We'll have time to talk at the business meeting on September 9.



Boondocking at the Crown Point Rally

With warm days and cool nights, Northeast Mountaineers caught relief from the summer heat at the Crown Point State Campground, July 19--21. Eleven rigs participated, including a guest family from North Carolina. Mountaineers learned about the history of the Crown Point fort peninsula jutting out into Lake Champlain, how to cook by fire (the old way), and what to do and not do when boondocking. Many members woke up Saturday morning with very low battery power. If that's happened to you when you're camping with no hookups, Michael Giunta offers some tips and tricks to stay powered up:

- a. Make sure that everything is off except the main power and the fridge.
- b. The inverter is a major power drain, so it's best to not use it at all while boondocking... The USB ports will still work for USB devices.
- c. Make sure the power antenna is off; it's usually near one of the TVs and will glow a little green light when on.
- d. Keep the pump off unless using.
- e. Keep lights off when not in that space and use only when needed. I use a battery lantern in the camper when boondocking.
- f. Keep the fridge on but only put precooled items in it (ice packs help also)

- g. On a sunny day try to park in the sun so any rooftop solar panels will charge the batteries.
- h. Buy a portable solar panel (a great simple environmentally friendly option) that you can place in the sun if you're parking in the shade.
- i. Bring along a gas generator to help if the power gets low.
- j. Running the vent fan will use up the batteries over time. OK to leave the vent open but turn off completely (put knob on 0)

Mike says we have been doing the above for many years now and my family and I boondock 80% of the time and we are doing this on just AGM batteries.

The batteries most important job is to keep our food at the right temp. (Refrigerators on older rigs can also run on propane)

I have also installed a Victron Smart Shunt to know what item is using how much energy. The shunt has an app on the phone that is very useful.
