- Either directly register online using the jotform link: https://form.jotform.com/213460194044146 or follow the 'Register for the Rally' link on the webpage, or send this form and payment to the registrar at norcalregistrar3854@gmail.com. It is preferred you register online, which makes it easier for the Registrar and Treasurer to keep track of rally registrations.
- Send all payments directly to the Registrar. Make your checks payable to WBCCI/NorCal and mail to NorCal Registrar Lori Bibby, 3029 Black Hawk Ln., Lincoln, CA 95648-7716. Note: All online payments have been suspended pending implementation of the new online payment system.
 - Refund Policy: Cancellations and/or changes to registration must be received no later than Wednesday
 of

the week prior to the rally, in other words, a week before the start of the rally. Refunds will be available depending on funds recovered in all categories. Parking fees are refunded according to RV park cancellation policy. Meals, tours, rally fees, etc., are refunded if money has not been spent by the hosts.

- Please contact the Rally Registrar if you have ANY changes to your registration, or wish to register after the deadline. 973-270-4132.
 - Under no circumstances are members to contact the RV Park with changes or cancellations.
 - NorCal abides by the federal, state and local COVID19 mandates to keep not only its members safe but also the employees of the RV Parks and the communities we visit safe, which in turn allows us to continue to rally during the pandemic. Rally Hosting Made Easy

How would you like to host a party with other people's money? Be appreciated too. And have fun. Then sign up to host a NorCal rally. We need you. You can do it!

NorCal is a popular Airstream Club in part because it has a rally almost monthly at different venues, typically with a planned activity or two. This gives members a chance to enjoy their Airstreams almost all year round, and visit with their Airstream friends that they otherwise would not see very often, if at all.

But those rallies don't just happen. They are planned and executed by volunteers who (1) participate in and enjoy the rallies, (2) want to express their appreciation to those other members who have made previous rallies possible by stepping up and hosting one too, and (3) want to keep the different rallies going as a club amenity.

For several reasons, the Club cannot expect the same people to continually host rallies, nor does the Club want that. If there are no volunteer hosts for many of the rallies, they will probably be cancelled, eventually leading solely to informal no-host flash rallies. which means everyone is on their own to reserve and pay for their own site (no more group rate), and do their own food and activities. This is fine for the occasional rally (indeed, we had one last year in Oakdale), but is not healthy for the Club as a whole that strives to be inclusive rather than exclusive and provide a variety of experiences for all its Club members.

Most rallies are put on by co-hosts, so you will not be doing the whole thing by yourself. Tasks can be easily delegated. Secondly, there are plenty of people around you can contact for any input, ideas or assistance you might need and who would be delighted to do so, e.g. the Smithsons, Carole Echols, the Murrays, Jane Malone, the Davisons, the Christies, the Crutchfields, Pat L, the Bibbys, the Verdegaals, Carmen Ortiz, etc. Just ask! Third, numerous people in the Club have special talents that can be tapped to facilitate your rally, such as cooking, craft making, music making, games and contests, or great ideas.

The easiest way to start is to pick a theme. Once you have a theme, the rest falls into place with some advanced planning. Your theme can be based on the location of the rally, the time of year, or whatever you want. Then:

(1) You will need to know the costs of your rally. First, find out the cost of the site per night, and whether there are any pet fees. This information you get from the rally chair. Secondly, determine the cost of any meals you will provide to the group. Two group meals are generally planned – the Welcome Dinner on Wednesday and the Saturday night Dinner, both of which can be anything - catered by a local restaurant or caterer, pot luck, steak burn, BBQ, take-out, food truck, group cooking, etc. Figure out what you want to do and estimate the cost of whatever you are providing, per person. If you use a caterer, or purchase take-out, they can provide you with that information and you can add in a tip amount for the rally charge. If you purchase food to cook, you will need to estimate a cost per person based on what you will be

buying and providing. Costco and Smart and Final are good places for purchasing food for a group. Fortunately you will know the number of people attending your rally well before you purchase any food, but you will need to know the general per person cost of any meal two months before the rally. Finally, scope out the area of your rally to see if there any activities suitable for a group that you may want to facilitate and any costs involved per person. Or if you provide a craft-making event, figure the costs of the craft supplies on a per person basis

- (2) Write a brief explanation of the Rally, what is there to see in the area, and why you think people should attend. Provide this to the Newsletter Editor, along with all the cost information for the rally coupon, two and a half months prior to the rally for inclusion in the Newsletter and on the Website in time for people to register. For example: if you are hosting the September Rally, you would supply your information to the Newsletter Editor by June 15th for inclusion in the July Poppy. For the September Rally, the cut off for registrations is July 31st so you will have a month to prepare for your
- (3) Prepare for your rally: You will have \$200 to purchase items for welcome bags, décor if any, prizes for contests or games you provide, Confirm with your caterers and any other vendors. Keep track of your expenses on a chart or spreadsheet, put all receipts in an envelope or file scanned to your computer to keep everything handy when it comes time

to submit your receipts for reimbursement. You will be reimbursed for any decorations, food, welcome bag items, door prizes, up front activity expenses and hospitality purchases after you submit your receipts.

