WHY HAM RADIO By Phil Drake K4UOK

I believe you may already have an answer to this first question. I'll bet your answer is as different as all the many answers and opinions about "ham" or amateur radio found online. And yours and those are all pretty much correct. Because ham radio is so many things to so many people it's almost impossible to pick a single reason for getting into this amazing and useful hobby.

A common meeting point of all these reasons is however a willingness by ham radio operators to help their communities in times of disaster or other emergencies. It's just baked into our DNA I suppose. After all, Ham radio gives you the ability to communicate anywhere, anytime and under any condition.

And to the last point in bold above, Cathy, Emma and I just experienced hurricane Helene, up close and personal, which destroyed major infrastructure in Western North Carolina. We woke up on Thursday September 26 (in our basement where we had huddled at 4 AM due to falling trees) with no power, Internet and low water pressure. Cell service was degraded and then disappeared entirely. ALL roads in our community were blocked by trees, there was no way in or out for three days. City utilities stopped a day later. The recovery, which is ongoing, will take months/years.

The only sure method of communication the first three days was by ham radio. Our primary local VHF repeater operated for two days and then went off air due to its backup power source shutting down. Several other VHF and UHF repeaters were operational throughout the recovery period. In fact, the Mount Mitchell VHF repeater was a critical recovery tool for areas of WNC hardest hit. An emergency net operated on this repeater for weeks.

Family members in Charlotte and Myrtle Beach were beside themselves worrying about us but I was able to use HF ham radio to email and text them. There is a saying "when all else fails, ham radio works".

Whether you want to just talk across the campground to a friend, provide info to fellow travelers in a caravan or meet new friends hundreds or thousands of miles away, having a ham radio license allows you to do it.

Speaking of license, you will need one from the Federal Communications Commission (FCC). To obtain a license you will need to pass a 35-question multiple-choice exam with increasing difficulty based on the class of license attempted. There are three license classes or levels: "Technician", which is the beginner level, "General" or mid-level and "Extra Class" which is the top-level license with a 50-question exam. The General and Extra Class licenses bring access to more frequencies and technologies. There is no longer a need to pass a "CW" or Morse Code (as it's commonly called) test. However, many older hams and some new ones too use "the code" to communicate. Why bother with "code"? It's still the most reliable method to get a message through static, interference and noise.

Since this is an introduction to ham radio let's concentrate on the "Technician" license and what you can do with this license class.

What can you really do with a technician or "learners permit" license? How about talk static free across town or to someone 40 miles away with a handheld FM radio? How about talk to fellow hams across the planet with a ham radio app (EchoLink) on your cellphone at no cost? Talk through a repeater on the International Space Station. Send and receive email without the Internet using your computer and radio. Technicians may also operate on the 80-, 40- and 15-meter bands using CW, and on the 10-meter band using CW, voice and digital modes.

- 3. Understand some very basic electronics.
 - 4. Use on-line practice exams.
 - 5. Learn the basic FCC Regulations.

 - Part 97 Amateur Radio Service Rules and Regulations
 - Technician question pool

renewed on-line without an examination.

A Diamond in the Rough By Lee & Jennifer Scott BRN 28782



Jennifer and I are relatively new members of the CAC, and relatively new to Airstreams in general. We bought a 1958 Pacer a couple of years ago that turns out was probably one of the CAC's founding member's campers. It has the original Carolina's Airstream Club decal in the rear window, which we will keep for as long the window glass lasts!

We found it for sale on eBay over in the Matthews, NC area, and when we bought it, it was like a time capsule from 1960. It had a 1960 Woodalls camping guide, along with a bunch of membership correspondence from the Wally Byam Caravan Club. It was owned by a Wade and Mary Ellen Huneycutt, and their Airstream Club ID badges were still inside - along with an empty metal tin of Nabisco Saltine crackers and other period camping memorabilia. It looks like 1960 was the last year it was ever used as a camper until we bought it from the guy who bought it from the Huneycutts. The week after we bought it, we towed it up to the Alumalina gathering in Marion, NC for the day, as it wasn't camp-able at that point.

It needed a new subfloor, which we had done at Retro modern Campers in Pickens, SC, but the frame was pretty much OK. After the new subfloor, I took over the restoration process. I saved all the original cabinetry and reused as much as I could. The original click-clack sofa was reupholstered and mounted atop a 6" cabinet base that is used for storage. I saved the original sink, cabinet, and 3-burner propane stove, but, unfortunately, the original undercounter refrigerator was beyond repair. I bought a retro-style modern refrigerator to go in its place.

Retro modern Campers also installed grey- and black-water holding tanks, since it originally had no grey and only a tiny black one. Unlike modern campers, the toilet and shower are on the curb side, so I installed a marine macerating electric toilet to pump everything over to the holding tank. The original small closet was converted to shelf space and houses a 200 AH lithium battery, a 2000-watt charger/inverter, 110v and 12v breaker panels, and small microwave oven. When the restoration was done, we made a few shake-down cruises to Charleston, SC, Savannah, GA, and Asheville, and then this year, we drove out to Vancouver, BC and came back through the southern Canadian Rockies and Glacier National Park. At only 18', we named her 'Peanut', but she has everything a camper needs, other than a lot of storage space!

The rear bed has a new custom mattress, but it's not quite big enough for both of us, so one of us sleeps in it, the other on the folded out click-clack sofa. At 3,100 pounds loaded, Peanut can easily be towed by my small Ford Maverick pickup. And for vintage Airstream gatherings that aren't too far away, my 1954 Chevy 3100 truck tows it just fine as well. After our first shake-down trips, Jennifer was concerned that there was simply not enough storage space in Peanut, and I was also looking for a new project, having thoroughly enjoyed the work I did restoring Peanut. So, earlier this year, I bought a 1954 22' Flying Cloud in TN and towed it home. It was not in quite as original a condition as Peanut was, as it was pretty much gutted, but the shell is in almost immaculate condition. The frame, though, was rotted out, and the subfloor was shot as well.

I took it back to Retro modern Campers, and they built a brand-new frame. This frame is a beefed-up 5" frame to be able to accommodate underfloor holding tanks that the original 3" frame was too narrow for, and I added a 2" receiver to the back bumper for a heavy-duty bike rack for our 2 e-bikes. After the new frame and subfloor were done, they mounted the shell back, and I'm now in the process of rewiring the shell and trying to decide on the final floorplan. I won't be able to use much of the original cabinetry, so it will most likely be a more modern interior with a few retro touches. When it's done in another year or so, we will have to decide which Airstream we will keep as our permanent camper and which one we will sell. While the Flying Cloud will be 4' bigger and have more storage, it probably won't be able to be towed by my Maverick or by my '54 Chevy truck. There is also something incredibly appealing about Peanut that will make it hard for me to sell her. So we shall see what happens!
