Caravan Corner – Deb and Earl Gass

My wife Deb and I completed the Viking Trail Caravan this past summer of 2024. It was our 3rd caravan. We have thoroughly enjoyed all three. Each caravan was different—but all have been filled with adventure and new developed friendships



The Viking Caravan started and ended at 'The Arm of Gold' campground in North Sydney, Nova Scotia. Our caravan leader, Pat Leggatt and husband Murray of London, Ontario had guided us through many planning menus to not only prepare the kitty expenses (international funds through Canadian banking), the usual biographies submitted as background information, and reservations for various activities. We arrived at the campground on Saturday, June 22nd and returned on Saturday August 24th

Our border crossings were uneventful. There have been exceptions, but respectful courtesy will serve you

well. Of course, a valid passport is necessary. If you have a pet, be mindful of the vaccinations and appropriate documentation required both directions. Leave your guns and weapons at home; you will not need them and it will greatly complicate your crossing entry. Our experience was very similar to international air travel

Our ferry trips were pleasant; the crossing to Newfoundland is about 7 hours. We also explored Labrador for a few days, a shorter ferry trip and Fogo Island, an even shorter ferry trip

A memorable conversation was had with a Labrador resident while awaiting loading our truck and trailer. He noticed my Iowa license plate and inquired if I knew Caitlin Clark. The Caitlin Clark effect is everywhere.

The Viking Trail Caravan consisted of 20 units with 3 from Ontario and 17 from the United States: 3 from Texas, 1 each from California, New Mexico, Kansas, Nebraska, South Dakota, Iowa, Michigan, Tennessee, Mississippi, Florida, Delaware, Pennsylvania, Massachusetts, and Maine. A geographic diverse group, all wonderful people.

There are two main categories of memories for me: 1) The people of Newfoundland are refreshingly genuine and caring. The musical 'Come From Away' accurately captures how the people of Gander responded to the airplanes and their passengers that were ordered out of the sky due to



the September terrorist attack of September 11, 2001. The 38 passenger planes over the North Atlantic were carrying around 5,000 people which basically doubled the population of Gander—and they did not know when and if nor how the planes might depart.



The people of Gander and the surrounding communities were compassionate, innovative, and caring during the week that the planes were in Gander. We saw that same remarkable human qualities wherever we went in Newfoundland. As part of the caravan, we saw the musical 'Come From Away' in Gander. The constable during this 9/11 event was Oz Fudge. He came to our campground and visited with us for an hour. In preparation for a visit to Newfoundland or to view the musical, I highly recommend the book 'The Day The World Came To Town'.

One example of that personable, caring nature: I was at an event and typically there is minimal space to park. I was boxed in—no way for me to exit the truck and I resigned myself to be patient and wait. A local approached me and asked if I wanted to leave. I answered, yes, but waiting is my only option. He answered, perhaps not. In Newfoundland we leave our fob or ignition keys in our vehicles as a courtesy for neighbors or emergencies. He looked inside the car, found the keys, moved the car and I was on my way.

I heard more than once that there is little theft in Newfoundland as businesses and homes are minimally secured. If something goes missing, they needed it more than I.

The coastal topography and communities are gorgeous, wonderful to explore, the hiking trails and vistas are memorable.

If you enjoy geology, Gros Morne National Park is delightful. The age of our planet, the outer crust and shifting tectonic plates over eons of time—this is one of the premier locations for these studies. Tablelands is the specific area of the park, explained by a competent guide to our caravan. A direct opposite of this park adventure is the freshwater fjord of Western Brook Pond which was viewed from a vessel with another excellent guide. Probably the most challenging hike is inside this park, excellent vistas throughout

Gros Morne is an extension of the



plate that has formed the Appalachian Mountains; you soon understand why the eastern Maritime provinces affectionately refer to Newfoundland as 'The Rock'

Other parks included Port au Choix National Historical Site (original natives); L'Anse Aux Meadows National Historic Site (Viking settlement from 970 to 1030) which was around 500 years before Columbus arrived in North America and Red Bay, Labrador National Historic Site which was the center for commercial whaling

