Hillbilly Cooking

WAC*Salad

The toppings and dressings for this salad can be made at home before the trip.

For the salad:

One large head of romain lettuce chopped

3 scallions sliced thin

One broccoli head broken up in small pieces, about 2 cups

Usually I make this just before serving but it can be made a day or two in advance and packaged in a sealed plastic bag.

Toppings

1 package Raman oriental-seasoned noodles, crushed with the flavoring packet set aside

¼ cup sunflower seeds

½ cup sliced almonds

2 tablespoons of butter

Melt the butter in a saute pan. Add the crushed noodles, seeds and nuts and cook over medium heat until lightly browned. Cool then place in a sealed container.

Dressing

½ package of the seasoning from the noodles

½ cup canola oil

½ cup sugar

¼ cup white vinegar

1-1/2 tablespoons soy sauce

I generally make the dressing just before serving but it too can be made ahead of time and put in a sealed container for travel.

To serve, place the salad in a large bowl, add the toppings and dressing, and mix thoroughly.

Spring trip part 5

Theodore Roosevelt National Park

In the spring of 2024, we took an 8,267-mile trip from New Jersey to the Oregon pacific coast and back. This article picks up where we left off in last month's issue: headed east from Malta Montana and our visit to the Upper Missouri River Breaks National Monument for our next stop, Theodore Roosevelt National Park.

Although Montana has, officially, 62 named mountain ranges and thousands of named mountains, they are all in the west and south of the state. Where we were, up on the Highline, US route 2, just south of the Canadian border and headed east for North Dakota, it's mostly flat with some gently rolling hills, almost all ranchland. We passed Fort Peck Lake, Montana's largest, created by damming the Missouri, then at the town of Wolf Point turned off US2 to US25, crossing the Missouri below the dam and heading south for Medora, North Dakota, the gateway to the South Unit of Theodore Roosevelt National Park.

At this point we can't resist retelling an old joke.

A scout rode up to report to General Custer as his regiment approached Little Bighorn. "General," the scout said, "I have some bad news and some good news." "What's the bad news?" asked Custer. "Sir, there are about 10,000 Indians camped at Little Bighorn waiting to massacre us." "OK," said Custer, "what's the good news?" "Sir," said the scout, "we won't have to go back to North Dakota."

Which is of course totally unfair to North Dakota.

The joke's low opinion of the state probably stemmed from two things: the weather (blazing hot summers, astoundingly cold winters), and North Dakota's badlands, so named (in 19th century diaries and books they are referred to as "Bad Lands", capital B capital L) because to someone on foot or on a horse, they are just plain bad if you want to get somewhere, not to mention their uselessness for farming or ranching or even mechanical transportation (the transcontinental railroad goes around them to the north, and to this day there are only two roads that cross them, I-90 and US-12). Theodore Roosevelt tried ranching in the badlands and 60% of his 1,000-head herd died in the winter of 1886-7. He gave up, wrote three books about his experiences there, and became president instead in 1901. For the purposes of civilization, the badlands may indeed be bad, but for us, products and beneficiaries of that civilization, they are also beautiful, even spectacular, and that's why we went to Medora, North Dakota.

The North Dakota badlands (as distinct from the badlands of South Dakota, Nebraska, Montana and Alberta, among others) start near the southwest corner of the state and follow the winding course of the Little Missouri River, which carved them, ending east of Williston, North Dakota where the Little Missouri enters the Missouri River, a distance of about 150 miles. With an average width of about 35 miles, these badlands cover about five thousand square miles or 3.3 million acres. Shortly after Roosevelt died in

1919, a movement began to commemorate the president with a national park in the badlands where he lived for a few years. After some twists and turns, Theodore Roosevelt National Park was founded in 1947 in honor of the 26th president, who died aged 60 in 1919. It is the only national park named after a single person. For a western national park, it is small: three units separated by some 80 miles totaling 70,000 acres (Yellowstone is over 2.2 million acres). We visited the south unit, the largest and most visited. Although we did not go there (next time!) the north unit is apparently wilder and less popular. The third unit is just a few acres that preserves what's left of Roosevelt's ranch.

