Overnight Oats

All you need are rolled oats, milk, Greek yogurt, chia seeds, and sweetener of your choice.

- 1/2 cup rolled oats
- 1/2 cup milk (dairy or dairy-free)
- 1/4 cup Greek yogurt (dairy or dairy-free)
- 1 tablespoon chia seeds
- 1 tablespoon maple syrup

Let mixture soak in the fridge for at least 2 hours, but it's best to soak overnight for 8 hours for a creamier consistency. Add your favorite toppings and enjoy!

Maintenance Tips

T-9: The Rocky Mountain Rust Wrangler



The air smelled of pine needles and diesel fumes. In the heart of the Rockies, where elk roamed the streets and ski bums navigated their Subaru Outbacks like downhill racers, there existed a secret elixir. A potion so mysterious, it could turn a rusty snowplow into a chrome-plated avalanche fighter. Its name? Boeshield T-9.

The Legend of T-9...Meet Rusty McAllister, a grizzled snowmobile mechanic with a handlebar mustache that could trap a rogue snowflake. Rusty had seen it all—avalanches, frostbite, and the occasional lost tourist. But what gnawed at his soul was rust. The relentless, insidious creep of corrosion that gnawed at his snowmobile tracks, his snow shovels, and even his prized ice-fishing auger. One frosty morning, while sipping a lukewarm coffee at the Rusty Moose Lodge, Rusty met a mysterious stranger.

Longmire Days Rally Buffalo, Wyoming

Longmire Days 2024 was enlightening, educational, humorous at times, and just great Wyoming fun. Colorado Airstream Club members who attended are to be applauded for their great perseverance while navigating through the Buffalo KOA booking process, and the very challenging Longmire Days ticket purchasing website.



For those of you unfamiliar with both the Longmire book and TV series, the common plot is about a modern-day fictional County Sheriff (Walt Longmire), who is a terrific detective, and an honest and empathetic law enforcement officer. He is fair minded to all people he meets, including those he has apprehended. All these traits support foundational reasons for Walt Longmire's popularity. But what really endears him to readers/viewers, are his dark vulnerabilities: Protective love for his attorney daughter, and a vengeful dedication to the love of his life, his late wife. Yes, I'm being purposefully vague so that your exploration of the Longmire character will not be compromised.

The Longmire series, although filmed in Las Vegas, NM, is centered in fictional Durant, WY, the County seat of fictional Absaroka County, WY. Durant, and Absaroka County are actually based on the author's real-life hometown of Buffalo, WY, the County seat of real-life Johnson County, WY. Included plot locations are endearing local Buffalo businesses, notably, the Busy Bee Cafe. The most common entry portal to Longmire's world is via the Netflix TV series appropriately titled: Longmire. WARNING: This series is highly addictive. So be prepared to binge!



The 2024 Longmire Days were similar to past "Days," yet different. Jeanne and I agree that this year was noticeably better than the previous years we've attended. What made it better? The quality of the individual events, presentations, and number of attending celebrities. Longmire creator, and author, Craig Johnson, is part of the organizing committee, and serves as de facto Master of Ceremonies.

Actors present included: Robert Taylor (Walt Longmire), A. Martinez (Jacob Nighthorse), Louanne Stephens (Ruby), Derek Phillips (Travis Murphy), John Bishop (Bob Barnes). Also attending, and of note, actor and Longmire Technical Advisor for Native American culture, Marcus Red Thunder. Last, but not least, was Craig Johnson's longtime New York Literary Agent, Gail Hochman.



Events kicked off on Thursday, July 18. Craig Johnson led a discussion and reading from his most recent book: First Frost (Book #20 in the series). Following that, Craig gave a presentation about the early Sheriffs of Johnson County, and a tour of the County Museum. Incidentally, Craig Johnson is a born wit and storyteller. His talks are always informative and entertaining. When he concludes, one wonders where the time went. Yes, he is THAT good. Later that day, Louanne Stephens hosted a very popular southern style "Sweet Tea with Ruby." Thursday concluded with a VIP reception, and the Longmire Days Rodeo at the County Fairground.

