Maintenance Minute

Many people forget about tire care and maintenance. You normally think about it 2 seconds after a blowout. Here are a couple of things to consider:

- How old are my tires? If you store your rig in the sun, UV can be hard on tires. It is recommended by many tire pros to replace trailer tires every 5 years, regardless of miles. I tend to look for cracks, worn tread and other visual clues that the tire may need replaced. Remember, new tires are way cheaper than a blow out on the road that could seriously damage your rig.
- 2. Always check your pressure. This is somewhat rig and taste dependent, as well as tire specific. Get the specifications for your the manufacturer's tires at website and make sure you have the correct inflation for your rig weight. For most trailer tires, that will be somewhere between 60 and 80 PSI. Something to consider is the higher the pressure, the rougher the ride can be. I try to go as low as possible knowing my tires will warm up once we get moving. Our tires



typically increase 5-7 psi on the road. On the sun side, it could be 10 psi or more. So think about the temp the tires will be on the road, not in your garage.

3. Check the batteries in your TPMS if you have them. I replace mine annually whether then need it or not. I buy them on Amazon in bulk and carry a few extra in my tool kit.

Product Review

One of the things than spoil a trip is the loss of refrigeration. On two long trips we have refrigerator problems. The good news is we managed to get it working again. However, our only back plan was ice. In some places, like places we end up, ice can get hard to come by or it can get expensive.

Ice is not a good fall back for a host of reason outside of cost. It melts (even in a Yeti), food gets soggy and does not stay frozen, and ice takes up precious room in your chest. So what are your options?

We decided to get an ice-free, 12V cooler. After a couple months of study and reading dozens of reviews, we landed on the BougeRV, Rocky 55 quart, duel zone portable fridge.

Why this unit? One, it came with a very good warranty on a promotion, 3 years. It is wrapped in Stainless Steel (durable and matches the rig), has Bluetooth connectivity, duel cooling zones, and a reversible door. It also fits under our bed cover and stays under 22" tall. The price point was significantly under the Dometic alternatives of the same size which are the industry standard.



We also paired this unit with a lithium battery station from EcoFlow (12V and 120V). That will be the subject of another review. We had a problem with our first EcoFlow unit and I am waiting for a replacement. This was a cheaper and more useful alternative than buying the BougeRV battery that can integrate with the cooler.

We have not taken a trip with it yet, but I have played with it in the house. It is very quiet. In fact, you have to get your ear close to it to hear anything. It works great. You can pick a freezer/fridge configuration, freezer/freezer or fridge/fridge. It cooled to 4F in about 15 minutes while empty.

The downside, it is a bit heavy. You are better off removing the two internal baskets and the fill the cooler once you get it where you want to keep it.



Otherwise, it is a two-person job to move it.

We will do a long-term follow up once we test it on a few road trips. But so far, it looks like a great fall back plan to the Airstream unit. There are a lot of good product like this out there. Let us know if you have tried one and what you think.

Trip Diary

We arrived at the Green County Fairgrounds in time to top off our fresh water and set up before the "happy hour" meet & greet at 5pm. We met the hosts Charlie and Linda Meinholz and received an introduction to Monroe, WI from a Monroe City Official. We were also given some entertaining facts about Limburger cheese and the option to try a sample. I wasn't quite intrigued enough to try it but Traci did. (Just don't breathe through your nose and you won't gag!) The evening culminated in cheese trays and crackers. There was a huge cooler with various beers that was donated by one of the rally attendees. I was intrigued by the McMango Face IPA that packed a whopping 9.5 ABV! It was quite popular.



The next morning, we had coffee and pastries from New Glarus Bakery. They have been in business since 1910 and pride themselves on keeping the traditions of making authentic Swiss pastries.

They were delicious! After breakfast, we headed over to the National Historic Cheese Making Center and enjoyed a guided tour of cheese making over the years. Then we visited the Alp and Dell Cheese Factory and was shown around by Tony, who immigrated from



Switzerland and is also an award-winning vodeller, so he gave us a short performance. It was amazing! The Alp and Dell store had cheeses from all over Wisconsin and imports from Switzerland, as well as their award-winning cheeses made there at the factory. The cheese curds were phenomenal. And, naturally, since we were in the cheese capital of Wisconsin, we had to have a grilled cheese sandwich from Decatur Creamery. We finished the evening back at the fairgrounds with another happy hour and pizza delivered from Vince's, made with (of course) local, Green County cheese!



Day three started with breakfast breads from New Glarus Bakery, then we boarded a bus to spend a day in New Glarus. We started at New Glarus Brewery for a self-guided tour and tastings of their brews. It was such a beautiful facility! Then, we were bussed over to Bailey's Run Winery and Whiskey Run Distilling for a hybrid tasting tour. Next, we were treated to a catered Swiss dinner at Chalet Landhaus restaurant and was given a fondue lesson and samples while we waited for our meal. Dinner entertainment included an introduction to the Alphorn, which was quite interesting to watch. After a delicious dinner, we walked a few blocks to the annual Polka Fest, where there was more beer, live music, and dancing. It was a busy, but fun day!



The last day of the rally took place within a mile of the fairgrounds where we were staying. Monroe has many breweries and cafes, and is a nice place to explore. Our group had a tasting at Bulquarian Brewery, then a guided brewery tour of Minhaus Brewery, which is the second-oldest brewery in the United States. Across the street from the brewery is the Minhaus kitchen, where we had our farewell dinner and the best Wisconsin Old-Fashioned I've ever tasted!

Not including the arrival, set up, and happy-hour on the first evening, the event was 3 days. The registration fee was \$190 per person which seems very



reasonable for all that was included. We had a great time, met some great new people, and are excited to attend the Sip of Oregon in September. I think that our personal highlight was all of the cheeses that we got to try (and buy!).