The park may be small, but it is a gem, a miniature portrait of what the badlands, and much of the great plains, was like until roughly 200 years ago: native grasslands, prairie dog towns, bison, wild horses, antelope, elk, big horn sheep and of course that wonderful landscape. The south unit, which is hard by I-94, has a 48-mile scenic loop road that allows visitors on short stays to make the most of their visit.

The entrance to the south unit is in the town of Medora, North Dakota, which, due to its location next to the interstate and the park, has become principally a tourist town, albeit one that is pretty upscale as tourist towns go, with a lot of new development including an outdoor mall, amusement and water park, campgrounds, a golf course, several restaurants and hotels, guest ranches, a theater, conference center, and a surprising amount of new upscale homes perched on the hills outside of town.

Because the National Park campground has no services (water, electric, sewer) we stayed instead about a mile out of town at Solly Creek State Park which has since been renamed Rough Rider State Park and is undergoing a \$4 million expansion. Our site, a turnout off the park road, had water and electric. Morning and evening we were serenaded by a western meadowlark sitting a stone's throw away on a fence post. Prior to the expansion (which is apparently starting this year) Solly Creek/Rough Rider had 11 electric and water sites. Because we were there in late April we had no difficulty reserving a site a couple of days in advance but this is unlikely to be the case during the summer months. Medora does

have at least four other commercial RV parks and campgrounds if no space is available at the state park.

The campground at Solly Creek/Rough Riders State Park sits on a triangular piece of land bounded on two sides by tall cliffs, on the third by the Little Missouri River.



Beavers had been busy next to the campground.

Once we set up we explored the campground area. The Maah Daah Hey trail runs between the campground and the edge of the Little Missouri river. We hiked north along it towards its junction with Solly Creek. On

half levelled by beavers. We also spotted hoof prints (deer or antelope?) and lots of horse tracks. When we reached the junction of the creek and river we looked in vain for the footbridge that seemed to be indicated on our map; the trail at that point crossed to the other side of the river before continuing

the way we passed a stand of cottonwood trees that had been

that point crossed to the other side of the river before continuing north. Stymied, we turned around as the map we had seemed to show a footbridge across the river just beyond the creek. Later, a park ranger told us that in summer the Little Missouri dwindles to the point where it can be easily forded whether on foot or horse and the marks on our map indicated the fording point. In April, however, both the river and the creek were far too high to ford.

Some of the other towns can only be reached on foot. In all, the towns occupy more than 10 square miles scattered throughout the park.

Next, we stopped at the park visitor's center, which is right in the middle of Medora, to take in the exhibits and a short movie about the park. Then we took a leisurely drive around the scenic loop, which, when we were there, was not a loop due to construction. However, with a bit of back tracking we covered about 90% of the road in about four or five hours, driving slowly and stopping often to take in the views and watch the wildlife, particularly the bison, some of



which grazed watchfully right next to the road. As it was spring, they were in the process of shedding their winter coats, giving them a shaggy appearance. The park maintains a constant population of 350 of the massive, prehistoric-looking creatures, co-managing the population with the nearby Mandan, Hidatsa, and Arikara tribes, which maintain their own bison herds, to increase the herd's genetic diversity.

As we drove along the scenic drive we encountered 11 trailheads. On foot (or on a horse) is probably the best way to really see all the park has to offer. Unfortunately, due to our tight travel schedule, we had nowhere near enough time to take a proper hike. If we had, we would have been able to see the park's petrified forest, in the far north end, and its painted canyon, in the south end.

With regret at having to leave so soon and hopeful promises of returning again, we packed up the next morning and headed for our next stop, the very different Badlands National Park in South Dakota.

"A lot has been done there, with a lot more left to do. I am cautiously optimistic that we will gather this October, it is still 8 months away and with good weather, much can be accomplished.

"The dates for 2025 were set long before Helene blew through and are still good. So, for planning purposes, mark your calendars for October 23-26. We anticipate no changes to all the previous years of handling things: Come early/stay late, pay when you get there. I cannot commit to camping rates or rally fees but can assure you it will remain a bargain as always.

"There is no way to know for sure if it can happen, so please write the dates in pencil. We will keep everyone posted."

Lois adds:

If Alumalina does happen Derek and I will be attending. As we get closer, we will get an updated status out to our Club. It would be great to get a large group to represent New Jersey. This year's Watchung Club October rally and business meeting is scheduled for October 3-5, so the good news is we can attend both if we so desire:)
