

Musings and Ramblings from the President ...

Captain's Log Stardate: August 2024



Repeat after me: "Technology is my friend. Technology is my friend." Repeat!

"Luddite" now describes in general people who dislike new technology, but its origins date back to an early 19th-century labor movement that railed against the ways that mechanized manufacturers and their unskilled laborers undermined the skilled craftsmen of the day.

The original Luddites were British weavers and textile workers who objected to the increased use of mechanized looms and knitting frames. Most were trained artisans who had spent years learning their craft, and they feared that unskilled machine operators were robbing them of their livelihood.

Thanks, for the history lesson. What does that have to do with Airstreaming?

Have you ever heard someone say or even thought to yourself, "What's the matter with the way we've been doing things all along?" Well, my answer is 'nothing'. So, why do we need WhatsApp and Jotform?

To answer this question, I've polled the audience....namely rally hosts that have used the tools. Jotform is an effective tool for conducting rallies. If you haven't hosted a rally before, stand by, at some point you will be involved. JotForm eases handling rally registration because it can be used to collect rally fees in addition to participant registration. Collecting via JotForm eliminates the rally hosts having to run folks down for payment, keep an accounting of the funds, and handle the money if the treasurer is not at the rally. It also allows the use of a credit cards for online payment at the time of registration. Details on that are in the design phase. Let's call the process "Simplicity of Assembly." **Always** vote in favor of making volunteers have an easier path. Next time around that volunteer could be YOU.

So how about WhatsApp? Some may argue that WhatsApp is just fluff. Maybe it is, but would you want to:

- A) be the host that has to reach out to 15 or more airstreams individually to give notice of itinerary changes
- B) be the one person that the host couldn't reach and miss the bus to dinner?

As far as using the app, many of us seek local knowledge of our rally area, or look for activity partners, or give travel reports, or sometimes post pictures just for giggles. There are many advantages to using WhatsApp on the local level.

Another major point is that WhatsApp looks right through your device type and can communicate with Apple and/or Androids at the same time. Texts, not so much.

So protest if you will, but these tools are the wave of the future. Embrace, and if you need installation help or app information, just tap one of us on the shoulder. We are happy to help.

The Soggy Bottom Boys were large and in charge at the rally in West Jefferson.


We should consider contracting out rallies to places that need rain. We had a bunch of the wet stuff this weekend. Two of the last three rallies were pretty moist.

The Poodle Palace is equipped with a very absorbent door mat from L.L. Bean it's their Water Hog line. I recommend it with highest marks.

We feel this is an upgrade from the logo Airstream mat. It is exactly the right sized for our rig and boy does it hold water. To the right is the same mat only larger at our brick and mortar home. We didn't spring for initials on the Airstream mat.



The L.L.Bean Water Hog is just as pricy as the Airstream logo mat but in my opinion more functional. Search L.L. Bean to get the most up to date information. Usually priced at \$59.00 to \$79.00.

The Airstream mat is \$79.60, if you can find them. The Airstream Store is usually out of stock. Some dealers throw them in with the purchase of your Airstream.

They are often available on E-Bay and Facebook Marketplace in good condition. Prices vary in the secondary market.




