We'll park. The Lassen RV Resort is in the scenic Fall River Valley. The 68-acre campground on a lightly oak forested bench above the valley offers stunning views. Your campsite will be partially tree-shaded, spacious, and flat. Most have picnic tables, and grill/firepits. Although it is off the main highway and quiet, there is easy access to Highway 299 and



the many things to do nearby.

We'll eat. Wednesday welcome dinner (hot sandwiches, salad, and dessert) provided by the hosts will be held in the pavilion. Saturday night we will enjoy a catered pasta meal from the Bistro. Thursday, Friday, and Saturday we will enjoy our morning gatherings with coffee, peanut butter and jelly toast tradition.

Off site there are restaurants in nearby McArthur (Crumb's) and Fall River



Mills (the Historic Hotel Restaurant.)

We'll get creative. For our craft project, we will paint a miniature bird-house. When completed it could become an object d'art for ones house or yard or Airstream.

We'll exchange Airstream tips.

There will be a chance to trade helpful hints and information about using and maintaining our Airstreams.

We'll relax. At the resort there are hiking and biking trails with possible glimpses of wildlife. We may borrow equipment from the office for horse-



shoes, badminton, and volleyball. The swimming pool is available beginning in mid-June but it might be warm enough for an early opening.

We'll explore McArthur and beyond. McArthur-Burney Falls, Lassen Volcanic National Park, Lava Beds National Park, and Ash Creek Wildlife area are just a few of the possible day trips. The Heritage Balloon Festival is scheduled to begin Friday May 8 at 2 PM and end Sunday at 2 PM at the Intermountain Fair Event Center in McArthur. There will be a mass ascension (weather permitting) of hot air balloons on both Saturday and Sunday at 6:30 AM. The well-known Fort Crook Historical Museum is in Fall River Mills. Some may be interested in going to the Radio Lab near Hat Creek.

We'll take to the water. Canoeing, kayaking, and fishing on Big Lake, Baum Lake, Hat Creek, and Fall River are possible.

We'll golf. The Fall River Valley Golf and Country Club is one of the loveliest in California, with wildlife, forests, rolling hills, and sweeping view.

We'll stargaze. If the moon doesn't make an appearance, there will be opportunities to try out our apps.

NorCal Does Pasadena!

Region 12 Rally Pasadena, California

Dec. 27th - January 1st 2019-2020



As Kai Ryssdal of Marketplace says - "Let's do the numbers!" On January 1, 2020, we ioined millions to watch the 131st Rose Parade on Colorado Boulevard in Pasadena. It was the 39th Rose Parade Special Event Rally, the 9th for Tom and Hedda and the 7th year of co-hosting with Bob and Cecelia Stansbury of the Lake Tahoe Airstream Club. But - where would one rather be in late December but in beautiful downtown Pasadena, waking to the calls of the wild parrots and watching beautiful sunsets over our Air-



streams.

Region 12 was well represented with 15 Airstreams from CA and 5 from NV. Texas sent 6 and there was one from each of the following

states: NC, TN, PA, and NM. Participants were fed two dinners and three breakfasts. During the day nary a truck or toad could be seen as everyone seemed to enjoy being out and about until reconvening at happy hour.

There are many parade-related events one can choose to see:
Bandfest, spread over two and a



half days and several performances to accommodate all the bands performing in the parade, float construction viewing, and Equifest showcasing the equine groups in the parade such as the Budweiser Clydesdales. Not to be missed are the nearby attractions such as the Huntington Library & Gardens that easily takes a day to see, plus there is plenty of shopping and numerous restaurants within walking distance of the rally spot.

Wait, there is more: one gets to celebrate New Years with fellow Airstreamers, and if one wants, the entire crowd amassing on Colorado Blvd in preparation for the parade the following day

After which one gets to retire to their own comfy Airstream until the next morning, when they walk a mere 4 blocks to their very own grandstand seat high up in the stand, complete with it's own "comfort station" should one need it while enjoying the Parade and festivities for the next two plus hours. If one chooses to stay an additional night, they can attend the Post Parade Float Viewing for an up close and personal view in detail of all the floats.



Next year, the 40th Rose Parade Rally for the 2021 Parade will be the last one hosted by the Stansburys and the Smithsons, and It may be the last one period unless another host or hosts step up, which has not yet happened yet. So the hosts are giving priority to those who have never attended the Rally,

Sign ups have already begun - they are half full as of this writing. The registration form is on Region 12 website. If you desire to go, sign up even if the rally is full. There will be a wait list and invariably by the time September and October roll around most on the wait list get on. The Blue Line Experience At the Rose Parade

On New Years Eve, the Ungermans and the Verdegaals took the "night before" walk down Colorado Blvd., where 1000s of families and friends were saving prime territory on the sidewalks, while vehicles were "cruisin" the street. To the uninitiated, it is a mob scene with people literally camping out all night for a sweet spot to view the parade.

After passing the grandstands for which we had tickets, we met a family that had been coming to the Rose Parade since before the Father (now 57) was born. His parents (both now deceased) were fervent Rose Parade fans and never missed one for well over a Century. The Eldest Daughter (now 67) estimated she had been going her whole life (including in utero), and now the grandchildren (one in college, the other in high school) were also practicing the tradition in honor of their grandparents, accompanied by a few friends of the family. Even though the Father moved to Arizona years ago, his family still makes the trek to Pasadena every year in their

RV, which they park on on a side street December 31st for free. When it is time, they claim the same area on the Colorado Blvd. sidewalk to await the parade the following morning.

Since their territory this year was big enough, the family offered us a place to park our camp chairs for the night so we too could watch from the street instead of the grandstand, and to guard our camp chairs all night. After debating the pros and cons, their offer was accepted.

At 10 p.m., Colorado Blvd. was closed to all vehicle traffic, and the entire mass of humanity moved from the sidewalk out to the "blue line" on the street, about 3 feet from the curb. This is prime parade viewing territory since it is the blue line that separates the viewers from the participants (That and the several motor scooters that traverse up and down the blue line during the parade so no one goes past it.) We dutifully moved our camp chairs out to the blue line with everyone else and bid our new friends good night. The

following morning, we rejoined them to watch the parade from the comfort of our camp chairs.

It was a different experience to see the parade from the blue line. Not necessarily better since the seats in the grandstand provide a better overview of everything, but certainly more intimate, since you could actually see people's faces, and hear them talk to the crowd. If felt more like being a part of the parade. As long as we did not have to spend all night in the cold guarding the chairs, it was a fun way to enjoy this fabulous event. Elisa Ungerman

The Western Winter Blast Flash Rally

The evening begins with the "amateur" rocket builders showing off their custom made wares. Then various companies/artists, put on successive synchronized shows. The cost to park is \$8.00 and \$8.00 per person to view from the grandstand seating at Havasu 95 Speedway at SARA Park.

Jack & Mike Henry shared what they remembered about the Pyrotechnic Show they attended years ago in the April 2019 issue of The Poppy, and a possible Flash Rally was suggested. The Henrys, Echols, Ortizes, Maffeis and ourselves immediately reserved sites at The Islander Resort in Lake Havasu. Unfortunately, the Maffeis had to cancel at the last minute so did not attend.

We all envisioned that we would sit outside our trailers with beverage in hand and watch the shows, but it did not work out that way as the pyrotechnic show was nine miles away. 

Sunday morning we departed, heading to the Alabama Hills near Lone Pine where we stayed on BLM land with a lovely picturesque view of the surrounding hills and mountains. If you are thinking of going, be aware that Lake Havasu City is very crowded this time of year, what with all the snowbirds in town and the various events and festivals going on at the same time.
