Stop 1 New Frontier RV Park Winnemucca, NV 1 night stop

RV camping sites, many with electric hookups. Clean restrooms with hot showers available for campers. Designated picnic areas with tables and grills for outdoor dining. A sandy beach area for swimming and sunbathing. Several hiking trails are available for exploration.

Stop 15 Lackawanna State Park, North Abington Township, PA, 1 night stay

North Abington Township was established in the early 19th century and is part of Lackawanna County. Originally settled by farmers and industrial workers, the area benefited from the development of the railroad and nearby coal mining, which contributed to its growth. The township features a blend of rural charm and suburban development, evolving over the years while retaining its historical roots.

Attractions and Things to See:

Abington Community Park: A popular local park with walking trails, picnic areas, playgrounds, and sports fields, perfect for family outings and community events.
