give these incoming officers assistance in better planning their year. There will be a training seminar during the International Rally for Unit Vice Presidents.

International 1st VP, Norm Beu, has also asked the 2020 Committee to review the job descriptions of the International Standing Committees to make sure the club is getting needed information while looking for ways to cut expenses. As the club gets smaller, do we need all of these positions? Or can we get by with fewer people or perhaps combine some committees?

If you remember, in 2005 Jim Franklin presented a paper outlining ideas to realign Regional boundaries, reduce the number of Region officers, and combine International Rallies with Region Rallies, all with the intention of cutting expenses. While in 2005 those ideas were met with less than enthusiasm, perhaps it is time to rethink this idea. The 2020 Committee is now looking at these possibilities. This is something that will not come easily and will take a great deal of thought and time. There are many different opinions on this subject and many areas of the Blue Book that would need to be amended.
