The hulls, soft outer cover, go to dairy farms to be used as feed for cattle. The shells are sold to co-generation plants as fuel or to farmers for livestock bedding. The nuts consumers purchase to eat as they are a healthy and tasty snack, and help pay for modifications/repairs our Airstream might need. Next time you see us, check out our new walnut table.

Are you ready for some Napa & Sonoma Vallev fun? Please join us at our "Skyline's the Limit" Rally in Napa! Skyline Park is situated in South Napa and is a very convenient location to explore the Napa and Sonoma Valleys and

surrounding areas! In addition to the wine industry, both valleys boast some great hiking opportunities, bike riding, site seeing and shopping. Our adventure will start Wednesday evening in Skyline Park with a welcome potluck style dinner. Hosts will provide the main dish, coleslaw, and rolls. *Please sign up for an appetizer, side dish or dessert to share.*

Thursday will start off with an educational event at the park's facility presented to us by Portocork America. Skyline Park has cork trees on the property that will be part of the demonstration. *There is no cost for this event, but please sign up so we can accommodate everyone.* The rest of the day you are on your own to explore. All of your hosts will have some great ideas for wine tasting in either Sonoma or Napa and will send out more information in advance of the rally. Thursday night we will meet back at the park facility for our usual cocktail time, but you're on your own for dinner.

If you've had enough wine, on Friday afternoon you may want to try out a tour and tasting at Napa Valley Distillery or visit the di Rosa Center for Contemporary Art in Carneros. Friday night, Tary & Janie Salinger will host an extended "Happy Hour" at their home – featuring heavy appetizers and artisan pizzas thrown by the hosts. Don't worry, there will be enough food to count this as "dinner". We're hoping this will be an event to satisfy your tastebuds. Their home is a little more than 2 miles from Skyline Park. Service provided, but BYOB.

Saturday is another day to explore Napa and Sonoma. At 3 p.m. you are encouraged to join member Tony Paz at the Archery Range for an Archery Class. Saturday night, we have arranged for a catered Fiesta to be prepared by the La Condessa Taco Truck – one of Napa's best! Dinner will follow our normal cocktail time and you'll just need to bring table service and BYOB. At Saturday's dinner we will also pay tribute to past Presidents. We hope to see everyone there!

Notice: As you may know, Covid has affected all industries in different ways. The wine industry is no different. Costs have escalated over the past 2-3 years and wineries have changed the way they present their wines. With that said, we suggest that you make reservations well in advance for any wineries or restaurants that you would like to visit.

Further Notice: This RV park has 19 Full Hook up sites (\$65/night) and 16 with Water and Electrical only (\$50/night). Dump station is available. It is suggested that those with larger holding tanks may want to consider the W&E only sites. It is highly recommended that you send your payment to the Treasurer ASAP after registering to confirm your registration. Sites are first come, first serve to those who fully confirm their registration, regardless of site type.

Results of Airstream International Constitutional Amendments



At the Delegate's Meeting during the International Rally in Fryeberg Maine, two amendments to the Airstream Club International's Constitution as previously discussed in the May and June issues of the Poppy were at issue. The Northern California Airstream Club had a total of 313 possible votes. This reflects the number of people who, at the time of voting in June, were members of NorCal and had provided Airstream International with a valid email address. Just twenty-five percent of NorCal's members eligible to vote did so. Our Club vote on the issues was as follows:

Amendment 1	Yes - 79	No - 2	Abstain - 2
Amendment 2	Yes - 77	No - 4	Abstain - 2

Mike Mineado served as NorCal's delegate at the Delegate's Meeting and tendered those votes. When the dust settled and all the votes from each participating Club had been counted, both motions passed by comfortable margins. Below is a recap on items voted on at the Airstream Club International Delegates' Meeting on July 27, 2022, as disclosed by Airstream International Headquarters:

Results for Constitutional Amendments 1 & 2:

- 99 of 104 local clubs participated in the vote
- Members-at-Large from 12 regions voted
- Amendment #1 passed with 77% "yes" vote
- Amendment #2 passed with 71% "yes" vote

What does this mean moving forward? Airstream International tells us that "more information coming soon, but no major changes in this first transitional

year. But get ready for an election in the spring of 2023 where members will, for the first time ever, get the opportunity to vote for a full slate of Executive Council (EC) members." Then the full International Board of Trustees (IBT), consisting of Region Presidents and EC Members, will select the International Officers (President, VP, Secretary and Treasurer) from the people within the IBT already elected the members.

Region Presidents are expected to reach out to us in the spring for our thoughts and preferences. "They'll add your feedback to what they've personally observed within the IBT to identify the people with the best leadership, communication and demonstrated collaboration skills" said Airstream Headquarters.

We have also been told that a Special Committee has been formed to look at the Executive Council nominations process, and that more details will be coming in the fall of 2023 about the application process for anyone interested in applying for a seat on the Executive Council. Executive Council positions will be for two years.

Finally, we also know that from now on, there will be no longer be any business meetings at the International Rally. For some people, that is the best news.



Rock Springs is within a couple hundred miles of attractions like the Rocky Mountains, Yellowstone and Glacier National Parks, so save the date for an unforgettable rally coupled with an amazing destination!

Online registration opened Thursday, July **28**th and is ongoing. Registration information as provided by HQ and the 2023 International Planning Committee is listed below. [Ed. note: It appears that at the RV on site is the parking fee and the per person cost is the rally fee. So cost for one person in an Airstream parked onsite is \$500, for two its \$625.]