- (4) Execute and Enjoy. Take or have someone take photos of the event for the newsletter.
- (5) After your rally, submit receipts and spreadsheet for reimbursement to Treasurer.
- (6) Send article and photos about your rally to the Newsletter Editor. You are done!

Ed and I joined the Club in January 2017, and attended our first Rally in April 2017, with others to follow. We enjoyed and watched what other people did when hosting a rally, thinking we would give it a year before taking the plunge. In December 2018, we signed up to be co-hosts for the 2019 Christmas Rally. We learned by watching others, and by doing it. Is it work? Yes, although the amount will depend on the size of the rally you choose. Contact our Rally Chair for

more information on hosting any particular rally. Frankly, most of the work is in the planning. The more you plan, the better the Rally.

Is it gratifying? Oh yes! Most people are very appreciative that you stepped up to host them. You get to know more people in the Club this way. Plus, you can enjoy all the other rallies guilt free because you stepped up and volunteered to do your part to keep what sets NorCal apart from other Airstream Clubs. If enough people stepped up (after all we have well over 200 members), the same people would only co-host every couple of years.

NorCal has published a booklet that very helpfully and specifically sets forth what you need to do for a successful rally. It is available on the NorCal website:

In summary, when you host a NorCal rally, not only do you get to host a party with other people's money but you won't be alone in doing so (unless you want to be). So what are you waiting for?

UPDATE: This article was initially written in January 2020, before COVID. Since that time, our rallies are dependent on the pandemic situation and the restrictions and safety protocols in place. We have held hosted rallies during the pandemic, in which the hosts provide goodie bags and suggestions for where to go in the area to eat or sightsee on an individual basis. There are no group meals or events, other than our traditional happy hour. Others rallies have been totally outdoors, without use of a clubhouse, but with catered meals via Food trucks. Lately, we have been able to meet inside with catered meals, but the situation is fluid and could change. You need to do what makes you comfortable. I totally missed this, but 2021 was Airstreams 90th year in operation. 2021 also coincided with the release of an documentary entitled "Allumination," filmed by independent film maker Eric Bricker over the course of almost seven years. In 2013, the filmmaker and co-producer contacted Airstream CEO Bob Wheeler, who not only gave them his blessing, but put them in contact with Wally's second cousin, Dale "Pee Wee" Schwamborn, and Airstream Life publisher and editor Rich Luhr. These contacts opened up a whole new arena to explore, specifically. "the impassioned community of Airstream fans." "We wanted to make a movie which served as a passport to the world of Airstream," said Bricker. "It was quite the epic journey in charting the terrain of the Airstream world and then

distilling it down to 80 minutes. We shot in 16 states, spoke with hundreds of people, and struggled for years in trying to weave together all of our footage into a singular story we felt conveyed the spirit of Airstream, both past and present." To accomplish this, he was also able to access the myriad of digital footage Airstream Archivist & Historian Samantha Martin maintains. 

Toffee Graham Cracker Bars

Phyllis Minadeo made these for the Christmas Cookie Share at the December rally. They are incredibly delicious, and I may have to purchase a jelly roll pan to make them myself. However, they must be accompanied by a warning: You cannot eat just one piece! Just ask Dave Williams.

Editor

Ingredients:

20 graham crackers (individual squares), regular or chocolate 1 1/2 sticks butter (6 ounces) 3/4 cup brown sugar 1 teaspoon vanilla 1/2 cup chopped pecans

Directions:

Line a jelly roll pan (10x15-inch) with foil; arrange graham crackers in the pan in a single layer. Combine butter and sugar in a heavy medium saucepan; bring to a boil over medium heat, stirring occasionally. Boil for 2 minutes; stir in vanilla and chopped pecans. Pour the hot mixture over crackers and spread evenly. Bake 10 minutes at 350°. Remove at once from pan to flat surface to cool. When cool, break into smaller pieces.



Salinger's Paleo Granola

Janie Salinger reports that she received many requests for her Paleo Granola recipe during the November rally. She states that for those who were at Jessie's Grove, she used walnuts and pecans and added dried cranberries to the granola, but she adds that "any nuts and dried fruit will work in this recipe."

Ingredients:

3 cups raw almonds, chopped
3 cups raw cashews, chopped
3/4 cup raw sunflower seeds (no shell)
3/4 cup raw pepitas*
1 1/2 cup unsweetened coconut flakes
3/4 cup coconut oil
1/2 cup coconut palm sugar
1/2 cup mild flavored honey
2 tsp vanilla
1/2 - 1 tsp sea salt
2 cup pitted dates, chopped


Mix everything in a large bowl except for the sea salt and chopped dates, stirring to coat evenly. If the mixture is too wet, add more chopped almonds and chopped cashews.

Spread evenly on a baking sheet and bake at 300 degrees until lightly golden. This may take 30-40 minutes.

When the granola has cooled for 10 minutes, sprinkle on the sea salt and chopped dates. Let cool. This recipe keeps in the fridge for over a month.
