### Maintenance Minute

One thing that many Airstreamers may forget about is tending to the 12V power

plants in our rigs known as batteries. There are typically 3 types, and each has its own maintenance needs.

Most newer Airstreams have either Lithium Ion or AGM (absorbed glass mat) batteries. But older units or replacement batteries might use FLA (Flooded Lead Acid). Most FLAs use water but some use a gel material in their construction. If you have FLA batteries that use water, the water level is critical proper to When refilling, performance. use distilled water and do not over fill. AGM and gel-type batteries are still lead acid batteries, but do not require water and are generally sealed (so do not open them).

The first check after determining type is to clean the terminals. It is normally a good idea to remove the cables from the terminal (I rarely do, but probably not the best way to do it) and mix a 6:1 solution of water and baking soda to use as a cleaning solution. Brush it on with an old tooth brush and let sit until it stops bubbling (5-6 minutes). While you are waiting, you might wipe down your battery cases with a wet rag and blow out the debris that might be in your box. Also check the tightness of any brackets that may be holding your batteries in place. After the baking soda has done its job,



just wipe the terminals down with a rag (or rinse with a water hose, <u>careful</u> not to splash anything on your rig). At this point you can add some terminal grease or anti-corrosion spray to the terminals and re-attach the cables. If you have a complex cable layout, it is best to snap a picture <u>before</u> you take it all apart.

If you have Lithium batteries, your investment upfront will save you a lot of maintenance. Just keep them clean with a little multi-purpose cleaner and a rag. There is no acid to build up on terminals.

Finally, check your voltage (on FLA and AGM) after they have charged. If you are not getting a voltage over 11.7 volts, you might want to take them to a battery dealer and have them load tested. They might be at the end of their life.

### **Product Review**

This months' review comes from Tanner Terry our unit FVP. He uses and highly recommends the AirSafe hitch.



I started researching AirSafe hitches after replacing several rivets on our AS after every trip. I ended up purchasing a Class VI AirSafe hitch with a 3" shank to fit my F-250 without having to use any reducer sleeves. Since I installed the AirSafe, the ride in the truck is much smoother than it was before and it is also easier to level the trailer for towing. We have noticed that our nightstand drawer does not open during trips anymore and we rarely have any missing rivets. The "porpoiseing" of the trailer is also reduced when we traverse over rough roads and bumps.

- Reduce driver fatigue
- Less wear and tear on truck and trailer
- Improve the quality of the ride
- Protect your precious cargo
- Free-floating airbag between truck and trailer, no pivoting points
- Non-hinged design allows for better performance and superior shock absorption

AirSafe hitches deliver what they advertise and, based on my experience, I would recommend one if you are going to tow with any HD pickup.

## Trip Diary

After leaving Michigan, our next scheduled event was the "Sip of Oregon" in McMinnville. Our original plan was to go through Minnesota, North Dakota, Montana, Idaho, and Washington to get there. But because life had other plans, we detoured to get "paintless dent repair" (PDR) performed on our truck in Indiana and return to Texas for some other truck upgrades. Then we returned



to Washington from Texas via a route that would take us back through Colorado and Utah so we were able to visit friends and family again. Spontaneity is one of the best things about traveling in an Airstream!



Since we were anxious to get to Creede, we only made a single stop in Texas along our route. There is a free overnight city camping location in Dumas, TX. They had 30 & 50-amp power and a dump station that we didn't use. I think they had water available as well but we didn't need that, either. The park was close to train tracks (of course) but it really wasn't too bad for a quick overnight stay. On Google Maps, search for "Texoma RV Park" to find it.

When we got to Colorado, we stayed at the Marshal Park Campground outside of Creede. It's a primitive National Forest campground with pit toilets. Unfortunately, the hand pumps for fresh water were disabled because the water had recently failed testing. We used a propane generator to keep the Airstream's batteries and a portable power station charged. Water was pilfered from our friends in a nearby RV resort when we visited. And we finally got to visit Great Sand Dunes National Park, see North Clear Creek Falls, hike the trail above Creede, and visited every nearby National Forest campground we could find in the area.

through Our trip Utah was an opportunity to revisit Dead Horse Point State Park at a perfect time for stargazing at night. We couldn't pass up the opportunity to relax here again and soak in the views. After leaving, we provisioned in Provo and then headed to Bear Lake on the Idaho border. It's clear, beautiful blue color has earned it the nickname "Caribbean of the Rockies". We stayed in the North Eden which had just campground been renovated. It is a nice campground with paved pads, power, water, and a gazebo at each site. Visit The Burger Barn in Garden City for their famous raspberry shake. The burgers were pretty good as well.



From Wallace, the drive to the Washington Land Yacht Harbor (WLYH) in Olympia, WA was about 6 hours. We were anxious to get there and rest for a week or two in the Terraport. The WLYH is a great location on the west coast to use as a home base for exploring the area.



We still didn't get to visit Olympic National Park - maybe next time. We did go into Tacoma and visit a McMenamins restaurant and pub there. We also enjoyed the farmer's market in downtown Olympia.