Friday, July 19, began early with a 5K Fun Run...that I don't think any of us were up for. Later that morning was an autograph session with Craig Johnson and the Longmire cast. This was also a grand opportunity to spend some brief quality time with both Craig, and the cast members. At this point, I need to report that the actors were all genuinely friendly, engaging, and very easy to approach. New this year was a Native American culture, history and drum lesson by Marcus Red Thunder. Enlightening, to say the least. Marcus had a wonderful way of explaining how Indian beliefs and religion are tied to Mother Earth. He also tickled us with a light covering of Native American philosophy that he teaches to tribal youth. He emphasizes all to: "Feed your Spirit," by seeing the good all around you.



A longtime Longmire Saturday tradition is the delicious outdoor Kiwanis Pancake Breakfast. The Kiwanis Club offers as many delicious pancakes as you can eat, and bottomless cups of coffee and orange juice. Durn, this year I again forgot to ask for their pancake recipe. Occupying the field next door was an Art and Craft show. Johnson County has some amazingly talented artists, craftsmen, Potters and jewelry makers. My favorite buy this year: Spiced honey. Following breakfast was the Longmire Parade down Main Street. This is the most popular kid event because of the piles of candy tossed by the actors to the crowd. Those Buffalo kids are expert at chasing down each and every piece! Buffalo's town park is called Crazy Woman Square. There, in the afternoon we had the pleasure of witnessing a number of full-dress Native American dance performances. Very ceremonial. Native American culture is important in this community, and therefore all Longmire shows and books are in some way tied to the two Tribal Reservations (Crow and Northern Cheyenne) across the state line, in Montana.



The final day, Sunday, Craig Johnson hosted two outdoor events. First was skeet shooting at the local gun club. Attendance was limited to just a few participants, and spectators. Second was a half-day horseback ride at the Paradise Guest Ranch. Luanne Stephens hosted a Sunday Brunch at the T&A ranch. Several of our members attended and reported that the food and entertainment (Ruby) was excellent. Late that afternoon, we all gathered for supper in the Virginian Room, at Buffalo's landmark Occidental Hotel. Founded in 1880, this venerable establishment is the oldest continuously operated hotel in the entire State of Wyoming. Can't speak for the rest of us, but my prime rib was perfect!



A number of other events, including some duplicates, also filled the above chronicled days. However, there were certain presentations (not previously mentioned) that require a special note and a personal recommendation, should you choose to attend a future Longmire Days.

So You Want to Write a Book - Craig Johnson and Gail Hochman address the challenges of getting a book published. This is a fact filled and entertaining dialog covering the foibles and frustrations and gratifications of becoming a successful author. Craig talks a lot about his beginnings in the business. Even if you never plan to write a book, this presentation is interesting and worthwhile.

A Conversation with the Longmire Cast - Although the format is different, this is similar to another event titled, "A Longmire Conversation." Both delve into TV show backstories, etc., but the Longmire Conversation is audience question driven and explores the relationships the actors have with their characters, and the plot lines. Gets very personal, and emotional at times. Both presentations are superb.



A Tale of Two Walts - Craig Johnson and Robert Taylor answer audience questions regarding the differences between the book-series Walt, and the TV-series Walt. Generally extemporaneous and highly entertaining. Both Johnson and Taylor are very quick with one-liners.



Finally, a HUGE shout-out to Paul and Anita Peoples (and their daughters), who are the owners, operators, and were our hosts at the Buffalo KOA. They made every effort to accommodate our Club. Not knowing the Longmire Days dates, they invented a two-tiered reservation process that allowed cancellations for future unknown date conflicts.

Anita volunteered, and hosted an arrival wine and beer social, for which she cooked a light buffet. Her Cowboy Caviar was delicious. They even searched, found, and returned an escaped dog belonging to one of our member couples. In over fifty years of camping, this KOA has topped all my previous experiences, in campgrounds of all types, in locations all across the country. They were unbelievably amazing.
