Notes from Your OAC Rally Coordinator

As we head into Fall, most of the 39 2024 Rallies organized for our club are now just pleasant memories. That said, we still have Rallies planned into November of this year so there is still plenty of camping fun to be had!!

After a brief pause over the Holidays, the 2025 OAC Rally Season will kick-off on January 23 at Cannon Beach for our Annual Leak Test Rally. As of this writing, we

already have 36 OAC Rallies scheduled for our 2025 camping season, and a few more are in the works. The locations and dates of these 2025 Rallies will be announced in the coming weeks and will be detailed in the 2025 Oregon Airstream Club Rally Handbook.

As previously communicated, the key enabling element which allows us to enjoy this many rallies every year are OUR VOLUNTEER RALLY HOSTS!! Without your dedication and service to the club, our rally season would look much different. As a reminder of what is expected of a Rally Host, I am enclosing an excerpt from the OAC Rally Host Handbook, which can be found on the OAC website at https://airstreamclub.org/oregon/host-rally.

OAC Rally Host Handbook Excerpt

First, thank you for your interest in being a Rally Host for the Oregon Airstream Club. Rallies are the primary activity that brings us together as a club. Rallies enable us to build friendships and to enrich our lives by enjoying the great outdoors with a broad-based membership who share like interests and our love for everything Airstream. There are **two basic ways to become a Rally Host**: (1) ideally a year or more in advance, communicate with your OAC Rally Coordinator and indicate your desire to Host a Rally at a future time and location you prefer, or (2) respond to a request from your Rally Coordinator to Host a Rally that has been scheduled without a Host (or has had a Host cancellation).

Hosting a Rally is not intended to be a cumbersome task. As Rally Host there are a few basic things that you will be expected to do. Most of these tasks are centered around organization and communication. You will also not be alone. There are many experienced members who are more than happy to provide guidance and share their experience...all you need to do is ask! In addition, there will be Rally Host training, including JotForm protocols, offered on-line each year prior to our scheduled Rallies.

Co-Hosting a Rally is one of the best ways to gain experience and confidence while working under the mentorship of an experienced Rally Host. Working directly with the Rally Host, you will learn by contributing your efforts as agreed with your Rally Host. Everyone has something to contribute and being a Rally Co-Host is one of the best ways to learn while doing. If you have hosted a rally previously, why not ask a newer member to co-host with you.

No two Rallies need be alike. Make your Rally your own by planning, organizing, and proposing events and activities that match your personality and utilize the resources, activities, and attractions at or near your Rally location.

As a Host, assuring your Rally participants enjoy the opportunity to mingle, make new friends, and enrich existing friendships is a key responsibility. This begins with the very first communication (usually through email) with members who have signed up for your Rally. This welcoming message should include a brief overview of the Rally schedule, any guidance regarding arrival/departure times, an overview of meals (if offered), and a list of participants. Many Hosts provide a printed schedule, a printed listing of site assignments, and a printed reminder about meals, if planned, that can be distributed on day one of the Rally. Greeting each camper as they arrive at camp is also a great way for folks to feel welcome. In addition, saying goodbye at the end of the Rally is a great way for folks to let you know what they liked and how the Rally went for them. Facilitation of communications during your Rally is most often accomplished through arranging BYOB Happy Hours, with or without camper contributed appetizers. Communicate your intentions to your fellow campers. You may know of a fun 'ice breaker' game to start the conversation at a happy hour, you may choose to break a large group into smaller groups (rotated daily) for happy hours, the choice is yours.

As Host, reaching out to new people and introducing them to others sets an example of how we try to welcome everyone. We want everyone to feel they are part of the group.

Take a few photos during your Rally and, if you are so inclined, share the photos with captions and/or a small write-up with your OAC newsletter personnel. (Co-Editors' note: We approve this message!) OAC members love to see themselves and others having a great time, and our newsletter is a great way to share.

Finally, as a Rally Host, **provision of meals during a Rally is completely voluntary**. Some Hosts find this to be an enjoyable activity while others do not.

- Potluck meals are a popular way to "provide meals" while sharing the meal preparation efforts with your fellow campers.
- Arranging a catered meal (Food Truck, etc.) has also been utilized to organize a meal without having to do it yourself. (Always check with the campground officials to be sure this option is permitted).

The Rally Host is never expected to bear the cost of meals; these costs should be apportioned to each Rally participant who elects to participate in Rally meals. Meal plans and costs should be communicated in detail and campers should be asked if they wish to participate several weeks prior to the Rally. This enables the Host to acquire the supplies and/or services needed. Participating campers should reimburse the Host in cash at the Rally.

In the future, you can take a chance when the north entrance is open to see if tickets are still available. You can call for updates at 541-314-9777 for the Harborfare in charge of the boats. Entrance allowed many to visit the beautiful Cascade Gorge and the Natural Bridge and get lunch or ice cream at Beckies Cafe in Union Creek!










What a great Rally we had up in Port Townsend for the Wooden Boat Show. The weather was beautiful the first few days with some fog rolling in on Sunday.

While attending the Friends Landing rally recently, I met Janet Humphrey who is the Director of Community Operations for RV Life Magazine. She has been an Airstreamer for many years and is very familiar with and knowledgeable about lots of Airstream forums. Here is her story...

Janet is a reformed tent camper. As she aged it got too hard to sleep on the ground. She also plays guitar for her band, Trillium-239, and often camps out while playing gigs. In 2000 she decided it was time for an RV. She was far from excited about shopping though. The first of 3 that she and her hubby purchased was a 19' 1977 Argosy Minuet. It needed work and they

did that. But camping with a child and 2 dogs meant they needed more room. So they bought a 26' Overlander in California. It needed even more work which they did. Camped in it for years. Eventually it felt too big and they wanted smaller. So they moved on to a 19' 1974 Globetrotter. They found that in a field in terrible shape about the time Covid hit. So they had plenty of time and parts and tools to do the work.

In 2003 Janet had an issue with her Airstream and realized that there was nowhere to go for answers except dealers. And if you had a vintage trailer the dealers weren't much help. She and others decided to create Airstreamers Forums where folks could come together online and discuss issues. She became the moderator of the site meaning she would monitor content. Over time it grew and more staff was needed. And more was being discussed. The group started to acquire other RV related businesses like Campground Reviews, Trip Wizard and RV Life. Revenue from ads is how they earned money and gradually the business became RV Life Network. It's important to note that Airstream Forums is not a part of Airstream Inc. it is a separate entity.

They now have a full staff and there are 3 million users. And it's growing. They cater to new trailer owners, vintage trailer owners and folks who are shopping and need help deciding what will be best for them. You can go to rvlife.com and see what they are all about.

- 1 cup crumbled feta cheese
- 2 fresh tomatoes, cut into large chunks
- 3 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil
- 3 tablespoons finely chopped parsley
- 2 cloves garlic, chopped
- 1 teaspoon oregano
- Salt and pepper to taste

- Preheat oven to 350F
- In a small greased baking dish, layer shrimp, feta, tomatoes and olives
- Mix together oil, parsley, garlic, oregano, salt and pepper
- Pour over shrimp
- Bake uncovered for 30-35 minutes, or until shrimp are cooked through and sauce is bubbly
- Serve with crusty bread, pasta or yellow rice


From the Editors


