Check it out: <u>airstreamclub.org/louisiana</u> The link should take you directly to the club's website. The other part of the address is for the **WBAC** home page for information on international events and information about the international club. <u>airstreamclub.org</u> To search the home website you will have to log in to the site. You will need to have a login password. First-time users will use their BRN (Big Red Number) to log in, then set your new password to use the next time you log in. Once logged in to the site, be sure to remember to log out.

Our website provides information about the club, copies of newsletters present and past, recent photos, officers, the Blue Book, and future events/rallies. Once you log on to our site, click on the homepage to establish that you are on our site, next scroll down the page of directory menu listings, about our club, newsletters, events, and rallies. You can continue to scroll down the website's main page to see posted events scheduled for the next 6 months. Or, click on the menu for events and rallies to see all listed rallies for the year with information about those rallies.








UPCOMING RALLY SCHEDULE

GPS may route you south on Highway 308. There are two options for driving down the bayou. Hwy. 308 (east side of the bayou) does not have shoulders. Louisiana 1 (west side of the bayou) has shoulders.

There is a Walmart on La. 1 after you exit Hwy. 90 for supplies you may have left home without. Grand Isle Supermarket and Sureway Supermarket are two small grocers on the island.


There is a toll bridge in Leeville. The cameras will catch your license plate and bill you. The approximate cost is \$25-30.

GRAND ISLE MIGRATORY BIRD FESTIVAL 🕊

Below are a few links that you may enjoy visiting to learn more about the Bird Migratory Event.

"After a long flight across the Gulf of Mexico, migrating birds flock to Grand Isle to rest after their difficult journey. The island has become one of the best places in the world to see the variety of species flying north in the spring and back south in the fall," said Grand Isle Mayor David Camardelle. "The Migratory Bird Festival not only celebrates their arrival to Grand Isle but provides easy viewing access to visitors."

See songbirds in oak-hackberry woods, shorebirds, and waders on beaches and in the marshes, and raptors overhead. Grand Isle is an essential stop for songbirds during their spring and fall migrations across the Gulf of Mexico. The celebration is held annually to correspond with peak bird migration in April.

Highlights of this year's event include expert-led bird-watching tours on the **Grand Isle Birding Trail, State Park, and Elmer's Island**. Visitors can watch the Louisiana Department of Wildlife and Fisheries catch migrating songbirds for weighing and measuring before release in Lafitte Woods Preserve. Kayak tours through the island's mangroves will be offered.

This Annual Celebration Event, initiated in 1998, was created in part to support the purchase and management of the Grand Isle Sanctuary to protect some of the last remaining undeveloped chenier habitats (live oak ridges). The event is hosted by the Grand Isle Sanctuary Group, Grand Isle Community Development Team, Town of Grand Isle, The Louisiana Nature Conservancy, and Barataria-Terrebonne National Estuary Program."

WHAT'S COOKING

Instant Pot Seafood Paella

Prep Time: 15 minutes | Cook Time: 17 minutes | Serves 6

- 2 cups chopped white fish and scallops 2 cups mussels and shrimp
- 4 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 onion, diced
- 1 red bell pepper, diced

green bell pepper, diced
cups rice
A few saffron threads
cups fish stock
Salt and ground black pepper to taste

- 1. Set the Instant Pot to the Saute function on Normal, add the oil, and heat up.
- 2. Add the onion and bell peppers, and saute for 4 minutes.
- 3. Add the fish, rice, and saffron, stir. Cook for 2 minutes more.
- 4. Pour in the fish stock and season with salt and pepper, stir.
- 5. Place the shellfish on top.
- 6. Press the CANCEL key to stop the saute' function.
- 7. Lock the lid in place and set the Instant Pot to Pressure Cook on high for 6 minutes.
- 8. Once cooking is complete, select CANCEL and let naturally release for 10 minutes. Release any remaining steam manually. Uncover the pot.
- 9. Stir the dish and let sit for 5 minutes.
- 10. Serve and enjoy!