The early fishing and whaling industries started in the early 1500's (a hundred years before Plymouth Rock and Jamestown). Regional fisherman (the Normand's, the Bretons, and the Basques) visited, settled, and the shipping industries to support the harvests back to Europe. Soon, the harvesting of seal pelts followed. With over harvesting protections for seals and whales were enacted and in 1992 the lucrative cod fishing industry was shut down due to overfishing. Private fishing and limited commercial fishing have commenced again, but the main livelihood has changed dramatically. Tourism has replaced some of the gap; but many young people



leave Newfoundland to find work in Ontario or the oil industry of Alberta. Several of our stops had museums and other exhibits that explained this cultural history in detail. Deb and I were able to catch a few cod with a technique called 'jigging'

We also had some good history references. Newfoundland has always been strategic for travel and national security. The Gander airport referenced previously was important as a refueling station in earlier aviation, not so much today. Newfoundland was its own commonwealth, closely aligned with Britain. It was until around 1949 that it became part of Canada. I had to reference and recalibrate my U.S. History with World history. World War I was from 1914-1918. The United States was in the war from 1917-1918. Likewise, WWII was from 1939-1945. The United States was in the war from December 1941 to 1945. Supplies from the United States were going to Europe well before our entry in December 1941, but the tonnage sunk in the North Atlantic was significant through 1940, 1941, and most of 1942 before our Navy was able to counter the German submarines and provide security. In depth historical references were at several stops, with the most comprehensive at our easternmost stop of St John's With these stops I gained a greater perspective of the world stage during this era; and made me appreciate the national defense importance of The Panama Canal and Greenland and the Suez Canal

Animals like moose are always prevalent at dusk/dawn and night. We avoided travel during this time for safety and it worked. Whale sightings, dolphins, puffins were memorable. We did not take our bicycles and for us it was the correct decision. There are little to no shoulders on most Newfoundland roads; makes biking less enjoyable


There are occasions when the gnats and black flies are bothersome (dawn and dusk). Having the appropriate

netting headgear, long sleeves, pants is appropriate. The weather can be everything. We did run our air conditioner, but not much: likewise, we did run our furnace, but not much. We ran our ventilation fans often. A small dehumidifier (the humidity is like Iowa and it does rain); rain gear for some days and boat rides for Gros Morne and whale watching

Other activities of interest: 1) ATV rides/driving. 2) zip lining in a zig zag pattern down a beautiful mountain across a waterfall-stream. 3) antique car museum in Swift Current with Vernon Smith. He was a character, what a delight. 4) many restaurants, craft breweries, bakeries, and one forgettable winery 5) Newcomers are 'Screeched In' a welcoming ceremony

My only regret is not carving out placeholders on our itinerary before joining the caravan and after the caravan. There is even a post Viking Trail caravan called 'Meandering The Maritime' which would have been ideal as Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick are worth exploring. We did explore the Cabot Trail in Cape Breton National Park, although at a faster pace than I would have preferred. We also dropped by Quebec City, again too quick. Exploring the 'Plains of Abraham' to ponder a different outcome leading up to Treaty of 1763 and then King George imposing a dreadful tax on the Colonies leading up to our Declaration of Independence 1776. We made our reentry at Chain of Lakes, New York and made our way to South Bend, Indiana for a family gathering.

Our memories include the wonderful new people we met, our new friends, and our leader, Pat Leggatt—I cannot offer enough compliments to Pat and the previous leaders that forged this itinerary and



splendid arrangements with limited suppliers. Just as we renew friendships at our local rallies, the National Rallies are opportunities to see the fine people we have met on these caravans

Also, Muscatine was known as the "Pearl Button Capital of the World" during the 20th century. The National Pearl Button Museum is



located in Muscatine. Muscatine's pearl button industry hit its peak between 1908 and the '20s, when the factories in Muscatine produced 1.5 billion buttons.


